Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Agriculture's Big Headache: Lack of Storage Space Must Store 280 Million Bushels of Farm Products

WASHINGTON—The Department of Agriculture is about to embark on a nation-wide search for empty spaces—mothballed merchant ships, empty airplane hangars, vacant garages, abandoned Army barracks, closed-down movie houses.

The department needs more space in which to store an estimated 280 million bushels of farm products which are expected to be harvested this summer, but for which there is no available storage.

If the search is unsuccessful, still another headache will be added to the Republican administration with which to cope in its effort to solve the delicate farm situation.

Under current government price support laws, farmers who avail themselves of federal subsidies must find storage space for their crops. If they can't, then they have to assume any loss resulting from spoilage.

The search for space by farmers will therefore be a hotly competitive one, with the administration blamed by those who lose out.

They will charge that the government has not done enough to build bins itself or to induce private construction.

This was a major issue, used adroitly by the Democrats in the 1948 presidential campaign against the Republican 80th Congress. It was credited with helping to swing normally GOP farm states to the Democratic side and insuring the election of Harry S. Truman.

TREATY FIGHT—An unusual aspect of the prolonged and vain search for a compromise on the Bricker treaty constitutional amendment is the fact that at no time was the administration's top foreign policy spokesman in Congress a party to the negotiations.

The absence of Senator Alexander Wiley (R), Wisconsin from the conferences caused considerable speculation, for he is chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, which handles treaties.

Wiley's non-participation underscores his opposition to the Bricker formula for curbing a President's treaty-making powers. It is no secret that Wiley would prefer to leave the Constitution alone. He may go along, however, with mild proposals being advanced by Senate leaders.

Senator Walter F. George (D), Georgia, the top-ranking minority member on Wiley's committee, was a leading negotiator until his patience ran out. Some wondered if George was not pulling GOP chestnuts out of the fire. The senator is a recognized authority on constitutional matters, especially those in the foreign field.

RATS!—The rats have been virtually conquered, but mice still infest the hallowed halls and walls of the nation's Capitol. They come in through pipelines, largely sewers extending to less revered reaches of Washington.

Several tiny black rodents make the Senate press gallery their home and appear occasionally elsewhere in the sprawling building.

However, rats have apparently disappeared entirely, although rumor has it there is still a holdout colony of large-size rodents in an unused and unvisited area below ground.

Rats were once so bad a problem that the authorities employed a man to sit in the sub-basement and fire a rifle at any rodents who poked their noses out.

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### Youth Sets High Standards

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

ACCORDING to a recent study of "Courtship Values" at the University of Colorado, as reported in the American Sociological Review, the standards of college and university students regarding the desirable traits of a "date" are higher than has been popularly supposed.

Companionability, based on friendliness and congeniality, was mentioned most often as a trait desired. Of those responding, 44.2 per cent named it.

Now, companionability is considered by most marriage experts as an important factor in marriage success. A miscellaneous list ranging from "maturity," "good character," or "good social background" to "sense of humor," totaled 25 per cent of the replies.

#### Church Popular

Going to church seems to be enjoyed as much by teen-agers as watching television, listening to the radio or singing. This was indicated by the answers to questionnaires submitted to 1,252 junior and senior high school youths of Schenectady, and was reported in "Recreation" for January. The study was made by the research department of the public schools.

Other preferred activities were "dating," driving a car, school athletics, roller skating, bicycle riding, social dancing, reading, school clubs and visiting friends. Less popular pastimes included dramatics, hobbies, painting, and horseback riding. Two other activities, "meeting at a sweet shop" and "jam sessions in taverns," were also favored by senior high

school youths, many of them girls.

The increase in interests of senior high students over junior high was considered "not healthy" by the researchers. About half the girls and a third of the boys indicated preference for "wandering through downtown stores."

Youth centers and swimming pools were considered by those questioned as the facilities most needed, followed by playgrounds, gymnasiums and parks.

