

Question: How long must a person have worked under social security to qualify for disability benefits under the 1958 Amendments?

Answer: At least 5 years (or 20 quarters). Question: Does this work have

to be in any particular period of time?

Answer: Yes, the 5 years' work (or 20 quarters) must have been within the 10 years (or 40 quarters) just before the date of onset of the disability.

Question: Do the 20 quarters (5 years) have to be consecu-

Answer: No. The time worked may be intermittent, spasmodic or continuous, just so it totals at least 5 years (or 20 quarters) The provision that at least 11/2 years of this work be in the 3 years just before the establishment of the disability is no onger in the law.

Question: When did this change in the law become effec-

Answer: September 1, 1958.


