Call Is Issued For Walk-In Donors At Bloodmobile Visit Here Tomorrow

Some gave because they wanted. Others gave because they thought they should.

A few gave because they were recruited by ones who know from personal experience what it means to need a pint of blood.

But, regardless of their reasons, Mills County is within 90 pints of its Red Cross quota for blood collections to the Central Texas Regional Blood Center in Waco.

The Bloodmobile is scheduled to visit Goldthwaite tomorrow and Mills County citizens are urged to give all-out support to this worthy project, which will benefit many persons in the county throughout the remainder of the year.

Contributions which are made to the regional center are insurance against blood shortages in our hospitals.

Who knows? The gift you have given so freely may come back to you sometime this year, or to your loved ones, at a time when it will be desperately needed.

Mills County has every reason to be proud of its 1955-56 blood donor record, Mr. Norman Duren said today.

Seventeen other Red Cross chapters in the area are striving to meet their individual quotas for the overall goal of 12,000 pints of blood.

Mr. Duren announced that 125 pledges will be required to meet the quota of 90 pints that Mills County is short for this year. Walk in donors are invited and urged to come in Friday when the Bloodmobile will be here from 1:00 to 6:00 o'clock p.m.

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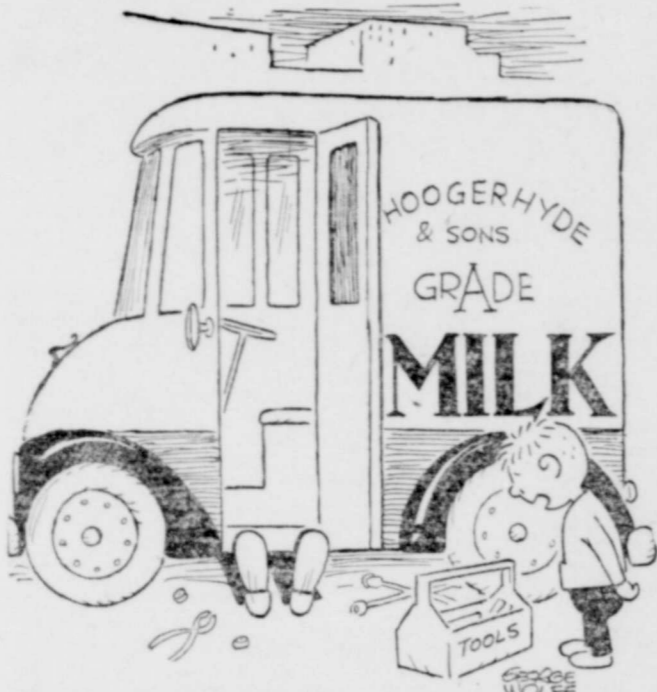

Politics Say Veto Of Farm Bill Hurt Move May Cost GOP Many a Rural Vote

WASHINGTON—Political strategists say President Eisenhower's veto of the farm bill hurt the Republicans more in the vital farm states than they are willing to admit. The main hope for the GOP now rests, these politicians say, in Mr. Eisenhower's promise to take administrative steps to raise price supports on basic commodities. Unless these proposals, along with Ike's soil bank plan, get a favorable reception, chances are that the farm bill veto will cost the Republicans a large number of voters in the farm belt.

Many Republican leaders aren't worried too much at this prospect, however. They feel that Mr. Eisenhower is so popular that he will win easily even if he should lose two or three farm states.

Of course, no one is able, so far, to gauge correctly the extent of the farm revolt—if any—against the administration. Only the ballots in November will reveal the situation.

● WHISTLING IN DIXIE—Democratic leaders are convinced they can halt any southern bolt from the party this year even though the civil rights controversy may flare hotly at the Chicago presidential convention.

Part of their optimism is based on the fact that some of the southerners who led the 1952 revolt no longer are in a position to spearhead a walkout. Two leading South Carolinians, James F. Byrnes and Strom Thurmond, are temporarily on the political sidelines, and Texas' Gov. Allen Shivers may lose in the fight with Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson.

Another item sowing optimism among Democratic bigwigs was a recent speech by Georgia's Gov. Marvin Griffith, who declared, "Georgia's best hope lies within the Democratic party."

