### Minimum Wool Price Continues November 1

San Angelo (Spec.)—The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the present minimum selling price for wool by the Commodity Credit Corporation will be continued on November 1, according to a release by R. W. Hodge, Director, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

This is a policy that we and the National Wool Growers Association have been working for since it was announced that the Department would not raise the price of these wools for use in the manufacture and storing of woolens. Hodge added.

It is hoped that this announcement will tend to help the wool market in general as the 1955 clip is now moving into warehouses in Texas. These wools have been hanging in the market and naturally depressing it."

Broose B. Metcalfe, Vice-President of the National Wool Growers Association and a past president of the TS & GRA, spent considerable time in San Antonio in April with other representatives of the National Wool Growers Association on this issue, Hodge said.

### State Capitol News

Austin, Texas—Right down to the line, the Legislature fought out the battle of taxation.

Pay of the legislators — \$25 per day—stopped May 10. So there was all the more reason, from their point of view, that the toughest, most complex and controversial problem of the session be solved as soon as possible.

First, the House passed a tax bill, increasing or putting new levies on gasoline, cigarettes, snuff, tobacco, natural gas, trading stamps, uranium, and wine and beer dealers.

When this bill went to the Senate, amendments were introduced to tax auto storage and parking lots, jewelry, furs and clothing, storage warehouses, airlines, real estate brokers, chemical manufacturers, hotels, tourist lodges, department stores, and chain stores.

**COMMITTEE HEARINGS**  
Sen. Dorsey Hardeman, chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, scheduled hearings almost as fast as amendments were introduced.

First witnesses were E. H. Thornton Jr. chairman of the State Highway Commission. He asked that the state tax on gasoline be set at six cents per gallon, instead of the present four cents. (The House bill increased 'the gasoline tax to five cents.)

Gov. Allan Shivers had advocated a two-cent increase in the gasoline tax to provide for the state's highway needs.

He continues to express the hope that there be no income or sales tax.

That the Legislators will complete the tax bill and adjourn within two weeks in Shivers' guess.

Big question is whether the House will accept what the Senate does—especially if it changes the gas levy.

**POLITICAL ASPECT**  
While they were discharging their legislative duties, some members were thinking seriously about the political campaigns of a year hence.

Mentioned often as potential candidates for Governor have been John Ben Shepperd, U. S. Sen. Price Daniel, Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Sen. Jimmy Phillips.

But a new face entered the picture this week when Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin was approached by friends who urged him to give serious consideration to the race for Governor in 1956.

In the school board meeting Saturday night election returns, as made by Lucille Conroe, Mrs. John Hester and Mrs. John Patterson, were accepted and certified. Loyd King received 118 votes and M. C. Yeager received 71 votes. Mr. King qualified by taking the oath of office and the school board went into organization.

Mr. Malcolm Jernigan and Mr. Charles Conradt retiring board members, were congratulated by the entire group for their faithful contributions to our existing school program and especially on the very excellent building program put over during the past three years.

With all seven present board members participating, Loyd King, Dale Reid, Olen Kemp, Jack McKenzie, Delmer Edgington, Tom Graves, and Bill Sherwood, D. R. Edgington was elected president, W. C. Sherwood, vice president and T. C. Graves, secretary.

The public is assured that they are welcome to attend any and all school board meetings, it was announced by Supt. J. T. Jones and board members. Meeting time shall be the first Monday night of each calendar month at 7:30 in the conference room adjoining the superintendent's office.

In school board action Saturday night, the superintendent's contract was extended until June 30, 1958. Supt. Jones, in accepting the extension, declared that it will be his number one objective to bring the program of instruction to the highest level possible with standards as high as the community wants. "If proper buildings is an asset, then our task should be an easy one", he said. Supt. Jones feels that he has as good a faculty as is possible to have.

He declared that the loss of two faculty members, Coach Ray Akins and Paul Galloway will be keenly felt and regretted. However, with replacement of these with Ray Standley and James Lowrance as coach and assistant coach respectively, it will be possible to continue with little interruption.

Supt. Jones received acceptance from James Lowrance on the offer of assistant coach position that was extended to him through school board action of Saturday night. As the coaching situation now stands, Mr. Chambers will continue with all the health and physical education in the 8th grade and below, and Mr. Ray Standley assisted by Mr. James Lowrance will have health and physical education in high school including varsity sports.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Eden Eager to Achieve A Formosan Cease Fire
Recent Election Victories Find Democrats Optimistic

WASHINGTON—British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden reportedly has lost no time in using his new prestige as chief of her majesty's government to press for secret negotiations with Red China in the hope that a Formosa cease-fire can be achieved.

