## Markets

Mills County Commission continues to have sales on Mondays and Fridays with a good number of sheep and goats at both sales. A total of 6,575 head of sheep were sold on Monday and a total of 5,885 head of goats passed through the auction ring.

Market was weaker in classes of sheep and goats last two sale days. In the sheep division all classes showed a decline in price or remained the same, while in the goat division all classes with the exception of good mutton goats showed a slight decrease in price.

## Tax Statements Are Mailed Out

Statements for 1956 taxes were mailed out by Mills County tax assessor-collector C. F. Stubblefield and Goldthwaite Independent School District tax assessor C. A. Womack over the past weekend to reach tax payers on October 1, when payment of taxes got underway.

Mr. Stubblefield announced that his office sent out about 2,500 statements for county and state taxes. The school office mailed out approximately 1,200 statements.

County and state taxes carry a 3% discount if paid during the month of October, 2% if paid in November and 1% discount if paid in December. Beginning on January 1, the full amount is due. Discounts do not apply to poll taxes which are not included in the statements mailed out.

There is no discount on school taxes. The full amount is due and payable from October 1 through January 31. On February 1 penalty goes into effect on unpaid taxes.

The school tax office has been moved from the second floor of the courthouse to the basement office where it was formerly located, Mr. Womack announced.

City treasurer W. C. Barnett announced that city taxes are also due and payable as of October 1. No statements have been mailed out by the city but tax rolls are complete and property owners are urged to pay their taxes early.

## Quail Project Is Started Friday On T. C. Graves Ranch At Caradan

A Quail Project was started last Friday on the T. C. Graves ranch in the Caradan community when Junior L. Briggs, local game warden, released 45 Texas pen raised Bob White quail. The number released constituted three coveys, and came from the State Quail Hatchery at Tyler.

Mr. Briggs announced that all of the quail released are banded and numbered for future study of quail population by officials of the Texas Game and Fish Department. Numbers on the quail released are 9796 through 9840.

Before the Graves Ranch was approved for a quail project a survey was made by the game warden with respect to food, water and cover on the property. A general map of the entire ranch was made and also a project map: Of the 2,000 acres

in the ranch 220 acres were set aside for the project, before the area was recommended.

While game officials found the natural setting of this ranch ideal, because of grasses, trees and water supply, they did recommend a special fenced area for weed seeding to provide adequate feeding area for the winter season. This additional improvement was made before the project was approved.

While regular state game laws will apply to the area in which the project is located State Game officials are recommending that Dr. Garves talk to his neighbors and other persons who may hunt in the territory to help control the program.

When quail bearing bands are bagged or found dead they are to be reported to Game officials for study of the quail population.

## Inside WASHINGTON

### MARCH OF EVENTS

No Death of Ideas  
For Postage Stamps

2,000 Pour in  
For Next Year

Special to Central Press Association

WASHINGTON—Whether or not you'll need a four-cent stamp instead of a three-cent, to mail a letter next year, the Post Office department is busy these days wrestling with the problem of what new stamps to put out during 1957.

It's no easy problem, either, for the department has received 2,000 suggestions for new issues!

These suggestions range from a stamp honoring the nation's savings and loan association to another marking the anniversary of Cotton Week. However, a handful of the special issues being urged the department probably will be chosen for production. At least some of these selections will be announced before the end of 1956.

All year long, requests pour into the department for special, new stamps. They come from state and local officials desiring to publicize a particular event or product, from chambers of commerce, from state legislatures eager to make their areas better known, or from members of Congress who want to "do right" by their constituents.

During the last session of Congress, more than 50 bills were submitted for new stamps—a different one every week! Copies of these bills went sent to Postmaster General Arthur B. Summerfield, whose job it is to approve any he considers worthy.

Unofficially, five new stamps seem to have been given the nod for next year. They would commemorate:

In January, the 200th birthday anniversary of Alexander Hamilton; in May, the 350th anniversary of the settling of Jamestown, Va.; in August, the 50th anniversary of the founding of the United States Air Force, and, in November, the 50th anniversary of Oklahoma's admittance to the Union, and the 175th anniversary of the Treaty of Paris, which ended the Revolutionary war and made the United States an independent nation.

IN DECIDING on these stamps, the post office chose from a raft of possibilities. For instance, Wabash, Ind., wants a stamp honoring it as the first city in the world to be lit by electricity. Other proposed stamps would commemorate America's first kindergarten, California redwood trees, and the founding of a state normal school.

The communities of Groton, Mass.; Billerica, Mass., and Beaufort, N. C., are among those requesting stamps honoring their founders Paul Revere, Amelia Earhart and the late Senator Robert Taft, among the American citizens proposed as subjects for new stamps.

"There must be a reasonable limit to the number of stamps that can be issued," says the Post Office department. But however strict some of the current suggestions may seem, remember America already has issued stamps whose subjects were the Pony Express, an oak tree, buffalo hunting, the horseless carriage, motherhood, pure food and drugs, and the first white child born in Buffalo, N. Y.

This never-ending stream of strange, new stamps may annoy postal clerks—and the general public—to distraction. However, it makes many voters happy. And the many thousands of dollars stamp collectors spend acquiring all the new issues help the post office keep its deficit down considerably!

### BRIEFS FOR FOOD SHOPPERS

Tops on the October list of plentiful foods, protein-rich foods will offer good values for tasty main dishes. Beef, turkeys, stewing chickens, broilers and fryers, as well as eggs, peanut butter, cheese, milk and other dairy foods head the U. S. Department of Agriculture list.

