The annual Learn To Swim classes will start at the Mills County swimming pool in Goldthwaite this coming Monday morning, July 21.

Classes will be conducted for all age groups and everyone interested in taking the free instructions is urged to stop at the pool and register not later than Saturday, July 19.

The classes will be organized Monday morning at 8 o'clock and instructions will be given to the classes of various age groups Monday through Friday for two weeks. Instructions will be by qualified Red Cross swimming instructors.

The usual procedure will apply. Everyone who wants to take the lessons will have to be six years of age or older and have their doctor's certificate. Glynn Raley will be at the pool Monday morning for check-ups.

There is no charge for the instructions. Only the regular swim admission to the pool will be charged.

These annual classes are being sponsored by the Lions Club and the Pool and Park Board. Ray Duren and W. C. Barnett, representing the board, have announced that everyone from the entire Mills County trade area is invited to sign up and take the free swimming lessons.

Tuesday, July 22 Last Day To Get Absentee Ballot

Next Tuesday, July 22, is the last day for anyone to get absentee ballot to be cast in the first primary election on July 26, it was announced this week by Mrs. Raymond Cockrum, chairman of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee.

Absentee ballots may be secured from Walter A. "Toby" Bryant, county clerk any time up to midnight Tuesday, July 22, and they may be voted up to 1 p. m. on election day. All absentee ballots must be turned in to the county clerk not later than 1 p. m.

Announcement was made this week that anyone who feels he or she will not be here on election day or those who feel that they are unable to climb the steps to the courthouse polls may vote absentee ballot. Those desiring to vote absentee should call or write to the county clerk for ballot and instructions.

LEARN TO SWIM

Come Monday morning and you will see, if you happen to be by that way, about a hundred young folk as well as a few older ones gathered down at the Mills county swimming pool in Goldthwaite getting organized for the "Learn To Swim" classes.

The round figure of 100 that I am using here may be off a bit one way or the other. Judging from the past several years experience one can guess that the response to the free swimming instructions will this year again be very good.

Classes will be conducted for all age groups and since there is no charge for the instructions everyone who possibly can should take advantage of the situation and learn to swim. Only cost is the admission ticket to the pool—which is a mighty big bargain.

The project is sponsored by the Lions Club and all members of the club and the pool and park board are going all out to help put the classes over in a big way.

RAILROADS MAKE A BID

Lower fares, meals are lures—Reduced rates, hot meals served in coaches, and Pullman accommodations at the much lower coach fares are among innovations of numerous railroads operating in Texas in bids for more passenger traffic, states an article in the Texas RAIL-Ways issued on July 1.

The story says further that reductions of almost 50 per cent in coach and Pullman fares were put into effect May 1 by the Missouri, Pacific between Houston, Corpus Christi and Brownsville.

The Texas & Pacific and Missouri Pacific are now offering hot, tasty lunches, prepared in dining cars, to coach passengers for \$1. The meals are served on trays in the coaches.

The Burlington is running built-to-order Slumber Coaches from Chicago to Denver. Travelers get a private sleeping room for coach fare plus \$7.50.

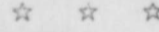
In effect now on the Kansas City Southern is a fare reduction which allows passengers to use Pullmans on regular coach tickets to any point on the line. The estimated saving is 29 per cent.

A Thrift-T-Sleeper service between St. Louis and Denver has been inaugurated by the Missouri Pacific. Under the plan, for example, the round trip fare between the two cities, with use of an upper berth, is \$50.25, plus tax. That is about \$30.00 cheaper than the lowest prevailing rail and Pullman first class charge for the same trip. The upper berth—costing \$2.50 in each direction—is the cheapest accommodation. Others: lower berth \$6 and bedroom for two or more \$12.00.

Other railroads throughout the country are making similar efforts to retain and regain passenger traffic.

All this could add up to a healthy sign with the railroads staging a comeback in the matter of passenger traffic which has in recent years decreased to a point where in many cases it was discontinued entirely.

With highway traffic becoming more and more congested and more and more people traveling to points other than their routine business and work circles it is quite likely that the public will look with favor to the bid being made by the Railroads.

