Contract Let For Goldthwaite Hamilton Road

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm to Market Road 2005 in Mills County was awarded in Austin this week, Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood has announced. The firm of Perry Construction Company submitted the low bid of \$136,503.37 on the project which runs from FM Road 575, 6.0 ml. NE Goldthwaite, NE to Hamilton County line.

Resident Engineer Glenn G. Trotter of Goldthwaite will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 120 days to complete.

Commissioners Approve Issuance Of Warrants For New Priddy Highway

The Mills County Commissioners' Court meeting in special session Tuesday approved issuance of \$50,000.00 in warrants to finance the purchase of right-of-ways and fencing for re-locating highway 16 from Goldthwaite to the Comanche county line, it was announced by County Judge John L. Patterson. The new, re-located, highway will be from the highway 84 and 16 junction north of Goldthwaite to the Comanche County line north of Priddy, approximately 17 miles.

These warrants will bear interest at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent and will be issued dated June 1, 1956. Purchase of right-of-ways and fencing is expected to get underway soon after that date.

Warrants were approved in an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00. However it was pointed out that it may not be necessary to spend the entire amount on the project. Any unused amount will not be issued and warrants will be destroyed.

This action was taken by the commissioners after considerable preliminary work had been done by an appraisal committee which was appointed by the board some time back. Serving on the appraisal committee were Luther Rudd, Jack Elms, P. R.

Three Stores Are Burglarized Tuesday Night

Three local stores were burglarized Tuesday night at an undetermined time it was revealed Wednesday morning. Stores that were entered are Hudson Drug, H. B. Davis Variety and Campbell Gas Company.

Davis Variety was entered after a glass in the back door was broken out and the door bar was released. At Campbell Gas Company the building was entered through the window in the rest room after tearing off the screen. At Hudson Drug the back door had been opened from inside when employees reported to work in the morning and apparently entrance was gained through a rear window.

Merchandise consisting of knives, watches, cigarette lighters, Parker pens, electric shavers, cameras and cigarettes were taken from Hudson Drug, along with \$10.80 in change. Merchandise taken which was easily checked amounted to approximately \$1,000, according to Mr. Hudson.

At Davis Variety the only items they were able to check and find missing was about \$12.80 in change from the registers.

Mr. Campbell said he didn't find anything missing at his store, although it is possible that some tools or minor items are gone.

Eisenhower to Get Bulk
Of Foreign Aid Request?

Congress May OK Up
To \$4.5 Billion, Belief

WASHINGTON—Despite the initial howls from Congress at the size of President Eisenhower's \$4.9 billion foreign aid request, chances are that he will get a big part of what he is asking. Most legislators want to cut down on foreign aid spending, especially in an election year when they think the voters might register their appreciation at the polls.

However, the fact is that the President's new program leaves little room for trimming without some vital assistance being blocked and few legislators actually want to stop foreign aid altogether.

Unless there is some notable improvement in the international situation—and that is highly unlikely—Congress eventually will go along with most of Mr. Eisenhower's request.

The outlook now is that an aid program of at least \$4 billion will be approved, and it possibly might run up to \$4.5 billion. So, don't look for any sharp slash in Ike's proposal.

NEW CABINET OFFICER?—Interior department "insiders" expect U.S. Secretary Clarence Davis to be the next secretary, succeeding Douglas McKay who is quitting about mid-April to run for the Senate seat now held by Oregon Democrat Wayne Morse.

McKay, former governor of Oregon, is known to be highly pleased with the help he's had from Davis, who he brought to the department when he became secretary in January, 1953. Davis, a Nebraskan, is highly popular in the department and has made no political enemies on Capitol Hill.

NEW RUSS LINE—Speculation in diplomatic circles is flourishing about the possible significance of Russia's debunking of the late Josef Stalin.

One theory is that it could mean the beginning of a genuine revolution among the masses—because the current leaders are striving desperately to use Stalin as a scapegoat for all troubles within the Soviet.

Another is that the whole episode is being played up beyond its true worth in the hope of fooling the world into believing there is a basic change in the Communist outlook.