However, the southerners are expected to file a strenuous minority report if the Democrats adopt a liberal civil rights platform at the Chicago convention.

● FULL EMPLOYMENT—As an outgrowth of the current business boom, the United States has what amounts to full employment and there are indications that the job rate may increase.

This became evident when the government reported that employment in March totaled 63,100,000 while unemployment was 2,800,000, down slightly from February and 300,000 below March, 1955.

Although some areas chronically suffer from local troubles, others report that jobs, especially in engineering, are going begging. With increased emphasis on automation, economists predict that the trend will continue.

As for the jobless figure, economists view the rate as more or less static because it includes persons habitually unemployed for one reason or another—infirmities, seasonal work, etc.

● BIG CITY TOLL—One of the main reasons why government costs proportionately more in big cities than in small ones is shown in a report by the Census bureau on municipal employment. It's because big cities have more employees in relation to their population and pay them more.

For every 10,000 persons, cities of over one million population have 104 full-time employees who draw \$388 a month salary compared with 51 employees making only \$231 in cities of less than 5,000.

Altogether, 1,435,764 persons worked for city governments in 1955 and their earnings came to slightly more than \$5 billion. About one-third of them were in services which in many other areas are separately performed by counties, school districts or other governmental units. These include education, health, hospitals and public welfare.

For regular city functions, the average number of employees for every 10,000 residents were 19 police, 12 firemen, 11 street workers, 11 sanitation men, nine in the water department, 11 in general control, six for parks and recreation, and seven in other miscellaneous services.

VIC'S . . .

SOLILOQUY



Because of the vital importance of the Red Cross Blood Program and its relation to Mills County and the Bloodmobile visit here this week, we devoted considerable space in this corner last week to questions and answers regarding the program. We are continuing this discussion this week in the hope that many of our readers will find the answers to some questions they have had, and that it will encourage more of the folks to get out Friday and donate a pint of blood. If the program is to be continued and Mills County is to remain a part of it, local citizens will have to rally to the cause.

IS IT SAFE TO GIVE BLOOD? Before anyone can give blood the doctor on duty must approve the donor's physical examination and medical history. Also each donor is under the care and observation of specially trained registered nurses at all times. Medical authorities advise that a person can give every 8 weeks, but no more often than 5 times a year. Therefore, the giving of 1 pint of blood a year is well within the bounds of safety.

DOES IT HURT TO GIVE BLOOD? The vein-puncture hurts no more than a mosquito bite. Who would not be willing to stand such a little pain to save a life?

DOES GIVING BLOOD HAVE ANY AFTER (HARMFUL) EFFECTS? No it doesn't. Some feel better after a donation. Others feel slightly tired for a short while after the donation. Drinking fluids after the donation the blood volume is replaced within 2 or 3 hours.

HOW MUCH BLOOD DOES A PERSON HAVE? The average person has around 13 pints. Providence has supplied each person with an extra pint or a spare pint to share with less fortunate individuals.

WHY MUST PEOPLE DONATE BLOOD? Because people needing blood transfusions can receive only human blood and it can be manufactured only in the bodies of human beings.

WHY MUST PEOPLE DONATE BLOOD REGULARLY AS A PATTERN OF LIVING? Blood is used in transfusions night and day, week in and week out to save lives and hasten recovery and it must be replaced at the center if blood is to be available in local hospitals. Remember that to maintain a blood supply someone must give before another can receive.

Doctors advise that an adequate supply of blood in the refrigerator at the local hospital is a most important factor in saving lives of accident cases or persons in surgery. When the blood pressure drops, blood must be administered within a short while. In instances like this, there is no time to go out and recruit donors.

WHY NO CHARGE FOR THE BLOOD ITSELF? Many feel that blood is a precious part of a person and that no price tag should be attached. People donate blood without charge and also feel that the blood should be without charge to the recipient regardless of financial status, because it is in the realm of lifesaving, not charity. Never-the-less nothing is truly free. Actually it costs your Red Cross \$8.31 to publicize, recruit, collect, process, and distribute a pint of blood. If it were not for the local volunteers working in the blood program, the cost per pint would be much higher. These operating expenses for the region are shared by the National Organization and cooperating chapters on a per capita basis.

