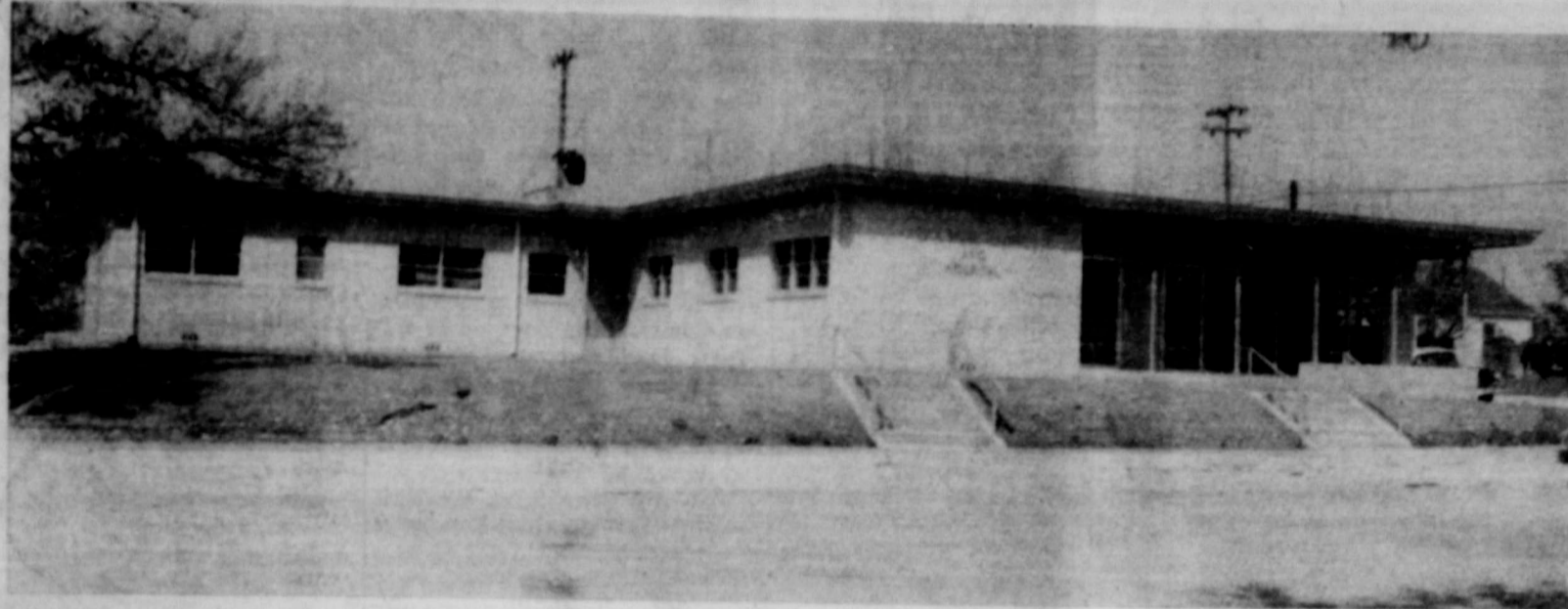

Open House For The Public Will Be Held From Two To Five P. M.

Formal opening for the new Childress Clinic and Hospital in Goldthwaite has been scheduled for this coming Sunday afternoon, May 3.

Dr. M. A. Childress and members of his entire clinic and hospital staff are extending an invitation to the public to attend open house from 2 to 5 p.m.

This formal opening of the new clinic and hospital brings to reality a ten year dream for Dr. Childress who started making plans in 1949 for a new clinic and hospital in Goldthwaite.

Actual construction got underway on November 25 and the job was completed early this month.

The clinic was moved into the new building on Monday, April 6, and the first patient was admitted into the new hospital on Wednesday, April 8.

The Childress Clinic and Hospital is located on the corner of Second and Parker Street, facing East. Featuring cream color Roman brick veneer construction the building comprises approximately 6,000 square feet of floor space.

