Not all firms will be closed however. A number of food stores will be open for business, according to their announcements appearing in this issue.

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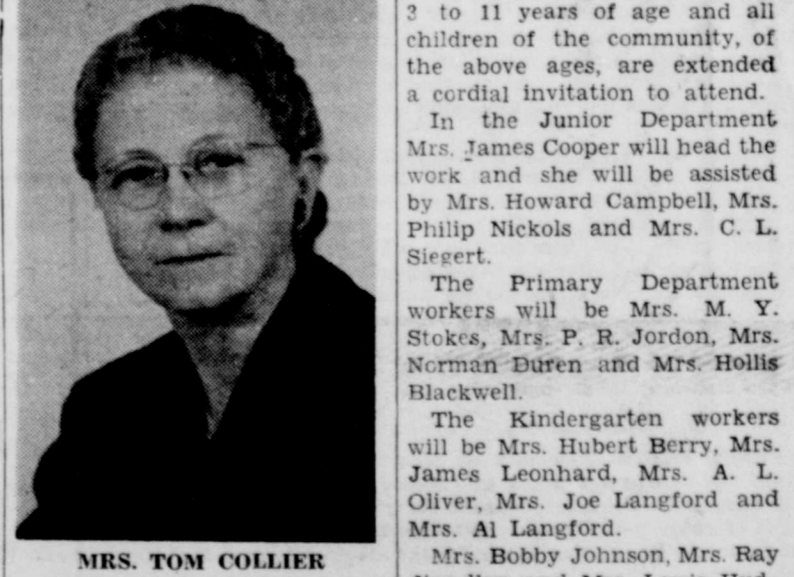

On Memorial Day the nation's most skilled drivers operating crack racing cars, will again meet in the famous Indianapolis Speedway race.

In this grueling event both cars and drivers will be tested to the utmost and many of them will probably drop out before the race is over.

Of the thirty-three cars that started in last year's race, twenty-five failed to finish.

It is true that some drivers took calculated risks in trying to win the race, and they soon found out that driving skill alone has definite limits when up against the hazards of speed conditions.

But most of the cars were knocked out of the race by mechanical failures. Those machines are specially built to take it. They get exceptional care from experts. They are driven by real pros who know their own and the cars' limitations. And yet many fail to finish, because the best machine ever built by human hands is subject to failure when put under extreme strain.

Passenger cars, too, are built to last. And they'll usually take plenty of wear and perform safely if watched closely, kept in top condition, and driven by people who recognize mechanical limitations and keep well within them. But they won't perform well or safely if they're abused.

It is the aim of the current state-wide vehicle maintenance program to encourage all Texas drivers to keep their cars in safe driving condition and to drive within their own and their car's limitations. The Texas Safety Association says this is the only intelligent way to handle an automobile.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Business Downtrend In 'Durable Goods' Construction Outlay May Near '53 Mark

WASHINGTON—One of the unusual aspects of the present economic situation in the United States is the continuing record level of construction of all kinds. This is interpreted as further evidence that the business downturn which has caused widespread worry is restricted mainly to the so-called "durable goods" such as automobiles and home appliances.

However—most important—it is not "snowballing." Government experts now think that total outlays for construction in 1954 may come close to last year's all-time high of \$34.8 billion and might possibly set a new record.

The only cloud on the horizon appears to be the current investigations of housing scandals—but industry men point out that these abuses—except for isolated cases of racketeers—occurred during the post-war rush to build new apartment projects. However, there is a fear that stringent new regulations on FHA insured loans, if approved, might curtail the home building industry which has been looking toward a year of 1,200,000 new units.

Unless this develops, the picture is bright. Construction contract awards set new records in each of the first three months of 1954—the time when fears were widely expressed that business in general was going down rapidly. The conclusion of economists based on building operation is: "There isn't going to be much of a recession."

SOVIET DEFECTIONS—A case of jitters has gripped Kremlin intelligence officers over the defection of key agents in some of the world's hot spots. In rapid succession, Soviet spies have asked for political asylum in Tokyo, Australia and Western Germany. And in each instance, it was reported that their briefcases were bulging with secrets.

