Dial Conversion Made Here Thursday Night

First Call After Changeover Made By Mayor To Senator R. Yarborough

Editor Of Eagle Turns The Switch In Dial Conversion

Conversion to the new dial telephone system for Goldthwaite last Thursday night was an important milestone for Southwestern States Telephone Company and citizens of Goldthwaite and the rural area that is served by the company.

Actual conversion to dial system took place at 10 p.m. when A. J. Lacy, Division Manager, West Texas Division of the company gave the signal to Vic E. Koleber, editor and publisher of the Goldthwaite Eagle, who pushed the switch to make the change-over.

Immediately after the switch was made Mayor Wm. G. Yarborough took the new dial phone in the business office of the new telephone building to make the first call. He called Senator Ralph Yarborough in Washington D. C. The call went through in record time and Senator Yarborough extended greetings to local citizens and officials of the telephone company on this important occasion. The Senator was still at his office, although it was 12 midnight in Washington. He also spoke briefly to the mayor about his activities in behalf of Texas in the present session.

During the first few minutes after actual change to the dial system it was interesting to note activities in the equipment room as calls started coming through. During the first ten

minutes activities were reasonably slow getting underway. Thirty minutes later though things really started buzzing as local telephone users got into the swing of trying out their dial phones. Company officials, city officials and a number of interested spectators got a first hand look at the equipment in operation. The general public will have the opportunity to see it during open house which is planned for August 11.

An interesting sidelight of the occasion Thursday night relative to the local situation was brought out by officials who have been with Southwestern for a number of years. It was just ten years ago when telephone service of the local exchange was converted from old style magneto crank telephones to the common battery type system.

Southwestern acquired the local exchange through purchase in 1927 and then purchased the old rural telephone company assets in 1929.

The new modern building and equipment represents an investment of approximately \$170,000 company officials have stated. The new building was started when ground breaking ceremonies were held on November 14, 1956. The building was completed in February 1957 and installation of equipment was not completed until a few days before the conversion.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Despite the static about treasury troubles, Gov. Price Daniel insists that the Texas Legislature can hold a special session and still have money left over.

Recently, House Speaker Waggoner Carr and others suggested that the state might not be able to pay session costs without a new tax. But the governor said his budget department estimates that a brief session, limited to two or three subjects could be held for as little as \$250,000. He reported that some \$618,416 is available. This is considerably more than any previous estimate had indicated.

Governor Daniel made it clear that none of the objections have lessened his determination to issue a special call for lobby control, water conservation and possible other important measures.

HELP ON OIL ASKED—As the state moved into another month of low oil production, Governor Daniel wired Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower that "a real emergency exists."

He asked the President's help in obtaining a limit on foreign oil imports. "More drilling rigs are being stacked," the governor's wire noted, with an "adverse effort on state revenues."

STOP GOVERNMENT COMPETITION

Senator McClellan of Arkansas has introduced an "Anti-Government Competition" bill.

This bill is designed to hasten the termination of government owned or sponsored business-type operations. Its passage would put Congress on record as directing Federal agencies to get out and stay out of activities that compete with privately owned, taxpaying enterprise.

While the measure is said to face stiff opposition from Government employe unions, it has the backing of economy minded members of Congress and they hope to push it through this session. They need all the active public support possible.

WHO'LL DO THE DRIVING?

Lewis Mumford, an expert on city planning, has this to say: "Either the motor car will drive us all out of our cities, or the cities will have to drive out the motor car—not by absolute prohibition, of course, but by restrictions of size and access, favoring small cars. . . and penalizing such monstrosities as those fantastic and insolent chariots with which American motor car manufacturers now burden our streets and parking lots."

