Wayne Poe Has Grand Champion Steer At Houston Show

Mills County Does It Again, Champ Sells For \$10,000.00 At Auction

Wayne Poe, 18, 4-H club member of Mills County exhibited the grand champion steer at the Houston Fat Stock Show last week. His 940 pound Hereford, Tom, was judged grand champion of the club show on Wednesday and then on Thursday night was named the grand champion of the entire show.

The steer brought the owner \$10,000 at auction Friday when he sold to George Parker of Parker Bros. & Co.

While the \$10,000 price fell considerably short of the record price of \$18,800.00 paid at the Houston Show to another Mills County youth, Johnny Wigley, for his 1953 grand champion Poe netted \$9,600, according to announcement from Houston.

The report stated further that Poe was not the least disturbed over the fact that the grand champion did not bring as much as last year's steer, or others before him, explaining that he bought the animal for \$125, and has spent about \$275 readying the steer, Tom, for show.

Poe, wearing a broad grin, prodded his prize fat steer around the ring while the on-lookers, with cash bulging in their pockets, were ready to start the bidding when auctioneer Walter Britten began his rapid-fire chant.

He watched his steer take the grand champ banner Thursday night while a rodeo audience of 9,200 saw the judge give the Hereford the nod over the three other bred champs, the Angus, Shorthorn and Brahman.

The grand champion steer, a 940 pounder, is the fifth grand champion of the Houston Show to come from Mills County since 1947, when Jim Bob Steen, now a county agent, showed another Hereford to the top show honors.

As Wayne readied his prize Hereford for the final judging, another grand champion winner from Goldthwaite, Johnny Wigley, helped preen the heavy animal.

Wigley, won the top honors

at the Houston Show in 1953, holding the show's record price for the grand champion, collecting \$18,800.00 from Bill Williams, Houston restaurant owner.

In addition to Mills County youths showing grand champions at the Houston Show they have also taken four reserve grand champion awards during the same period, since 1947.

Poe, who had the champion scramble calf in the Houston show in 1954, went to San Antonio and on to win the grand champion steer award on the same animal. He collected \$4,500 at the Alamo City auction.

In all he reports having won a total of \$19,600 in his feeding and showing of steers which he plans to use for going to school at Abilene Christian College.

The 1956 champion was fed under the supervision of George Reese, county agent for Mills County.

The middle weight Hereford shown by Poe took many honors before going to the grand championship of the show, as follows.

First place middleweight Hereford. Champion Hereford of Junior Show, Champion of Junior Show and Champion of the Hereford Show.

representative attendance at the kick-off dinner when the drive were outlined in "Red Cross Report" was shown.