The first of the recent "jumps" was made by a personable, young attaché in the Soviet mission in Tokyo. During his tour of duty, he had grown fond of Americans and finally decided to make his break. Then, another admitted spy in Australia was granted government protection. The Russian's wife was pushed aboard a plane for Moscow, but later was taken off and given her freedom, too. Within days, a Russian secret service captain fled to West Germany and disclosed what were reported to be some of the Kremlin's innermost secrets.

Washington officials are inclined to view these chinks in the Soviet espionage network as an indication that other defections can be expected.

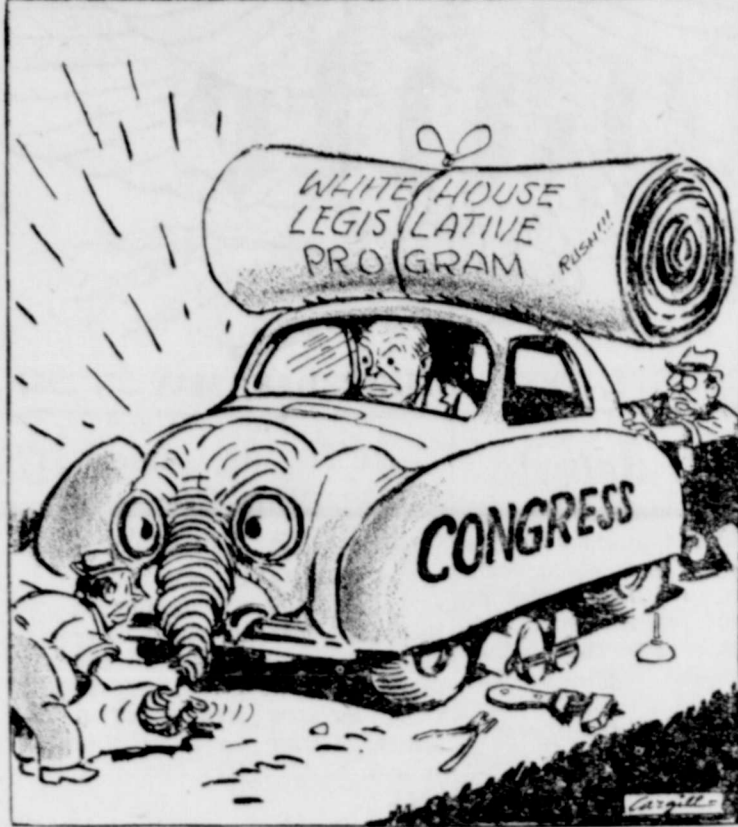
DEFENSE COSTS—Airplanes on Moscow's drawing board, are upsetting the Pentagon's plans to "reduce and level" the nation's huge defense costs. An example is the Navy's long-term plan to build hundreds of radar picket ships. Although Liberty ships taken from mothballs are to be used as the hulls, the electronics cost far more than the ships.

However, far more defense will be necessary when the Soviets get into operation planes now in the design stage that will have ranges of 8,000 or 10,000 miles.

The fact is that the entire United States defense system is based today on the assumption that the Soviets have no planes with ranges much more than 4,000 miles, and therefore could attack only over the shortest routes, mainly across polar regions.

On this assumption, the southern half of the United States, and the Panama canal are left out of the Atomic Age picture. Nothing physical, however, would prevent an attack on these regions except that the Russians don't have bombers with enough range to swing around and come in from the south. Officials fear, however, this may be changed soon.

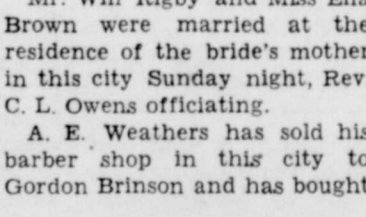

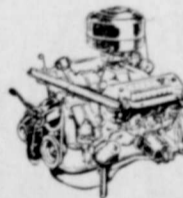

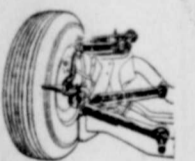

## Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

A forty acre field planted to Madrid Sweetclover and Aus-

trian Winterpeas on the Bill Sherwood farm, northeast of Goldthwaite, is doing very nicely since the recent rains.

The clover and peas were sowed last October and fertilized with 100 pounds of 16-20-0.