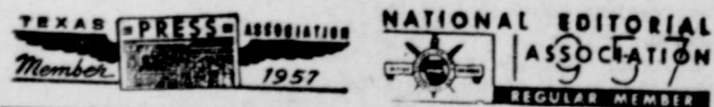

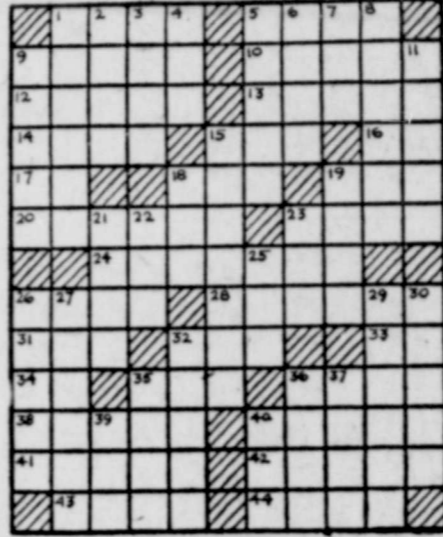

MARCH OF EVENTS

House Civil Rights Victory | Increased Birthrate
Ups Education Aid Chances | College Enrollment

WASHINGTON—The recent civil rights battle and the group in the House of Representatives may mean a better comes up in the House very soon.

The vote on the civil rights bill weakened the already link between southern Democrats and conservative Republicans. The southern Democrats were willing to vote one of their future votes against the school aid bill for a GOP vote in favor of the jury trial amendment to the civil rights measure.

No Republican came through on the side they had in the past so the Dixiecrats may get the favor and vote for the school bill which the Republicans want to beat.

The Democrats can do this in good faith if their states would be the major beneficiaries under the school aid program.

COLLEGE CRISIS—A presidential commission is readying a new report on the "coming age" in providing colleges to meet the needs of the huge elementary and high school enrollment. The problem was outlined for Congress recently by Devereaux C. Josephs, chairman of the President's Commission on Education Beyond the High School.

"The first ripple of the wave of students now enrolling in the elementary and secondary schools has not yet graduated high school but will do so this year," Josephs said. "The impact of the greatly increased birthrates since 1949 will be with mounting intensity year by year as far into the future as can foresee."

Even by last autumn, Josephs said, college enrollments were highest in history, higher even than at the height of veterans' enrollment in the late forties.

"The percentage of college-age youth actually attending has been growing steadily for many years, and the rate of increase has stepped up just in the past two or three years," Josephs stated.

At the same time, Josephs added, the demands "within our people for more than a 12th grade education have been increasing faster than the supply, and we see nothing on the horizon but indications that these demands will increase even more in the next two decades."

GIRARD CASE—The United States decision, temporarily while awaiting action by the Supreme Court, to hand off Girard over to Japan for trial in Japanese courts is sure to off a concerted drive in Congress to abrogate the entire status of forces treaties.

There long has been resentment in many quarters of Capitol over these agreements which provide for the trial in foreign of American soldiers stationed overseas.

However, the Girard case is the igniting point for a strong against the pacts. Not only is congressional opposition mounting but the strong voice of powerful veterans' organizations is behind a repeal move.

ANSWER TO KHRUSHCHEV?—Administration sources are highly surprised if an invitation is extended to a United States representative to appear on Russia's airwaves as Soviet boss Nikita Khrushchev did in the United States. State department officials say they have been seeking such broadcasting time for almost 18 months on an exchange basis.

The administration has given no encouragement to the idea a high-ranking official should carry the proposed United States message to the Russian people.

The issue now has taken on political overtones. There are indications that Democrats see a chance of embarrassing the administration by accusing it of refusing to take the propaganda against the Kremlin.

Big Valley Revival Meeting To Start August 4

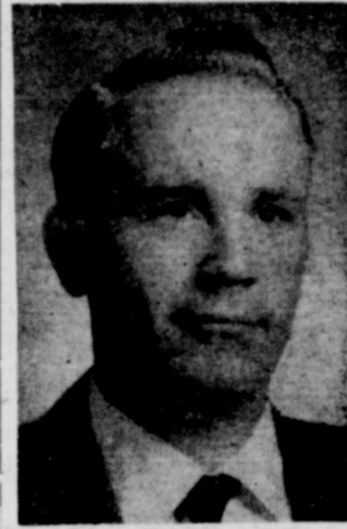

Faithfulness On The Job Key To Youth's Success

MANY youths who have recently finished high school or college are now going to work. Perhaps half of them will enter an industry where they will punch a time clock; others will be white-collar workers.