The neighborhood problems committee found that with few exceptions, "churches are not meeting the recreational needs of children."

It would be most gratifying if the indicated popularity of church-going really squared with action, as you and I are usually distressed with the relatively small number of teen-agers we see at church. Maybe it's better in Schenectady.

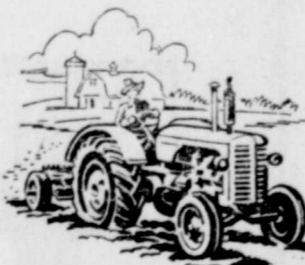
#### Religious Work

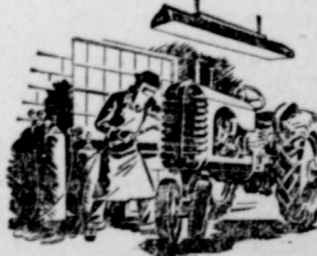

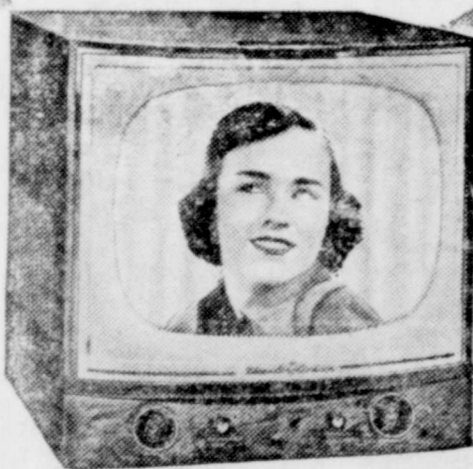

**Recipes For Fresh Vegetables**

NEW and improved methods of  
transportation, distribution and  
packaging, bring good fresh pro-  
duce to our markets the year

The wise homemaker who is an  
amateur dietician, too, will see to  
it that her family gets vitamin-  
rich fresh vegetables served in a  
variety of interesting and appeal-  
ing ways, such as, for instance,  
this Pennsylvania Dutch Turnips  
recipe.

**Pennsylvania Dutch Turnips**  
For 4-5 servings, use 2 medium-  
sized blue-top turnips, 1 medium-  
sized uncooked sweet potato and  
1 medium-sized cooking apple, all  
sliced. Cook until tender in cov-  
ered saucepan, containing 1-inch  
boiling water. Mash until fluffy,  
utilizing the valuable liquid. Add  
salt to taste, 1/2 tsp. sugar, 1/2 tsp.  
ground black pepper and tsp.  
butter.

For an excellent luncheon or  
supper dish, one utilizing left-  
over chicken, prepare a Carrot  
Ring.

**Carrot Ring**  
Shred carrots into shredded  
coconut size, shredding enough  
for 4 c. Combine shredded car-  
rots with 2 tsp. chopped chives  
or parsley, tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. black  
pepper, 2 tsp. flour and 2 slightly  
beaten eggs, mixing well. Pack  
firmly into a well-buttered 8-in.  
(5 c.) mold. Set in a pan of hot  
water. Bake 50 min. or until done  
at 350° F.

To unmold, let stand 10 min.  
Run a spatula between the mold  
and the carrot ring, all the way  
around, pulling the ring away,  
from the mold to completely  
loosen it. Place a serving dish  
right side down on top of mold,  
leaving carrot ring on the dish.  
Fill center with 3 c. creamed  
chicken and peas or creamed  
seafood and peas. Garnish with  
a few cooked green peas sprin-  
kled over mixture. Serves 8.

**Novel Salad Idea**  
For a fresh, crunchy salad, both  
healthful and delicious, toss to-  
gether 2 1/2 c. shredded cabbage,  
1/2 c. chopped fresh parsley, 1/4 c.  
chopped onion, 1 tsp. fresh lem-  
on juice, 2 tsp. mayonnaise, 1/2  
tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. black pepper.  
Serve on lettuce or watercress  
and garnish with a dash of pap-  
rika and a parsley sprig. Will  
serve 4-5.