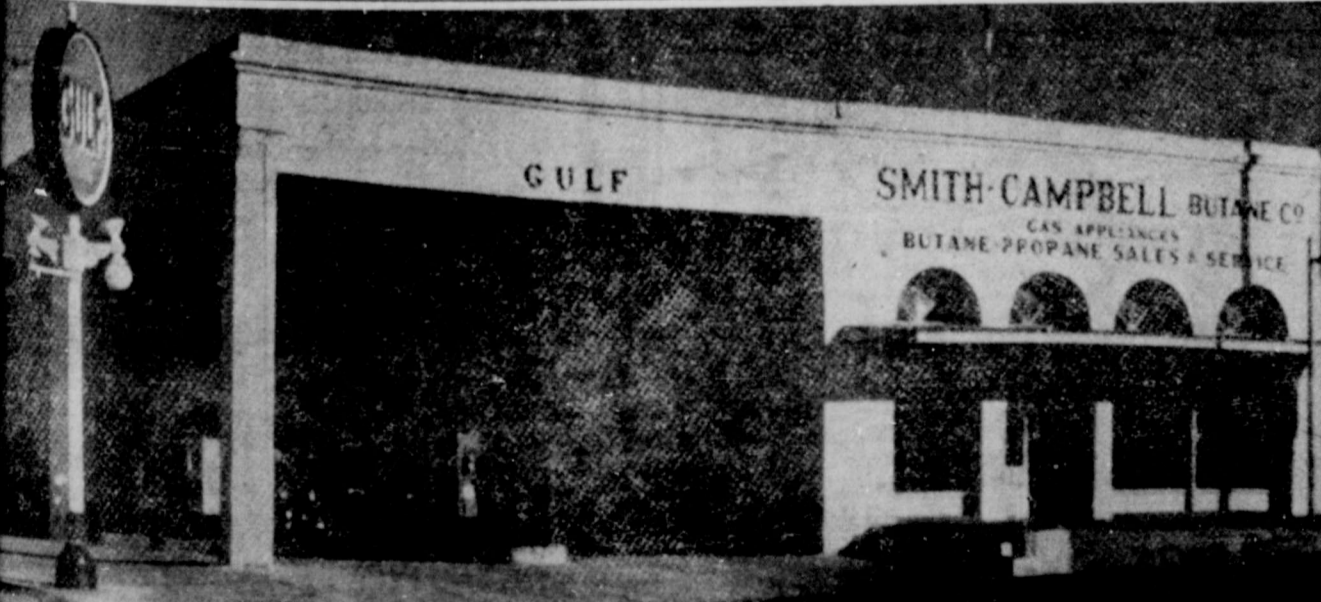

In commenting on the importance of this year's drive Mr. Collier announced that for each \$1.75 that the State of Texas sent to Red Cross Headquarters during the last three years, \$2.25 was returned to Texas from National Headquarters for disaster purposes.

Another important item to be considered is the Blood Program, of which Mills County is a part. During the past year patients of Mills County received over 100 pints of blood from the Red Cross Blood Center. The blood program last year cost Mills County Chapter \$682.00. This coming year it will cost the local chapter \$839.86 to continue to be a member of the center.

Contract for the new building has been let to Truett Auldridge, general contractor. Sub-contract for raising the old building and clearing the lot was let by Auldridge to Hammond Brothers who started demolition

work Monday. The old station was closed March 1.

The new improvement project will cover the entire lot measuring 60x120 feet. When completed the new station will be of the latest type and style in service station structures with the new porcelain finish. Featured in the station will be enclosed washing and lubrication, modern tile rest rooms, large parking area

and a store room and office for the Gulf Consignee. The store room and consignee's office will be in a separate building on the east end of the lot.

Marvin Hodges, Gulf Consignee for Goldthwaite and Mills County stated that no arrangements have been made at this time as to who will be operator of the new station when it is completed and opened for business.

Contract Let For Highway 16 Improvements

A contract for crushing and stockpiling flexible base on State Highway 16 in Mills and San Saba Counties has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Centex Paving Company submitted the low bid of \$24,900 on the project. Crushing and stockpiling base at a site between Goldthwaite and San Saba is expected to take 50 working days, according to Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

B. R. Russell, resident Engineer at Brownwood will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

Dulles' World Tour Regarded Of Highest Political Import | Good Highway Restaurants Mighty Scarce, Says AAA

WASHINGTON—Politically speaking, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' world tour in March is the most important journey the far-roaming statesman has ever made.

Dulles, en route to or returning from the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization meeting in Karachi, Pakistan, will touch virtually all of the world's "danger zones"—including the Middle East, Formosa and Indonesia.

Republicans are hopeful that when he returns, the secretary can report to the nation that prospects for peace are at least as good this year as they were in 1955. Such a report is almost essential to the "peace and prosperity" theme on which the GOP bases its hope of retaining the White House.

An optimistic appraisal from Dulles is also needed, in the view of political strategists, to counter Democratic charges arising from the celebrated "brink of war" diplomacy Dulles outlined in a controversial magazine article.

● **BED AND BOARD**—Less than one out of every 100 restaurants on the nation's highways and at vacation spots are good eating places, according to field reporters of the American Automobile association.

At a recent three-day conference, the reporters who check accommodations for the AAA declared the number of worthy eating spots for travelers is "appallingly small" percentage-wise.

They said that fewer than one per cent of all restaurants available for motorists can be recommended by the AAA. Their principal complaint of the nation's restaurant cooks: "They lack originality. They want to fry everything."