Start Right

Here are some pointers for the youth who is at the beginning of his career:

Your chances for advancement will depend on your skills and particularly on your faithfulness to the present job. Later on, when you apply for another job elsewhere, the new employer will want to know what your present employer thinks of your dependability and he will find out.

If you work in an industry, you may be more inclined, as a rule, to do your best than if you are one of the few white-collar employees on a job. It may not be as easy to do your best if you are the only employee or one of the few in an office, store or other small business as it would if you were an industrial worker. Also, you might not have as great an opportunity to display your superior personal qualities and resourcefulness in the former as in the latter.

You may not have to sign in or sign out or keep a time card. No one may scold you for being late in the morning or returning late from lunch, or leaving early in the afternoon. This may be left chiefly to your choosing, although the hours are well-defined.

Discipline Yourself

If you are really going to prove dependable, you may have to discipline yourself. If you have never done this very well in other matters, you may easily drift into chiseling off a little more time here and a little more there, without really meaning to do so. Then by and by you could sadyly disintegrate in measuring up to the responsibilities and freedoms you have had. Aware that this is happening, you may only feel uncomfortable and worried about yourself without improving your ways.


Good Rule



The storage of subsoil moisture was surprisingly low on much of our grassland during the heavy spring rains. In fact it was not difficult to find dry soil at one foot in some pastures.

Where the native grasses were killed during the drought by over use, leaving the land bare, most of the rainfall ran off. While on pastures with

good cover most of the rain soaked in.

On the tight soils with poor cover west of Goldthwaite runoff exceeded 90 per cent in some cases. Dry soil was found in several pastures at a depth of only 10 inches. This represents only about two inches of moisture penetration, leaving about 18 inches to run off. Land with good cover was wet several feet deep.

The best way to reduce of rainfall is to maintain cover of dead and living grasses on the pasture. A simple case of over-soaking up rainfall when land does not. This bare soil is exposed to pounding of raindrops, pack the soil and cause run together. This is a packed and crusted that is in poor condition hold the little water up.

LAND BEING TIED To help solve this problem, many cooperators in Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are resting on pastures in an effort to the remaining grasses maximum growth and seed.