Diplomats say that Eden believes time is of the essence, for once the Chinese Communists have completed a buildup of air bases, they will be in a position to "lead from strength."

Sir Anthony is said to be hopeful that both the Soviet Union and the Peiping Communist regime can be made to see the futility of a conflict which would involve use of atomic weapons.

Eden's manipulations, according to the diplomatic "grapevine," are being conducted in Moscow and through emissaries to the Asian-African conference in Indonesia, who are sympathetic to his views.

The United States, while taking no official part in the backstage moves, is, of course, being kept fully informed, and meanwhile all American officials are under strict orders to refrain from any public utterances of an inflammatory nature.

DEMOCRATS—Recent election victories in Chicago and Michigan have convinced some Democratic leaders that their party is still benefitting from the trend which enabled it to gain control of Congress in 1954.

The Chicago mayoralty election was particularly gratifying to Adlai E. Stevenson, who went all-out for the winner, Richard J. Daley. By the same token, the Michigan results delighted Gov. G. Mennen Williams, who may be a strong candidate for the 1956 Democratic presidential nomination.

However, the Republicans are not downhearted. They note that Daley's margin of victory in Chicago was the smallest in all but one election since 1931.

In Michigan, the GOP experts insist the results demonstrated no clear-cut trend, and no indication that the state, which went resoundingly for President Eisenhower in 1952, would turn thumbs down on Ike in '56.

KEY POSITIONS—A congressional bill can be a lot more complicated than it seems on the surface. Consider, for instance, the measure which the House debated recently to raise the pay of postal employees by about seven and one-half per cent.

As printed in small type of the Congressional Record, the legislation covered almost 13 pages. Nearly half the space was devoted to a description of the duties of employees whose salaries would be increased.

Under the heading "key positions," the measure gives the title of every job there is in the post office department—59 in all—and then details the duties.

First "key position" is that of "janitor," whose basic function is described as follows: "Cleans, sweeps and removes trash from work areas, lobbies and washrooms." Four more paragraphs are devoted to this key worker's "duties and responsibilities," including sweeping floors, moving furniture and mowing the lawn.

GUARANTEED WAGE—Although the administration is maintaining a hands-off attitude, top officials are closely eyeing the new work contract negotiations between Administration auto manufacturers and the CIO United Auto Workers.

The negotiations are expected to reach the "trouble Negotiations stage" in May. Some highly-placed administration men fear that if the union wins a guaranteed annual wage, it will tend to dry up jobs, boost costs, and make it harder for the small and middle-sized employer to stay in business.

There is concern also, over pay boosts. Government officials feel that an increase of, for example, 12 1/2 cents an hour, would have an inflationary effect.

Meanwhile, the union, backing its demands with a strike threat, is said to want concessions that would cost the industry up to 50 cents per hour per worker. It is a touchy situation and may produce one of the big economic stories of the year.

RURAL MAILBOX IMPROVEMENT WEEK

The week beginning next Monday, May 16, has been designated officially and permanently by the Post Office Department as Rural Mailbox Improvement Week. In continuation of the valuable work in previous seasons to repair or improve the rural mailboxes of the nation, a vigorous campaign will be launched again this spring, to carry on this worthwhile project.

Here are a few pointers for R.M.I. Week

- (1) See that posts are erected—are not leaning—and that box is fastened securely.
(2) Replace obsolete boxes if it is hard to get mail into it.
(3) Name should be mailed on side of box which approaches (or can be on top of box if several boxes are grouped together).
(4) It is a big help if several boxes are neatly and properly placed on a plank extending between two posts.
(5) Bottom of box should be on an arm extending out away from the post, in a manner that it can be reached, with all obstructions (including snow and packages) promptly removed.
(6) Fill ruts with crushed rock or broken brick or cement.
(7) Drive your own car up your mail from behind the right hand side as the car is required to do, then chances are that your box pretty well located. But be sure, talk to your carrier about the proper location, and correct setting.
(8) Your carrier serves box 365 days every year. It is correctly set, it lightens work and saves him time that he can more quickly route (and saving his time save the Government money).
(9) This will be appreciated for with the rapid development of housing on acreages, the load of most rural carriers more than doubled in the few years.
(10) Your mailbox is the door to your home. Since usually in front of your mailbox its neat appearance will considerably to the neat appearance of your home. A filled-box and post planted—possibly a few flowers—behind it.