On overnight accommodations, the reporters had better news. They noted that chain operation of good motor courts is increasing, that more mid-town hotels are catering to the tourist than ever before, and new accommodations are emerging rapidly in most parts of the country.

● **CALIFORNIA SHOWDOWN**—Washington politicians say to keep a close watch on California's June 5 presidential primary. The real tip-off, they say, will be provided as to who gets the Democratic nomination for President.

These politicians say that if Adlai Stevenson wins the contest, he is almost a sure bet to get the nomination. However, if Senator Estes Kefauver tops the California voting, he has a good chance of heading the party ticket.

That is the reason why both Stevenson and Kefauver are going all-out in the drive to capture the California vote, which probably is the most important of any pre-November balloting this year.

The only other primary race figuring in the Democratic picture is Florida's May 29 preferential contest, but Florida doesn't carry the delegate strength that California will have at the Chicago convention.

Stevenson and Kefauver also clash in Minnesota's March 20 primary, but Stevenson is such an odds-on favorite that the vote will have little significance in the final determination of a Democratic presidential nominee.

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VIC'S SOLILOQUY

For the benefit of a number of folks who may not have had opportunity to read copy of the Eisenhower 9-point Farm Program I would like to present it here this week, as follows:

(1) A VOLUNTARY 2-POINT SOIL BANK to take 40 to 45 million acres out of production of your problem crops, get rid of the surplus, raise prices.

(2) AN ACREAGE RESERVE which uses the surplus to reduce the surplus.

(3) A CONSERVATION RESERVE to prevent future surpluses and to build back soil for future needs.

(4) LAWS TO PERMIT FASTER SURPLUS DISPOSAL especially in foreign markets. Selling, not storage, is the answer.

(5) STRENGTHEN COMMODITY PROGRAMS on wheat, corn, dairy products, soybeans, cotton, and rice. Ease production controls wherever possible.

(6) PROTECT FAMILY-TYPE FARMS by limiting the size of price support loans made to large corporate-type farms.

(7) EXPAND RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM to help low-income families live better, earn more.

(8) PUSH FORWARD THE GREAT PLAINS PROGRAM to stabilize income in drought-stricken areas, and to prevent another dust bowl.

(9) INCREASE FARM RESEARCH APPROPRIATION to find new uses and new markets for farm crops, lower production costs and increase farm profits.

(10) ASSURE ADEQUATE CREDIT TO FARMERS to meet capital needs of present farmers, help young farmers get started, tide farmers over emergencies.

(11) REFUND GASOLINE TAX TO FARMERS on motor fuel used in farming operations.

On January 1, 1953 when Texas Attorney General took office he made the following remark in his Inaugural Address: "It is up to those who hold Public Office to conduct their official and personal affairs in a manner that inspires confidence. Public office is a glass house. I have entered it voluntarily and will live in it with the curtains open."

TWO CLERKS NEEDED
The Winsted, Conn., Evening Citizen, recently ran a little advertisement of its own, directed at its advertisers. It said: "A store that doesn't advertise still needs two clerks—one to carry out the other who faints when a customer comes in. Advertising is the life blood of business."

That goes for the sellers of goods and services—and for concerns that want to build up confidence and public interest, which are touchstones of commercial success. Advertising isn't an expense in the ordinary sense—by building business, it helps to lower cost to producer and consumer both. And the newspaper, large or small, remains the most effective advertising medium.

Revenue folks rarely take the trouble to raise an eyebrow over taxpayers' letters at this time of the year. Quite a few of the letters express a very personal dislike for paying taxes. Few taxpayers consider their tax payments a blessing. The Dis-

tributive Director of Internal Revenue received a very unusual letter containing a contribution to the government. Contributions in the form of conscience payments are not especially unusual, but the Revenue folks felt this one was. The dates, names and places have been left out to comply with the taxpayer's wishes. The letter said:

"I am enclosing a check for \$25 as my sincere contribution and an expression of my deep gratitude before God to this big, great, free and blessed country. Please accept it and use it like you want. I know that I am free of income tax, because my incomes are small and I am allowed so many de-

ductions. I have been living for several years as an income Priest and I know the spot liberty, being in jail for two years and in two concentration camps under the Nazi liberation from a German concentration camp by American troops. I know what suffering my countrymen and the people of all nations behind the curtain are undergoing. I appreciate the opportunity of being here and I feel the need to express in fact my gratitude and appreciation. My small contribution springs from gratitude is an expression of my appreciation of the here and to work without the fear of being arrested at any like my countrymen in my tive land.