HOW MUCH IS OUR COLLECTION QUOTA? 180 pints is our quota from July 1st to June 30th.

HOW ARE BLOOD COLLECTION QUOTAS ASSIGNED? Each Red Cross Chapter participating in the blood program is given a quota based on 3% of the population. Numerous and extensive surveys have been made throughout the country and it has been found that 1,000 people will use 30 pints of blood annually. Applying this usage rate our county, we will use 1 pint of blood every 48 hours and 36 minutes.

WHY ARE FREQUENT VISITS MADE? They are necessary to keep a constant flow of fresh blood to the center to replace the blood that is sent out daily to the various hospitals.

**FREEZE SURPLUS

Freezing keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and food values of most vegetables and fruits better than other methods of food preparation. For best results, select fresh, tender vegetables right from the garden while they are at the right stage of maturity for eating. Other factors that influence quality are preparation, packaging, freezer loading and length of storage.

**FLOWERS IN HOME
BOOST FAMILY MORALE**

Use spring and summer flowers to brighten family meals, and add an extra touch of hospitality to your home every day. Flower arranging is fascinating, simple and is fun. A well planned flower arrangement is a creative project. Basic rule for arranging flowers are given in the bulletin entitled "Flower Arranging is Easy". The bulletin also gives suggestions for making cut-flowers last longer. The bulletin is also available from my office.

Keep your plastic dishes free from food or beverage stains. There is an easy way to remove stains which will not harm the finish. Simply mix chlorine bleach, baking soda and vinegar

into a solution using this ratio: 3/4 cup chlorine bleach, 1/4 cup baking soda and 1 cup vinegar. Prepare enough of the solution so that dishes can be soaked in the solution. Allow them to stand for five minutes in the solution, then wash them as you usually do. Repeat the treatment when necessary.