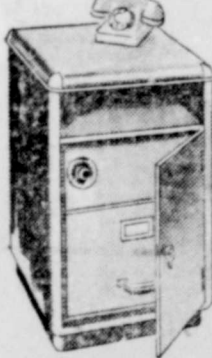

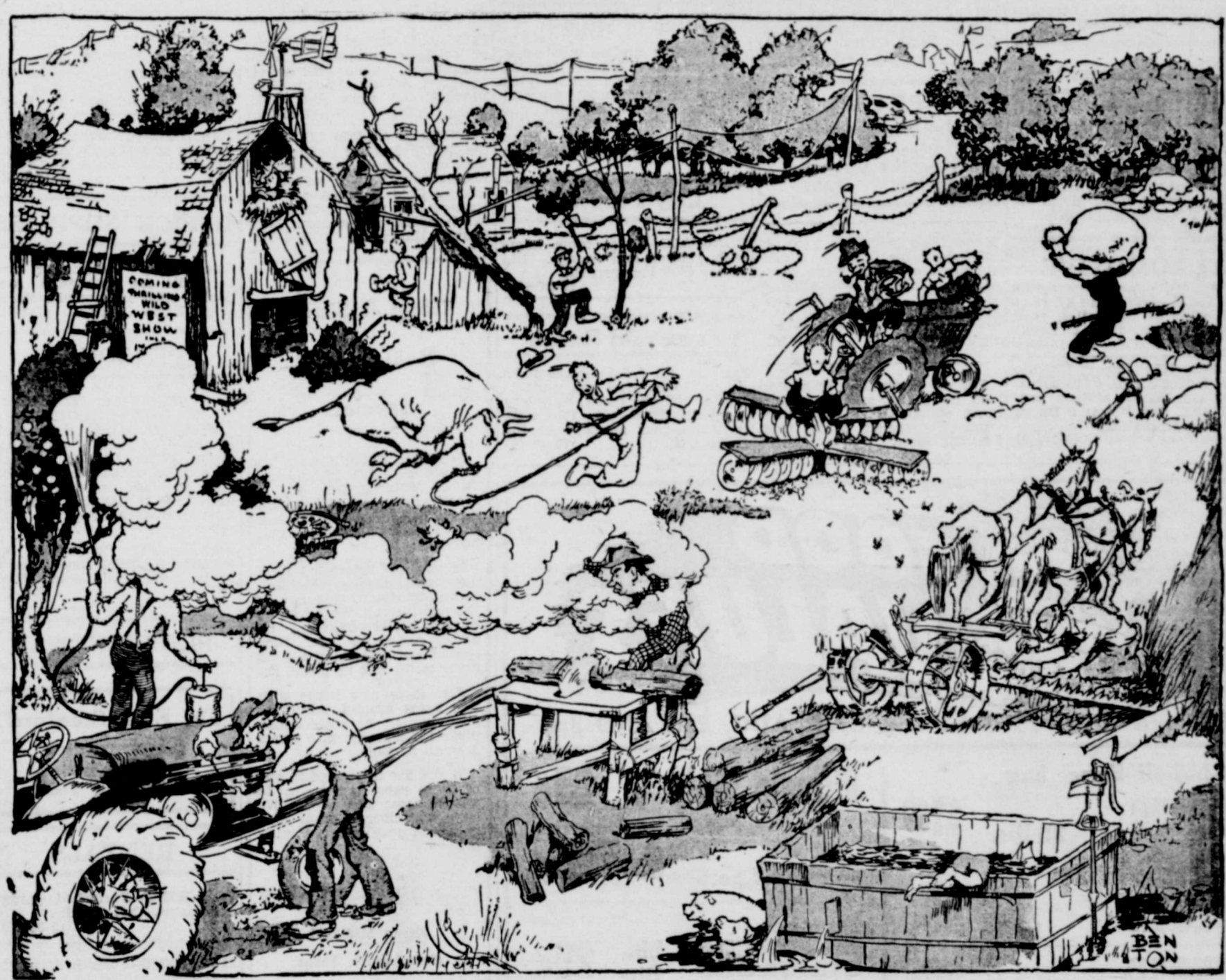

2240 for filing the 1957 claim. An instruction sheet for preparing the application will also be provided. For new fuel users or those who failed to file last year, copies of the filing form may be obtained from my office.

A copy of Publication 308, Farmers Gas Tax Refund, prepared by the Internal Revenue Service, may also be obtained from your county agents office or from the nearest District Internal Revenue Service Office.

All agricultural producers who used an appreciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations should check into their eligibility for a refund.

The fatal accident rate has been increasing on our farms in this country, according to a USDA tabulation of available data. There has been an increase from 6.7 per 100,000 persons during 1940 to 1943 to 10.3 during 1949-1953.

During this last 14 year period 30,521 fatal accidents occurred on farms in the United States.

The greatest cause was machinery. Drownings were the chief cause in Texas.

Texas also had 727 fatalities which was the largest amount of fatalities of any State in the Nation.

The greatest number of fatalities was in the 10 to 14 year age group—followed by children under 5. The 20 to 24 age group was the safest.

SUGGESTIONS OFFERED ON HEGARI VARIETIES

There is a lot of difference in the varieties of Hegari now available to Texas farmers. According to Associate Extension Agronomist Lee Coffey, reports reaching him indicate that considerable confusion exists among farmers as to the variety of Hegari they should plant.

Coffey offers these suggestions to farmers who plan to plant one of the varieties of the popular grain sorghum. REGULAR HEGARI, he says, is recommended for bundle feed. Under good growing conditions, this variety will make a plant about six feet tall and is an excellent producer of forage and grain.

