TORNADO SAFETY RULES:

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A WARNING IS RECEIVED, OR A TORNADO IS OBSERVED, MAY MEAN THE DIFFER-ENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!!

a. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.

2:-IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:

- Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at 25 to 40 miles per hour.
- If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3:-IF IN A CITY OR TOWN:

- Seek inside shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
- In homes: The southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greatest safety. People living in brick or stone houses should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the basement of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
- Standing against inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

4:- IF IN SCHOOLS:

- a. In city areas: Especially if school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS!
- In rural districts—remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5:-IF IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:

On receiving a tornado warning a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6:-KEEP CALM! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively ment was called Wednesday only a few places in a warning area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

7:-KEEP TUNED to your radio station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.



Business Sag, Unemployment | Republican Leaden Rise Seen as Election Issues | Upswing May Come to By HENRY CATHCART Central Press Washington Writer

WASHINGTON-Both Democratic and Republican strategists have become convinced that the United business recession and mounting unemployment will be issue of the 1958 congressional elections.

GOP leaders are frankly worried about the impact of a nomic situation. They feel that even if the business proves later in the year, the upswing may come too late bad effects on their party's popularity b November balloting



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

To guard against this, we suggest lining the dress . . . Use a light-weight rayon linging or other material that isn't too heavy, and doesn't cling.

Cut the lining about oneeighth inch smaller than your regular dress pattern and bring it eight to ten inches below the hip line. Machine-baste to the front and back pieces of the dress before putting the seams together. This keeps the fabric from slipping and puckering as you stitch it in place

Often he "dies on base," but if he is helped along and finally scores, the cheers are not for him but for the hitters. In the summary his accomplishment rates as "no time at bat" and "no hit." Somebody else even gets credit for a "run batted in." A team can get by with a player or two who "usually walks," if it has enough hitters. It's the same way with a town, and its advertisers.



Answer: No. You are still able to be gainfully employed and therefore you could not meet the definition of disability in become so severely disabled that you have been unable to work for 3 or 4 months, and you feel the disability will continue. you should inquire at your social security office.

Question: I am working out an insurance plan for myself and family. If I become disabled, how will my disability benefit be figured?

Answer: Your disability benefit will be computed in exactly the same manner as if you had attained retirement age and applied for a retirement benefit. Disability benefits are based on average monthly earnings, over a specified period, to which the regular social security benefit formula is applied. As an example, average monthly earnings of \$250 would yield a disability benefit of \$88.50.

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
