Did U. S. Urge Chiang Kai-shek to Try Invasion Now?
State's Robertson Admits Visit to Formosa 'Fruitful'

WASHINGTON—The State department is keeping mum, but the reports persist that the United States talked Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek out of trying to invade the Chinese mainland at this time.

The department was flooded with questions from newsmen about the matter but each and every query was met with just about the same answer: "No comment."

When Robertson returned from his week's stay on Formosa, he denied that his mission was to tell the generalissimo not to start anything.

However, the able diplomat did admit that his mission was "very fruitful" and the reports still persist in Washington and Taipei that he succeeded in persuading the generalissimo that he should postpone any invasion attempt for the time being, at least.

NO POLITICS—The Eisenhower administration will crack down hard on violators of various federal election laws during this year's congressional campaign.

PLAYING IT SAFE—Both of the major political parties seem to be more than a little confused at this point.

POWER PROBE—Republicans face an all-out investigation of the controversial Dixon-Yates power contract if the Democrats win control of the House in the Nov. 2 elections.

Investigation Broadened If Demos Win?
The Dixon-Yates contract is first on the agenda, however. This is the contract for private power in the government's public Tennessee Valley Authority area which President Eisenhower ordered the Atomic Energy commission to approve over the objections of three of the five commissioners.

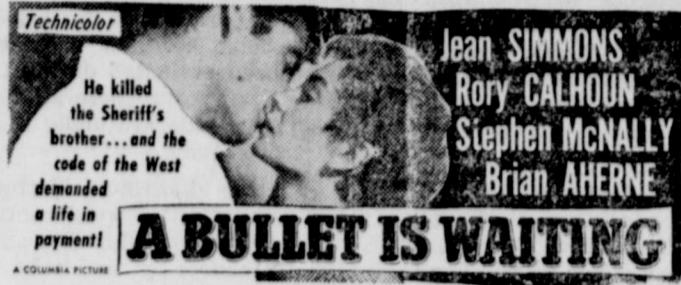

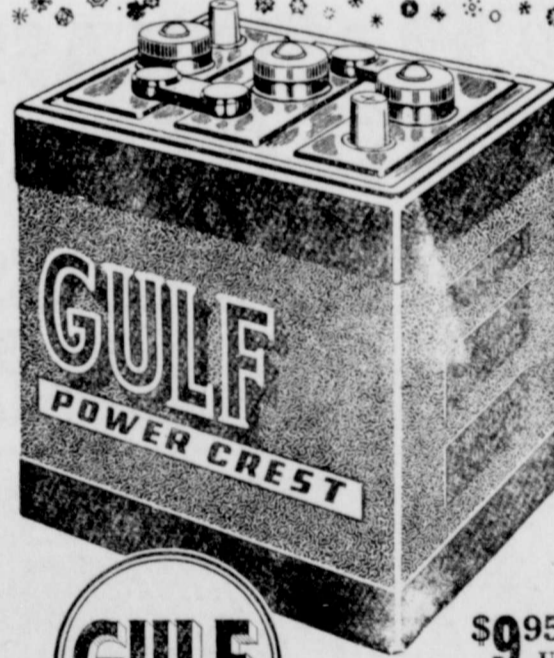

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

Farmers and ranchers of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who have planted cover crops in the past have been well pleased with the results obtained from these crops. Most of them have planted or are planning to plant more cover crops this year.

Sherwood Owens of Center City does not think it profitable

to plant corn unless a crop of Winterpeas have been grown on the land before corn planting time. Even though the corn planting has to be delayed, the corn holds up during the dry weather and produces a better crop.

V. C. Segelquist of Center City has found that Sweet-clover is a profitable crop from a grazing standpoint, Mr. Segel-

quist says that he has run as much as a cow and calf on two acres of sweetclover.

D. N. Waggoner, who farms near Center City, can still see results of a vetch crop planted two years ago. Corn following vetch was approximately two feet taller than his other corn and his millet about ten inches higher than the millet on land that had not been planted to a cover crop.

Harold Beard of Caradan increased his wheat yield eight bushels per acre by growing

COMBATING A LOSS

Chemical weed control has become a common farm practice in the last decade. And no wonder! Only soil erosion costs farmers more than losses from weeds.

Scientists have developed numerous herbicides which now supplement improved cultural practices. These chemicals can be used at low pressure and low gallonage as pre-panting, pre-emergence, post-emergence and soil sterilization treatments.

