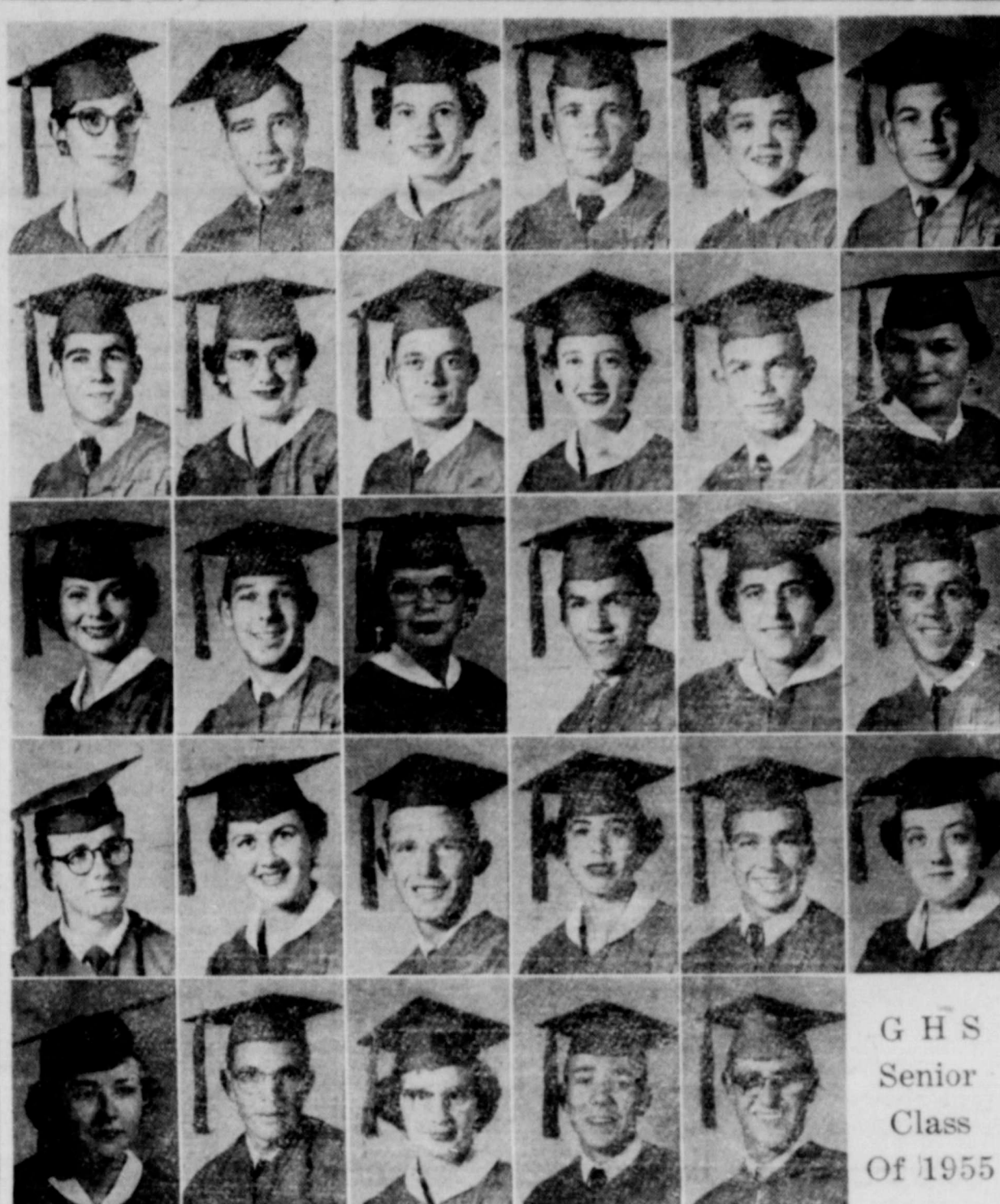

Ike Won't Run in 1956, California Party Leaders
GOP Insiders Believe See Nixon Chosen as Heir

WASHINGTON—Some GOP insiders believe that regardless of the pressure being put on him, President Eisenhower has decided not to seek re-election in 1956.

California leaders of the party profess to believe that Mr. Eisenhower hopes to see the 1956 nomination go to Vice President Richard Nixon. They point out that at the recent GOP strategy meeting in the Golden state a message was received from the President, praising Nixon in unusually strong terms.