Hi-Hegari is a comparatively new variety which was developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station as a silage crop. This variety, under good growing conditions, averages considerable taller than regular Hegari and is a heavy producer of forage.

Early Hegari grows taller than Martin milo and is often

too tall for combining. Its stalks are finer than other varieties and is recommended for hay.

Combine Hegari, says Coffey, is shorter than Martin and should not be used for hay or bundle feed. Under ideal growing conditions, it is one of the better producing grain sorghum varieties. It is, however, a poor grain producer under drought conditions. Coffey adds that it is often difficult to combine because it has poor head exertion and dries slowly. It is also rather late in comparison to the other varieties of combine sorghums.

There will be 100 Billies and Does entered in the show and sale. Judging and classing will start in the morning and the sale will start at 1:00 p.m.

All goats in the show and sale will be classified as to type by Lem Jones and Pete Gulley, who will also have charge of the auction sale.

A total of \$275.00 has been donated by the following firms for prizes for Billies and Does bred and raised by exhibitor:

TODAYS Menu

Three New Food Ideas For Three Occasions

By ALICE DENHOFF

HERE'S a potpourri of recipes, the first, a substantial snack for TV viewers.

Sift together 2 c. sifted flour, ¼ tsp. salt and 3 tsp. baking powder. Cut in 2 to 4 tsp. shortening. Add ½ or ¾ c. milk—enough to make a soft dough—stirring just enough to make ingredients hold together.

Cut Into Rounds
Turn out on lightly floured board; knead gently for ½ min. Roll dough ¼-in. thick. Cut into rounds with small biscuit cutter about 1-in. in diameter.

Slice tiny sausages very thin. Cover a biscuit with sausage slices, then with another biscuit, more sausage and top with another biscuit. Press together at one side.

Set on end in small muffin pans. Bake at 425°F. 12 to 15 min. Serve piping hot. Makes 14-16 sandwiches.

Shrimp Salad
A hot shrimp salad makes a good luncheon or supper special any time of year.

To serve 6, sauté ¼ c. diced green pepper, ¼ c. chopped onion

and ½ c. diced celery in 5 tbsp. salad oil until tender. Be careful not to brown.

Drain a (#1) can shrimp and add to a (#2) can grapefruit sections and juice. Season with ½ tsp. salt, ¼ tsp. paprika and 2 tsp. sugar. Cook very slowly until heated through.

Serve hot in individual salad bowls sprinkled with paprika. Serves 6.

Dessert Beverage

A dessert beverage served with plain cake or cookies is a nice way to top off a meal this time of year.

To serve 4, dissolve 4 tsp. sugar in 2 c. freshly-made coffee; cool. Pour into freezer tray and freeze in refrigerator until firm but not hard.

Beat 1 egg white until stiff. Add 1 tsp. sugar. Add frozen mixture and beat until fluffy but not melted.

Return quickly to freezing tray and freeze until firm.

Using 3 ½ c. freshly-made, chilled coffee, half fill 4 tall glasses and divide frozen mixture among glasses.

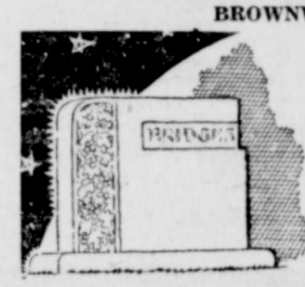

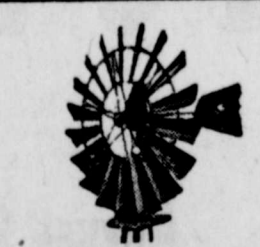

for Texas oil, the Railroad Commission set the August allowable at 13 producing days, same as for July. It is the lowest producing pattern ever used in the state.

INDIVIDUAL INCOMES UP—Texans are getting richer, according to Uncle Sam's tax reports for fiscal 1957.

For the five-state Southwestern area federal tax collections hit the all-time record total of \$4,346,149,316. More than half of this—\$2,560,867,402—came from Texas. This is a 7 per cent increase for this state over last year's collections.

