## Markets

Sheep sale at the Mills Commission Company showed a good increase in the price of head last Friday total of 4,312 head passed through the auction ring. The sale was off slightly week before with 1,592 head.

The sheep division all showed a decrease with the exception of stocker lambs which remained the same as last week. Goat prices were about the same as last week.

## Wool Incentive Price Will Continue At 62¢

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has reminded wool growers that the incentive price for wool during the 1959 marketing year, beginning April 1 and continuing through March 31, 1960, is 62 cents a pound, the same as during the current 1958 marketing year.

The Department of Agriculture, Mr. Burkett said, makes no recommendations as to whether wool should be sold before or after March 31, when the current marketing year ends. That is a decision for the individual producer based on the market situation and other factors.

Under the payment method used in the wool program, the more a producer gets for his wool, the higher payment he receives. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average farm price of wool up to the incentive level.

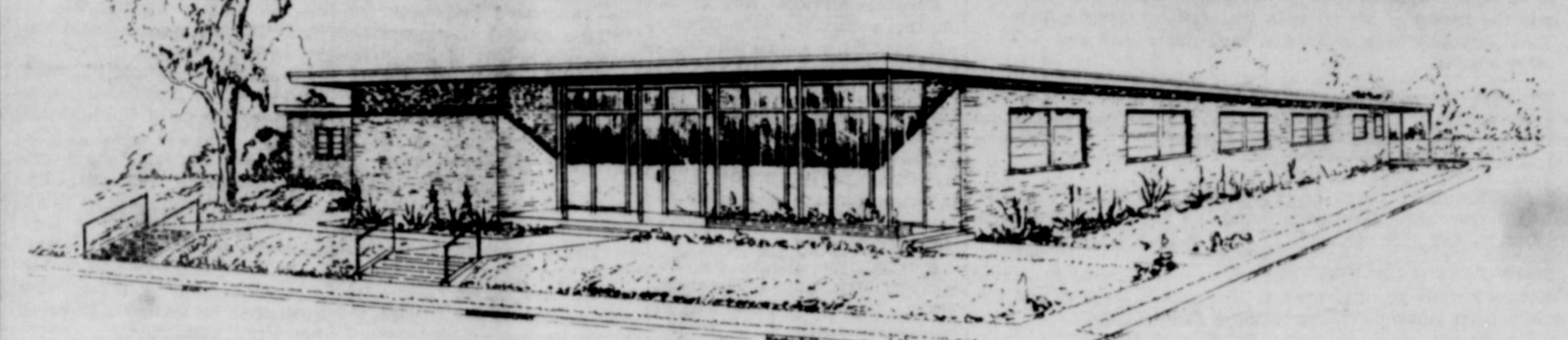
The meeting was held on March 15, 16 and 17 and Dr. Raley received the Charter for the Goldthwaite Lodge at this time.

## Ten Year Dream To Be Fulfilled As Dr. M. A. Childress Makes Move

A dream of 10 years will be fulfilled when Dr. M. A. Childress moves into his new clinic and hospital in the next few days. He came to Goldthwaite 10 years ago and from that time on had hopes and plans in the making for some day to build a clinic-hospital.

Construction which got under way November 25, 1958, is now in the final stages and the contractor hopes to complete the job within the next few days. W. H. Barsh, Waco, is the general contractor and L. G. Kruger has been general foreman on the job. The above picture is artist's drawing of the building. Dr. Childress announced that he will move his clinic into the new home just as soon as contractor gives him the go ahead signal. He hopes it will be by the weekend.

Several years of planning went into the building project which comprises approximately 6,000 square feet of floor space. It features a clinic with facilities for two physicians and seven bed hospital. Cost of land, building and equipment is approximately \$90,000.

The one story cream color Roman brick veneer structure is located on the corner of Parker and Second streets, facing East. It is completely air-conditioned with central heating and refrigerated cooling for year-round comfort. It is new and modern with all details worked out to meet the very latest standards and requirements as approved by the State Health Department.

The Clinic and Hospital have separate entrances although the two will be combined for economy in operation of X-ray and Laboratory facilities.

In the Clinic there are facilities for two physicians with separate reception rooms, office and consultation rooms for each doctor. Also there is a reception office and business manager's office.

The hospital wing features seven beds with three semi-

private rooms with bath between and two double rooms with bath for the two. There is an X-ray room, Lab, Obstetrical room, kitchen, surgical room and a completely air-conditioned nursery.

## Work Started On Addition For Baptist Church

Truett Auldridge, general contractor, started construction work this week on the addition to the First Baptist Church.

The \$56,000 expansion program recently authorized by the church will provide a 44 x 60 ft. two story addition to the educational wing of the building. Also it will provide a permanent chapel with a number of other improvements.