But do not look for a single super-herbicide that will kill all weeds and harm no crops. That is unlikely, because all crop plants and weeds are closely related. Today's trend is toward specialization. A specific chemical for a specific purpose.

There are hundreds of compounds and they all effect plants in different ways. The result depends on how well the chemical is absorbed and translocated in the plant; the plant's genetic background and germination, and how long the chemical persists in plant and soil.

A compound may kill one plant but not affect another. The same compound may be harmless to the leaves but deadly when used as a pre-emergence treatment. So it is important to have a screening technique that measures a chemical's over-all activity. Such techniques are being developed by plant scientists in the course of weed research.

This broad systematic herbicide evaluation program links

sweetclover in his fields. Henry Soules of Star planted sweet-clover in small grain as a hay crop and produced from 20 to 40 bales of clover and oat hay per acre. This hay was used in feeding calves.

If you plan to plant a cover crop you still have time but you must act NOW. For best results the seed should be properly inoculated and should be fertilized. A fertilizer containing nitrogen is very helpful in getting the crop established especially if cover crops have never been grown on the land before.

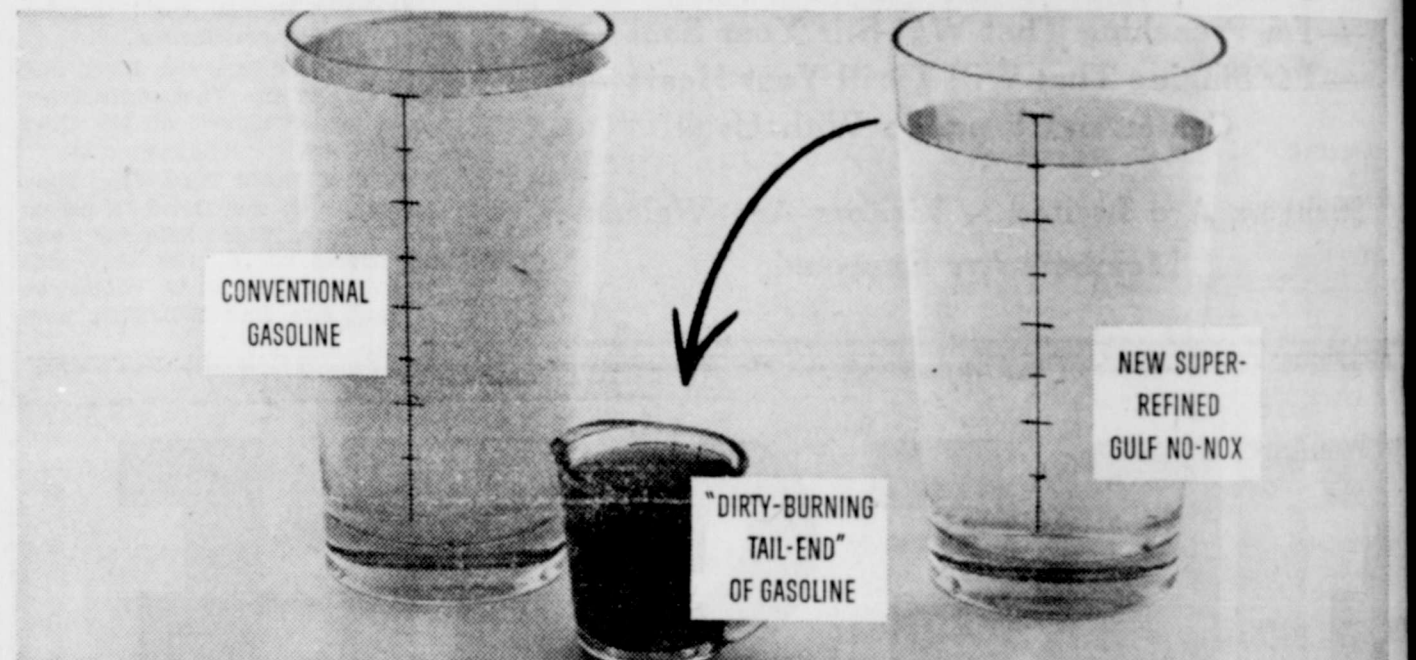

Part Time Work Questions To Be Asked In Current Population Survey

Special questions on part-time workers will be asked in addition to the usual inquiries on employment and unemployment in the November Current Population Survey, according to District Supervisor Charles E. Fay of the U. S. Census Bureau's district office at Dallas, Texas. The survey will be conducted locally and in 229 other sections of the country during the week of November 15.

