After the matter is turned over to an architect approximately eight weeks will be required before bids can be called for and contract for construction can be granted, it was announced by school officials.

3% Tax Discount Deadline Saturday

Folks are reminded that Saturday of this week, October 31, is the deadline for the 3% discount on taxes paid to the County Tax Assessor-Collector. Beginning November 1, the discount which applies to county and state tax payments drops to 2% and December 1st, it drops to 1 per cent.

All taxpayers who had property rendered in the county assessor's office have been mailed their tax statement and a large number have taken advantage of the discount and have paid their taxes during this month, it was announced by C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield, Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector for Mills County.

Stubblefield has also announced that anyone who failed to get their statement is urged to call or write the tax office and give them legal discription of property and tax statement will be prepared and mailed.

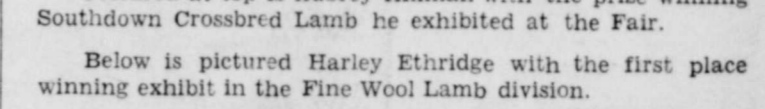

Mullin Future Farmers Still Winning

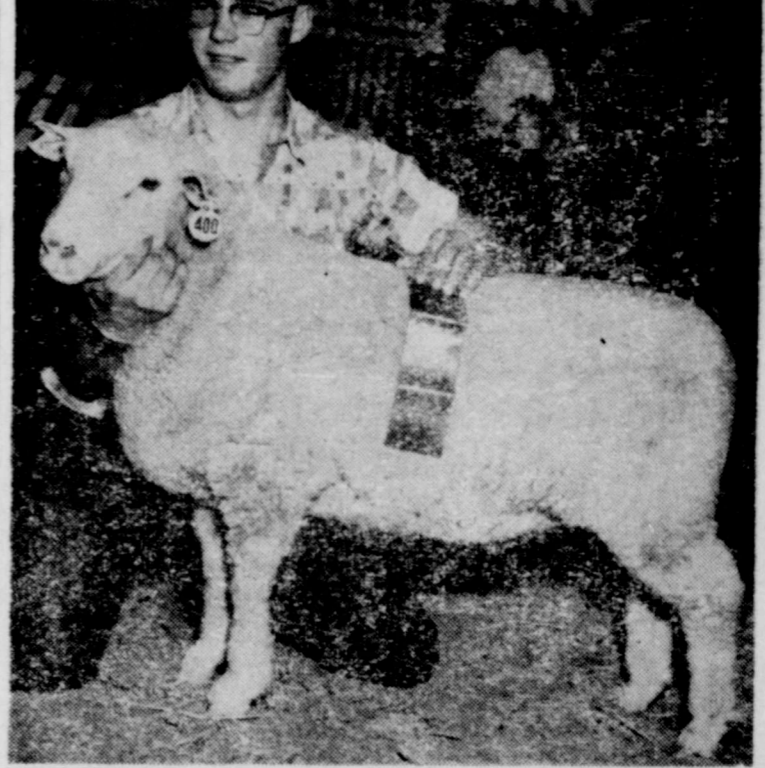

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THE SUM OF GOOD GOVERNMENT

What is good government? Perhaps the best definition of all is found in Thomas Jefferson's first inaugural address: "A wise and frugal government, which shall restrain men from infringing one another, which shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned — this is the sum of good government."

EXPERIENCE IS THE GREAT TEACHER

The way to get a bellyful of socialism is to live under it. England is a perfect example. The classic attitude of the British Labor Party is that the state should own all important enterprise, and the Party went a long way in that direction before the voters threw it out of office. A short time ago the Party held its annual conference, with 3,000 delegates in attendance. Proposals to nationalize the land, arms plant, and the aircraft and machine tools industries were voted down. A typical comment came from a coal miner who said, "A boss is a boss, no matter whether he gets the job from the state or private owners. Sometimes the bosses of private industry are more reasonable to deal with." The British people are lucky, in that they can speak their minds and vote. The other victims of communism and socialism aren't so fortunate. Nothing short of war or revolution can unseat their oppressors.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Brownell Admits Revealing Warren Appointment Early | See Party Battle Royal Among GOP in January

WASHINGTON—Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., has admitted to friends that he was the Cabinet member who "leaked" the news of Gov. Earl Warren's appointment as Chief Justice 48 hours early. In addition, Brownell has said that he will continue to give out information to selected newspapers or individuals "from time to time when it is in the public interest."

The attorney general offered no explanation to associates who wondered why he called in representatives of several "friendly" newspapers and told them in advance of the appointment. Brownell was reported to be upset about the widespread resentment among Washington newsmen over the way the leak was handled. However, he insists that he has the right to make the "most effective use" of information which he wants distributed and that from time to time he will employ such leaks. The attorney general said he took the initiative on the Warren announcement and that neither his public information aides nor the White House knew of his plans.

POLITICAL MAYHEM—Look for a party battle royal among Republicans when Congress reconvenes in January. At stake is nothing less than President Eisenhower's influence on Republicans in the Senate. Whatever the outcome, Mr. Eisenhower will come to realize all the more how much he lost when Senator Robert A. Taft died. Led by Senator Homer Ferguson of Michigan is a drive to put all committee chairmen on the Senate GOP policy committee. Only a few are on the steering group now. Should this effort be successful, the committee will be loaded with members who were pre-convention opponents of Mr. Eisenhower and who still fight him on some issues. Most of the committee chairmen not only disagree with the President on vital matters, but none owe him anything politically. All have been in the Senate for at least six years—long before he entered politics.

DURABLE LADY—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt tells a story about her recent global trip which proves that she has lost none of her physical stamina, her zest for being up and doing, or her sense of humor in the nine years since she left the White House. The incident took place when the redoubtable Mrs. R flew into Istanbul about 4 a. m. to be greeted by a United States consul general who looked rather bushed. Mrs. Roosevelt said the official inquired solicitously if she wouldn't rather rest in the comfortable waiting room than tour the ancient Turkish city. She added: "He did look awfully tired and I knew he was hoping that I would just nap during the 90-minute stop-over. It was plain to me he was hoping he could go home and forget me, but he told me to be truthful in my choice. "I had never seen Istanbul and I did want to see the city—so I told him the truth and away we went. "I am probably the only American to have looked at three beautiful mosques in Istanbul at that hour in the morning... I hope the consul general got caught up on his sleep."

RED TRICKS—The Foreign Operations administration reports that violations of the export controls of the free nations are not confined to the stunts of smugglers arrayed as "frogmen," the concealment of steel plates on fishing junks, or dashes across lonely jungle borders. FOA says: "There are methods that are more refined than those, more diverse and ingenious, and more troublesome. "By such methods in Europe, for example, cargoes of highly strategic goods have too often moved to the Soviet bloc during the bright daylight, in ordinary freighters and Rhine barges and work day railroad trains, looking for all the world like routine shipments in the course of international commerce."