Several months will be required for the building program.

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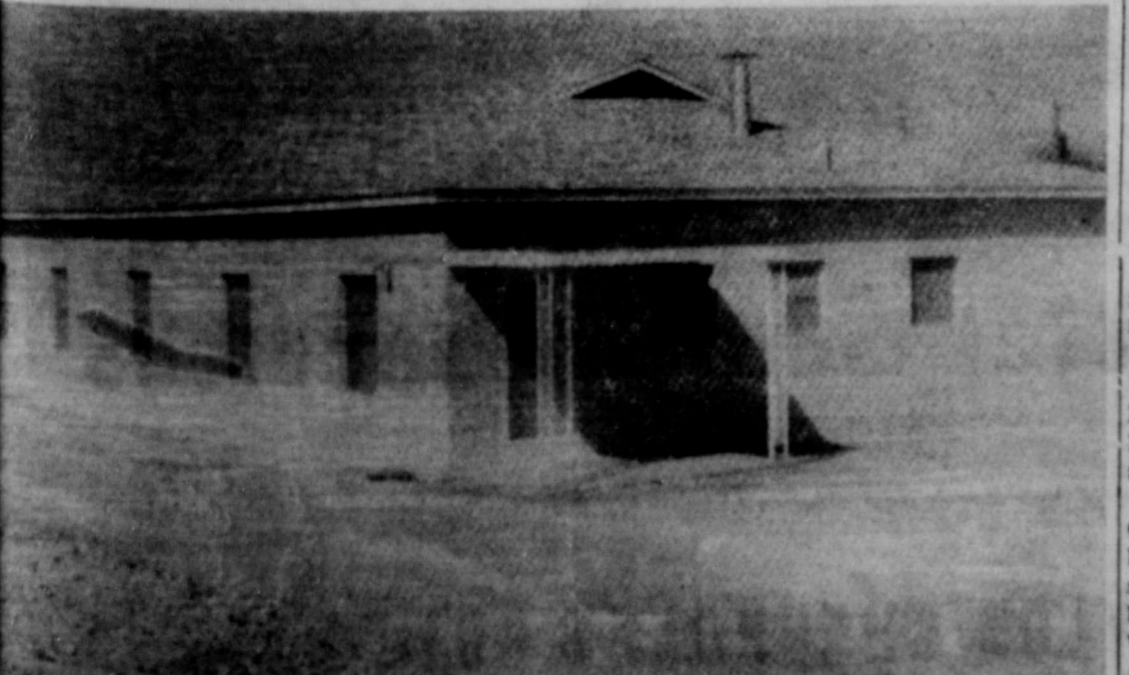
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LEGION BUILDING—The new Legion building will be open for public inspection Sunday March 29, 2 to 5 p. m., when open house will be observed.

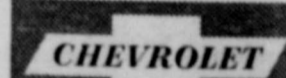

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Stakes are being played rough as the battle at the State Capitol moves into the "summer and tongs" stage. High state officials are laying careers on the line when take a stand.

Gov. Price Daniel wants to obtain needed revenue through a program primarily on taking over abandoned property, changing bookkeeping methods a bit and increasing corporation taxes, natural gas and certain selective sales.

On the other side are a number of lawmakers, including Speaker Waggoner Carr, who call the governor's plan inadequate. They contend Texas' needs are great and should be "spread thinly" to the least injury. Cited as



## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

A new insight into the number of lakes and streams in Texas appears in the April issue of **OUTBOARD**.

In the article, Author L. A. Wilke tells all the major waterways. He tells about the dams on them; the kind of fish that can be had; and the accommodations available around these impoundments.

While we are on the subject of literature, we might also comment on the expansion program of Joe Small whose friends call him "Hosstail."

When Joe figured he'd learned all he could at the University of Texas, about 20 years ago, he started a little outdoors magazine entitled *Southern Sportsman*.

He printed about 5,000 copies of that issue, and had a hard time getting rid of them.

In due course, however, the little magazine did grow, and Joe expanded. Finally it became known as *True West*. Then he took over the old *Frontier Magazine* printed for many years by our old friend Marvin Hunter at Bandera.

Joe began pouring true western stories into these publications, with articles by such experts as J. Frank Dobie and Dr. Walter Prescott Webb.

Finally it attracted attention of some capital back east. Now Joe is printing 250,000 copies of each publication, and they are finding ready reception on magazine news stands all over the United States.

Which goes to show that stories of the great outdoors always will be read. Hosstail Small hit on a good idea, it seems.

And now that you are through with your reading lesson for the day, let's talk about fishing. The time is getting here for top water plugs.

Already we've had reports of some big blacks being caught on top water lures. As the water warms up and bugs and flower and tree seed begin to fall into the water, there'll be more and more.

