## Col. M. Y. Stokes Jr. Announces Candidacy For State Representative

Col. M. Y. Stokes Jr., of this city, this week authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for State Representative, from this district.

In announcing his candidacy for Representative in the Texas Legislature for the 73rd Legislative District, M. Y. Stokes, Jr. of Goldthwaite has issued the following statement:

"Voters in this district of Brown, Comanche and Mills counties, like other patriotic Texans, have been shocked and disgusted by the political scandals in the state government. Veterans and the State of Texas have been swindled in the land scandals. Some 120 Texas insurance companies are being closed after being allowed to operate virtually unregulated for years. Members of the Texas Legislature itself have admitted that they accepted fees as high as \$10,000 from the most notorious of these insurance companies.

"Texans are disgusted because so few of their elected representatives have done anything to prevent these scandals or, to correct them until after the harm had been done.

"Texans know that highly paid lobbyists are working full time in an effort to gain control of the state government for the benefit of their multi-millionaire employers. The little farmer, little stockman, little businessman and the salaried man and woman, although they pay most of the taxes in this district, are the forgotten and neglected men in Austin.

"Texans know that a legislator who stays in office too long finds it harder and harder to hold out against these big pressure groups and their friends and supporters in the Legislature.

"Texans, in short, feel that a change in the Legislature is overdue.

"When you elect me to the Legislature, I will not be a loud-mouthed hell raiser, but I will have been for a checkup.

U. S. Bombs Russia With Irresistible Jazz American Style Music Popular in Red World

WASHINGTON—The United States is bombarding Russia with jazz and the Soviets love it. So much so that since the death of Stalin the Russians have made no attempt to jam the radio program as they have so many others.

In fact, reports the *Voice of America*, the desanctification of the dead dictator has brought with it a complete reversal in the Russian attitude toward American jazz. Stalin viewed the peculiarly American music as an offspring of Wall street rather than Basin street. Now jazz bands play in Moscow and Warsaw cabarets and in Prague.

In charge of the *Voice* jazz program is Willis Conover, Washington disc jockey and a recognized authority on jazz. Conover is well on the way to becoming one of the best-known Americans to Moscow and the rest of the Communist world.

Conover's program is not limited to Red countries. It is being heard now by thousands all over the world, wherever jazz enthusiasts gather, and Conover undoubtedly has the greatest audience of any disc jockey in history. A thousand fan letters a month pour in from every conceivable portion of the globe attesting to the popularity of the program.

Typical of them is the letter received from a listener in Stuttgart, Germany, who wrote: "Since months I dig nearly every night your jazz programs, which I think is the best I ever heard."

FROM COPENHAGEN, a father wrote that his son, Preben, 9, had accidentally tuned in the *Voice* show and asked what it was. His father replied, "Preben, this is Armstrong playing. You know, the black man with the silver trumpet. This is America."

From New Delhi came a request for a picture of Duke Ellington and a British merchant seaman wrote from Auckland with a request for "more Count Basie." From far away Formosa a fan sent a plea for "more of the greats like Armstrong, Kid Ory, Sidney Becket."

The *Voice* show is a two-hour program which is beamed everywhere seven days a week. One hour is limited to standard popular music, such as records of *Star Dust*, by Artie Shaw, and *I've Got My Love to Keep Me Warm* by Les Brown's band.

The second hour is devoted to pure jazz which ranges from Dixieland swing to contemporary pieces. Louis Armstrong's *Struttin' With Some Barbecue* has proven a popular selection with foreign listeners.

John Wiggins, deputy program manager, said many fans write in and express their appreciation. "I like jazz," they write. "Jazz is American. Therefore I like America."

INDICATIVE OF THE POPULARITY of jazz abroad was the experience in Karachi, Pakistan, recently by the Dizzy Gillespie band which has been touring Europe and Asia under State department auspices. Tickets for the Karachi show were sold out in two hours and the band had to give a repeat performance to another full house.

Conover regards the program as perhaps the best way of bringing America into the homes of millions of peoples abroad. He feels that jazz hurtles all foreign boundaries.

Conover from time to time delivers short lectures on the program on the development of jazz and often interviews such stellar exponents of the music as Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong and Stan Getz.

The *Voice* program is entitled simply, *Music—USA*. It carries no politics or other message from this country, but for those who think it may be a waste of time, *Voice* officials cite a letter from a Milan, Italy, fan. He wrote, "Best propaganda I ever tasted."

