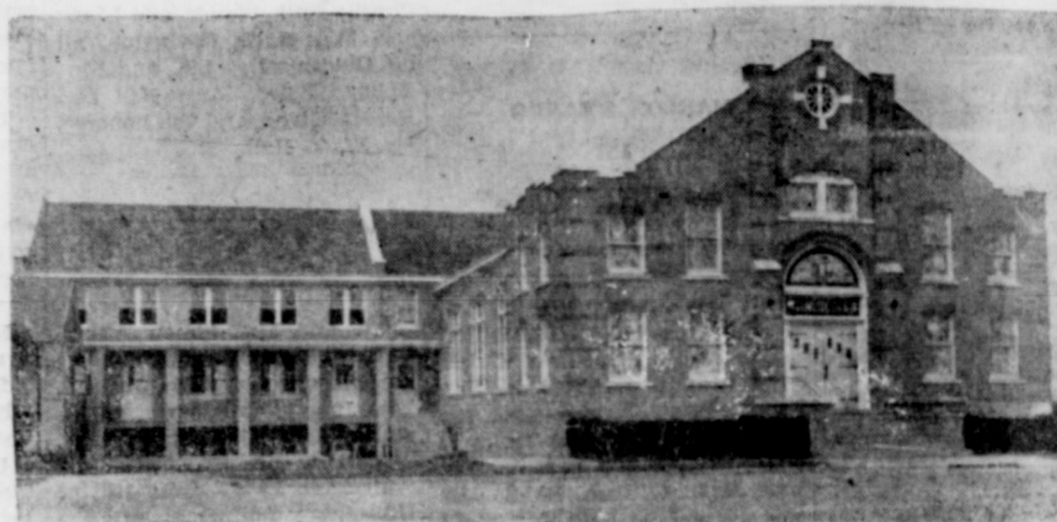

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH E. N. Smith, State Conservationist for Texas, today declared municipal and industrial waters of water have no cause for worry in connection with the conservation of water from the small reservoirs in Soil Conservation Service upstream flood prevention.

of flood losses every year along the small creeks where the dams have been built. In addition, farmers can now raise crops on several thousand acres of fertile bottomland which have been flooded too frequently for cultivation.

Smith explained that critics have said that if many flood prevention dams are built in the headwaters of streams the water supplies may be seriously reduced by evaporation from the pools of the structures. Actually, Mr. Smith said, the evaporation loss from the pools of upstream flood prevention dams would be small compared to the evaporation loss from existing major reservoirs, and very small compared to the average flow of the streams.

The average yearly flow into Benbrook, Grapevine, Garza-Little Elm and Lavon reservoirs is estimated to be slightly more than one million acre-feet. The

net amount of water evaporated annually from the conservation pools of these reservoirs is estimated to total 131,300 acre-feet, or 12.8 percent of the average yearly inflow. Mr. Smith estimated that the similar loss from the pools of all flood prevention dams built, under construction and proposed—upstream from the four major dams—would be only 13,700 acre-feet annually, or 1.3 percent of the average inflow.

In addition to the annual flood damages prevented in up stream areas, the flood prevention dams will reduce the rate of sedimentation of the major reservoirs by more than 50 percent. It is obvious, said Mr. Smith, that the combined benefits of the upstream dams far outweigh any small effect which they may have on water supply.

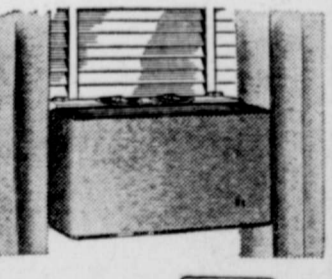

**DEFENSE BILL:** Defense appropriations of \$28,861,584,486 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1955, have been recommended by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

That sum is \$5,451,736,514 less than total appropriations for the current fiscal year. It is \$1,025,470,514 below the budget estimate.

The recommended appropriation is equivalent to more than \$170 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

**AIRCRAFT:** Committee hearings on the defense appropriations bill brought out the fact that aircraft procurement expenditures by the Air Force, Army and Navy will account for some 22 per cent of all defense spending in 1955.

This reflects continuing emphasis on building up our air power. During the current year, aircraft procurement expenditures are 20 per cent of total defense spending. Last year, the figure was 17 per cent.

By July 1, 1957, it is planned that the Air Force will be organized into 137 wings, of which 125 will be combat wings. The air army of the Navy will include 16 carrier air groups and 15 carrier anti-submarine warfare squadrons. The Marine Corps will have three air wings.