Of course there is a thrill in catching a bass anytime. It's fun to outsmart one in dragging a jig across the bottom of the lake. It's even fun to catch one on a worm or minnow.

But it's nothing compared with a big black hitting a top water lure.

There you get to see your plug working, as you maneuver it across bass beds. You see the bass when it hits. And you watch the action until you boat it.

Working top water plugs is a simple, easy proposition. Although you can learn many new tricks as time goes on, basically the working of a top water lure is about the same. You can get these top water lures in either poppers or spinners.

Each does a good job. There may be a few specific instances where one is better than the other, but either, in the hands of a good fisherman, can make the frying pan sizzle.

In using the popper or darter, cast the plug into the area where you suspect a bass is feeding. Depending upon the condition of the water and other factors, you can let it rest on the water a few seconds, then give it a slight jerk, or you can burp it for an explosive effect.

Sometimes a bass will grab the lure the minute it hits the water; other times he'll follow it right up to your boat before he takes it; sometimes he even goes off in disgust right before your eyes.

A top water lure never should be worked too fast, however. If you are in good bass water, and if you've put the lure close to a bass, there is no sense in rushing it away from him. If he hits at it once and falls short, give him another chance. I've seen them make three or four false runs at a lure before they finally take it.

The same is true of the cigar shaped lure with a spinner. Some have spinners fore and aft. Others have spinners on both ends.

Again the use of either of these is your own choice. It won't make too much difference to the bass, if you work it right.

Remember, however, you must work that lure to please the bass and not yourself. As Dave Hawk says you've got to think like a fish and not like a fisherman, if you want to string your bass.

With this spinner type of lure you can make them do most anything you want. You can make it dart to the right or the left, straight down or straight ahead. With a little practice you can present it in such a manner that any fish will find it worth looking over.

My own preference is for a spinner on the tail of the lure. Sometimes you'll foul your line on a spinner on the front of the lure, if you are not careful with your cast. This foul will prevent your working it smoothly, and if perchance a bass does hit it, the line might be cut too easily by the pressure behind the spinner.

And incidentally, keep your hooks sharp and straight. Hooks bent out of shape are pretty poor for bass catchers. It's a good idea after each fishing trip to check over all your equipment. Retouch spots where paint has been rubbed off, and get all your hooks and spinners back in shape. It'll pay off in results.

**CITY BOYS HONSWOGGLED**  
—In a couple of recent city vs. country votes in the House, the "city boys" were completely outdone by their country cousins.

This is not unusual in the frequent clashes over rural and urban interests, since rural area lawmakers now predominate. But with the cities growing so fast, the rural group fears that one more census and re-districting will tip the scales.

They hope to head this off in a constitutional amendment proposed by Rep. Will Ehrle of Childress that would limit any one county to nine representatives. Despite city protests, it passed the amendments committee, 10-6.

**EASIER POND PERMITS** — Farmers won, too when the House passed a bill that would make it easier to get a permit to dam up a small pond for irrigation.

Rep. Murray Watson's bill would change the law governing ponds of less than 200 acre feet. These may be constructed without a Water Board permit for domestic and livestock use. For irrigation use, a permit is required which farmers complained was far too complicated, expensive and difficult to get.

Sen. Bill Wood of Tyler is sponsoring an identical bill in the Upper House.

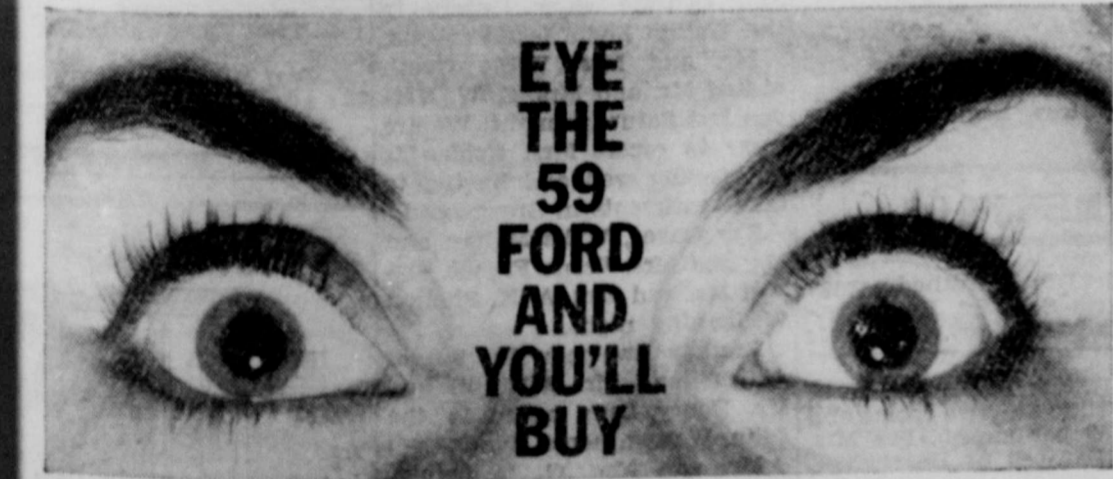
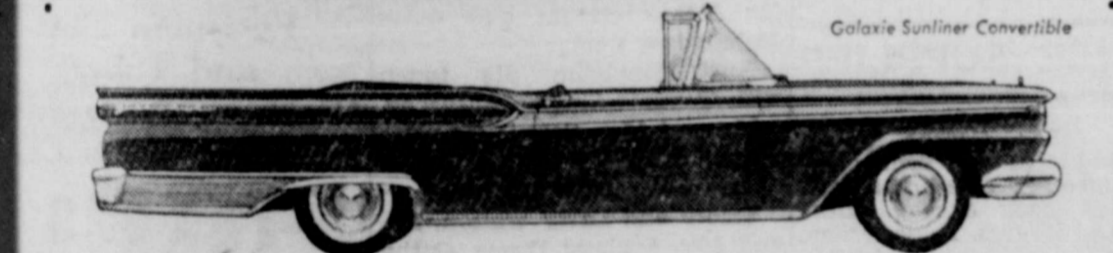