The purpose of the special questions is to provide information on the number of people who work part-time, the reasons for their short hours, and how many want and could accept full-time work. Similar questions asked in connection with the August Current Population Survey revealed that 7 1/2 million nonfarm workers reported working less than 35 hours during the week of August 15. This number included 1 1/2 million workers in regular full-time jobs who were idle part of the week because of slack work or other economic factors. An additional one million held regular part-time jobs but wanted and could have accepted full-

time employment. The remaining five million preferred part-time employment or were unable to accept full-time jobs.

Current Population Survey interviews in this area are conducted by Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas, Texas.

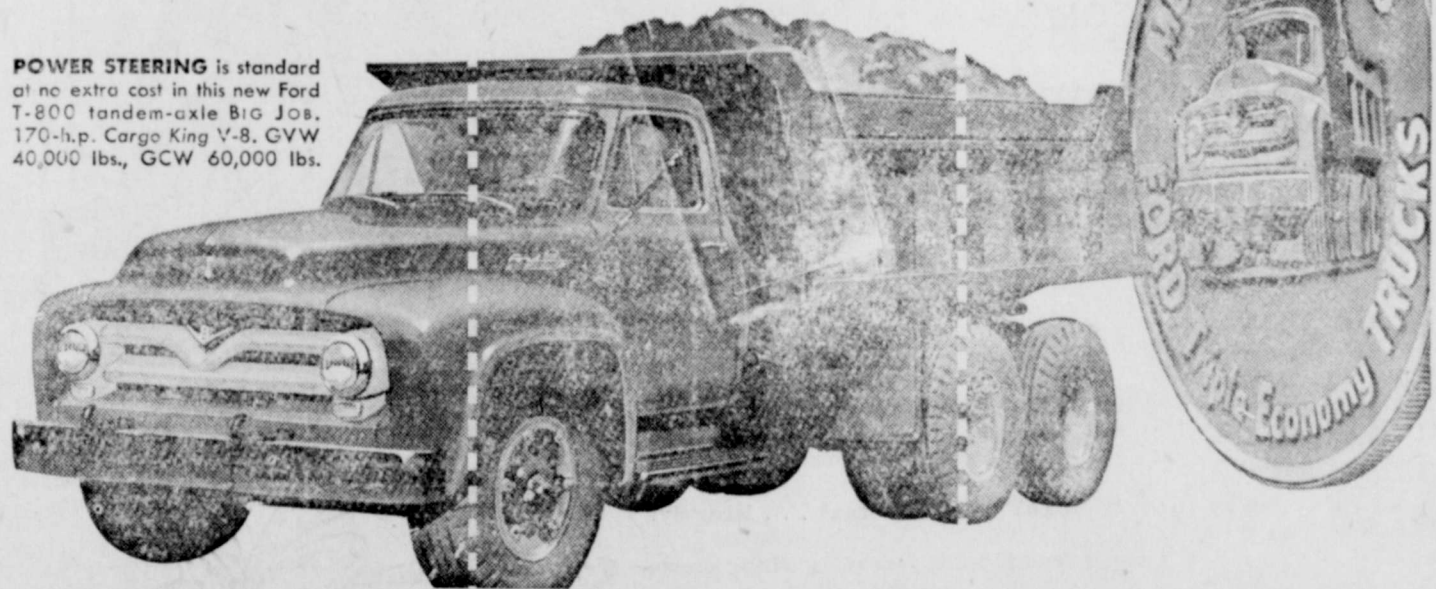

**Questionnaires Are Mailed To
Farmers For '54 Agriculture Census**

Questionnaires for the 1954 Census of Agriculture are now in the mail and will be in the hands of local farmers within a few days. It was announced today by Field Supervisor Walter F. Jackson of San Angelo, Texas.

The farm census questionnaires are being mailed from a central point with the distribution timed so that the report forms will arrive about a week ahead of the date when enumerators will begin the field canvass. The advance mailing is for the purpose of giving farm operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers required by the questionnaires and getting them ready for the census enumerators. This procedure is designed to insure greater accuracy of reporting and to save time both for the farmer and the enumerator when the latter calls at the farm.

The 1954 Census of Agriculture questionnaire is designed to provide information on the

number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values, and mortgage debt. On the average, each farmer is asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered by simply checking "yes" or "no".