The only agreement in all circles is that something definitely is happening within the Soviet which forces the leaders to make a grandstand play—whether that grandstand audience is intended to be the people of Russia or the people of the Western world.

SKINDIVERS HARK!—The Maritime administration has no desire to discourage skindivers, but it would like them to know there is no sunken treasure to be had for the taking. Every spring the agency is deluged with letters asking for information on ships that have been sunk and can be salvaged.

Maritime's answer is that private ships and cargoes belong to the owners, even if they rest in Davy Jones' locker, and that government vessels lost in wars are pretty hopeless. Of some 1,200 U. S. ships sunk during World War II, locations are known for about 1,000—but only 175 have ever been considered for possible salvage.

Maritime says there just are no known shipwrecks where gold or other fabulous wealth awaits the adventuresome diver. Even the safes of the government ships would have no more than \$150 in cash.

I wish you could have been with me the week of April 16-20 as I participated in the District 8 Rural Neighborhood Progress Contest Judging tour. The other two judges were Mr. E. D. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent of Somerwell County (Glenrose) and Mr. E. W. "Ted" Trew, Agronomist from the A&M Staff of specialists. Miss Annie Lucy Lane and Mr. R. G. Burwell, District Agent were our official guides from one community to the next.

We began by checking record books in Stephenville Monday morning. We went to Eastland County and toured the Nimrod community that afternoon. Tuesday we toured the Williams community in Brown County and Amity in Comanche. Wednesday we toured Stag Creek, Soda Springs and Van Dyke in Comanche County. Thursday we toured the Armstrong community in Bell County and Otto in Falls County. This finished our tour and we gathered in the Extension Agents office in Marlin to formulate our results. After much discussion back and forth we finally picked our winners and assigned each community its ranking. Stag Creek in Comanche

County was 1st; Nimrod in Eastland County 2nd; Soda Springs, 3rd; Van Dyke, 4th; Amity, 5th; Otto, 7th and Williams 8th.

This contest is sponsored by the Farmer Stockmen Magazine in cooperation with the Texas A&M College System. Communities are judged on what they have done in a Year's time to make their community a better place to live. These improvements are grouped under the big heading of, 1) Increasing and Managing Family Income, 2) Improving Health Conditions and Service, 3) Improving the Farm and Home, and 4) Encouraging Social Participation.

My work at home piled up higher and higher each day I was absent, but I feel it was worth burning midnight oil many nights to have been on this tour. I became better acquainted with some of my co-workers, but more important was the inspiration which I gained from seeing what communities could do when they organized and worked together towards a common goal.

A BOOST FOR TEXAS POULTRY PRODUCTS

The Texas Department of Agriculture is laying groundwork for a new and important marketing program aimed at helping the Texas poultry and egg industry.

Plans are for inauguration of a marketing service intent on improving quality of Texas poultry through inspection and grading, boosting the Texas egg industry through a grading and standards program, and thereby expanding market outlets for Texas poultry products.

Since there are at present no state laws which regulate quality or set standards for the sale of poultry or eggs within the state, Texas producers often run into marketing problems both in local and national trade. Lack of standards often causes Texas to be used as a dumping ground for produce from neighboring states which fails to meet proper standards.

For lack of poultry inspection and egg standards laws, Texas cannot compete successfully on the national market with graded and inspected produce from other states.

Trade sentiment is strongly in favor of state laws providing for such poultry and egg inspection programs, and chances are excellent for their eventual passage. However, until such legislation is adopted, the proposed self-help program is needed to help promote Texas poultry products as quality merchandise on the national and home markets.

Such a plan, properly executed, could put thousands more dollars in the pockets of Texas growers. Through information and demonstration programs showing proper grading, handling, shipping, display and storage methods, poultrymen would learn how to market quality produce at a minimum cost.

Research would be made to determine causes and cures for seasonal gluts and shortages of certain products with special emphasis on balancing the over-

all supply-demand situation.

Texas has long been a leading state in poultry production. In fact, the U.S. commercial broiler industry had its first beginning in the heart of the South Texas broiler area. In order to meet growing competition from other areas, highest standards must be maintained to protect Texas' interests in this big and important industry.