Five years ago he exhibited the first artist's sketch of a proposed new clinic and hospital. As the days, weeks and months passed the plans received more and more attention as improvements and revisions were made in preparation for the day when they could be completed and

construction could be undertaken.

That day came in 1958 when Dr. Childress announced plans for construction in early October. Plans had been completed and bids were called for as the announcement was made public on October 9. Bids were opened on October 14 and contract was awarded to W. H. Barsh, Waco, a few days later.

There is separate entrance for clinic and hospital although they are operated as one unit to effect economies in lab, X-Ray and other facilities.

The Clinic is designed with offices and consultation rooms for two doctors.

In the hospital there are seven beds with some additional rooms that can be utilized in emergencies. The hospital wing is constructed so that a section can be added should the need arise. A special surgical room has been built and it is hoped that a surgeon will join the staff before long.

Judge Yarborough Attends Convention

County Judge, Wm. G. Yarborough attended the annual convention of West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association held in Mineral Wells last Thursday and Friday. He represented Mills County at the gathering which was attended by members from a wide area of West Texas.

The shearing demonstration was sponsored by the Hollis Blackwell Wool and Mohair Co. in Goldthwaite with the cooperation of Loyd King.

This demonstration showed the small wool producer as well as the large producer that certain methods should be observed and followed in the preparation of wool for market. This is a phase of the production that is often neglected by many ranchmen.

All of the sheep had been tagged several months before shearing. The shearing pens were clean and shearing floors were kept clean by sweepers

who picked up the tags and bagged them. This makes a great deal of difference in the appearance of the fleece the shearer delivers.

The fleeces were rolled for tying by rolling with the flesh side out and starting at the neck. This method permits the britch wool to come up last and the side wool, which represents the largest part of the fleece, to be exposed to the buyer for examination.

All the wool bags were packed "flat," which makes it easier to handle them. Floors made of sections of boards were used to roll the wool sacks to the trucks for hauling.

Mr. King's wool was very clean when it was loaded for shipment and a wool clip that should be very attractive to the buyer when opened for sale.

VETERANS SERVICE—L. B. Porter, Veterans Service Officer of the American Legion Post here has received a letter from the Veterans Affairs Commission in Austin giving some interesting information regarding that work during the past year, especially with respect to Mills County.

The letter states in part:

"Each year, not only are we required by law, but it is interesting to take stock to determine what has been accomplished during the year, and as there is nothing to sell, nor revenues to collect, the only gauge that can be used is the amount of service rendered to veterans and their dependents.

"Due to your efforts, more than \$21,000 in federal funds were distributed to veterans and their dependents in your county during the past 12 months. This figure represents payments in the form of disability compensation, pension and training allowance to living veterans, death compensation and pension paid to widows, orphans and dependent parents of deceased veterans, and many other benefits which are less frequently paid. This amount of money only represents the cases that were handled through organizations that this department is accredited with."

Personally I am real proud to have this community asset in our city and I want to extend to Dr. Childress and his staff sincere good wishes on their open house and for a very successful future.

PUBLIC SPIRITED CITIZENS—When the Legion and Lions Club announced results of their successful white-elephant sale a few days back, the report indicated that the indebtedness on the new building is now less than \$500.

NEED FOR A PARK FUND—Since I'm rambling along about the need for some funds for one thing or another I might as well get in a good lick on the need for a park fund to properly maintain our community park.

This park is a county-wide project and is not only there for the public benefit, but, it is being used by a good many people.

There is no use beating around the bush and be 'wishie-washie' about the matter, we need a park fund to hire a caretaker for three or four months during the growing season to properly maintain the park.

There are only two ways to do it. One is for the city—or the county might help—to set up a fund through the taxing program to do the job or we can get out and hustle up enough PUBLIC SPIRITED CITIZENS to contribute so much each month for the four months period to hire the needed work done.

If it is done through a program whereby the city pays for it arrangements would have to be worked out to do it. The city has no funds for such a purpose now. In that way everyone would have a small part in the park upkeep. If it is done the other way a few PUBLIC SPIRITED CITIZENS will have to foot the bill.