**SHIPS:** Under terms of the bill, expenditures for shipbuilding will total approximately one billion dollars next year. That is about the same amount being spent this year.

At the end of June, 1955, the active fleet of the Navy will consist of 1,080 ships. Of these, 404 will be major combatant types— aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, submarines, and so on—and 676 will be mine warfare, amphibious warfare, patrol, and auxiliary vessels.

**PERSONNEL:** At the present time, we have approximately 3,330,000 men in our Armed Forces. That is a reduction of about 72,000 since the first of this year.

The Defense Department reports that it expects the total to be reduced to 3,047,000 by next June— 1,173,000 in the Army, 970,000 in the Air Force, 689,000 in the Navy, and 215,000 in the Marine Corps. Only the Air Force will show an increase in manpower during the coming

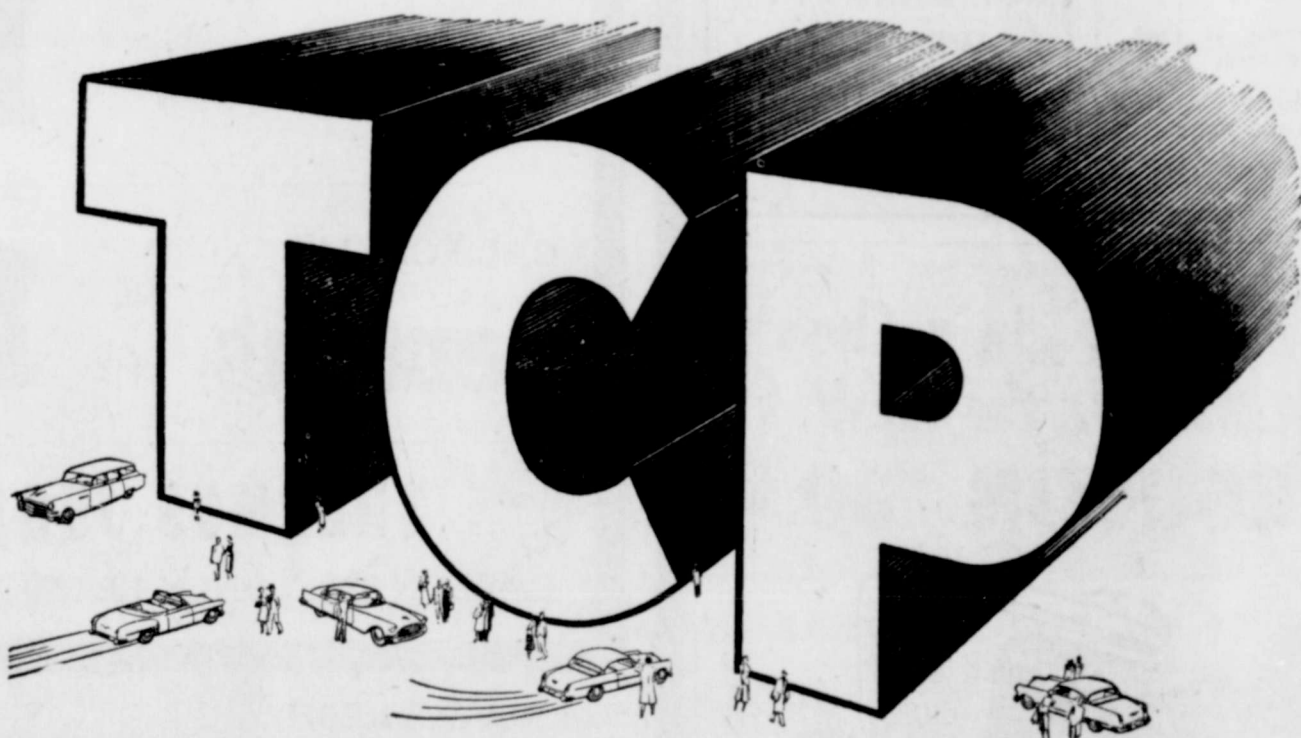

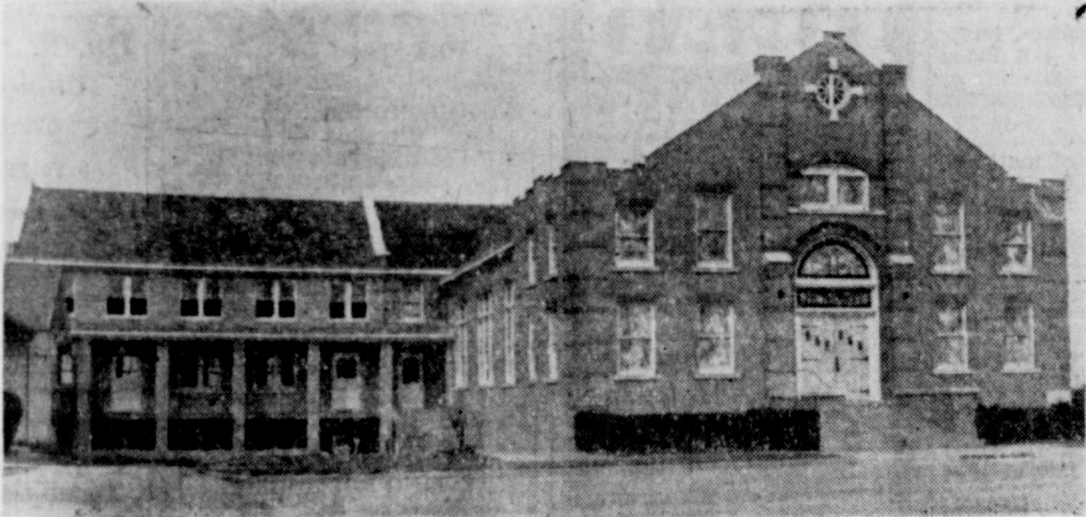

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## LONE STAR Agriculture

By John C. White, Commissioner

### TEXAS COTTON INDUSTRY

A four hundred million dollar industry is thriving in the nation today, built on a raw material that was discarded as "waste" a century ago.

This "waste material" is cottonseed, a commodity that now creates an annual farm income of some \$400 million. At one time, these precious pellets were considered worthless. Except for a small quantity needed for planting the new cotton crop, cottonseed were dumped in nearby bodies of water or

left to rot near the gin. For each 100 pounds of cotton, the plant yields about 180 pounds of seed. Not more than 18 pounds of this seed are needed to plant the next year's crop. The rest goes into hundreds of different products ranging from food to gunpowder.

