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COMPETITION IN ACTION

The consumer has been getting a welcome break lately. The cost of many of the commodities we buy has declined. Others have held steady in price, which is itself a refreshing change from the time when every month brought jumps. Few costs have risen. And most of the forecasts say a moderate downward trend will continue.

Various reasons are responsible. For one thing, practically everything is in abundant supply — the output of our factories has literally been staggering. In some instances improved production methods have resulted in cost cuts. And, on the retail level, competition is at an extremely high pitch.

This means that the merchant must offer every inducement, including the lowest possible price, to the public — not because he is charitably inclined, but because that's the only way he can keep his business.

BLIND SELFISHNESS

A country editor recently observed that our present system of agricultural price supports, which has led to ever-mounting surpluses, is certainly unsound and needs correcting. But, he continued in effect, groups which are critical of it — including business and labor organizations — would be on much stronger ground if they showed some willingness to make a few financial sacrifices on their own hook. His point, in other words, is that almost everybody, not just the farmer, has been looking for profitable favors and preferential treatment.

There is much justice in this view. A parallel is found in the effort to cut government spending — everyone is for it in principle, but cries with pain when it threatens to touch him. And that blindly selfish attitude could ruin this or any country — morally as well as financially.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Stevenson vs. Symington | Chips Down in Democratic Struggle for Leadership | Battle for Party Power

WASHINGTON—The chips are just about down now between the Stevenson element and the backers of Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri for behind the scenes domination of the rejuvenated Democratic party.

Democratic National Chairman Stephen T. Mitchell who has just completed an intensive survey of the entire country has assured Adlai Stevenson that his leadership is factual as well as titular and that he can count on the 1956 nomination if he wants it.

However, on the other hand, adherents of Symington, who regard the Missouri as a middle-of-the-road politician more acceptable to many voters than the more liberal Stevenson, insist that his star is rising.

Symington has in his camp such powerful Democrats as Senator Richard B. Russell of Georgia and almost the entire southern bloc, whereas Stevenson must rely for support from the liberal group led by Senators Herbert Lehman of New York and Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota.

RED ROUNDelay—Democrats and Republicans alike are keeping "Communists-in-government" alive as a political issue for 1954 and there is no sign of future abatement of the quarrel. The GOP, of course, is centering its attack on what it contends was significant infiltration of the Roosevelt and Truman administrations by Communists, fellow-travellers and outright Soviet spies.

Democrats have shifted from a passive defense to a counter-offensive based on challenge of the Eisenhower administration's claim to have severed 2,200 "security risks" from federal employment.

Each side is so committed that the cries of cooler heads of both parties for a toning-down of the squabble are sure to go unheeded.

LANGER INCIDENT—Responsible leaders in the Senate consider ill-advised the action being taken by Senator William F. Knowland (R), California, to unseat Senator William Langer (R), North Dakota, as judiciary committee chairman. They predict nothing will come of it except to bring on a heated row if Knowland insists on going ahead with his proposal.

Knowland, majority leader, suggested that the Senate majority conference, composed of all GOP members, have the choice of perhaps the "two most senior members of a committee" for chairman.

At present, the member who has served the longest in the Senate becomes chairman. Little chance is seen for the success of Knowland's move because it carries with it the danger that any member with long seniority could be by-passed.

Efforts to change the seniority system have been tried before, with similar lack of success.

WIT-NESS—Some congressmen have reached the stage where they can see the lighter side of the recent shooting on the House floor in which five of their colleagues were felled by Puerto Rican Nationalists.

With tongue in cheek, some are demanding what they are pleased to call "combat pay." Others, who sought the nearest convenient shelter, say "flight" pay is a more appropriate term.

Rep. Walter Horan of Washington reports the formation of an "I-Was-Standing-Next-to-Bentley" club. He says it is next to impossible to find any member who, according to his own version, wasn't shoulder-to-shoulder with Rep. Alvin Bentley of Michigan—most seriously wounded of the five members.