Farmers Get Relief From Gasoline And Fuel Taxes Through New Law

Under a new law passed by congress farmers will get some relief from gasoline, diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on the farm for farming purposes. H. R. 8780 was signed by the President on April 12, 1956, and is now Public Law 466. It provides relief to farmers from the Federal taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel, and special motor fuels used on the farm for farming purposes. Pertinent paragraphs from the Internal Revenue Service News Release IR-154, relating particularly to gasoline tax

refunds under the new law, are as follows:

"To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 2240 and are to be filed with the United States District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. The form will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, county agricultural agents, and many banks and post offices.

"Refunds will be limited to the Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business, on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also require a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

"No refunds of tax are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as gasoline used on public roads or highways in transporting family members or workmen, equipment, livestock, crops, feed, etc. Also, no refunds are allowed for tax on gasoline used in processing, packaging, freezing, or canning operations.

"Farmers who expect to file claims should keep sufficient records to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed."

Many Texas Employers Face Penalty On Unemployment Compensation Tax

Several thousand Texas employers apparently let a new tax deadline of April 30 creep up unheeded, the Texas Employment Commission warned today.

After that date the employers of four or more people in twenty weeks during the last half of 1955 face possible penalties if they have not filed wage returns with the TEC and paid unemployment taxes for January, February and March.

Forms are available at any local TEC office, the warning added, or can be secured by writing the Texas Employment Commission at Austin.

Those who had four or more people employed for as many as twenty weeks last year became subject to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Program this year. Previously, only em-

ployers of eight or more had been affected.

In news releases and by direct mail, the TEC has tried to contact the 30,000 employers who are liable for payroll taxes in 1956. The beginning tax rate is three per cent—2.7 per cent going into the state's unemployment compensation fund. The remaining 0.3 per cent is collected by the Federal Government for administrative purposes. A lower rate is possible later on under the state's program, using the employer's experience as a basis for reduction.

A spokesman for the Commission estimates that more than ten thousand employers have not yet reported.

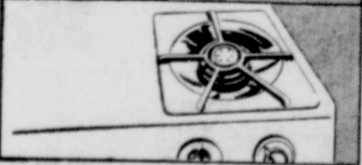

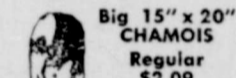

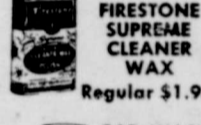

Texas Press Group Claims Code Violates Free Speech

NIO, (Spec.) — De-provisions of the Code "violate the speech and the press in contra-both the State and institutions and the best interests of the State," the South Texas Association proposed deletion in the event objectionable provisions had been invalidated by the appellate court prior to the next legislative session.

The press organization, with nearly 200 members representing daily and weekly newspapers, met in San Antonio on Friday and Saturday, for their 29th Annual convention.

Their action arose from the recent indictment of Vern Sanford, general manager of the Texas Press Association, by a McLennan County Grand Jury

on charges of violating the Election Code by placing two political advertisements totaling \$76 with Waco newspapers.

Pointing out that Sanford was "acting merely as the agent for these newspapers as duly authorized by individual contract with them," the group expressed "wholehearted confidence in the integrity of Vernon T. Sanford, and the Texas Press Association and its officers."

The resolution follows: "Whereas it has come to light that the present Texas Election Code contains certain provisions that violate the right of free speech and freedom of the press in contravention of both the State and Federal Constitutions and contrary to the best interests of the people of Texas; now therefore,

"Be it resolved by the members of the South Texas Press Association that in the event the appellate courts have not ruled out these provisions at that time, the next session of the Texas Legislature be urged to give careful study to removing these restrictions to the rights of free expressions by individuals and by the Press.