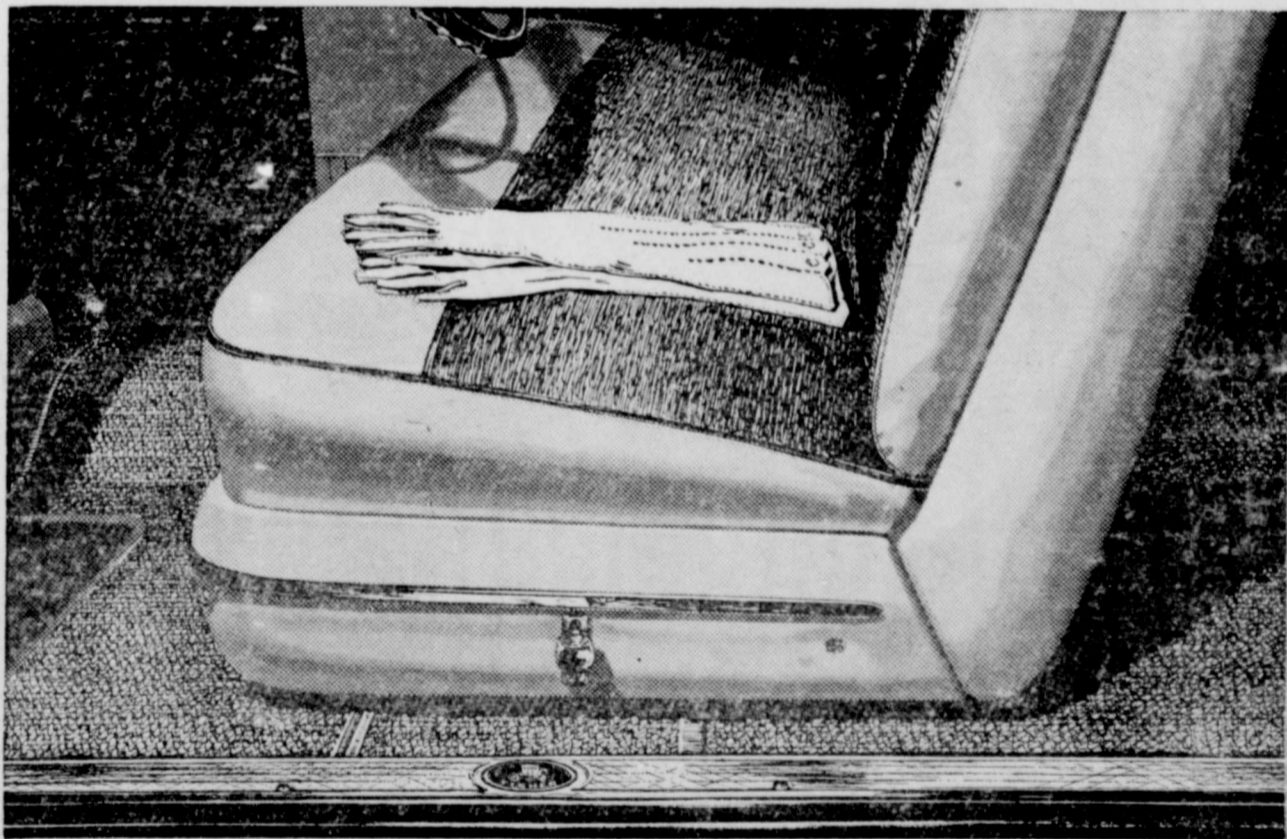

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas is buzzing with activity! Although political squabbles take the headlines, the state's general prosperity affects the average Texan's life more significantly.

In almost all areas—industry, construction, retailing and employment—the graphs are pointing up, up and up. General business activity hit a new record high—4 per cent above 1955 and 6 per cent above the first quarter of last year.

Texas also is out in front in national comparisons. Estimates of gross national production show a 3 per cent rise for the first quarter of '56. Texas' rise was 4 per cent.

Retail sales in Texas were up 3 per cent over the first quarter of 1955. Department stores led with 5 to 10 per cent increases.

Texas' increase in industrial activity is regarded as the most significant factor in the overall picture. Business research experts believe that Texas will receive more than its proportionate share of the \$34,000,000,000 which industry is expected to spend nationwide on new plants this year.

Contractors are confident they are headed for a record year. April construction totaled \$88,000,000—an increase of \$21,000,000 over April of '55.

Employment followed the general upward trend. This, despite drought-crippled farm activity. Latest figures show 2,248,800 wage earners in March. That is 115,000 more than for March of last year.

POLITICS IS BOILING — In bitter precinct battles, Gov. Allan Shivers lost the first skirmish of his long political career. Sen. Lyndon Johnson led all the way in the rural areas. He also

won in San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth and Austin. Of the metropolitan centers, Dallas alone went for Shivers.

Just as the rural vote cost Ralph Yarborough the governorship in 1954, so did the small towns defeat Shivers in 1956. In the final analysis, it was the Country Boy's vote that was the hub of victory.

FARMERS GET NEW HOPE—Farmers over wide areas of Texas are full of optimism. Long-awaited rains, the heaviest in years, fell in North, Central and East Texas.

However, even where it rained, substantial moisture deficiencies have not been wiped out. But to many farmers the wonderful rains that finally came made them look forward to a good year.

SANFORD CLEARED BY COURT—A decision with far-reaching effect on political advertising expenditures has been handed down by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The decision was made in connection with an application of Vernon T. Sanford, Texas Press Association manager, for relief from two indictments returned against him by a McLennan Co. Grand Jury. Indictments charged he had violated the Texas Election Code by spending more than \$25 for political advertising in behalf of Ben Ramsey for Lt. Governor in 1954.

Sanford and the TPA Board of Directors contended that any law which limits an individual to a \$25 expenditure prohibits freedom of expression and therefore is unconstitutional.

In reviewing the matter, the court found that two laws on the same subject were in direct conflict. Each limited advertising to widely different amounts and set different penalties. Therefore both were declared invalid.

Result: Charges against Sanford were dismissed and Texas now has no applicable law regarding political advertising expenditures by an individual.

LABOR LAW AT STAKE — Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd was forced into the role of apprehensive spectator in the fight to save Texas' right-to-work law.

He asked, but was refused, U. S. Supreme Court permission to be heard. He did, however, lend

moral support and advice as Nebraska's attorney general argued in the high court for his state's law.