"My widow's mite to the treasury of the U. S. A. is that I am embarrassed. I not give more in my appreciation to this government, country, and free nation where fugees of all nations, beliefs, and countries can freedom, liberty, honest and good care."

 The Middle Colorado delegation was introduced to the Congressional Committee by Congressman O. C. Fisher of the 21st District who made arrangements for the hearing, Harkey said, Congressman Fisher was a special guest of the directors of the Middle Colorado Soil Conservation District Association.

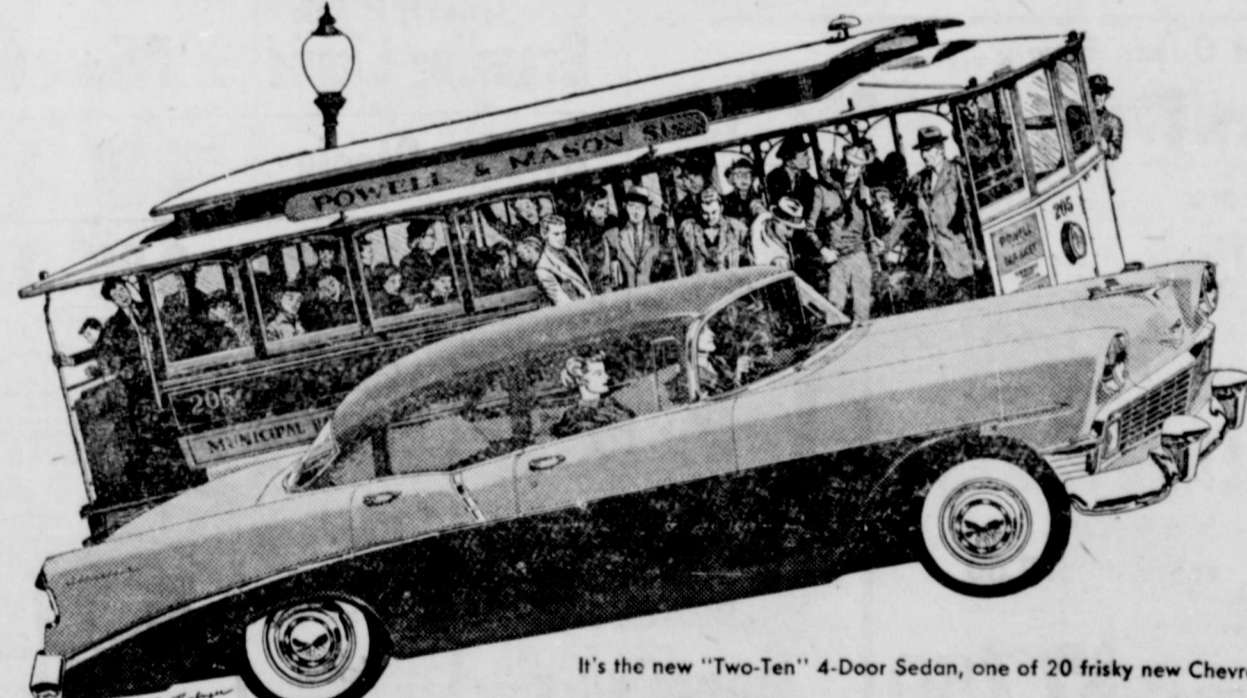

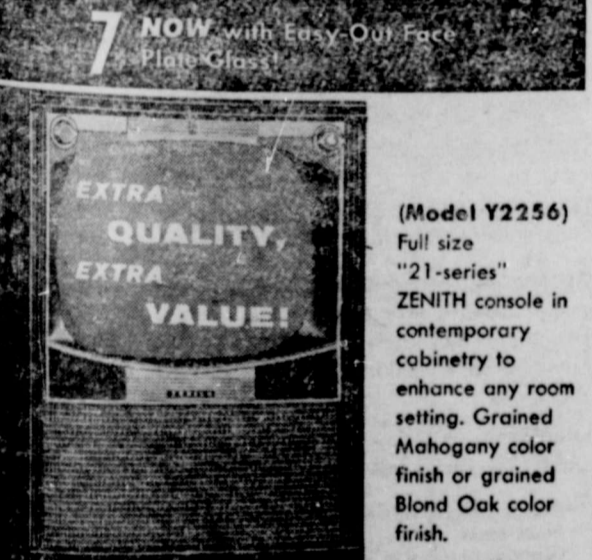

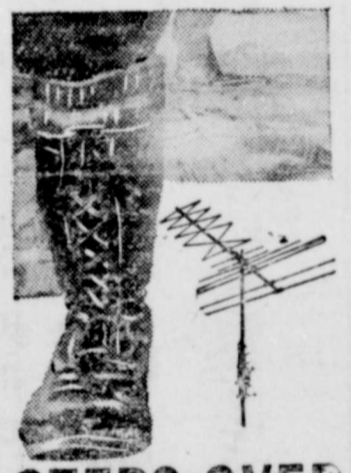

Two Million Auto Owners Are Warned About Vehicle Inspections For 1956

AUSTIN, (Sp)—Two million Texas auto owners were handed a word of warning today by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Safety Director pointed out that that number of the States registered vehicles have not yet secured inspections for 1956.

"Some two million autos in the State," said Garrison, "have not been inspected. That represents about half of the total number of motor vehicles regis-

tered in Texas and there remains but six weeks in the current inspection period during which these cars must be taken to licensed inspection stations for their annual safety check."

The DPS head also cautioned that many of the more than 4,000 inspection stations are likely to experience last minute traffic jams at their doors just prior to the April 15 deadline unless car owners move without delay to secure inspections.

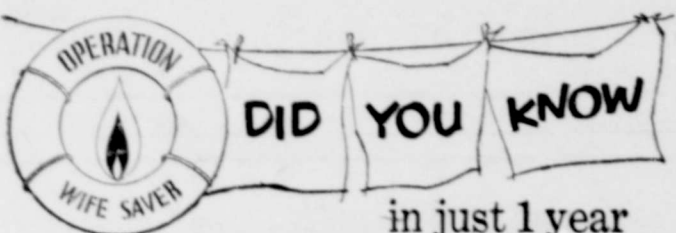

GRASS AS A CROP FOR 1956