In Washington some persons close to the White House say that Mr. Eisenhower is convinced Nixon as a standard bearer could unite all elements of the party, including the far right wing which is by no means sympathetic to the Eisenhower aides. Mr. Eisenhower has shown increasing interest in his Gettysburg farm as has the First Lady. The Eisenhowers are represented as feeling that after more than 40 years of service to his country, in and out of uniform, Ike is entitled to private life.

● SLOWLY—Lawyers with vast Supreme Court experience predict that the high tribunal will order the nation's federal district courts to take over the touchy job of ending public school segregation.

That means that segregation will end very slowly in most places where it is practiced, since the lower courts will consider local conditions in deciding how the ban should be enforced. "Go slow," will be the prevailing mood, in order to reduce friction. Therefore, school segregation may not vanish for several years. However, when it does, the eradication will be complete and will be accomplished with little trouble.

This is the primary desire of the Supreme Court justices, who realize what a special revolution ending segregation will be for many southern communities. The justices are said to feel, however, that the revolution can and will take place if it is left to the district courts with their knowledge of local conditions.

● MINIMUM WAGE—Congress undoubtedly will boost the national minimum wage but not as high as organized labor wants it to go. Sentiment in the Senate and House favors at least a new minimum of 90 cents an hour, and possibly a \$1-an-hour wage. The CIO and AFL are leading a drive to have the wage pushed up to \$1.25 an hour but has won little support among the legislators.

President Eisenhower has proposed that the present 75-cent minimum wage be raised to 90 cents. He is sure of that much but some Democrats are advocating the \$1-an-hour level.

While the Democrats have an outside chance of getting the \$1-an-hour, it is believed that most elements in Congress finally will accept a slightly lower figure as a compromise. Do not look for any major fight over the issue, however. There is little or no opposition to a boost in the wage level and the only question is how much.

● PAY RAISE POLITICS—Democrats feel that they have outmaneuvered Mr. Eisenhower on the touchy issue of pay raises for the postal workers of the nation.

Every congressman is convinced that the postal workers can prove to be political dynamite and even Republican House and Senate members will be apprehensive about disregarding their wishes. As the situation stands now, the House has voted an 8.2 per cent pay increase and the Senate approved a flat 10 per cent hike. Mr. Eisenhower has made it apparent he is prepared to veto any pay boost that amount to more than 7.2 per cent. However, the Democratic-controlled Congress probably will send the President a bill above the 7.2 per cent level which will compel him to veto it.

The veto could well stand up inasmuch as it takes a two-thirds vote to override but Democrats feel that by forcing such an action, they will have accumulated a political bonus for 1956.

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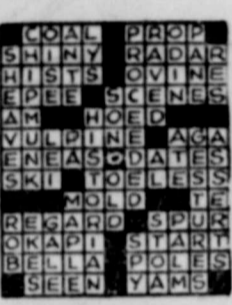

### Census Supervisor Urges Businessmen To File Reports

### Recent Amendments To Social Security Law Provide Benefits For Large Group

The recent amendments to the Social Security Act provide immediate benefits to a large group of people. These people are certain survivors of workers who died before September 1950. If you are the survivor of a worker who died after June 1940 but before September 1950 and who had some work covered by social security but who was not fully insured under the old law, you may now be eligible for benefit payments.

As an example of what this amendment means, let's take the case of Bill Smith. Bill was a young man, only 26 years old when he passed away in June 1949. His work record showed two years — 1945 and 1946 — or eight quarters of work. Mrs. Smith stated that Bill had worked in a radio shop for another person for about two years and then had opened his own business. Since Bill needed ten quarters of coverage, about two and a half years of work, to be insured, we had to tell Mrs. Smith that she and the children could not be paid benefits. Under this change in the law,

Mrs. Smith can be paid benefits for herself and the children until the children are 18.

In the Austin service area there are a number of widows 65 or older and young widows with children under 18 who are now eligible for social security insurance benefits because of the law. Most of these people contacted their social security office at the time their husbands died and were told that they did not have any insurance benefits payable. Under the new amendments, benefits are payable to these survivors and they should contact the Austin Social Security Office again.

### Precautions For Screw Worm Season

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Branding, dehorning, castrating and other seasonal livestock jobs may open the way to screw-worm infestations unless effective controls are used.

Stockmen are advised to be on the alert for these costly insects and to treat all flesh wounds on livestock, infested or not.

One application of EQ-335 smear should do the job, says C. F. Garner, extension entomologist. Large wounds may require a second treatment. EQ-335 contains lindane which gives a last killing effect.

