Burglars Arrested Here Wednesday

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield and Deputy Clyde Cockrum Wednesday morning brought in two Latin American boys who had escaped from the Gatesville Reformatory Monday night. They stole a car in Waco Tuesday night, came on to Goldthwaite where they broke into Johnson Bros. Texaco Station, taking money, candy and gum, according to reports from the Sheriff's office.

The boys left town heading out the Hanna Valley Road, after blowing out two tires on the car, they hid in the Luther Jernigan pasture. Mr. Jernigan, being an alert citizen, saw the boys, knew something was wrong and called the Sheriff's department.

Mr. Stubblefield and Mr. Cockrum went to the Jernigan ranch and brought the boys in without incident and placed them in the county jail where they remained until transportation arrived from Gatesville at about 10 o'clock, when they were returned to the reformatory at that place.

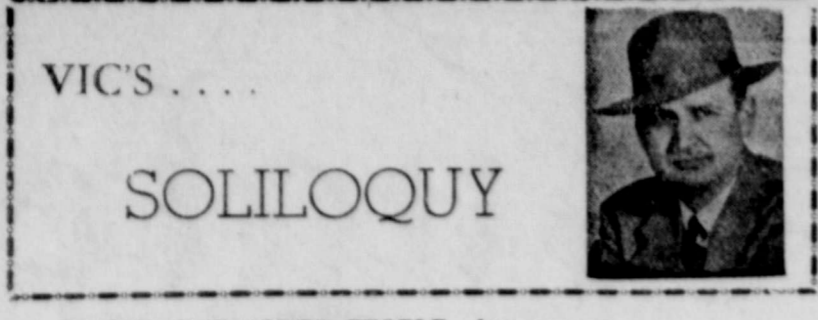

THE WATER SURVEY—By now work is well underway on the preliminary water study or survey which is being made for the city by engineers.

LONG WAY TO GO—During his American visit, Soviet Premier Khrushchev made it clear that one of his primary goals is a Soviet economy which will out-produce that of the United States. And the intimation was that this will be accomplished in the foreseeable future.

If the Premier is correct, he will have produced a miracle of the first water.

U. S. News & World Report has summed up comparative data, based on official sources, concerning pay and output here and in the Soviet Union. Highlights:

Average U. S. factory pay is \$4,700 — in Russia it is about \$1,000, based on buying power. The average American farmer produces enough for himself and 20 others, with much to spare as the huge farm surpluses prove — while the average Russian farmer produces enough for himself and four others, with nothing to spare. And the output of the U. S. factory worker is 2-1/2 to three times that of his Soviet equivalent.

The magazine says: "So the Khrushchev problem boils down to this: inefficient farming, meaning a limited supply of workers for other jobs . . . a shortage of modern equipment, as well as manpower, for nonfarm production . . . low productivity of the work force . . . defense needs that strain the country's capacity to produce."

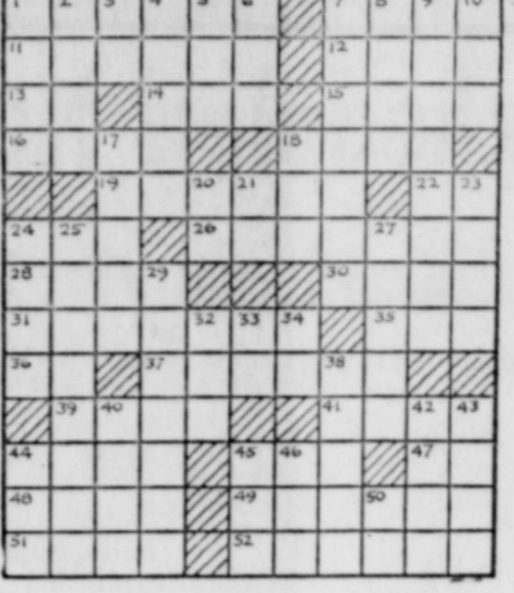

FAA Takes Steps To Flying Safety | **Results of Survey Show Traffic Patterns**

WASHINGTON—Headlines in recent years have made the public aware of the rapidly increasing problem of diminishing air space due both to the greater number of aircraft in operation and the dramatically higher speeds of the jet age.

However, one of the most effective steps taken to solve this problem has gone relatively unnoticed.