Little League is a program of contagious enthusiasm. It is based upon an appreciation and understanding of the needs of youth. It is carried on locally by adult volunteers who deserve high commendation and recognition for their selfless efforts.

In Little League each boy learns some of the lessons of fair play, of discipline, of team work. He finds that the other boys, regardless of race, creed or color, strive for the same common goals, and this kind of thinking spreads from the boys to their families and thus to the communities.

Little League must not be used for personal profit or advancement. Any attempt of a sponsor or anyone else to capitalize on Little League by exploitation or using it as a drawing card for some other profitable attraction, should be rejected immediately. This does not mean that a sponsor may not have his name on the uniforms. However, his sponsorship motives should be limited to better public accept-

ance of the fact that he is a citizen because he backed Little League.

National Headquarters maintains and enforces disciplines that must be observed in a program engaging the interests of upward to 4 million boys in their formative years. Leaders in the field accept the challenge. They support Little League Headquarters in compliance with the level of responsibility in the administration of such program.

From the ranks of these hundreds of thousands of boys stand now on the morning of all the hill undoubtedly will be all of the great ball players of the future. For Little League the basic platform under all baseball. However this is not of the main goal. Properly operated on the local level, Little League Baseball will speak itself as a great democratic movement which builds character in American boys.

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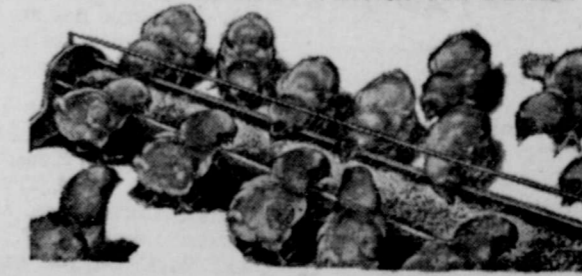

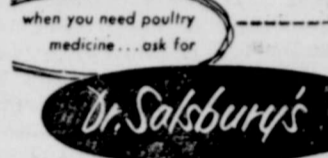

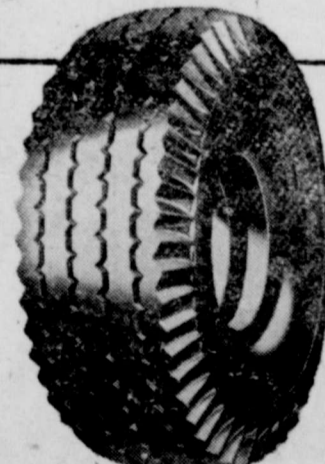

**THE MEDITERRANEAN FRUIT FLY** has been found in Texas citrus industry had been feared when it was learned the citrus pest, the Mediterranean Fruit Fly, had left its Texas home and arrived in Florida.

It is believed still to be free of infestation. And, what's more important, the Mediterranean Fruit Fly hasn't found its way westward to Texas citrus regions. Protective measures are already underway to prevent the citrus pest from getting a foothold in America. Some 2,500 fruit fly traps have been shipped from Texas to Florida in the past few weeks. In addition eight insect specialists from the Rio Grande Valley will aid entomologists in stamping out Florida infestation.

A federal quarantine of the Mediterranean Fruit Fly became effective May 1, and all Florida citrus coming to Texas will be carefully checked to safeguard Valley growers.

This new-found citrus foe is probably the most serious insect ever to threaten our citrus industry. Its consequences are much more harmful even than those of the black fly now being combatted in the Rio Grande Valley.

No official quarantine action has been taken to date by the Texas Department of Agriculture. However, should some difficulty arise in the federal eradication program, it is likely that some restriction on interstate movement might be established. Persons interested in further information concerning the Mediterranean Fruit Fly may write to the Division of Plant Quarantine in care of Commissioner John White, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin 14, Texas.

## Forms Available After June 1st. For Gasoline Tax Refund To Farmers

Farmers will soon be able to obtain a refund of the Federal excise tax on gasoline which is used on a farm for farming purposes under a new law. Present Federal tax rate is 2 cents a gallon.

Sam Hamlett announced today that under the new law first refund payments will be made after June 30 on gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956. Thereafter, refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 2240 and are to be filed with the United States District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. Forms will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, county agricultural agents, and at some banks and post offices.

