Rain Storm Hits Mills County Saturday **Light To Heavy Damage From Wind** And Lightning Reported By Many

Heavy rainfall measuring from one and one-half to seven inches accompanied by the Oak Ranch in the south part of worst electrical storm in years the county, extensive damage struck Mills County last Saturday afternoon about 3:30. The storm cloud began forming early in the afternoon in the Northwest and people started gathering near storm cellars and other places of protection in case of a tornado. As the wind struck Goldthwaite it was accompanied by a heavy dust cloud for a few minutes. The heaviest damage in town was apparently in the western part as the cloud came in from the Northwest going Southeast,







ANTI-RECESSION NOTE

In the May issue of Bankers Digest there appeared a note from Warren P. Duren, President of Mills County State Bank which reads in part:

"Regardless of the talk and reality of the recession, our folk in this area are in the best shape they have been at any time. Moisture is ample, pastures have made an excellent comeback, and the price of cattle, sheep, and goats is excellent. Most of our farmers and ranchmen bought little if any feed during the winter, which more than offsets the lower price of the wool and mohair clips.

"It is our feeling that the general economy will make a gradual climb in the near future, but not to a boom condition as some have predicted."

* * * OATS TESTING 39 POUNDS

This may be a record for Mills County in so far as the bumper oat crop of 1958 is concerned.

A couple of weeks ago the Eagle reported on general conditions of the year's harvest and the wonderful yield reports from farmers regarding their oats and the splendid tests recorded.

During that field trip and survey it was found that most of the oats being combined at that time weighed from 32 to 37 pounds per bushel.

Mr. and Mrs. Glynn Sanders, Mullin, have now come up with a new report of one field of their oats they combined that tested 39 lbs. per bushel. They feel that it is the best in Mills County this year. If anyone in the county has a better report we would certainly like to hear about it. Until then this report will be considered tops.

Hints For Helping Hens Beat The Heat

College Station-Over - heating of laying hens during the summer can cause such a loss of production that even the best performance the rest of the year will not offset, warns Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman.

The construction of the poultry house and its location are major considerations of every poultryman in providing for the birds' comfort, points out Wormeli. A satisfactory house must give protection from heat and cold, high winds and other inclement weather.

Tests indicate that laying hens perform best between 45 and 85 degrees F., he says. At about 65 degress they consume about two pounds of water per pound of feed and at 95 degrees the ratio is over four to one.

When temperatures rise over a hundred degrees, Wormeli recommends wetting the birds slightly through either a fogger belonging to Will Black at system or water sprinklers. the best piede of equipment they know how. If we take good care of them, they will give us many miles of trouble-free use. Here are some suggestions from Gator Boat Trailer Co. which are good for any boat trailer: (1) Clean and repack wheels and check bearings; (2) Thoroughly lubricate all moving parts; (3) Remove rust spots and repaint them; (4) Check cradle and bunker padding for boat protection; (5) Check coupler carefully. If it is out of line you'll bring home undue wear on your tires; (6) Tighten all bolts and (7) Replace winch-rope if it shows signs of fraying.

To these suggestions we might add-be sure and check your tail light and license number plate. Remember also that your tie-downs must be efficient and capable of holding your boat in place.

Take these precautions and you will have a minimum of trailer trouble.