Since the first of the year, the Federal Aviation agency, under the direction of retired Air Force Gen. Elwood R. Quesada, has made a comprehensive survey—the first ever undertaken—to determine just exactly who is flying where, when the flying is being done and under what conditions.

The survey, accomplished with the aid of Civil Air Patrol, covered large and small airports, private and public, and will enable the FAA to provide the aids to air navigation in coming years that will help to insure the safety of the flying public.

● **AUTO PRODUCTION**—Economists are shaking their heads over the prospect of increased material and manufacturing costs in the auto industry as the new 1960 models start rolling off assembly lines.

Steel production during the 80-day cooling off period of the Taft-Hartley law is expected to be at maximum rates, with the big steel companies paying overtime to keep the mills going at top speed, and selling some kinds of steel at premium prices.

Auto manufacturers, in turn, are expected to work at top speed during this period to produce as many cars as possible before the steel mills close down again, likely at the end of the 80-day period.

This means higher prices for steel, higher labor costs for auto production, and more money to pay interest to banks to finance the huge inventories they may build up.

Some government economists concerned with the cost of living envision a situation which could force auto companies to increase their prices above those announced at the beginning of the 1960 model year.

● **TAKING A RIDE**—Congressmen had just about weathered long months of ridicule about nepotism. They were beginning to breathe easier in their home districts during adjournment.

Now this feeling of ease has been shattered by disclosures that House Clerk Ralph R. Roberts has used his official Cadillac to drive home to Indiana. Roberts also took one of his office employees along as a chauffeur.

Roberts has been using his official car for personal reasons for years. In fact, he thought that was why the government had supplied him with the auto.

Some congressmen are being kidded about the episode, and that wouldn't be too bad, except the kidders invariably make reference to the nepotism scandal. And for a few members, this is striking too close to home.

She Unsnarls Lingo

—From Dallas Times Herald, Thursday, October 8, 1959.

Most of the time when people see Ramona Flores at work they see just another pretty young government girl busily answering phones and other routine clerical chores.

But once every few weeks, the 25-year-old Miss Flores leaves her normal duties as receptionist in the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service at 1100 Main for another job.

In this role, many think of her as sort of modern Joan of Arc, standing slender and small—but somehow quite tall—beside them in the hushed courtroom of Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson.

COURT PROBLEMS

For Miss Flores' other job is that of an interpreter in the court problems of Mexicans ensnared in the complexities of federal laws. And the unfortunate defendants are endlessly further confused because they can't speak English.

Alone and afraid in the awesome grandeur of the federal court, the accused see in Miss Flores a champion with whom they can talk in their own language. And in whom they feel they can trust much more than even the kindest judge and most sympathetic prosecutor.

Actually, Ramona has no legal training and in her job as court interpreter she is no advocate of the accused. Here is strictly the job of being certain that the defendant understands within the limits of human communication, what is being said in court.

'THANKS'

Numerous defendants have thanked Miss Flores for her help as their "friend in court." Last week, the United States government added its official thanks.

Through District Director Gordon L. Cornell of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Ramona was given a cash award of \$225 and the highest rating of "sustained superior performance" for her extra duties as interpreter.

A native of Goldthwaite, near Brownwood, Miss Flores came by her bi-lingual expertness naturally. Her mother is a Texas native but her father was born in Mexico and Spanish was often used in easy conversation in the home.

Joining the immigration service here on completing high school and a business course in April, 1952, Ramona credits her job with helping her interpreting skill.

"When I came here my Spanish wasn't the best," she said.

"I picked up a lot of it associating with the people who came here to the service for help.

THE BEGINNING

"They'd correct me if I said something wrong. Then the service started using me as an interpreter in presenting people for prosecution, generally for illegal entry into this country."

"I feel pretty secure in court now, but I was pretty scared one time. It was in a big gun-smuggling case under the Treasury department. They had

some big attorneys from Mexico defending the Latin American defendant.

"I was sitting there scared to death that something might come up that I couldn't interpret and they might contest it.

"Well, we got through the case and after court recessed, the three Mexican attorneys came over to me. But they just wanted to compliment me for doing a good job. Believe me, I was pretty relieved and proud then."

BROWN PATCH IN LAWNS CAN BE CONTROLLED

Brown patch disease in St. Augustine grass and Bermuda grass is taking a heavy toll in central and east central Texas now and will probably continue until late winter and early spring. This disease can be controlled if proper measures are used.

