8.16 Inches Of **Rainfall Recorded** Here During May

GOLDTHWAITE, MILLS COUNTY, TEXAS

Rainfall recorded here during the month of May measured 8.16 inches according to official report from weather observer Harry Allen. Of this amount .25 inches was recorded on Friday May 31, since last week's report.

This brings the total for the first five months of this year to 21.23 inches which is 10.73 inches more than during the same period last year when 10.50 inches were recorded. It also shows Goldthwaite received 3.42 inches more rainfall during the first five months this year than the entire year 1956 when 17.81 nches were recorded. The 1956 rainfall was 12.33 inches short of the long term average normal of 30.14 inches according o weather bureau reports.



#### TORNADO SAFETY RULES

Every week one has the feeling that the stormy and unsettled weather conditions that have been with us since the early part of April may be coming to a close. We are nearing the summer season when the tornado season usually slacks up. Yet this year the thunder storms and unsettled weather conditions are still with us. So again we would like to pass on a few simple rules about what to do in case of a tornado.

To know what to do when a warning is received, or a tornado is observed, may mean the difference between life and death!

I) There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and perferably equipped with pick and shovel.

#### II) IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:

1) Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

2) If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

#### III) IF IN A CITY OR TOWN:

1) Seek inside shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building

#### STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS.

2) In homes: The Southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greatest safety. People living in brick or stone houses should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the basement of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

3) Standing against the inside wall on the lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

#### IV) IF IN SCHOOLS

1) In city areas: Especially if school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND **GYMNASIUMS** 

2) In rural districts-remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

#### V IF IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted cuping the parsonage of the Ch- Mechanical College of Texas, to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. VI: Keep calm. It will not help to get-excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

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





Among boys of the same age, cancer—again mostly leukemia -is the third leading cause of death, claiming more lives than anything except accidents and homicides. Accidents are way out in front.

And as young people mature, the picture changes only slightly. From age 30 to 44, cancer still ranks third as a killer of males, but assumes first place as a cause of death among women. It holds this first-place spot for women through age 59, by which time the disease has crept into second place as a cause of male mortality. At age 60, cancer ranks second for Cancer today is second only both sexes, falling off into

> During the 15-year period from 1940 to 1955, comparative rates of cancer deaths for men and women changed considerably. In 1940 the male rate was 7 per cent less than the female

rate, but by 1955 men were leading women by 15 per cent. The greatest variance is shown and 29 years of age, cancer- in the 45-49 age bracket, the chiefly leukemia-is your most male death rate exceeding the female rate by 8 per cent.

Significant disparity between men and women is noticed in

mortality rates according to body sites attacked by cancer. For example, in cancer of the stomach, the death rate is almost 90 per cent higher for males than females, and cancer of the larynx kills men 10 times more often than women. On the other hand, women suffer 30 per cent more deaths from cancer of the genito-urinary organs than do men.

Cancer of the lung kills six times as many men as women. Eighteen per cent of all cancer among men is cancer of the lung, but only five per cent of all cancer in women involve the lung.

The present trend toward increasing mortality from cancer can be lessened only by the people themselves through periodic medical check-up and proper medical care when cancers

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are discovered.