Of this total, 75 per cent comes from income taxes, the remainder from employment taxes, excises, etc. Revenue officials attributed the big jump to higher salaries in the Southwest.

IT'S AN ILL WIND—Cricket season came early this year in the Capital City. The pesky, black jumpers which pay Central Texas an annual visit in great numbers, are here.

But Marion Toole, aquatic biologist for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, says it's

a lucky season for fishermen. Crickets, it seems, are considered a real delicacy by all game fish. But sunfish and bass bite them best, he says. "It's too good an opportunity for any fisherman to pass up."

So, while merchants fight them in downtown areas and home owners spray and dust around porches and patios, both fish and fishermen can have a field day. "And they'll be with us until early September," Toole added.

TRAFFIC TOLL UP—Texas traffic deaths and injuries jumped an estimated two per cent for the first six months of this year as compared to 1956.

Reports from the Department of Public Safety for January-June, 1957, show 96,785 accidents. Total for the same period in 1956 was 91,555 accidents. Final figures on deaths and injuries are not yet tabulated.

One bright spot, however: deaths dropped from 5.7 per million vehicle miles to 5.5 for this year.

VETS DUE REFUNDS—Some \$16,271 in fees will be returned to veterans who started, but did not complete, transactions with the Veterans Land Board.

SENATOR YARBOROUGH GREETES TEXAS DELEGATES

Before it was amended by the last Legislature, the law did not allow the board to return fees to veterans who changed their minds about buying land.

Average refund will be about \$70, largest \$100, according to Land Commissioner Earl Rudder.

"FLU" WATCH ON—An outbreak of Asiatic "flu" in Texas is likely, say State Health Department officials.

Many Texans were believed exposed at a church conference in Grinnell, Iowa, and at the Boy Scout Jamboree in Valley Forge, Pa.

Adding to the uneasiness was a report that 50 sailors stationed at Corpus Christi had been stricken.

Present vaccines are ineffective against this Asiatic virus, said Dr. J. E. Peavy, chief epidemiologist. "But I hope a new vaccine will be ready by fall."

VICE CAMPAIGN IN THE RED—Atty. General Will Wilson's department is having to use "rubber checks" to carry on with its campaign against organized gambling.

Because of its extra activities, the department ran out of money, with no more due until the new fiscal year begins, Sept. 1. Governor Daniel granted the department \$11,425 from his special emergency fund of \$200,000. But, because of a technicality in the wording of the bill, this money isn't officially available either until 1959.

Hence, the checks written on the fund are deficiency warrants, which, said the comptroller, are really "hot checks." Banks can't get their money from them until the Legislature meets and makes them good.

OPTOMETRISTS WRANGLE—Texas optometrists are still in a hassle as to whether the state can regulate their advertising—and if so, how much.

Prior to the last Legislature the State Board of Optometry Examiners tried to set up advertising regulations. Suit was brought challenging its authority and the effort was dropped.

Last session a new law was passed barring "fraudulent, deceitful or misleading" advertising. At a recent meeting the board is reported to have set machinery in motion to form an advisory committee from the profession with powers to set

restrictions. But some practitioners objected and talked of trying to get advertising media to bring suit to test the constitutionality of the new law.

A board spokesman promptly explained the board wasn't contemplating any ban on advertising. He said the statewide advisory committee was only to make recommendations which would not be binding.

SHORT SNORTS—Half as many legislators with twice as much pay has been proposed by Austin's Sen. Charles Herring. "I've found it difficult to deal effectively with such a large number of lawmakers," said Herring, but added that he doubted the halving plan would be adopted. . . . A total of 92 new firms employing 1,587 persons was started in Texas last month, reports the Texas Employment Commission. . . . Low bids totaling \$14,063,208 were tabulated by the State Highway Department in its July bid opening for road construction projects. . . . One of the largest organiza-

tions in Texas was launched this week at a convention leading up to the merger of state labor groups into the Texas AFL-CIO.
