SCHOOLS SHOW TREND-A portent for th future is that, at the present time, almost th Slums in fourths of the school population of Washington Washington D. C., is Negro.

Some congressmen are disturbed. For instance, Rep. James G Davis of Georgia, a bitter foe of integration, charged: "Washingt is becoming another Harlem. Somebody ought to get a medal for this."

However, it should be pointed out that most of Washington municipal problems are financial . . . and that the principal main factor is the federal government. In 1920, for example, the federal contribution to the local government in lieu of paying taxes for the services the vast federal installations here require, almost matched dollar for dollar, the amount paid by local taxpayers.

Today, however, the federal government pays only one dollar is 10 of the amount required to run the District of Columbia govern ment-a vastly inadequate sum.

As a result taxes on homeowners are sky-high. And, smarting under Congress' refusal to allow Washingtonians to vote, and me merous other discriminations, many of the most desirable resident have long since fled to the nearby Maryland and Virginia suburbs

If Representative Davis really wants to give someone a meda perhaps he should consider giving it to himself and to his colleague on the District of Columbia committee which has, for so long, re-fused to prod-or even permit-Congress into paying anything like its fair share of the local tax load.

As the Negro population increases, the District of Columbian financial plight inevitably must become more desperate-if possib -because Negroes traditionally have less money and are less able to pay the taxes required to keep up a glamorous showcase di like the nation's capital.