Refunds will be limited to the Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business, on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

Mr. Hamlett explains that gasoline shall be considered used for farming purposes if it is used:

- (1) By the farmer or any other person in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity, including the raising of livestock, poultry, etc., on the farmer's own farm.
- (2) By the farmer in the operation, management, conservation, improvement, or maintenance of his farm or its tools or equipment.
- (3) By the farmer in handling, drying, packing, grading, or storing any agricultural or horticultural commodity in its unmanufactured state, but only if the farmer produced more than one-half of the commodity which he so treated during the period for which the claim is filed.
- (4) By the farmer in connection with the planting, cultivating, caring for, or cutting of trees, or the preparation (other than sawing into lumber, chipping, or other milling) of trees for market, but only if the planting, etc., is incidental to his farming operations.

No refunds of tax are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as gasoline used on public roads or highways in transporting family members or workmen, equipment, livestock, crops, feed, etc. Also, no refunds are allowed for tax on gasoline used in processing, packing, freezing, or canning operations.

Farmers are also given special relief from the Federal excise tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on a farm for farming purposes. "Farmers who expect to file claims should keep sufficient records to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed," Mr. Hamlett cautioned.

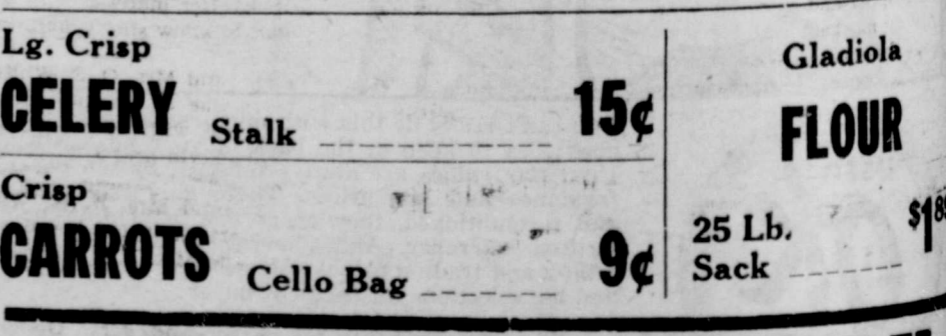

### Fancy Dishes Made With Chopped Beef

By ALICE DENHOFF  
A FOUND of ground beef in the refrigerator means the makings of many kinds of dishes. Ground beef can be made into a simple dish or dressed up as the main course for that next dinner party. Inexpensive, but disguising its simple origin, is Ground Beef-steak Supreme.  
To serve 4, combine 1 lb. ground beef, ¼ c. fine bread crumbs, 1 beaten egg, tsp. salt, ½ tsp. pepper, 3 tbsp. minced onion and ¼ c. chopped celery. Shape into an oblong patty about 1 in. thick. Brown in skillet in hot fat. Using two spatulas, carefully turn and brown the other side.  
Dilute 1 can mushroom soup with ½ can water, blending until smooth. Pour over meat and cook on top of range over low heat 25 min.  
When doubling recipe, shape the meat mixture into 2 steaks. Brown them separately in the heating thoroughly.

skillet, then transfer to long baking dish. Pour sauce over meat and bake at 325° F. 25 min.  
**Oriental Dish**  
From the Far East comes a wonderful ground beef recipe which, while it does take a bit of doing, is so rewarding.  
To serve 6, mix 1 lb. ground beef, 1 egg, salt and pepper to taste and 1½ tsp. finely chopped onion. Mix into balls, roll in flour and fry until light brown.  
After meat is browned, add ½ c. chicken stock or canned chicken soup, tsp. oil, 4 slices pineapple, cubed, and 3 green peppers, cut into large pieces. Simmer over low flame.  
Make a sauce of 3 tbsp. corn-starch, 2 tsp. soy sauce, ½ c. each vinegar and sugar and ¾ c. chicken stock or soup. Stir thoroughly and add to the meat balls. Brown them separately in the heating thoroughly.