**Fresh Carrot Pie**, something  
different for the adventurous, the  
recipe serves 6.

**Carrot Pie**  
Heat oven to 400° F. Combine  
3/4 c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. each salt and  
ground nutmeg, tsp. each ground  
cinnamon, ground ginger, 1/8 tsp.  
ground cloves and 1/4 tsp. grated  
lemon rind. Add 2 eggs, 2 c.  
cooked, sieved fresh carrots and  
one c. undiluted evaporated milk.  
Mix thoroughly. Pour into pastry-  
lined 9-inch pie plate. Bake 40 to  
45 min. or until knife inserted in  
filling comes out clean. For added  
flavor, add tsp. each grated lem-  
on and orange rind to pastry.  
Gives a delightful tang.

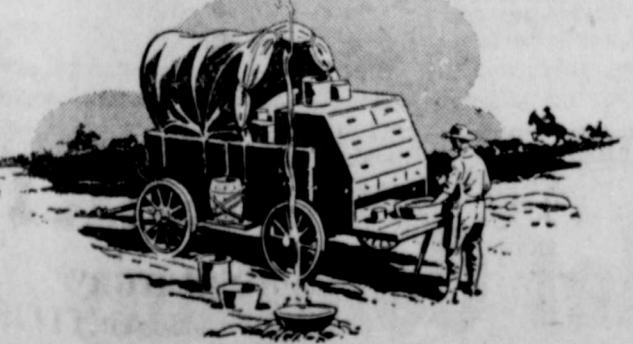

COTTON EXPORT OUTLOOK

The year 1954 will again see the United States in the position of a residual supplier of cotton to the world.

In other words, the demand for our cotton will be limited until other exporting countries have largely sold out.

The present outlook holds no cause for undue alarm, however. Indications are that the total cotton exported this year will not be less than last season's 3 million bales—and possibly somewhat more.

Last year, other cotton producing nations shipped about 8 1/2 million bales. The export total if all countries, including the United States, was 11.5 million bales. These other countries also are expecting to ship about as much in 1954.

One factor which will help this year is that the textile trade in most foreign countries is measurably better than it was a year ago. The demand for imported cotton is expected to pick up. If this improvement holds throughout the coming season, the consumption of imported cotton in foreign cotton should exceed that of 1953.

Cotton production in the U. S. is limited through acreage allotments this year. Although

a shortage definitely is not expected to develop, this limited production should help strengthen the demand for cotton and prevent the necessity of storing much of the crop.

We should not regard a surplus of cotton as a drag on the market. Instead, it is to our