"Whereas, the newspapers of Texas have been unjustly attacked through civil and criminal court proceedings instigated by a vengeful, defeated candidate for public office against the Texas Press Association and its manager, Vernon T. Sanford; and whereas said unwarranted proceedings have resulted in indictment of Mr. Sanford by the McLennan County Grand Jury on two counts of alleged violation of the Texas Election Code;

"And, whereas, the acts alleged in said indictments were performed by Mr. Sanford in the normal routine of accepting political advertisements for publication in the newspapers of the state and in so doing Mr. Sanford was acting merely as the agent for these newspapers as duly authorized by individual contracts with them;

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by the members of the South Texas Press Association at San Antonio, Texas, on April 21, 1956, that we hereby express our wholehearted confidence in the integrity of Vernon T. Sanford, and the Texas Press Association, its president, Russell W. Bryant, and its other officers."

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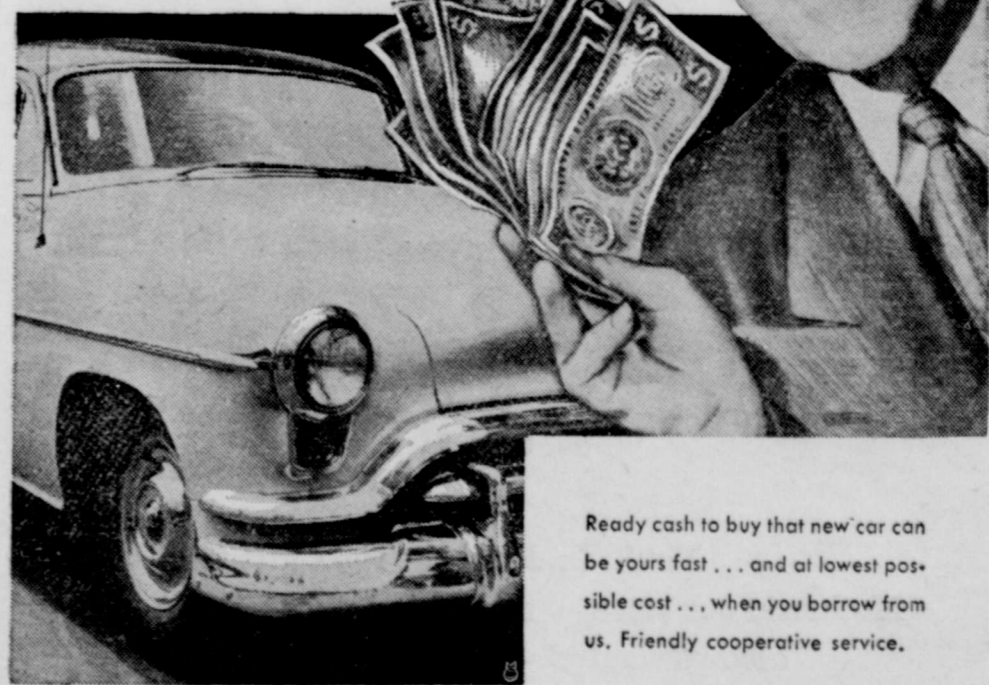

Monday May 7 Filing Deadline For Candidates

This coming Monday, May 7th, is an important date to be remembered from the standpoint of the political calendar for the

1956 election year. It is the last day for candidates to file for election.

Joe Palmer is chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Mills County. Candidates who are seeking nomination in the July 28 primary election must file with the county chairman to have their name on the eligible list of candidates to be

printed on the primary ballot. Interest on the local scene appears a little from present indications with three offices in contest at this time, although more aspirants may file before the deadline next Monday.

Offices having more than one candidate announced thus far are that of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector and Commissioner of precincts one and three. Only a limited number of offices are open this year in the county with the majority being carried over on the four year term.

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State Capitol NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex. — If you have a bit of imagination, you can see a huge "help wanted" sign hanging over the capitol dome.

Some mighty important jobs are to be filled. Salaries range up to \$25,000 a year. And some of the jobs are as yet unclaimed.

Top job of course is that of Governor. It is a two year job paying \$25,000 a year. The incumbent, Allan Shivers, has announced his resignation.

Next highest in the pay bracket is that of Attorney General. There is a vacancy there too. John Ben Shepperd also is resigning Jan. 1. The pay is \$20,000 a year and it is a two-year job.