Also according to Moran, some legislators were ready to beard the Puerto Ricans—guns or no guns. The Washington legislator says that when the shooting started, Rep. A. L. Miller of Nebraska, stood up, waved his cane, and shouted, "No, no, you can't do that. It's against the rules."

of the church and for ever advancement has made in citizenship. "Whenever great tasks undertaken in business the leaders have recognized importance of friendship among those who are to participate in social, educational and religious endeavors. People have common interests, mutual understanding and friendship before they can work together in harmony and strive diligently for advancement. "Selfishness, individual sonalities and ambitious leadership must be kept out of the community. Friendship has a tendency to keep out such and differences that would disrupt and disorganize meetings. "No pleasant relationship is possible without friendship among farmers in the community. Unless you know your neighbors and appreciate your neighbors and friendship among neighbors neighborhood will not be pleasant place to live." While this was written mainly for rural folks, directed to folks in farm communities, it may be well for folks living in small towns to apply the intent of such philosophy to themselves and to their own community.

**Regional Recipes for Dinner**

By ALICE DENHOFF

RECIPES mostly with a regional flavor today, leading off with a recipe for baked stuffed onions sent us from Michigan. This tempting vegetable dish is really a delicacy, a good choice to eke out a rather skimpy main course.

**Baked Stuffed Onions**  
To serve 6, remove skins from 6 large onions of the mild variety and boil, uncovered, in a large amount of salted water for 10 min. Drain and turn upside down to cool.

Remove onion centers carefully, leaving a shell sufficiently thick to retain its shape. Chop centers and combine with 3/4 c. each soft breadcrumbs and finely chopped cooked chicken or mushrooms, 3/4 c. thin white sauce, 1 egg yolk, salt and pepper to suit. Stuff onion shells with this mixture, sprinkle with 1/2 c. buttered cracker crumbs and bake at 350° F. until onions are tender.

**Out of New Orleans**  
From New Orleans, that home of fine food, comes a recipe which transforms plain lean beef into an epicurean dish.

To serve 6, place 1 1/2 lbs. lean beef in a casserole or deep skillet. Around meat, place 6 medium diced and peeled potatoes, 2 c. tomatoes, 1 large onion, 1 green pepper, both sliced, 1 c. green beans, 1 c. cooked or canned whole

kernel corn, and 2 sliced carrots. Sprinkle well with salt and pepper cover partially with water and bake in a slow oven (250° F.) until meat is tender. More water may be added to prevent meat from drying out. Serve on platter with vegetables.

Mix 1/2 c. flour to smooth paste with cold water and thicken gravy. Season with salt and pepper, chopped parsley and Worcestershire sauce to taste.

**A Party Dessert**

From St. Louis comes a recipe for a delicious dessert, a nice choice for a party, since the recipe serves 8-10.

Mix and sift 1 c. sifted cake flour, 1 c. sugar, tsp. baking powder, 1/4 tsp. salt. Beat unbeaten egg and 3/4 c. thin cream together, add tsp. vanilla and pour into the dry ingredients, beating thoroughly.

Bake in well-greased muffin pans at 375° F. 30 to 40 min. When cup cakes are cold, hollow out center and fill with ice cream. Level off with back of spoon and completely blanket the top with marshmallow halves. Place under broiler for half minute, or until marshmallows are puffed and brown. Should be served at once.

Takes in all 1 pt. ice cream and 9 marshmallows cut in crosswise halves.

**PEACE THE GOAL:** Again last week, I sat in on a conference of the utmost gravity to all of us. Congressional leaders of both parties met with Secretary of State Dulles just after his return from his journey to England and France— just before he left on another journey that would take him finally to Geneva.

The subject of discussion was Indo-China.

**WHAT ARE THE ISSUES?** It is impossible to exaggerate the seriousness of the situation. The issues can be stated in a few words:

Indo-China is a rich prize. It is the richest source of tungsten still available to the free world. Tungsten is vital to our defenses.

Beneath the soil of Indo-China are rich deposits of tin and manganese. No military machine can operate without these metals.

Even more important than these physical resources is Indo-China's strategic location.

If this country should be captured by the communists, they would be in a commanding position to take over the entire continent of Asia—the world's most populous land mass.

That would be a heavy blow to freedom.

**THE NATIONAL GOOD:** As I looked around at the faces of the men gathered at the conference and listened to their solemn words I had no doubt that every man present was thinking, above all else, of the good of America.