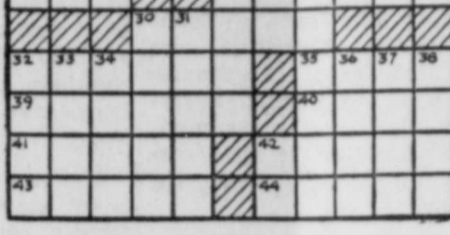

Nixon-Mitchell Ticket Possible GOP Choice

Secretary Gains Ground With Leaders of Labor

WASHINGTON—The name of Richard M. Nixon has been in the forefront of speculation as the Republican most likely to be named to run for the White House in 1960. Now, since the national prominence he has gained on his Latin American tour, his nomination is taken virtually for granted, and the area of speculation has extended to his possible running mates.

Recently the name of Secretary James P. Mitchell has achieved widespread mention in this connection. Players of this political prognosticating game point out that Nixon and Mitchell were the two Cabinet members who most vigorously called for a tax cut as a means to end the recession, although they lost the fight to Treasury Secretary Robert E. Anderson.

Mitchell, they add, enhanced his position with labor in the recent Senate fight over new union control legislation. True, Mitchell voiced the administration's dissatisfaction with the bill drafted jointly by Senator Irving M. Ives (R), New York, and Senator John Kennedy (D), Massachusetts. However, labor leaders know his real sympathy was with the more moderate Ives-Kennedy measure. Labor respects him as a sincere and dedicated public official, and this is the area of support most needed by Nixon if his presidential bid is to be successful two years hence.

HIGH COURT HUMOR—U. S. Supreme Court Chief Justice Earl Warren has a warm, outgoing personality, and a highly developed sense of humor which is revealed in a favorite story he tells on himself. It concerns his early days as a lawyer.

Warren, back in the early 1930s, was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court, and one day argued his first case before the nine sitting judges, headed by Chief Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes. Warren no longer remembers the case, but does recall his attack of stage-fright at the time. He also recalls that about a week after his appearance, Holmes retired from the court.

Warren chuckles: "Some of my colleagues told me that I'd driven that dear old man from the bench."

GENERAL ANILINE CASE DRAGS ON—The recent decision of the Supreme Court sending the General Aniline and Film company case back to the lower courts for re-trial was a bitter pill for the federal government which had fought the case through the courts and private negotiations for almost 10 years.

It means more years of argument and legal maneuvering with the outcome cloudier than when the case began. The \$100 million concern was seized by the United States as an enemy alien asset in the early days of World War II.

However, after the war a Swiss holding company, Interhandel, claimed it owned the company, and, as a neutral, had full rights to its return. The United States government contended that Interhandel was really a Swiss dummy corporation set up by the German I. G. Farben industries, the real owners of the American firm.

Interhandel was ordered by the courts to produce Swiss banking records to show it did in fact own General Aniline, but this the company was unable to do because Swiss law ordered the banking company not to make its records available.

The American government contended that I. G. Farben knew all along that the Swiss government would take this stand and, in fact, organized Interhandel for this very purpose in the days prior to the beginning of World War II. However, the Supreme Court did not agree with this U. S. contention, and the whole matter will again have to be fought out in the courts.

Meanwhile, various stockholder protective groups, Interhandel and the United States government will continue to pay attorneys' fees, and for some law firms the case has all the earmarks of a lucrative life-long career.

Simpson, who ranches Big Valley community, has 30 acres of blue panic. He has been grazing for about two weeks. Also planted 29 acres of Alnum and has grazed over one month. The fields are carrying 100 head of sheep and Mr. Simpson plans to summer by using these pastures. He is very pleased at the amount of seed he is receiving from these grasses.

1935. The grass is native to Australia, Afghanistan and the plains of India. It was introduced to the United States in 1912 from India and was brought from Australia in 1920 and 1935 by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Blue panic is a perennial, warm-season bunch grass that grows in large, dense tufts. It has a bluish-green color and grows to a height of over 4 feet. It will furnish grazing to six weeks earlier in the spring and later in the fall than Sudan. The grass grows throughout the warm season of the year so long as moisture and plant food are available. Soils of the areas where blue panic is adapted range from clays to fine sandy loams and are generally high in lime. The grass has not grown satisfactorily on sands that are acid or that are low in organic matter.

Use of blue panic is primarily as a cultivated grazing crop. It is not a range plant and is

not suitable for overseeding among native range grasses. It should be seeded in rows and the land maintained in a state of cultivation. Because blue panic is produced under cultivation and since stands are easily destroyed by plowing, it is an excellent crop for use as a soil builder in cropping systems. The extensive root system of this plant will add a great deal of organic matter to the soil, if the grass is properly fertilized and allowed to grow two to five years.