Apply the smear directly to the wound, then put a small ring around the opening. Screw-worms increase rapidly once present. If headed off from the start, a lot of trouble and needless loss can be avoided, Garner says.

### Pink Or Treated Wheat Is Seized By Food And Drug Administration

As announced by the ASC Office, "A number of cars of pink or treated wheat have been seized by the Food and Drug Administration in the area served by the Chicago CSS Commodity Office."

This is an extremely serious problem. Pink or treated wheat may not be disposed of for human food or animal feed use. The only authorized disposition other than for seed purposes is certain commercial outlets for non-food and non-feed use. These commercial processors, as a matter of policy, will not buy treated wheat so there is virtually no market outlet.

The wheat may be held for seed under seal and bond and the Food Drug Administration indicates that it may be necessary for one of their inspectors to follow the treated wheat into the field at seeding time to insure that proper disposition is made of the treated wheat.

Producers are warned not to mix left-over treated seed with wheat that will be delivered under the price support program.

#### WHEAT ALLOTMENTS

Producers who have not planted any wheat in one of the last three years, 1953, 1954 or 1955, may, if they wish, apply for a "New Grower" allotment for 1956. "New Growers" are farms which do not now have a wheat allotment and which have not planted any wheat in the last three years.

Applications may be filed until July 15, which is the final date for filing.

**IMPROVED CROP OUTLOOK**  
Recent heavy rains in many areas of the state have changed the Texas crop outlook from "dismal failure" to "hopeful prospects."

Yet, regardless of the immediate picture, it is evident that Texas farmers and ranchmen still will need a "normal" amount of additional moisture the rest of this year.

Enough rain has fallen to assure a good grain sorghum planting conditions in the production belt from Corpus Christi to the High Plains region. In the next few weeks, farmers will

be busily planting millions of acres to this crop.

Cotton prospects are now fairly good after a disheartening start. Even though the rain washed out some fields and some hail damaged others, it is not too late to replant, in most cases. Hopes for corn look even better than cotton.

Unfortunately, the rain came too late to do much good for Texas wheat. Oats are gone for the most part but benefits to pastureland cannot be underestimated. Ranchmen hail the rains as "the best in the last five years" in Central and North Central Texas.

Despite the unusual amount of rainfall, however, the relief cannot be termed as a "drouth breaker." Damage done by five extremely dry years will not be repaired by a week of rain. A vast area of South Texas, extending from Alice to Laredo and north to San Antonio has received only spotted downpours.

Water reserves are still short in many sections except those which received more than five inches. The initial showers must

be followed by additional moisture equal to a normal year's supply before the threat to our water reserve is past.

Briefly, the rains are a blessing—but Texas needs more! At least a full "wet" year will be necessary to put agriculture back on its feet.

**Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News**

Supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District were notified last week that the application for flood prevention work on Bennett Creek under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act had been given preliminary approval by the Texas State Soil Conservation Board.

This watershed has been approved as being "practicable and feasible." Preliminary surveys had shown that anticipated benefits would exceed cost of remedial measures.

Bennett Creek watershed received one of the most damaging rains in years the day after receiving word of the preliminary approval for flood prevention work. Areas in the watershed reported as much as seven inches of rain, causing the Creek to get out of banks. Most of the damage was confined to crop, fence, road and bridge damage.

Landowners in the watershed and businessmen in the area are happy over the possibilities of securing flood prevention measures on Bennett Creek. All concerned are aware however that whether or not a flood prevention program will be carried out on Bennett Creek will depend upon the ability of the local people to raise their share of the cost as well as the amount of money appropriated by Congress for the small watershed program.

Reports from Deep Creek in the San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation District reveals that the flood prevention program installed on that watershed some three years ago is doing a good job in preventing flood damage.

High intensity rains of from four to six and one-half inches, falling in approximately three hours, were reported. The floodwater retarding structures caught more water than at any time since their construction. The draw down tubes were functioning as designed, releasing the floodwater at a slow rate.

Landowners in the area saw the importance of having good

conservation treatment on land above these structures. In area where land treatment had not been applied, damage was noted. These floodwater retarding structures prevented a major flood in the former flood plain according to several people living in the watershed.

**PARENT PROBLEMS**

**Helping Tot to Speak**

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

SOME children are very slow to begin talking. While most children can say about 200 words when they're two years old, there are some youngsters who speak little or not at all until they are over two. This does not mean they are retarded, for frequently such children prove to have superior mentality.