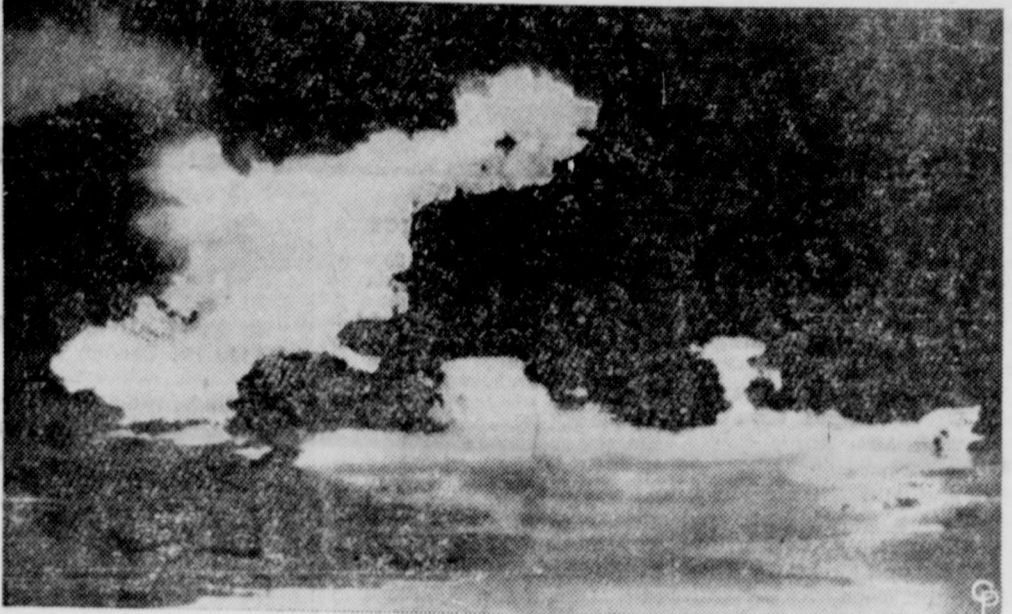

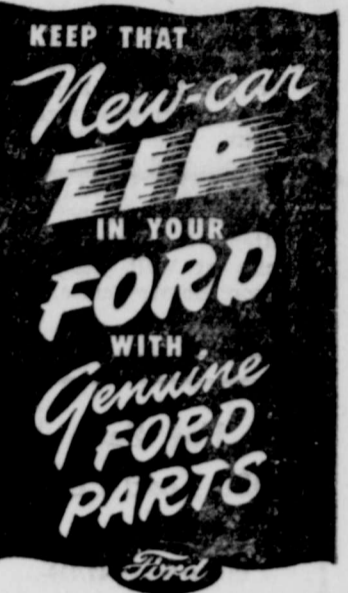
**W. W. Head, Pioneer Resident, Is Buried Here Last Friday**