Seeding time for blue panic is in the spring after danger of frost is past. Seeding should always be in rows and never broadcast or close - drilled. Broadcast or drilled plantings have not been satisfactory.

Grazing management of blue panic is much the same as for Sudan grass. Rotation grazing of small blocks with relatively large numbers of animals is necessary to get good utilization of forage produced during the peak growing period.

The plants should be well established before grazing starts, and should not be grazed shorter than six to ten inches. Grazing could begin by the time established plants have made 18 inches of growth and should not be delayed past the boot stage.

There will be a meeting at the County Agent's office for the Mills County Vocational Agriculture Teachers, the county agent and interested parties, on July 21. This meeting is for the purpose of working out plans for a 4-H and F. F. A. commercial Lamb Program. We believe that this program will give the youth of the county additional training in a sound lamb management program. More on this program will follow as the rules and regulations are worked out.

The Central Texas Registered Goat Breeders Association Sale will be held on August 30. Friday, August 29, in Goldthwaite, the goats will be sifted and classified and the sale will start Saturday, August 30.

This Association has a membership of 31 members from Mills and the adjoining counties. There will be 135 billies and 35 does sold in the sale. Entries close for this sale on August 1st.

The association is expecting some outstanding breeding stock for this second annual sale. Mills County has some of the outstanding goat breeders of Texas and they plan to enter some of their best goats in this sale.

A TIME FOR BEING GRATEFUL

This time two years ago Texas was writhing under the effects of prolonged drought. Sections of the state had not for at least six years known the feel of beneficial rains. July was a crucial month in which we asked for all possible assistance from the federal government for our suffering farmers and ranchers.

This year, July is a time for being grateful. For the most part, Texas pasturelands are covered with grass, and drought-depleted livestock herds are well on the way to being replenished. We have just come through a most successful and rewarding grain harvest, and conditions are right for this year's cotton crop to overcome last year's miserable failure. Other crops offer similarly glowing reports, and for many Texas farmers the smile has returned to replace the sun-squint of the drought years.

Even in a good year such as this promises to be, farming is not all smiles, though, and it can never be. Mingled with our blessings, we have our problems. The rain brings insects and other pests, but had we no rain, we would have no crops to be infested.

Our pestilence problems this year from the irritating imported fire ant in East Texas and hordes of grasshoppers in Northwest Texas to the pecan-sapping walnut caterpillar in South Central Texas and a

loathsome scourge of rats in Southwest Texas.

We have to fight hard to protect our crops and our livestock from these and other menaces. But we must also be grateful that we have something worth defending from them.

For Better Eating—Next time

you land one of those big yellow cats and want to make it into one of the juiciest meals, drain the blood through his tail before you cut him up.

Usual procedure is to make the kill with an ice pick through the top of his head, between the eyes, then slice off the tail just above the tail fin and hang him up by his head. All the blood then will drain through the tail and make for better looking, better tasting meat.

Skinning The Cat—Most fishermen skin the catfish before storing in the deep freeze. But not many of them skin their bass.

Here's how one fellow does it. He follows the usual procedure of removing the fish's insides and head—but he doesn't scale it. Instead he wraps the fish in foil, with scales on, and drops it in the deep freeze. Then when he is ready to cook he peels the skin, scales and all, off the fish, much like you skin a catfish. Much quicker, much easier than scraping off the scales, he says, and better eating too. Ever try it?

Census Bureau Collects Facts On "Second" Jobs Of Employed Persons

Special questions, designed to provide information on the number of persons who have more than one job, will be asked in the July Current Population Survey, it was announced today by Supervisor James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas, Texas which will participate in the survey.

Similar questions asked in the Current Population Survey last year revealed that about one in fifteen (7 per cent) of employed men and one in forty (2½ per cent) of employed women held two jobs during the week ending July 13, 1957, the period covered by the survey. Together these multiple jobholders comprised five per cent of all employed persons during the survey week. Their estimated total number was 3½ million. The group designated as multiple jobholders included wage and salary workers with more than one employer during the survey week, as well as persons on the payroll of an employer and also self-employed or those holding a paid job and also

working without pay in a family enterprise.

