Mills County Sheriff, C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield, is issuing a word of warning to citizens of the county to be more cautious in their dealings with itinerant fly-by-night solicitors who may call on them.

During the past week some complaints were made to the sheriff about such dealings where folks felt that they were over-charged for jobs done. On Thursday of last week Stubblefield made some investigations

after complaints were received and \$135.00 was recovered for two parties involved. Stubblefield pointed out that two work classifications, Spray Painting and Cers Pool Cleaning, have been involved. He also has received a number of complaints about traveling solicitors for publications who have taken orders and collected money and folks failed to hear anything further from them or the company they were supposedly representing.

In some cases coming to the attention of the sheriff's office folks have agreed to have a job done at a stipulated price and realized later that they didn't get the amount of work or service they thought they were bargaining for.

In that connection folks may well keep in mind local business firms who are here to serve them. If one needs merchandise or services the local folks are the ones who will serve their customers the best in the long run.

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BACK DOOR ENTRY

Refusal of the Texas Legislature to grant certain powers to the State Board of Examiners in Optometry should have ended the matter at least until the next legislative session. When the duly-elected representatives and senators of the people of Texas take favorable action, or deny by failure to take action, they do so in the name of the public.

Thus it is with astonishment and shock that the report came out of Austin Tuesday (Nov. 3) that the optometry board had ordered into effect a new set of regulations, embodying the American Optometry Association's code of ethics and rules of practice. It was the code and rules which the legislature had had under consideration and which the legislature refused to authorize.

The original arguments against the optometry control bill are just as valid today as they were in the heat of the controversy which developed during the session of the last legislature. The Times had objected to the bill because it undertook to run out of business all optometrists who did not conform to whatever interpretation the board might place on the rules and regulations. Some optometrists would be put out of business not because of any inefficiency or incompetence, but simply because they offered a type of competition that other optometrists would rather not face.

To these objections now must be added the manner in which the will of the people, expressed through the will of the legislature, has been circumvented. To accomplish their objective in spite of the legislative decision, the proponents of optometry control have slipped around to the back door, finding that the front door was barred. Their route is by way of the bureaucratic process and not the democratic process. — Wichita Falls (Tex.) Times.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Who's to Have Power In Granting Immunity? See Recession Bugaboo An Administration Fear

WASHINGTON—It won't be as easy as it sounds for Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell to get the immunity-granting powers he seeks to complete testimony by witnesses who claim their answers before congressional committees might incriminate them.

First of all, the authority is opposed by those who say the Fifth Constitutional Amendment protects a witness from having to bear witness against himself and that it would be morally wrong to tamper with that protection.

This view admittedly is not shared by many members of Congress. The main fight over Brownell's proposal will be between two equally strong forces, both of which favor the basic idea of granting immunity.

Where they differ is over the question of who should be allowed to grant immunity. One group would reserve the authority to Congress itself; the other would bestow it on Brownell.

Another complication is the obvious fact that the only kind of immunity which could be granted would be to federal prosecution. A witness might still claim that by answering questions he would leave himself wide open to state charges.

ADMINISTRATION NIGHTMARE—The Eisenhower administration apparently is haunted by the fear of an economic recession.

There have been some outspoken predictions by men-in-the-street that a recession, if not worse, is on the way. Disappointed Democrats, in some instances, may be spreading it. However, the report is strong enough to have its effect on GOP stalwarts.

The fear seems to be based on several things: 1—The end of the Korean war and the business boom dependent upon it. 2—The government's economy program, including cut-backs in defense production. 3—The firing of thousands of federal employes.

Many government contracts have been completely cancelled and others have been sharply curtailed. Eighty thousand government employes were let out during the first six months of the administration. Another 100,000 are to go in the fiscal year which began last July 1.

Republicans are acutely aware that another major depression probably would spell the doom of their party. Too many millions still remember what was popularly labeled the "Hoover Depression" and the GOP cannot but recall that it was followed by two decades of Democratic rule.

PROBE OF A PROBER—Although Justice department officials denied it for months, they actually put FBI agents on the trail of Senator Joseph R. McCarthy's personal finances.

However, the FBI report and other discreet investigations did not uncover any violations of the law by the Wisconsin Republican which would warrant federal prosecution.

This is what led Attorney General Brownell to give McCarthy's political and financial actions a clean bill of health as far as his department was concerned. Brownell pointed out that there must be proof beyond a reasonable doubt that federal laws have been violated before a case can be taken to court. Evidence turned up in a Senate committee probe of McCarthy didn't meet that standard, in Brownell's opinion.

However, the attorney general was quick to point out that the senator's income tax affairs are still undergoing a thorough study by the Internal Revenue Service.

PART-TIME FARMING

Farmers are often asked for advice by friends who long for "A Little Place In The Country." What do you tell them?

The first thing you can tell them is that a great number of people are already trying it. A recent census listed two-thirds of a million part-time farmers in the United States. Another million "residential" farmers do a little farming for income. Altogether, these small farms make up a third of all farms in the nation.

A lot can be learned from the small farm operators who are established. Probably they will recommend strict planning of land use. Besides a house and garden, about an acre and a quarter will be needed to raise grain to feed a couple dozen hens and 40 chicks. For a cow,

the "new" farmer may need two more acres to produce hay and pasture and three-quarters of an acre for grain.

To feed three pigs 6 months takes about an acre each for grain and pasture. And to keep a horse requires three good acres to grow pasture, hay and grain.

These estimates are based on acre yields of two tons of hay and 40 bushels of corn. If he plans to raise only fruit and vegetables for home use, half an acre to an acre of good land might be enough.

A large garden properly cared for will net about \$100 to \$300 a year in fresh and preserved food. More labor, skill, equipment and a larger investment are required to produce milk, meat and most specialized crops.

Both the advantages and disadvantages should be counted before plunging into part-time farming.

Among the advantages: It provides a wholesome and healthful environment for children. It gives a measure of security if the part-time farmer's regular job is lost. It furnishes outside work and recreation, beneficial to the health. It supplies the means for profitable use of spare-time labor and lowers the cost of living.

On the other hand, the job

is confining, especially if he raises livestock. In times of crisis on the farm, he may get little sleep at night after a hard day's work, frequently in hot sun or cold rain.

It costs a lot of money to get started and keep going. Land near town is expensive and supplies and equipment come high. It is hazardous by reason of drought, hail, disease and insects. This cuts deeply into earnings and sometimes capital.

A good rule-of-thumb to follow is get a farm that has enough acreage to bring in the income expected—and don't set the sights too high. There is a lot to do, and a lot to learn that first year.