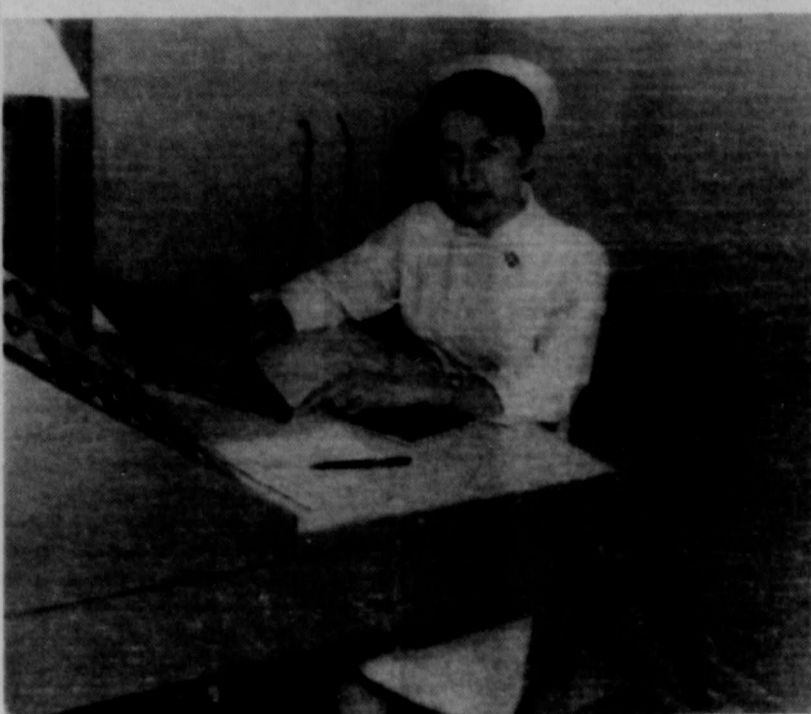

HUMANE SLAUGHTER OF LIVESTOCK
Following considerable pressure from the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Congress passed the Humane Slaughter Law in 1958.

The law resulted in about \$5 million being spent by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for a research project to find livestock slaughter methods which would comply with the law.

Three methods have been approved. They are: chemical, the use of carbon dioxide gas for sheep and swine; mechanical, the use of captive bolt stunners or gunshot on sheep, swine, goats, calves, cattle, horses and mules; and electrical, the stunning of swine, sheep, calves and cattle with electric current.

Designated methods require that the carbon dioxide gas or electric current be administered so as to produce surgical anesthesia in the animals quickly and calmly. The captive bolt stunners and firearms must produce immediate and complete unconsciousness with a minimum of excitement and discomfort. In addition, the animals must also be driven to slaughter - preparation areas with little excitement or discomfort. Areas through which the animals are driven must be free from hazards that might accidentally produce pain.

These provisions might raise the eyebrows among old-time slaughtermen—and the law has caused considerable controversy, as well as expense. Nevertheless, the designations were made after advice and consideration with the Humane Slaughter Advisory Committee established in accordance with the law.