We actually eat a large portion of this seed. Nearly 100 percent of the oil extracted from cottonseed is used in edible products such as vegetable shortening, margarine, salad and cooking oils, salad dressing and mayonnaise. Some cottonseed oil is used in manufacturing washing powder, paints, linoleum, oilcloth and similar products.

The seed is just a part of the picture, however. In Texas, the largest cotton producing state, the total crop value amounts to some \$812,345,000 annually. It is grown on 153,177 farms, or 46 per cent of the total farms in the state. We produced approximately 4,350,000 bales of cotton and 1,803,000 tons of cottonseed last year.

Cotton and its by products accounted for 38 percent of the total farm marketing. They brought income to some 1,793 gins, 113 warehouses, 87 oil mills and 53 textile mills in the state—and to thousands more who are benefited by their payrolls.

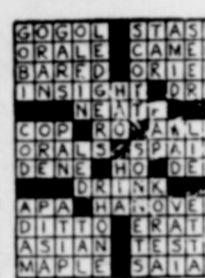
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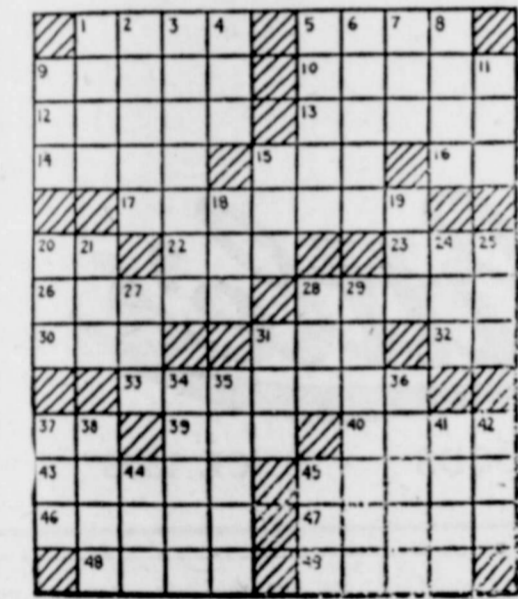

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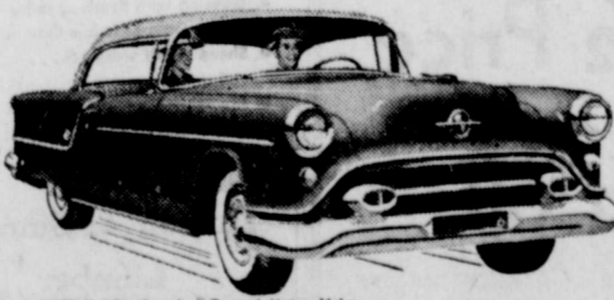

### Methodists

Chesser Valley, Pompey Creek and Mullin. At the end of the Conference Year, fall 1889, Zephyr Circuit was formed and Goldthwaite Circuit included Center City, Pleasant Grove, Star Mountain and Payne Gap. This combination held for two years and then Goldthwaite became a Station at the beginning of the Conference Year 1891-1892. At the same time the Charge now known as the Star Center City charge was formed and has remained the same with the addition now and then of another preaching place.