The field was heavily grazed

from the latter part of December to the middle of April. The peas were grazed out leaving a good stand of clover.

Since recent rains the clover has grown to a height of approximately six inches. Mr. Sherwood plans to stay out of the clover with his stock until early fall.

Plans for small range tours in the District are being made. The Washboard community is planning a tour of the Owens' Ranch as soon as cotton planting is over. The purpose of these tours will be to see the benefits derived from a properly managed range.

Following the recent rains, moisture penetration tests were made in the western portion of the work unit area. These tests showed that on areas where the ground had a good grass cover the moisture penetrated to a depth of 16½ inches. On an area only five or six feet away where the cover was gone and bare ground was present, dry soil was found at a depth of 4½ inches.

The condition of the soil determines the depth the moisture will penetrate. It is not always how much it rains but how deep it penetrates.

The Humble Oil and Refining Company's "Texas In Review" Program filmed Soil Conservation Districts in Texas recently. This program will be used on the regular "Texas In Review" program. The Soil Conservation District Program was filmed on the Escondido Pilot and Deep Creek Watersheds. It will show the Flood Prevention work that has been done in these watersheds. The Deep Creek Watershed is in the San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation District.

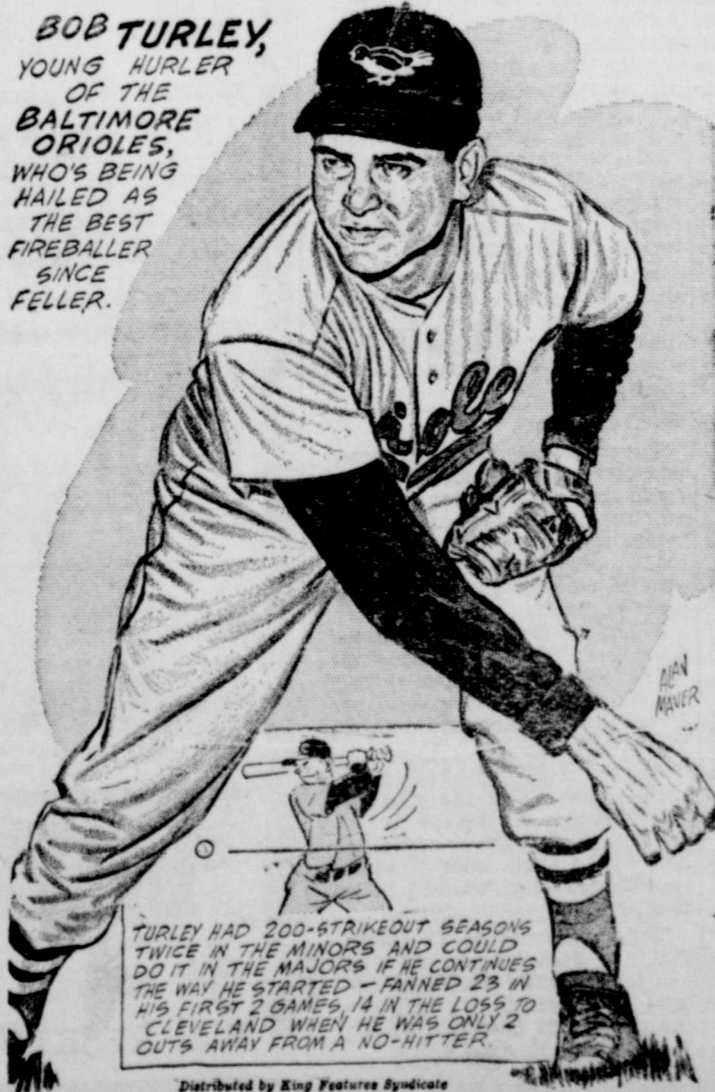

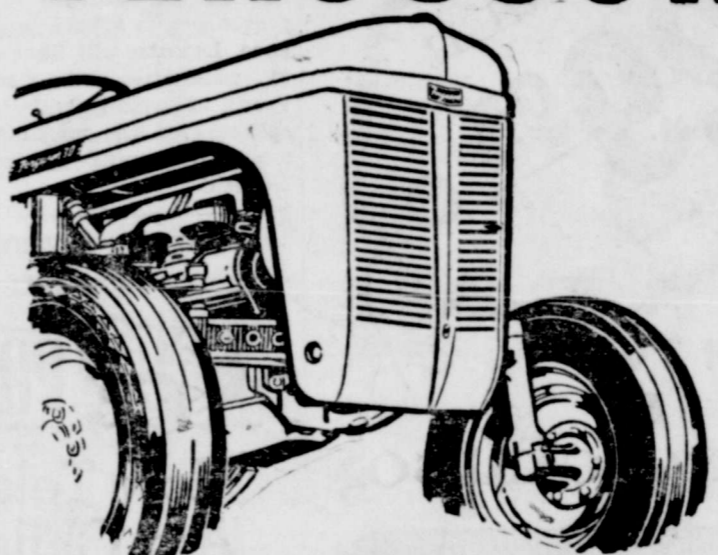

PARENT PROBLEMS

How Television Could Aid Child's Education

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

If you will watch TV while your youngsters do, you might observe several murders by gunshot, two or three stabbings, some robberies or kidnappings. All this might happen within half an hour, day after day, the year around. And how eagerly the youngsters take in this human violence and cheapening of human life!

Not many parents supervise their children's viewing of television from fifteen to twenty hours a week. Many children spend more time in front of TV sets than they spend in front of their teachers.

**Excellent Programs** Of course, there are some excellent network programs among them. Ding Dong School, Zoo Parade, Kukla, Fran and Ollie, Mr. Wizard, Super Circus, Nature of Things, Adventure and You Are There, also Omnibus and its junior edition, Excursion, among the finest, made possible through the Ford Foundation.

Educational television will supplement these good programs by bringing to our living rooms, symphony orchestras, ballet programs, courses in psychology, the works of Shakespeare and the like. Educational television can become the nation's greatest teacher.