**MORE DEPRADATIONS**  
We are put in possession of the following Indians news, by a letter from Mr. Wm. Thaxton, dated San Saba, March 16th: "Small bands of Indians are almost constantly prowling through our country, stealing and killing horses. About two weeks since, they stole a large number of horses from Cherokee creek, in this country, and made good their escape with them. On the 8th inst. they killed three head of horses on Wallace creek, and stole nine head more, and were quietly wending their way towards the North, when they were discovered by Messrs. The Indians, two in number, were driving their stolen horses as leisurely and with as much unconcern in open day, as any stock raiser in

the country would do. The white men, although they were but poorly armed, determined to attack them, when a sharp fight ensued; the Indians assisting manfully, showered a leys of arrows upon their assailants, but fortunately without effect. The white men continued the fight until they emptied their pistols, and wounded one of the Indians badly, if not mortally, and then turned back charge of the horses, and drive them in.—They had been stolen from Wallace creek and vicinity."

## Marketing Assistance For Texas Watermelon Growers

The multi-million dollar Texas watermelon crop will be assisted in finding its way to markets throughout the nation this year under a new Texas Department of Agriculture-sponsored program.

Watermelon growers in the state's major melon-producing areas in East, North Central and South Texas and the Rio Grande Valley can take advantage of free marketing aid which will publicize facts about their individual crops to buyers in important national markets.

Initially, the program involves getting full information from individual growers as to acreage and variety of melons planted this spring and approximate date of harvest. This in-

formation, when compiled, will be published by the TDA in bulletin form and distributed among anxious buyers.

Since Texas not only produces the most melons of any state but also the earliest melon crop, markets are generally most receptive to Texas melons—provided they know about them. In recent years, however, the increased commercial value of melons has brought about added competition, especially in mid-season, and the challenge is to keep the buyers coming back to Texas for all their watermelon needs.

Texas melons ripen for harvest first in the Rio Grande Valley, followed in a few weeks by the South Texas crop and later by East and North Central Texas production. A survey is already underway among Valley growers to compile and distribute information about their crop well in advance of first harvest dates, and similar surveys will be conducted elsewhere prior to melon season.

Information needed from growers include grower's name, address (or location in county), number of acres by variety planted to watermelons, and estimated date of harvest.

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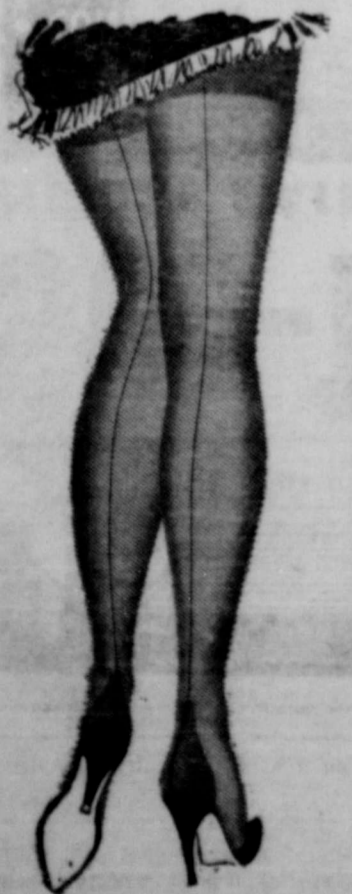