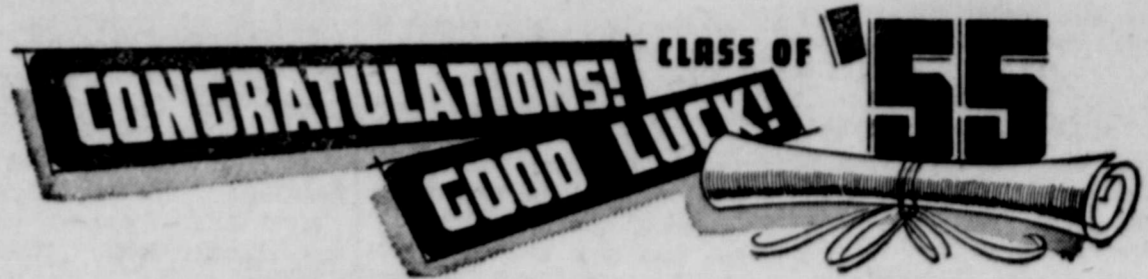

One of the great injustices against Texas farmers is the wide-spread theory that present "dust bowl" conditions on the Plains is the result of poor farming practices.

In a few cases, this is true. But during my recent tour of West Texas, I found that only a small proportion of the land was blowing due to deliberate or unthinking misuse.

Some of the plains country should never have been touched by the plow. Eventually this land must be put back to pastureland. Even land which has had the best of care is bound to suffer some damage from wind erosion during prolonged dry spells. Yet most of the soil is shifting in West Texas because the farmer doesn't have enough money to practice those measures which would prevent it.

reached those limits. In my discussions with Texas farmers, the feeling is that a government loan is needed to clear up 12-month notes at the bank. It is a matter of record from 20 years experience in F. H. A. loans, that the government cannot make a better investment than lending to farmers. These loans are paid back with interest.

When the time comes that a government loan means the difference between staying on the land or starving the farmer out, then these loans are an investment in the future security of our farm economy. That time is now ! ! !

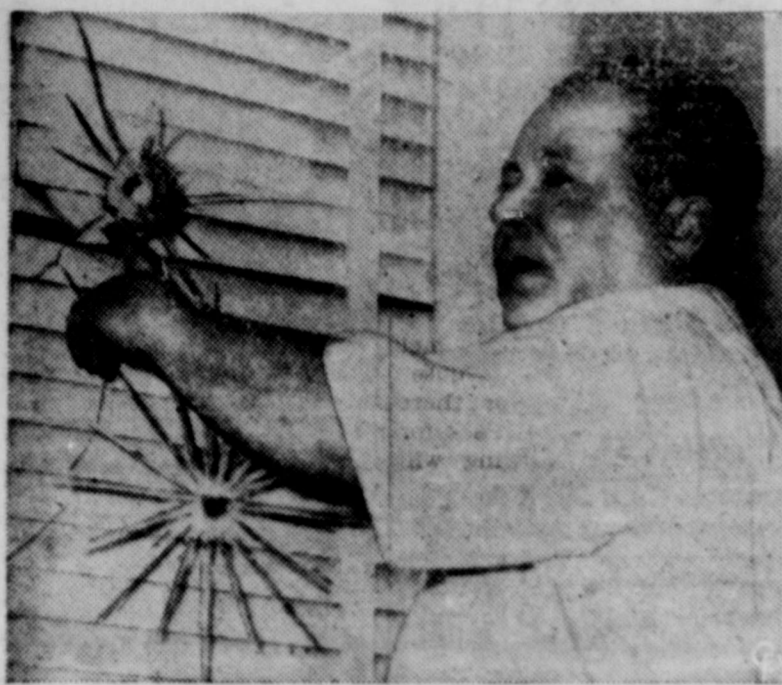

**PARK BILL PASSES**  
Ready for Governor Shivers' signature is the long fought parks bill.

Jointly sponsored by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston and Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano, the measure provides for \$25,000,000 worth of bonds to build tourist accommodations in state parks.

It calls for the erection of lodges at Inks Lake in Central Texas, Eisenhower State Park on Lake Texoma, and Atlanta State Park on Lake Texarkana.

Scheduled for construction first is a 101 unit resort hotel and lodges on Roy Inks Lake, to cost approximately \$1,000,000.

Later construction would be at Possum Kingdom Lake, Lake Whitney, and Falcon Reservoir. The entire program is self-liquidating.

**VETERANS LAND PROGRAM**

Loopholes in the veterans land program will be plugged if bills by Rep. Dolph Briscoe and Rep. Buckshot Lane meet with Senate approval.

These two House-passed measures would set up stiff requirements and regulations for land purchases and place full responsibility for administration of the program on the shoulders of the chairman of the Veterans Land Board.