Pentachloronitrobenzene (PCNB) 75 per cent wettable powder can be used for control. One pound mixed with water will cover 1,000 square feet of turf. Enough water should be mixed with the chemical to thoroughly soak the solution throughout the old grass clippings and down to the soil beneath the grass. Be sure and do not apply excess amounts of the chemical. Only

two applications a year will give control, and more than this may result in a toxicity problem.

Where the disease is already present, applications are more effective if made during the first 24 hours following a rain or irrigation. If the disease covers a large area at time of application you can expect some results in two to three weeks.

Proper use of fertilizer and water will help prevent the disease. Brown patch is apt to occur on lawns that have received excess amounts of water and fertilizer. Grass should not be watered late in the evening.

Other hints for preventing brown patch are: fill in with soil and level low spots where water tends to accumulate, avoid letting thick layers of old grass clippings of "thatch" accumulate, and mow properly.

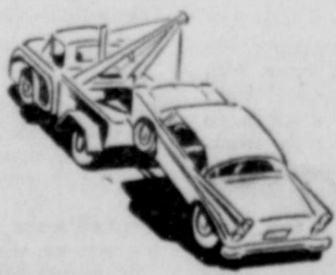

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Sometimes the law enforcement officer has the feeling of being alone.

This statement was made by Abilene Police Chief Warren Dodson at the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation's banquet in Austin. It pinpoints one of the reasons for TLEF's existence — to effect a better partnership between the public and the law enforcement agencies.

Public sympathy, it seems, is inclined to go out to the criminal, putting him in the role of "underdog," the hapless victim of hard-hearted policemen and prosecuting attorneys.

"Texas Legislature has a poor record for crime fighting," Gov. Price Daniel charged at the meeting.

"Of 27 law enforcement bills proposed last session, only three were passed—and these were partially crippled."

Governor Daniel warned that crime is increasing three times as fast as the population, and it is the state's most serious social problem. During the first six months of this year, lawlessness flourished at the rate of three murders, three rapes and 125 burglaries each day.

TLEF is a privately financed

organization of outstanding citizens from over the state.

All The Way For LBJ—Governor Daniel announced he will support Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, not only for the presidential nomination, but for chairman of the Texas delegation to the Los Angeles national convention.

Senator Johnson and former Gov. Allan Shivers fell out over who should be state delegation chairman in 1956. Johnson won.

Daniel says he wants Johnson to be chairman, but that he (Daniel) will take an active role in working for the senator both here and in other states.

Save The Seed—State Board of Education has gone on record as being unanimously opposed to spending anything but the income from the \$400,000,000 permanent School Fund.

Fund has been built up over the years, principally through sales of mineral rights on the school lands. It has been invested in government and municipal bonds which have an income of about \$12,500,000 per year.

This investment income is used for school operating ex-

penses. It is dipping into the principal — the \$400,000,000 — that the Board opposes.

Board resolution compared the school trust fund to seed corn which "our forefathers saved to plant instead of grinding it for use as food."

There has been some talk of tapping the permanent fund to meet current demands for a teacher pay raise.

Board of Education approved the holding of a county-wide election to see if Cooke County residents would be willing to support a junior college at Gainesville.

A study of the feasibility of establishing a junior college in

Midland also was approved.

Textbooks in seven subjects were adopted by the Board, including, for the first time, journalism books.

Rule Hits 'Corporate Optometry'—Within the next few weeks Texas optometrists will vote on a proposed new rule prohibiting practice under any name except the name under which the optometrist is licensed.

Before polling the optometrists, the Board of Examiners in Optometry got a ruling from the Attorney General Will Wilson stating that the regulation would be legal and valid.

While the board is not bound by the results of the balloting, it was predicted that a favorable response would almost certainly result in adoption of the rule. This, because there are hundreds of individuals engaged in optometry as compared with firms so engaged.

If adopted, the rule would prohibit practice "under an assumed name, corporate name, trade name or any name other than the name under which the optometrist is licensed."

This would mean the end of such firms as Texas State Optical, and Lee Optical, where glasses are available at considerable savings to the general public.

Hospital Problems Studied — State Hospital Board has under way studies aimed at three of its current problems.

One is to find a way, other than providing expensive mental hospital facilities, to care for some 2,700 patients whose only ailment at present is old age. Two plans are being considered. One is state assistance toward the cost of caring for the oldest in private nursing homes. Other is providing for state nursing homes.

