Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Nuclear Power Plant To Give U. S. Edge See Move an Answer To Russian H-Bomb

WASHINGTON—Here is why the Atomic Energy Commission believes its plan to build a full-scale nuclear power plant is "America's significant answer"—to the Russian hydrogen bomb. It may seem strange that a terrible weapon of war can be "answered" by a peacetime generating station, but that is the case.

When the United States completes the power plant that AEC Commissioner Thomas E. Murray says can be built in three or four years, this country will be in a stronger position than ever before in its fight against Soviet imperialism—and it will force Russia into its weakest position.

For nuclear power will give a tremendous lift to the United States Four Point program of technical aid to underdeveloped areas. Without inexpensive power to generate electricity, the Point Four program lacks industrial appeal. A nuclear power plant would fill that lack.

The United States would then be able to do a far more effective job in its efforts to build up these underdeveloped areas—areas which will remain the easiest prey for Communism until their economies are strengthened.

Thus, with a peacetime atomic power plant, the United States will be able to keep vast areas of the world from falling into Red hands. However, there is another consideration. These areas produce uranium. Keeping that precious ore out of the Kremlin's grasping paw will not only build up our own atomic strength but will also cut down on Russia's.

BENSON'S DILEMMA—A number of farming experts concede privately that the administration will not be able to solve both the political and economic problems of the slumping agricultural economy. However, they expect that a solution to one of the problems will be found soon.

Agricultural Secretary Ezra Taft Benson has promised to submit to Congress in January a detailed plan to help improve the farm situation.

If Benson finds a solution to the political and not the economic problem, or vice versa, the farmers won't be entirely satisfied and undoubtedly the slumping agriculture economy will be a major issue in next year's congressional elections.

On the other hand, Benson feels that new or expanded federal subsidies, which the farmers want, would only aggravate and intensify the economic problem, although subsidies may conceivably solve the political problem.

Some observers believe Benson is right in saying that bigger subsidies will only encourage production of surplus commodities which have priced themselves out of the world market and which cannot be absorbed in the domestic market.

Benson may come up with the answer to both problems, of course. However, the experts—in Washington—think that a solution of both would be nothing short of a miracle.

CABINET DRAWBACKS—Life for the only woman member of President Eisenhower's Cabinet is not entirely to her liking. Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, the secretary of health, education and welfare, pays for being in on top-level conferences with other big-wigs by missing out on the private life which is the joy of most women.

For instance, she said recently that it is so long since she had dined at her own dining room table that she can't remember when.

Instead of meeting in the family circle at the close of a business day, she comes home late and dines off a tray. Her husband is in Texas most of the time where he is busy with his publishing interests, and her daughter, Jessica, and son, Bill, are away at school. So at times Mrs. Hobby gets real homesick.

Those who look at Mrs. Hobby's career with envy can well realize that the balance sheet is not entirely on the plus side for the secretary.

LIVESTOCK PARASITE CONTROL

We are a long way from a cattleman's Utopia but recent experiments in Texas with a unique method of parasite control may be bringing it closer. The method being studied involves the use of insecticides injected directly into cattle. Good preliminary results have been achieved but the work is still in the experimental stage. Three chemicals have been tested— Aldrin, Dieldrin and Lindane. All three were effective in destroying the cattle grubs which spend much of its life inside the bodies of cattle.

Cattlemen would welcome such a measure if it eliminates the troublesome and costly grub. But there still are some knotty problems to be solved and a lot of unanswered questions. It must be determined whether or not these insecticides will prove both economical and safe to use over a period of time. Entomologists and veterinarians may come up with the answers when the study is completed at the U. S. D. A.'s Bureau of Entomology Laboratory in Kerrville, Texas.

The insecticide solution has been injected under the skin of yearling cattle in one series of tests. Injections were made at the time when grubs began to appear as bumps under the skin and were repeated every 28 days.

The insecticides are carried by the bloodstream as systemic chemicals to all parts of the animal's body. As the grubs reach the animal's back and begin to feed heavily on the flesh, they automatically dose

themselves with insecticide. Many of the larvae died soon after reaching the back. A few others continued their normal life cycle, cutting their way through the hide and dropping to the ground to pupate.

Other promising but preliminary research has shown that the screwworm fly, which lays eggs in open livestock wounds, could be controlled for as long as a month with this same method. Of the three chemicals, Dieldrin proved most toxic to the screwworm.

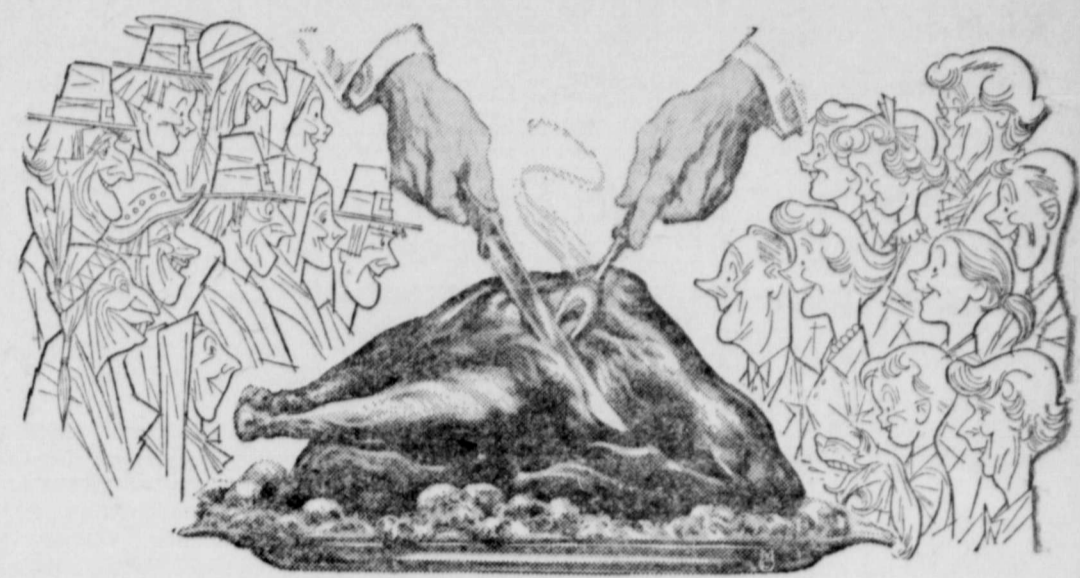
Continued progress along this line may eventually provide farmers and ranchers with healthier and higher meat producing animals. Cattle grubs, alone, have been estimated to

cause a loss of \$100 million each year through annoyance of animals and damage to meat and hides. Losses caused by

screwworm are estimated to be about \$25 million each year. —Earle Want Ads Get Results—