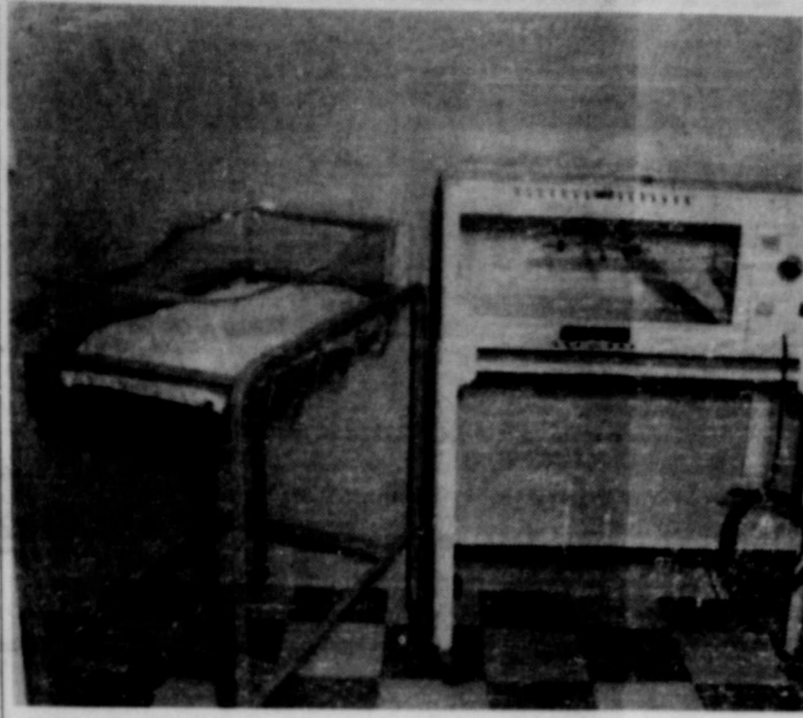
**LOSS OF
TWO CARLOADS OF COTTON**

Question: I have learned that my former husband died recently. After our divorce, I remarried. I have always had custody of our two children, who are now ages 4 and 6. My present husband has been supporting the children entirely, as my former husband did not contribute to their support. Can the children receive social security benefits from their father's account?

Answer: No. In your case, the father must have been contributing to the children's support before they would be eligible for benefits on his record.

Question: Could you specifically enumerate the persons who would be considered as "immediate family" insofar as social security benefits are con-

cerned? **Answer:** The "immediate family" would include a wife, 62 years of age or older; a dependent husband, 65 years of age or older; any unmarried children under age 18; any disabled children over age 18 if they were disabled before their 18th birthday; and a wife, even if under age 62, who is caring for such children. Dependent parents, age 62 for a mother, age 65 for a father, are included for survivors benefits only.

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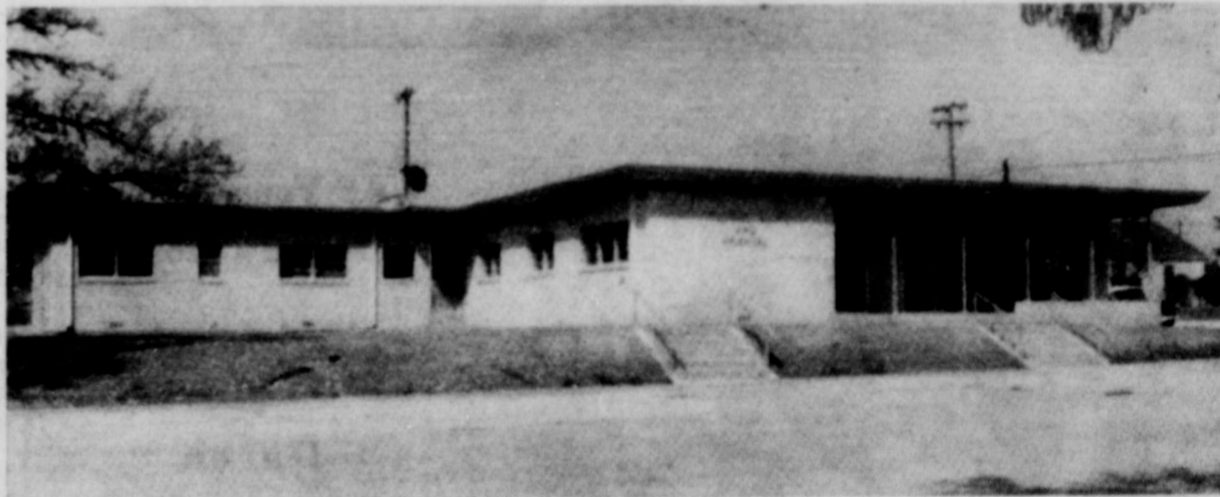
