

School Board Adopts Budget

The Board of Education of Goldthwaite Independent School District adopted a budget at their regular Monday night meeting after public hearing was conducted. The Budget is for the new school year 1959-60. Anticipated receipts from all sources of revenue for the coming year total \$165,241.50 the budget reveals. These receipts are broken down as follows: Local sources, \$57,261.50; County funds, \$300; State sources, \$107,680

Expenditures as set up in the budget total \$164,368.50, leaving a budgetary balance of \$873.

The expenditures by departments are as follows: Administration, \$11,869; Instruction, \$105,394; Health Service, \$50; Pupil Transportation, \$15,382; Operation of plant, \$8,000; Maintenance of plant, \$950; Fixed charges, \$1,750; and Debt service, \$16,491.50.





Seventy-eight per cent of the plans, then why would a payroll nation's independent businessmen are opposed to an increase in social security taxes to help defray medical expenses, it is

revealed in am just completed nationwide poll of businessmen by the Nation-al Federation of Independent **Business** . . .

Currently, poll is being

made on the bill before Congress introduced by Sen. Murray and Rep. Dingell to levy a 3% tax on salaries and wages to provide government health insurance. While the returns are not in on this vote, it seems logi-cal nation's independent businessmen will be no more in favor of this proposal than one they have already voted upon. . . .

Of course, the argument for government health insurance is that many people cannot afford illness at today's costs.

It is known, however, that under a free enterprise system the majority of the nation's people have some type of private health insurance, and there are such plans open to most of the rest. merely by paying the premiums. However, that fact does not seem to be so germane at this time. There is a more serious aspect to this desire for government to be all things to all men.

It is quite possible that a case could be made for the thesis that many people in the country today cannot actually afford to eat. Thus, if the sole measure of

what the government shall do, or not do, is the criteria for compulsory government medical

price of new automobiles. Thus, why not a payroll deduction to provide free autos.

Sometime, somewhere along the road the fact must be faced that the government cannot be expected to do everything.

For one thing, every tax that s ever passed by any legislative body is eventually, in one form or another, passed along to the consumer, and usually by the time it goes through the distribution channels, the mark up on the goods that reflect these taxes. pyramids the tax several times adding to inflation

In addition, the costs of government administration soar sky high, so that any tax levied for welfare purposes is either an assessment on the payer that is higher than the same services can be secured for elsewhere, or there is just not enough in the fund to take care of the needs, requiring the dipping into general funds.

For example, the proposal before Congress is to tax 3% on each dollar of income up to \$6,000 per year. This could mean an annual cost of \$180. Yet many families of not inconsiderable size are protected by one of the existing private health insurance plans for just about half this amount in annual premiums.

Actually, the belief held by some that government can pro vide any low cost services of any kind is a snare and a delusion Government services are the most expensive possible. It often doesn't appear this way, because the bill for such services does not come in one statement, but is hidden in many taxes.

Around Priddy the grain sorghum looks good and heavy but some of the farmers have reported that grain worms were eating the heads of the grain. This is especially true in the tighter headed varieties.

A number of farmers have sprayed for these worms but the rains have made it difficult to get in the fields to spray.

George Schuman has sprayed his fields and he said that he believes it has controlled the worms in his fields. The county agent inspected the field and only found a very small number of worms present after spraying

Farmers should spray the worm infested fields with toxaphine at the rate of three pounds per acre.

The effectiveness of the spray material can be increased if spraying will be done during the hot part of the day, for the light headed grain has a tendency to open up when it is hot, and the spray can penetrate the grain heads for better worm control.