There are four good jobs at \$17,500 a year. These positions include: Land Commissioner, Comptroller, Treasurer, and Railroad Commissioner. Here the incumbents, J. Earl Rudder, R. S. Calvert, Jesse James and W. O. Murray, have either little or no opposition. Just ask for it and the job is theirs. They are in like Flynn, unless other job applications arrive before the May 7 deadline.

There are several \$15,000 jobs available, such as Agriculture Commissioner, three places on the Supreme Court, and one on the Court of Criminal Appeals. The Agriculture Commissioner's job is another two-year contract, but the court jobs are for six years.

Ag Commissioner John White hasn't said whether or not he wants to be re-hired, but most of the Justices have. Re-applying are R. W. Calvert and Meade Griffin on the Supreme Court, and W. A. Morrison on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Not an applicant for re-hiring is Supreme Court Judge Will Wilson. He has filed for John Ben Shepperd's job, as attorney general. It pays \$5,000 more a year.

Then there are nine places on the Court of Civil Appeals, each paying \$12,000 a year. Most of

these incumbents are seeking a renewal of their contracts.

Jobs of 15 State Senators expire too, along with 150 House Members. These are just part time jobs paying \$25 a day for 120 days, normally only every other year. The Senate jobs last four years, however, to the House's two.

Along with the House and Senate jobs is that of Lt. Governor. His salary is the same as the legislators'. Ben Ramsey who now holds the position says he likes the work and would like to be re-hired.

Because most of these jobs pay well and carry with them honor and recognition, there is a penalty attached. You have to pay to apply, and the application fee is in proportion to the salary. Unfortunately you don't get a refund if you aren't selected for the job. This discourages a lot of applicants.

Those filing for the Governor's job pay an application fee of \$1,250; for Attorney General \$1,000; Land Commissioner, Comptroller, Treasurer, Railroad Commissioner, \$875; Agriculture Commissioner \$750 — and the same for Judges of the Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals. Civil Appeals Court Judges pay a fee of \$600, as does the Lt. Governor.

Applications for House and Senate jobs pay \$1 to \$100 per county, the amount being determined locally.

There are several other jobs of a similar nature opening soon—such as that of Congressman-at-Large. The application fee for this post is \$1,125. Martin Dies has the position now. Incidentally, it is the highest paying job next to the Governor's. Salary is \$22,500 a year with a two-year contract.

Texas has 21 Congressional job openings coming up too. Salaries are the same as Congressman-at-Large, but the application fee is less. It varies with each area. These are two-year jobs.

Another job opening possibility is that of U. S. Senator from Texas. Here there are some "ifs" attached. If Price Daniel resigns—and maybe Lyndon Johnson too. Both are campaigning now for other openings—Daniel for Governor and Johnson for President. U. S. Senators draw \$22,500 a year for six years; filing fee, \$1,125.

Applications for statewide jobs are filed with George W. Sandlin of Austin, chairman of the State

Democratic Executive Committee. If you want to apply for any one of these positions, you'll have to file your application not later than Monday, May 7, and pay your application fee not later than May 10.

State Senators and Representatives and applicants for the U. S. Congressmen file in each county in their respective districts.

These jobs differ radically from labor and industry posts in that the job holder must apply again and again if he wants to keep the job indefinitely. And he must compete with all comers. Of course the application fee is just the beginning of the expense of getting the job. Also there are more bosses than employees, because the public, after all, has not only the first but the final say.

However, the pay is good, and there is a guaranteed annual wage.

Personnel will be selected in July, August and November — with the public making the selection.

POLL TAXES INCREASE — Texas potential voting strength hit an all-time high this year. According to the state comptroller the 1956 total ran 2,410,188. Previous record was 2,338,261 in 1952.

PRECINCT CONVENTIONS — Saturday will tell the story on who controls the Texas delegation to the national Democratic convention. Large turnouts are expected at precinct conventions. Tension is mounting as spokesmen for each faction barnstorm the state. In some cases rival rallies have been held in the same town only hours apart.

Probable key to the outcome lies in the way some 10 or 12 counties go. These are the ones in which major cities are located. They control about 1,000 of the state's 1,898 delegate votes. Harris County (Houston) alone has 270. But rural counties are not being neglected. In a photo finish — not unlikely — they might make the difference.

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