There was no political snip-

**ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

King Ahab of Israel asked his neighbor, Naboth, to trade him his vineyard which Ahab wanted to make into an herb garden. Naboth refused to give it up because the vineyard was part of his inheritance.



King Ahab was so disappointed that he threw himself on his bed and refused to eat or drink. Jezebel told the king to cheer up, that she would get rid of Naboth and then Ahab could have the land.



Jezebel wrote letters in Ahab's name proclaiming a fast. Naboth was to be set high above the people, then two men would accuse him of blasphemy to God and king and he would be carried out and stoned to death.



Elijah warned the king that for this evil deed he and his wife would die ignominiously. Frightened, Ahab dressed himself in sackcloth and fasted, humbling himself before Jehovah.

ing, for every man recognized that the grave issues under discussion transcend all political considerations.

There was, I firmly believe, a solemn intention on the part of each man present to weigh his words carefully—to consider the whole grave problem from every angle—and to act, finally, in the best interests of all the people of America.

**FIGHT FOR FREEDOM:** The French Foreign Legion, which has been fighting in Indo-China, has been magnificent. So have the officers in command on the scene. But—and this is a BIG but—

There has been little support on the French home front for the war. (Many of the Legionnaires are professional German soldiers.)

The French have refused to grant full independence to the people of Indo-China.

Many Asians feel they have no choice between French imperialism and Chinese imperialism. They are apathetic. The French might well take a

lesson from our own Texas history. At the battle of San Jacinto, Texans routed the forces of Mexico— although Texans were outnumbered two to one. They were fighting for freedom. That fact more than made up for the numerical odds.

**MANY QUESTIONS:** The questions to be settled in connection with Indo-China are as numerous as they are serious. I do not know what action will be taken.

I feel very strongly that any action, whatever its nature, must proceed with the full knowledge and consent of the American people.

Like all other Americans, I hope and pray there will be no decision which takes our fellow-Americans through the valley of the shadow of death.

### START FLY CONTROL PROGRAMS EARLY

Neither strict sanitation nor a spray program alone can eliminate the costly nuisance of the common fly. Instead, a sound fly control program must be a combination of both practices.

This is the time of year for the livestockman, dairman or general farmer to start his campaign against the fly. If you begin early enough, a small initial outlay of cash and effort will return good dividends in increased production.

Recent tests in Oklahoma showed that cattle protected from horn flies during the grazing season gained 15 to 30 pounds more than unprotected cattle. An extra income of at least \$3 to \$6 per head was gained at a spray cost of about 6c per head.

Dairy cows also responded by giving more milk if unmolested by flies. During one 60-day test, the sprayed herds averaged over 3 pounds more milk each day than cows in unsprayed herds. The 200 extra pounds of milk received per cow was a good return on the small investment for fly control.

Farm sanitation should start with eliminating breeding places such as manure piles, unsanitary poultry houses, dirty hog lots, outdoor toilets and decaying organic matter. This should be followed by:

- (1) Spraying early when fly population has not had a chance to multiply.
  - (2) Spraying all buildings housing animals and other buildings that are known to attract flies.
  - (3) Spraying with a concentration according to manufacturers recommendation.
  - (4) Spraying animals regularly. Flies are attracted to animals who will continue to bring them into treated buildings.
- Remember, the two-fold program—sanitation and fly control—will mean better results from your livestock or poultry operations. It helps eliminate the dangers of human and animal diseases.

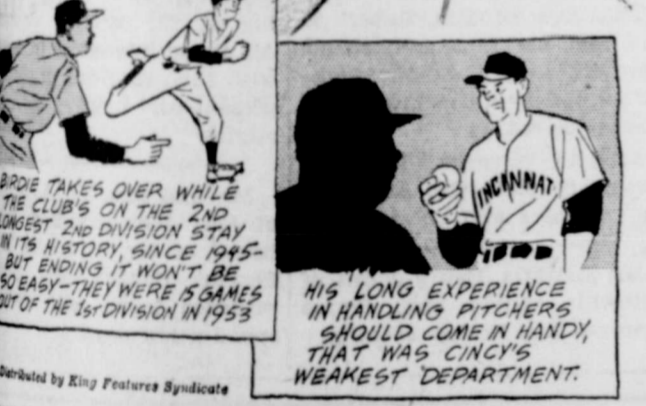