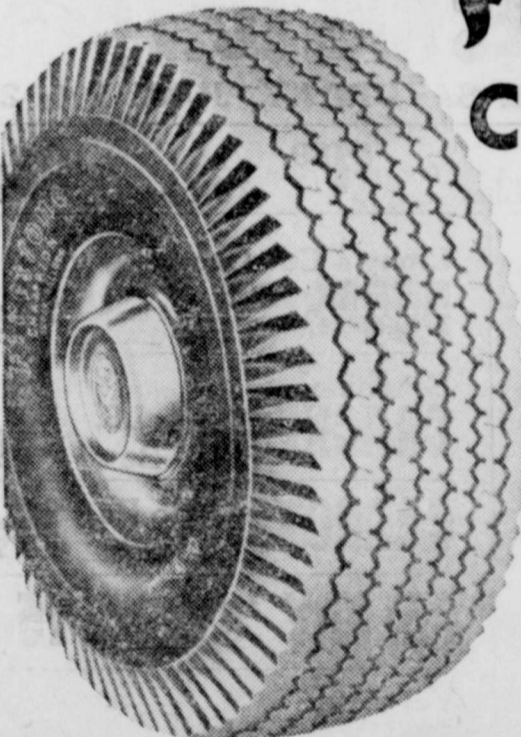

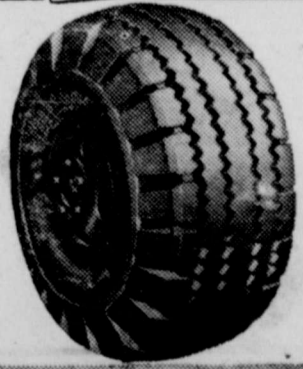

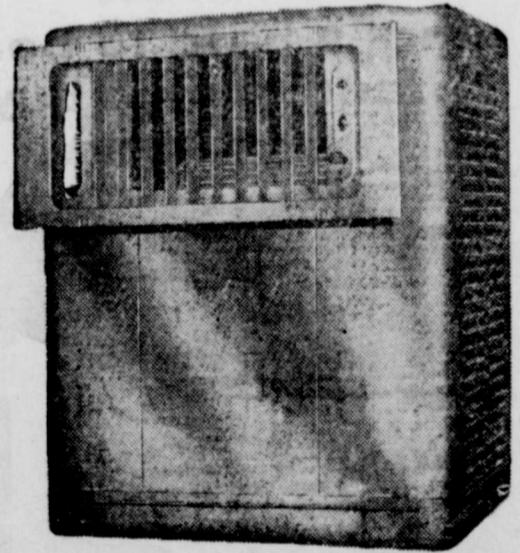

## Farm Housing Loan Program Is Reactivated With New Appropriation

Walter T. McKay, State Director of Farmer Home Administration announced today that eligible farmers in Texas may obtain farm housing loans from the Agency. Funds for the loan were recently made available by a supplemental appropriation.

Applications for these loans may be made immediately at any of the 135 county offices of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas, Mr. McKay said. Regulations for processing the loans have been distributed to all field offices.

Farm Housing loans may be made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest on the loans will be 4 percent per year on the unpaid principal. Repayment may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years. The loans will be secured by a mortgage on the borrower's farm.

Building plans and specifications for the improvements to

be financed with the farm housing loan will be obtained by the applicant. Farmers Home Administration will review the plans and inspect construction as it progresses to assist the borrower in obtaining construction that meets generally accepted standards of soundness.

The local county FHA committee determines the eligibility of applicants for farm housing loans. To be eligible, Mr. McKay explained, an applicant must be the owner of a farm, be unable to obtain suitable credit for dwellings and other buildings from other lenders, and have enough farm income or income from the farm and other sources to meet family living and farm operating expenses and repay his debts.

The farm housing loans are made under the authority of Title V of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended. In Texas 1-165 farm housing loans have been made for a total of \$6-

726,135; \$1,996,299 of this amount has been repaid. In addition, interest collected through December 31, 1955 totaled \$864,030.

The supplemental appropriation Act which was signed by President Eisenhower May 19 made \$5,000,000 available for

farm housing loans. At present no additional funds are authorized after June 30, 1956. Mr. McKay stated that the Farmers Home Administration also extends credit for farm housing under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, as amended.

not keep my mouth shut when you and your children are about to be robbed. I may not defeat them, but I can sound the alarm.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson grabbed the political spotlight with the announcement that he was resigning on June 1.

He will devote his full time to an aggressive campaign for the office of Attorney General.

Said Wilson: "Texas' greatest need today is vigorous enforcement of Texas laws. I believe I can serve Texas best in filling that need."

Wilson, who gained fame as Dallas' racket-busting district attorney, has served six years on the Supreme Court. He was elected in 1950 by a heavy majority, and is one of the youngest men ever to serve on the high bench.

It was felt by most seasoned observers that Wilson would have been re-elected without opposition had he desired to continue as a member of the State's highest tribunal.

Wilson served as Assistant Attorney General of Texas under Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers in 1941-42.

IKES VISIT — Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower's visit to his native state, planned long ago, by chance came three days after the Democratic State Convention. There, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson was endorsed as favorite son candidate for President.

Thus, Texas has two native sons in the race for Chief Executive of the United States.

Gov. Allan Shivers, who has said he will support the presidential nominee whom he considers best for the nation, regardless of party, didn't attend the Dallas convention at which Johnson was the main figure.

As Texas Chief Executive he did, however, welcome President Eisenhower at Waco, where Ike received an honorary degree from Baylor University.

Eisenhower leaders, including National Committeeman Jack Porter, and other Texas Republican notables, conferred with the President briefly in Waco. Also present was Mrs. Oreta Culp Hobby, late of the President's cabinet and now co-chairman of the national Citizens for Eisenhower organization. Governor Shivers did not take part in the conference.

JOHNSON'S GOALS — Senator Johnson gained his personal goals at the Democratic convention. But his control of the convention was shaky all the way through.