Ever wonder how much meat to buy for a meal? Here's a guide suggested by extension foods and nutrition specialists:

For boneless cuts or ground meat, allow about 1/4 pound per serving.

Cuts with some bone in—steaks, chops and roasts—require 1/3 to 1/2 pound per serving.

For heavy boned items—spareribs, shanks, hocks—allow 3/4 to 1 pound per serving.

Dried beef, liver sausage, bologna and some other sausages require only 1/8 to 1/6 pound per serving.



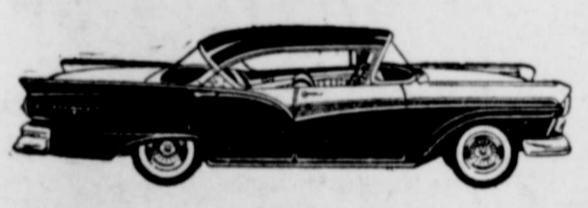

During 1955 farmers were required to file a quarterly Social Security return with the District Director of Internal Revenue. Due to a change in procedure, farmers now file one return in January covering all taxable wages paid to farm employees during the preceding calendar year.

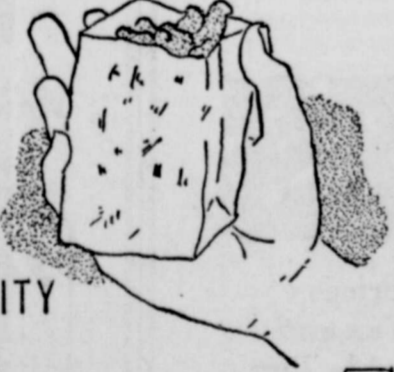
A farmer must file a Social Security return during the year when he quits farming before the end of the year and has paid taxable wages during the year.

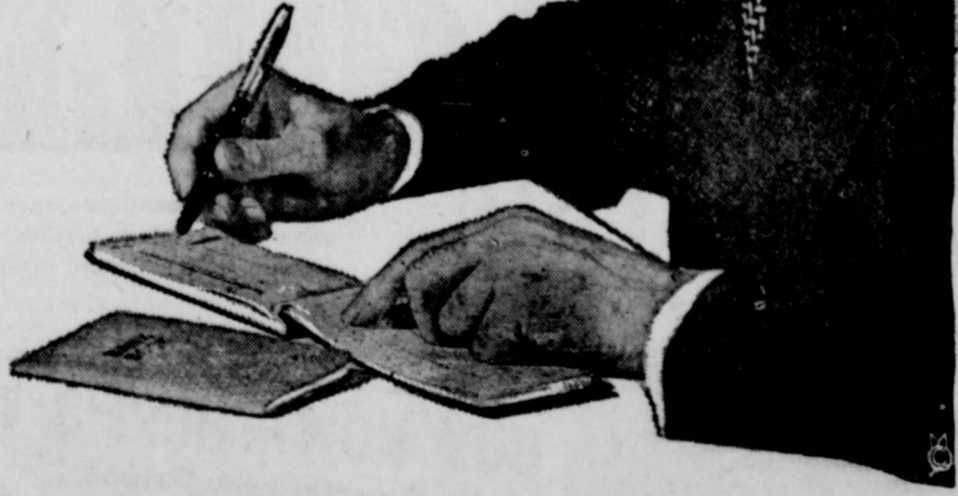

### Drouth Relief Feed Program To Be Reappraised

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage Program has exceeded the estimates of demand made when this program was negotiated so it is necessary to reappraise the actual cash requirements.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of one million dollars of Federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such a program is needed.

Walter T. McKay, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, Director of Credit Services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA county offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates. The county offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make daily reports on the tonnage requirements covered by such applications to Mr. McKay's office.

Mr. McKay has been asked to solicit the assistance of the Texas USDA Drouth Committee and the office of the governor in making a careful reappraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements. Mr. Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires of Secretary Benson, the Department will continue to work closely with Governor Shivers and leaders in the state and give all assistance possible within the authority and funds available to the Department in providing assistance to drouth stricken farmers and ranchers of Texas.

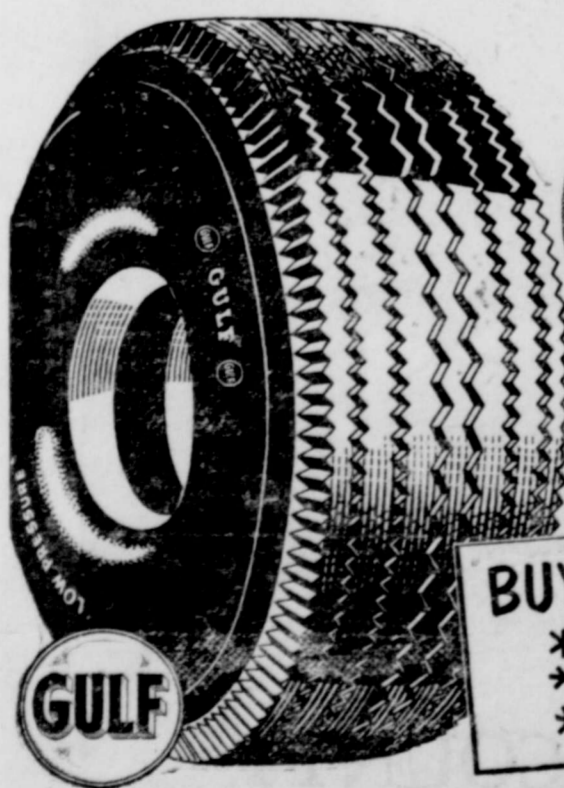