Nebraska, like Texas and 16 other states, has an anti-closed shop law which unions contend is in conflict with the National Railway Act.

Reason for Shepperd's apprehension is the general belief that Nebraska's case is weaker than the Texas case, which still is tied up in state court.

VEHICLE TAX VOIDED — Special local automobile taxes to finance big city freeway projects are unconstitutional. So ruled the Texas Supreme Court in a case involving Harris County's auto registration tax.

Such taxes must be levied by general laws, said the court. Dallas County made two tries for such a tax, but voters turned down the proposals.

HUGE ROAD PROGRAM PLANNED — A whopping \$150,000,000 road program for 1957-58 is planned by the State Highway Commission.

Anticipation of substantially increased federal funds is behind the ambitious project. Since House passage, approval of the new federal aid bill is regarded as virtually certain.

About half of the 2,161 miles of highway designated for construction work will be of the "super highway" type — four, six and eight lanes.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said plans were released early so projects could be placed under contract quickly after final congressional action on the aid bill.

HIGHWAY PATROLMEN SOUGHT—Careers as state highway patrolmen now are open for men between 21 and 35 years of age.

A 200-man increase in the patrol was authorized by the last legislature. State-wide examinations of candidates to bring the corps up to full strength will be held in June.

Applicants must have lived in Texas for a year, have a high school education or equivalent and be in perfect physical condition.

Application forms may be obtained at any district office or by writing W. J. Elliott, chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, Austin.

SHEFFIELD TRIAL MOVED—Brady Land Dealer B. R. Sheffield won the first round in his fight against the veterans land sale charges against him. Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts agreed that Sheffield could not get a fair trial in Travis County and granted a change of venue.

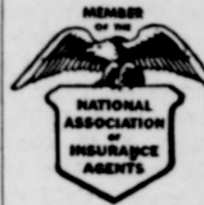

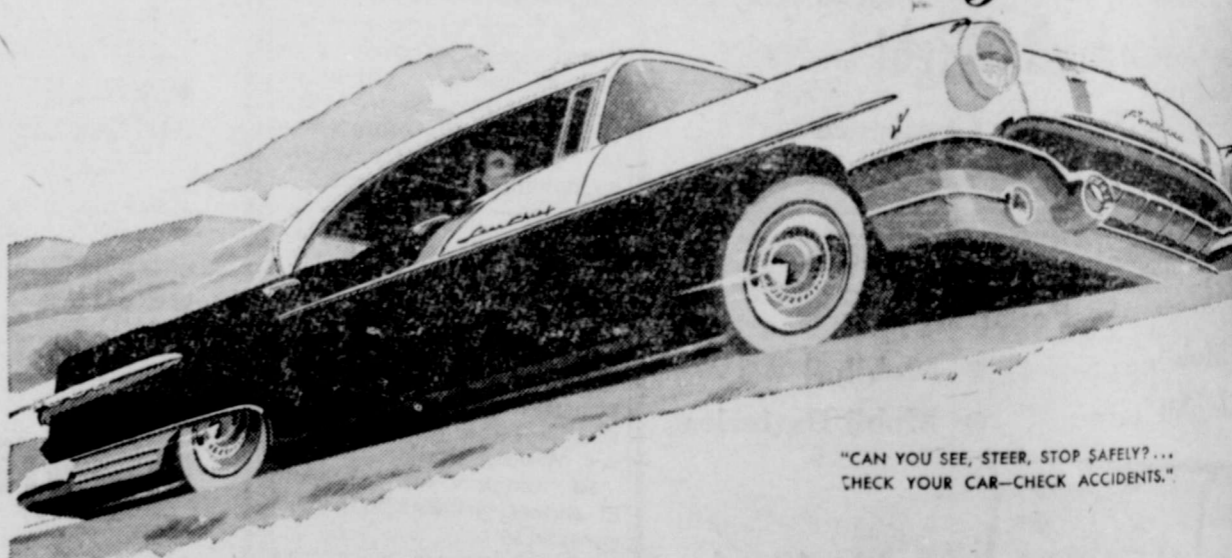