**Sign Language**

One youngster we know, the baby of the family, did not begin speaking until he was almost three. But, then, he didn't have to. He communicated by sign language and grunts, which his older brother and sister translated for him. Since he could make himself understood without speaking, he was slow to learn.

**Consult Specialist**

Generally speaking, it's a good idea to have an ear specialist check the youngster who is three years old and is not yet talking. There's a possibility that something may be wrong with his hearing. It is also possible that some emotional factor may be

keeping the child from talking as soon as he should.

**Undue Pressure**

It sometimes happens that a child begins speaking late because his parents have put undue pressure on him to talk. One mother wrote to say her husband had whipped their little girl in an effort to get her to repeat words he would speak to her. This, of course, has a very bad effect on a child.

How much better it is, to use patience in helping a child to speak. Instead of commands and constant urging, just assume the child will begin speaking of his own accord. In a pleasant way, repeat the names of actions and objects. The child will eventually repeat them after you. Always show enthusiasm at his efforts, no matter how jumbled they may be.

**Speak Distinctly**

It is a good idea to read to the youngster who is slow in talking. Converse with him frequently, making sure you speak slowly and distinctly.

### Warm Weather Puts Egg Quality On The Skids

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Warmer weather can put egg quality on the skids unless producers take a few precautions, warns F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist.

High temperatures and low humidity are two of the greatest enemies of good egg quality. For producers who sell on grade, a drop in quality means lower prices. Sold ungraded, a drop in quality means decreased consumer demand.

Keep the eggs clean, Beanblossom says. Use clean, dry nesting materials and keep the birds confined on wet days to avoid mud-tracked nests.

Step up the number of times each day eggs are gathered, preferably to two or three times daily. A wire basket allows air to circulate quickly, carrying off the heat.

Store eggs in a cool, humid but well ventilated place. And market regularly and frequently. Beanblossom points out that

Grade AA eggs become inedible in three days at 98 degrees, but usually will remain Grade A for about six months if held just above freezing.

AUSTIN, Texas—It's amazing how quickly pennies can grow into millions of dollars. But, it is with pennies that Texas is solving its financial problem.

Big discussion of the week has been the proposed two cent increase in gasoline taxes. Right behind that big topic has been the 1c increase in cigarette taxes and the hike to 1c per bottle (\$1.30 per barrel) in beer taxes.

With these topics before them, the Legislators came back almost to where they started—namely Gov. Allan Shivers' original tax recommendations. Tossed out by the Senators, after many hearings on numerous phases of taxation, were vir-

ually all other tax proposals. When the tax bill bogged down in the Senate, Governor Shivers threw in a surprise strategy move.

By message, he told the House and Senate—now working without pay—that if they wanted to end this session, he would call them back in a special session when they could be paid \$25 a day.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Speaker Jim Lindsey at once responded that the session could complete the tax chore, unblock the billion and a half dollar appropriation bill, and finish its job.

**BILIBUSTER RECORD BUSTED**  
For the third time during the 1955 Legislative session, a new talkathon mark was established by a member of the usually sedate Senate.

This time the speaker was Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock who took 28 hours, 25 minutes against a state water project financing plan.

Previous holder of the record was Sen. K. Wayne Wagonmiller of Bowie. Before that it was Sen. Jimmie Phillips of Angleton.

Corbin was opposing a committee report on Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposed constitutional amendment to the \$100,000,000 water program. He was objecting to the three-cent ad valorem levy.

Governor Shivers had advocated the plan as a key part of his water conservation legislation. The proposal would set up a six-man board, to be appointed by the Governor. Corbin also contended that the board should be elected, rather than appointed. In objecting to the method of taxation, Corbin said that it would cause dry land farmers to bear the burden of water projects in other districts.

Like the other "billibusters," it was fruitless.

**RAIN STEALS THE SHOW**  
General rains throughout the state stole the spotlight from the Legislators the past week. It was NEWS—BIG news. Even where there were floods, there were smiles of gratitude for the moisture.

As for the capital city, weathermen here report that Austin already has received more rain this year than it did throughout 1954.

Recent almost statewide rains have changed Texas' crop outlook from "dismal failure" to "fairly good" according to Agricultural Commissioner John C. White. Rain came too late to help the wheat and cats, says White, but benefits to pasturelands were rated "excellent". He pointed out the need for a normal amount of moisture the rest of the year.

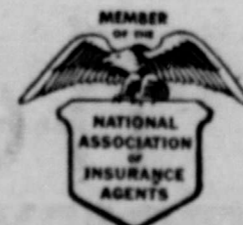