We would like to be able to list the names of all the pastors who have served Goldthwaite during these 75 years but space does not permit. To name a few and not all would be unfair for although in the

records some seemed to have done outstanding work while others did not do so well we feel that it is not our task to evaluate the work of any of them and so we leave their work and the importance of it to the judgment of One who can evaluate the work in the light of eternity. Paul wrote, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God giveth the increase." This we feel is the case with Goldthwaite. What the church is today is the results of the labors of all in the past plus the work of faithful lay men and women of today.

While the task of erecting the new Educational Wing has been shouldered by the membership at large, the brunt of the work has been upon the shoulders of the Building Committee composed of Dr. T. C. Graves, Chmn., and Messrs W.

C. Barnett, Malcolm Jernigan, Wallace Johnson, who took the place of his father, the late W. M. Johnson, on the Committee, and Sam P. Sullivan.

THE MULLIN CHURCH. Of the churches which went to make up the Zephyr Circuit in 1889 only Mullin remains in Mills County. We regret that we were not able to find any old records of the Mullin Church nor did we find anyone in Mullin who could give us much information about the history of the church. We hope that in the near future we may be able to find some one who can bring us up to date on the history of Methodism in Mullin.

THE STAR - CENTER CITY CHARGE. Here again we do not have the full picture. The earliest Quarterly Conference Record we have been able to find of Methodism in connection with the work in that area is that of January 22, 1891. When the beautiful new church of Center City was dedicated August 1952 there was a splendid article in the Godthwaite

Eagle, on the history of the Center City Church. That article, which I have before me, states that the first church at Center City was organized in the middle 1870's and gives the name of the first pastor and his report to the Quarterly Conference. His name was the Rev. W. M. Williams, however, he was not pastor of Center City until the year 1880-1881 and his report as quoted in the article of the above date is given verbatim in the Quarterly Conference Record of April 2, 1881. This record I also have before me as I write this.

Brother Williams speaks of having 7 appointments and these are listed as Center City, Salem, Indian Gap, Ward's School House, Sandy Springs Camp Ground and Shiloh. Pleasant Grove is first mentioned in the Q. C. Record of January 5, 1894.

In the years that followed we see the names of several preaching places mentioned. These are—Mountain Creek, Mercer's Gap, Long Cove, Star Mountain, Brooks School House, Payne Gap, Russell Gap, Hurst Ranch, McGirk, Willow Springs, Spring Dale, Lookout Mountain, South Bennett, Miller Grove, Big Valley, and even William's Ranch and Goldthwaite. The latter was when the Center City area was for two years, 1889-1891, a part of the Goldthwaite Circuit. The name of Star first appears during the Conference Year 1884-1885.

In recent years Moline was a part of this charge until about two years ago. The Star Center City Charge at present includes only four churches—Star, Center City, Bethel, Pleasant Grove.

We would like to mention all the pastors who have served this charge and there are the names of many people who assumed the responsibility for the work of these churches but space does not permit to name all of them. Then too, there were many who labored valiantly in the background who, in the sight of the Master, would come in for a large share of the glory but whose names never find a place in the Official Records due to lack of space. That is true in any generation and in any church.

The History of Methodism in Mills County is too big a subject for a short article. It would make thrilling reading if some one had the time to write it. It could well serve as the subject for a Masters or a Doctor of Philosophy thesis or dissertation.

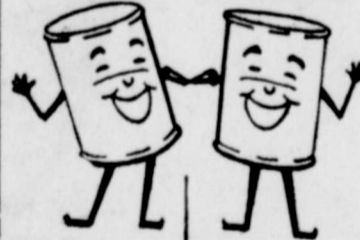

We who are called Methodist are proud of our rich heritage and only hope that 75 years from now someone may look upon the work of this day and say of us as we can say of these who have labored before us — "Well done."

We would not for one moment minimize the work done by other groups of Methodist in the county. We have no records of their work. Our brief summary has been made from Quarterly Conference Records

of work done for the most in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, prior to union of the three branches of Methodism into what is known as "The Methodist Church."

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