This enterprise must face big costs; must provide positive constructive programs and win audiences for them. A few state legislatures and municipalities have appropriated some funds, but most financial help will have to come from public contributions—for the present, at least. A station

can be built for \$250,000 and run fairly well for a year for \$250,000. That's far less than it costs to put the Milton Berle Show on the air for two Tuesdays. The problem of building a non-commercial station and getting it into operation on a limited budget, with mostly inexperienced workers, and under the necessity of pleasing half a dozen different trustees is staggering.

Most major universities have channels, and in some towns the only channel is educational. By the end of 1954, some twenty-one stations are expected to be in operation.

What to Expect

The public may expect on these non-commercial channels: classroom instruction for public schools; direct adult education; community programs; out-of-school programs for children; general cultural and entertainment programs.

A harder problem will be to provide sufficient showmanship to compete with commercial TV. Will commercial channels be forced to put on more educational programs?

Anyway, a good many of us are enthusiastic about the possible net outcome. We believe there are enough intelligent adults in America to want more of what educational television may have to offer.

## Your Red Cross Blood Program

What is the purpose of the Red Cross blood program and how does it take effect in Mills County?

Purpose:  
1) To meet all needs of blood of the residents of Mills County.  
2) A portion (one-third at this time) of the blood collected is intended for defense purposes.  
3) Blood derivatives are supplied to the doctors and hospitals in participating chapters: Gamma globulin, serum albumin, and plasma in reasonable quantities; and anti-hemophilic globulin will be available when it can be processed by the Center laboratory.

The Central Texas Regional Blood Center at Waco stands ready to supply blood needs of residents of Mills County in any quantity and type required, provided the hospitals in which those residents become patients are willing to accept blood for the Mills County residents. This blood can be requested by the hospitals direct from the Center when there is time for the blood to be sent out by fastest means of transportation in extreme emergencies.

If blood from another source is given to patients by the hospitals, it will be replaced by the Center on a pint-for-pint and type-for-type basis.

In no case where blood is provided through Red Cross may a charge for the blood itself be made; however, a reasonable charge is made by hospitals for administering the blood.

## Farmers Home Administration Service Improved Through New Measures

Measures to speed up and further improve Farmers Home Administration services to farmers have recently been developed in Washington under the direction of Secretary Benson. T. T. Perkins, State Director at Dallas, said today.