Controlled crop production, acreage restrictions and the proposed "soil bank" program will be factors to consider by farmers in Texas this year. Perhaps now is a good time to start planning a crop that is often overlooked by many farmers—grass.

Grass is a good crop or a poor one, depending on the attention given to it. It is a cheap feed—and that's important at any time. Farmers who are short of feed or cannot afford to buy it extensively are often able to lick the problem through pasture improvement.

Dairy cows get their best and cheapest feed from pasture. A good dairy cow on adequate pasture alone will give 25 to 30 pounds of milk a day. Pastures of average quality and production will provide daily the equivalent of 8 pounds of hay, 25 pounds of silage, and 4 pounds of grain.

On the average, beef cattle obtain 75 percent of their feed nutrients from pasture and hay. Steers started on grass and finished by dry-lot feeding will use only half as much corn per 100 lbs. of added weight as those fed in the dry lot altogether.

Grain-fed hogs are healthier and gain faster when allowed to graze. A combination of permanent and temporary pasture

can save up to half of the concentrated protein supplement needed by pigs in a bare lot.

Poultry in good pasture eat about 10 percent less mash and grain than they do in confinement. Ladino clover has been worth \$100 an acre as poultry pasture for egg production. Pasture is especially important in raising healthy, vigorous pullets for flock replacements. Green pasture for turkeys more than eight weeks old may save at least 20 percent of feed required.

The State Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture can furnish information of grasses suitable for the various sections of the state. For details write, John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, Austin, Texas.