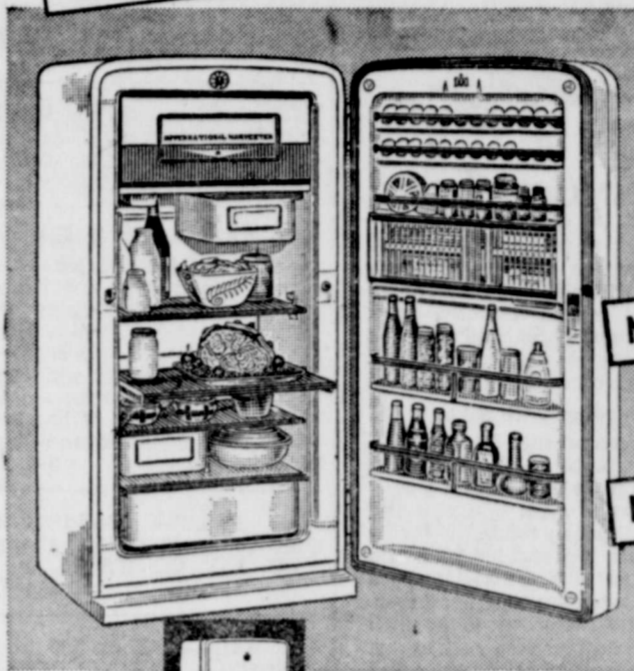

## TODAYS Menu.

### New Ways with Everyday Food

By ALICE DENHOFF  
**MEALTIME** miscellany today, leading off with a recipe for delicious sweet potato balls.  
 Combine 2 c. mashed sweet potatoes with 1 beaten egg, 2 tsp. sugar and 1/2 tsp. salt. Shape into 4 to 5 balls, putting 1 tsp. of peanut butter in the center of each.  
 Roll balls in cracker meal, coating well. Fry in deep hot fat (375° F.) until delicately browned. Drain on absorbent paper and serve.  
**Meat Loaf Transformed**  
 Meat Loaf again, yes, but glamorized with a stuffing.  
 Combine and mix well, 1 1/2 lb. veal and 6 oz. pork, both ground, 2 tsp. salt, 2 tsp. minced onion, 1/4 tsp. pepper, tsp. sage, tsp. prepared mustard, 2 tsp. finely chopped green pepper, a grated garlic bud, 2 finely rolled shredded wheat biscuits, 1/2 c. ketchup, 1/2 c. milk and 1 beaten egg.  
 Line bottom and sides of greased loaf pan with mixture. Fill center with stuffing. Cover with remaining meat mixture, pressing firmly. Bake at 350° F.

for 1 hour. Serves 8.  
 To prepare stuffing, combine and mix well, 3 finely rolled shredded wheat biscuits, tbsp. each minced onion and chopped celery leaves, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 2 tbsp. melted butter and 1/4 c. hot water.  
**Pudding With Style**  
 Butterscotch Rice Pudding is a good choice to finish off a meal that is a little on the light side.  
 To serve 6, wash 1/2 c. rice and cook until nearly tender in double boiler with 2 c. scalded milk and 1/4 tsp. salt. Meanwhile, in a shallow pan, cook together 2 tbsp. butter and 1 c. brown sugar until mixture becomes very dark brown but not burnt. Add this to rice and milk, and finish cooking until rice is tender and caramel melted. Pour 1/2 c. cold water in bowl, sprinkle tbsp. plain gelatin on top of water; add 1 c. hot milk, stirring until dissolved. Add gelatin to rice mixture and turn into mold that has been rinsed in cold water; chill.  
 When firm, unmold and serve plain, or with whipped cream or fruit sauce. Serves 6.

### Postmaster Fairman Endorses New Pay And Incentive Plan As Suggested

Postmaster Lucile Fairman of Goldthwaite, Texas today endorsed the postal pay increase and incentive plan recommended to the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee on February 18 by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield.

"This plan," Mrs. Fairman said, "provides equal pay for equal work. It opens the door of opportunity to postal employees who merit promotions

based on improved performance. It should help attract good people to the Postal Service. The public should benefit by better mail service. In my judgment, it is money well spent.

"While fourth-class postmasters and rural carriers are not now included in this plan, their jobs, I understand, are to be studied later.

The principal features of the proposed plan, according to Mrs. Fairman, are:

1.) Clerks and carriers would be paid \$210 more a year as a starting salary; and their maximum rates increased by \$100 or about 5 cents an hour.

2.) The time needed by most employees to advance from the minimum to the maximum salary rate for their job would be reduced in most cases by two years.

3.) More adequate pay differentials are provided for employees with higher skills, supervisors and managerial personnel who, at present, have slight incentive to rise above routine work levels.

4.) The salary of no individual employee will be decreased as a result of the application of this new plan.

5.) Supervisors, who at present have single rates for their jobs, would be given the opportunity to progress within a rate change.

In addition, the agency's county office also makes production or farm adjustment loans and extends credit for the purchase or development of farms. It also can make special livestock loans to drought-stricken producers of cattle and sheep to help them maintain normal production.

Applications for any type of loan cannot be approved by the Farmers Home Administration if a farmer's needs can be adequately met with credit from private or cooperative lenders.