Mr. Perkins had just returned from a meeting at Oklahoma City where the new steps to decentralize and streamline agency operations were explained by Washington officials. L. A. Machemehl, Jr., W. M. Burkes, and the State Field Representative also attended the meeting.

In accordance with Secretary Benson's policy of placing more control of agricultural programs in local hands, many of the decisions formerly made in state offices will now be made in the counties. County Supervisors, the employees who deal directly with the farmers, will have final approval on a larger number of loans and will have more authority in working with other creditors and in taking steps to help borrowers solve their financial and farming problems.

Greater use will be made of state and county committees. New state committees, to be appointed in the near future, will be called upon frequently to review agency operations and make sure they are efficiently serving local needs. County committees will be relied upon to an even greater extent than in the past to help adapt national policies to local needs.

Services of other public and private organizations will be used to the maximum extent possible. County home demonstration agents will help Farmers Home Administration borrowers with their family living problems. Every possible step will be taken to make sure that no government funds are advanced when private or cooperative credit is available to meet the needs. Lenders will be urged to supply funds for insured farm ownership loans.

The agency's emergency loan program was stressed at the meetings. State Directors and their staffs were told to move into an area whenever a drought or a flood strikes and when the crisis has passed to move out again as quickly as possible.

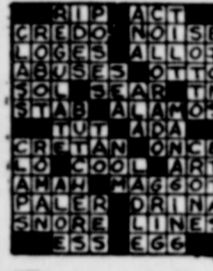

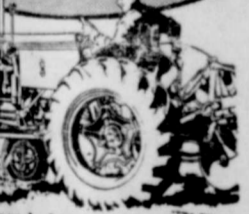

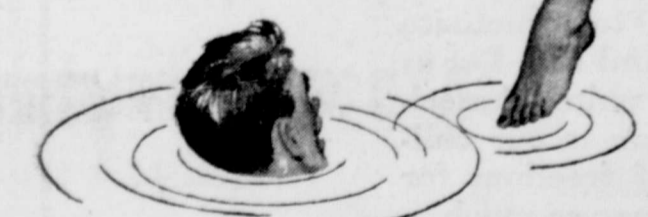

TODAY'S Menu Specialties to Serve For Luncheon or Supper. By ALICE DENHOFF. HERE are some good luncheon or supper specials that you may find useful and good. Eggs and mushrooms get together for a nice à la king mixture, the recipe to serve 6. Delectable and Inexpensive. Melt 1/4 c. butter in saucepan; add 4 tsp. minced onion and simmer until tender. Blend in 1 1/2 tsp. salt, dash of pepper and 1/2 c. enriched flour. Add 3 c. milk; cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add 2 tsp. chopped pimiento, 6 chopped hard-cooked eggs, 4 tsp. chopped parsley and 1 1/2 c. button or chopped mushrooms. Trim crusts from 9 slices toast. Cut toast in diagonal halves to form triangles. Place 1 toast triangle in the bottom of each individual casserole. Place 1 c. egg and mushroom mixture over toast. Insert a toast triangle either side of casserole and place a grilled link sausage in center of each casserole. Vegetable Specialty. A vegetable rarebit is a fine way to dispose of left-over cooked and raw vegetables. For 8 servings, melt 2 tsp. butter in the top of a double boiler. Blend in 2 tbsp. flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, dash cayenne pepper, 1/4 tsp. dry mustard, and 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce. Add 1 c. milk; cool until thick, stirring constantly. Add 1 1/2 c. grated American cheese, stirring until cheese melts. Add 1/2 c. chopped, cooked celery, 1/2 c. chopped, cooked green pepper, 1/4 c. chopped, cooked carrots, 3/4 c. cooked peas and 1 c. fresh tomato wedges. Cover and heat through. Serve on toast. Sausage and Peaches. Sausage Peach Balls next. For 4 servings of 2 each, combine 1 lb. sausage meat, 2 tbsp. minced onion, 2 c. soft bread crumbs, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper and 1 beaten egg. Form into 8 balls. Drain 8 peach halves and arrange, cut side up, in a shallow baking dish. Stick 3 cloves around each outer edge and place a sausage ball in center of each peach half. Bake in an 8-in. square seamless pan in 350 F. oven for 45 min. Remove to hot platter, drain off fat and pour 1/2 c. peach juice over sausage peach balls.