The largest single category of multiple jobholders consisted of about 1.6 million persons who worked for wages or salaries in nonfarm industries on both primary and secondary jobs. Another 600,000 persons nonfarm wage or salary work with some form of nonfarm employment. An estimated 900,000 persons, or about one-fourth of all multiple jobholders, were self-employed farmers on either their primary or secondary jobs.

The special questions on sec-

ondary jobs will be included in the regular monthly reports on employment and unemployment. Current Population Survey information will be selected locally during the week of July 14 by Nella F. Coe of Lampasas, Texas.

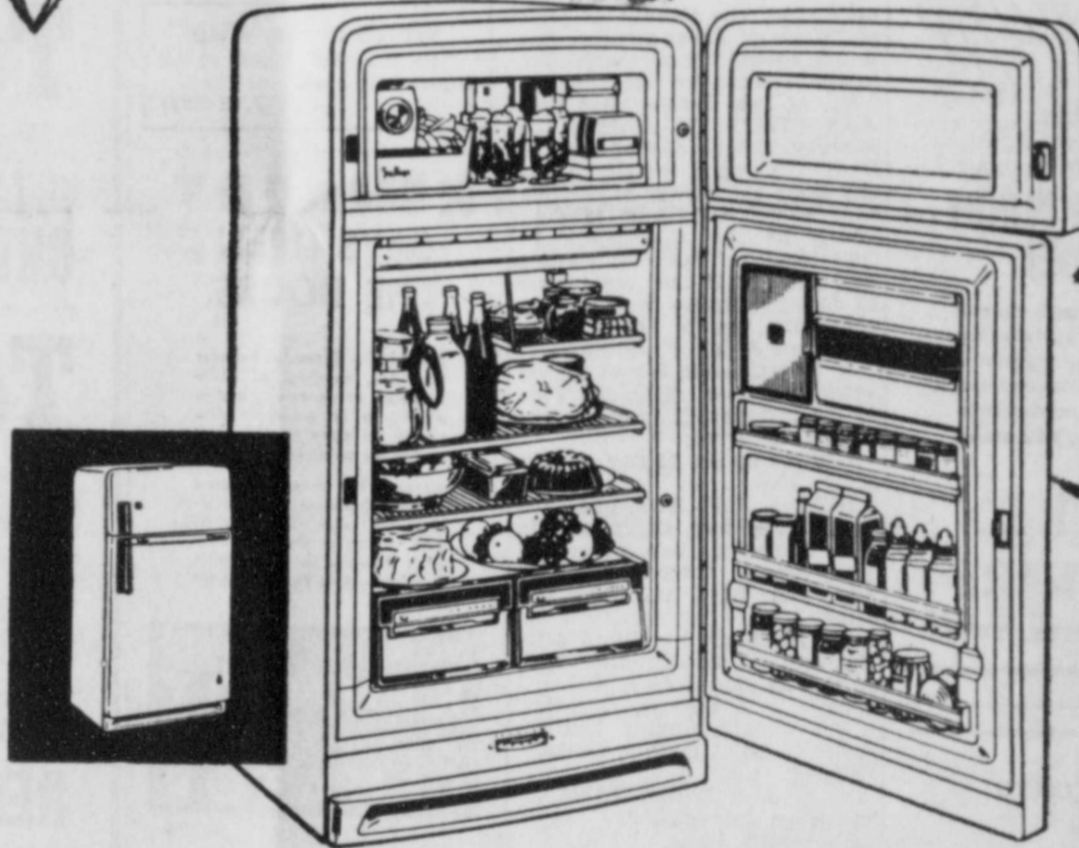

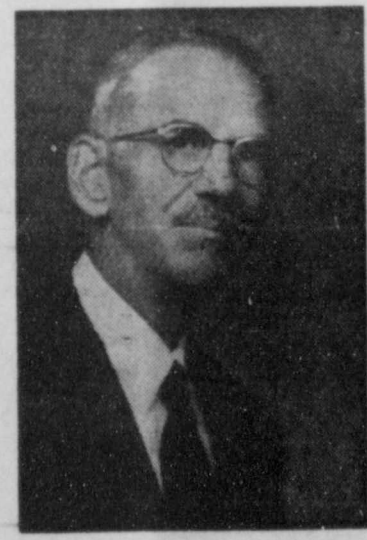