Near the end, his personal requests were turned down. His reported choice for Democratic National Committeewoman, Mrs. Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. of McAllen, was sidetracked for Mrs. R. D. Randolph of Houston. She replaces Mrs. Hilda Weinert of Seguin. Also replaced was National Committeeman Ben Ramsey. Elected in his stead was Byron Skelton of Temple.

A new state executive committee is not to be named until the usual time—the September convention. Meanwhile, the May convention is not adjourned.

merely recessed. This is interpreted as a "foot in the door" to keep watch over the present committee during the summer.

Defeated conservatives say that Shivers conservatives and Johnson conservatives soon will be back in the same camp. They think it can happen in time to shift party control again in the September convention.

NEW TAX SUGGESTED — When the 55th Legislature convenes next January, the biggest bugaboo will be a familiar one—need for more money.

Budget estimates indicate at least \$25 million more a year will be needed for 1957-59 appropriations.

Campaign platforms of legislative candidates show that many think existing tax sources are paying as much as they can. Many suggest that new revenue sources should be found to equalize the load. Few are very specific.

A concrete suggestion came last week from a University of Texas economics professor writing for "Comment," the Bureau of Public Affairs monthly. A "business activities" tax was proposed by Carey C. Thompson.

Such a tax, said Thompson, would be based on value added to a product by manufacture and hence would hit "only newly-created wealth hitherto untaxed."

Michigan, he said, collects about \$30 million a year by this means.

Alternate proposals, such as income or sales taxes, widely used in other states, have always met strong opposition in Texas.

"RIGHT-TO-WORK" LAW HIT — Labor leaders are elated, state officials glum over the crippling of Texas' "right-to-work" law.

U.S. Supreme Court last week ruled such state laws cannot apply in the railroad industry. They are superseded by the National Railway Labor Act which authorizes closed shop contracts.

Said Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd: It means "railroad workers must join unions or go hungry. A man who is refused the right to work unless he supports certain organizations cannot exercise any of the other rights guaranteed by the constitution."

Jerry Holleman, executive secretary of Texas AFL, called the decision "a great step forward. Texas Federation believes Congress should extend this same protection to the rest of the workers in the country."

OLD DEBTS COLLECTED — A state auditor's survey of the General Land Office resulted in payment of some long overdue debts to the school land fund.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness released a report covering the three-year period just prior to Bascom Giles' resignation. It had turned up 24 mineral leases on which annual rental payments were in arrears. These were called to the attention of Land Office personnel, and collections of \$9,373, plus \$402 interest, were made.

Cavness noted that J. Earl Rudder, appointed to succeed Giles as land commissioner, has sought to improve lease handling insofar as funds permit.

Restrictive legislative appropriations cause the office to be understaffed, the auditor commented.

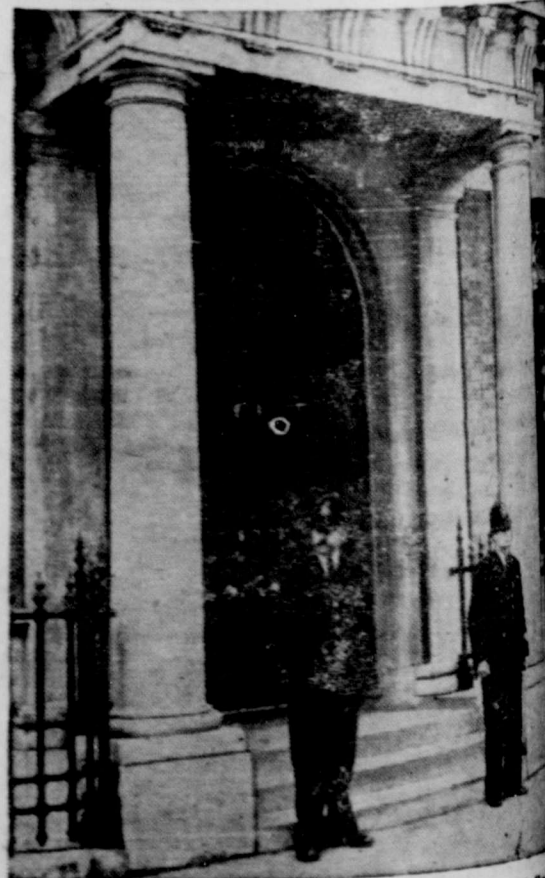