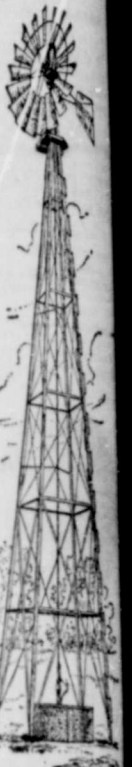

AUSTIN, TEXAS

On March 8, 1956, fifty-nine courageous Texans met in convention at Washington-on-the-Brazos and there imperiled their own lives by signing the Declaration of Independence from Mexico and setting up a provisional government for the Republic of Texas.

At that same convention these men wrote a Constitution for the Republic of Texas which for the first time in history prohibited imprisonment for debt and recognized equal property rights for women by setting up a community property law and protected a man's home from foreclosure by a homestead. These provisions were carried over into the laws of the State of Texas and other states.

The Texas Independence Day Organization, with the cooperation of the Texas Association, seeks to immortalize the Signers of the Declaration of Independence by building a Museum of Texas History in their honor at Washington State Park by public subscription.

WHEREAS, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the fifty Signers of the Declaration of Independence as the Signers of the Declaration of Independence and I do hereby invite all citizens of Texas to contribute to this effort through their local chapters.

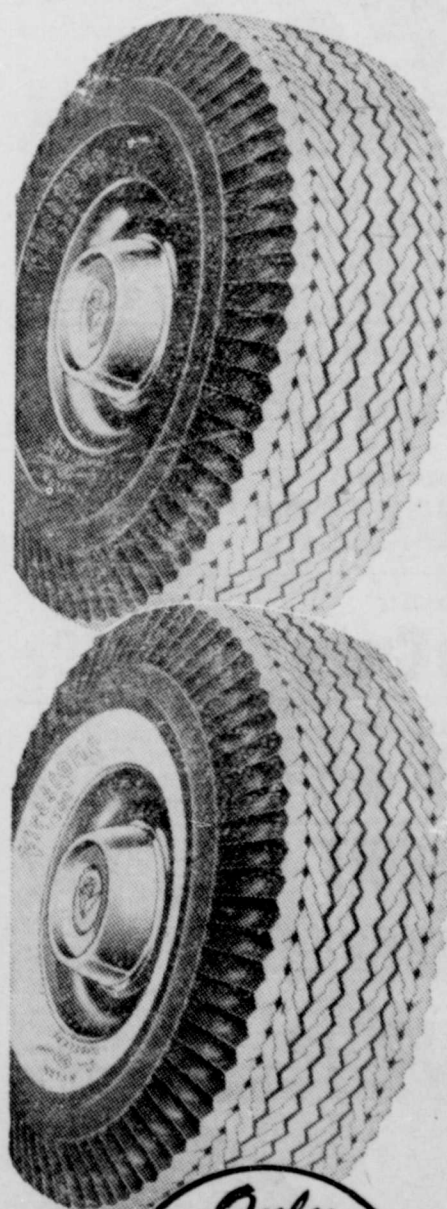

More Covered By Social Security

Professional engineers and architects and funeral directors who had \$400 net earnings from their professions were covered by Social Security as of January, 1955. Mr. James B. Marley, manager of the Austin social security office, pointed out that it is necessary for these professional people to file self-employment social security reports along with their income tax returns for 1955.

Ministers and certain members of religious orders may consider themselves self-employed for purposes of obtaining coverage under Social Security. In order for a person in this group to be covered, he must be a duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed minister of a church or a member performing duties in the exercise of his ministry or a member of a religious order who has not taken a vow of poverty and he must file certificate (Form 2031) with the Director of Internal Revenue requesting social security coverage.

If the minister wishes to receive credit for his 1955 earnings,

the certificate must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by April 15, 1956. Delay in such filing until after April 15, 1957, may mean loss of the minister's right to elect social security coverage.

The voluntary choosing of social security protection by a minister is entirely an individual matter and does not involve the church or institution in any way.

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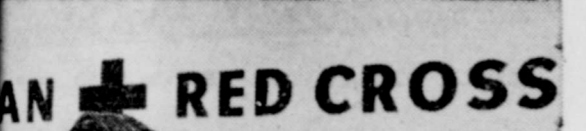