Under law, the state is not responsible for giving institutional care for the aged. But these patients were all admitted on court order as mental cases. Now they're too infirm to be "turned out."

Another problem under study is that of tuberculosis patients who go "awol" from TB hospitals before they are completely cured. Danger is not only that they will relapse, but that they will infect healthy outsiders.

Third matter under study is the facilities needed for present and future care of mentally retarded children under school age.

Carr Appoints — Named by Speaker Waggoner Carr to the Joint Educational Standards Commission were Reps. C. T. Matthew of Yoakum, Leon Thurman of Anson and Maurice S. Pipkin of Brownsville. Commission is to search for ways to cut school costs without sacrificing necessities.

Reps. Louis Anderson of Midland and C. W. Pearcy of Temple have been selected by Carr to serve on a committee to study the state fiscal system.

Four big city solons will serve on a committee to study the possibility of merging some functions of city and county governments. They are Reps. Raymond R. Russell of San Antonio, Warren C. Cowen of Fort Worth and Ben Atwell of Dallas County.

Court To Move — Texas Supreme Court justices will sit at their new marble bench for the first time on Dec. 3, rather than Nov. 18, as previously announced. A special ceremony will be held Dec. 3 in the New State

Courts Building, with the justices formally attired in black robes for the occasion.

New DWI Tests Urged—It's so hard under present law to prosecute a driving-while-intoxicated charge that most law officers settle for a lesser charge, says the head of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

Speaking to the Texas Safety Association, Brad H. Smith urged passage of laws allowing for chemical tests to determine drunkenness.

Daniel Raps Lawmakers — Private research agencies have done a good job of fact finding, but the Legislature has been slow to carry out recommendation, Gov. Price Daniel said at the Texas Research League's annual meeting.

He cited law enforcement and traffic safety as areas of legislative foot-dragging and implied there had been an effort to undo Insurance Department reorganization.

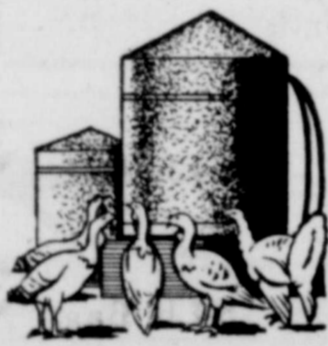

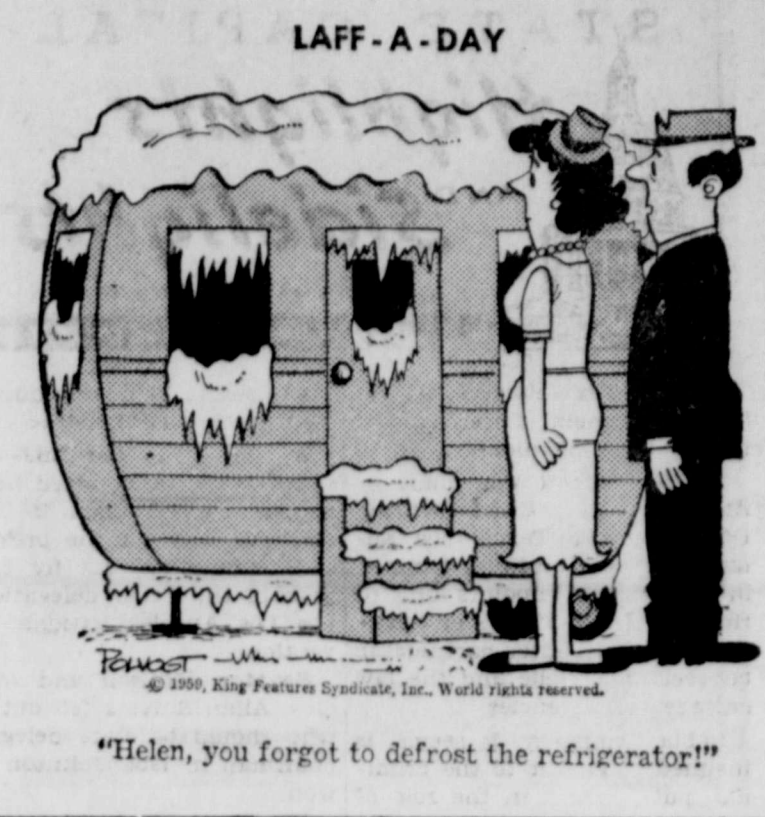

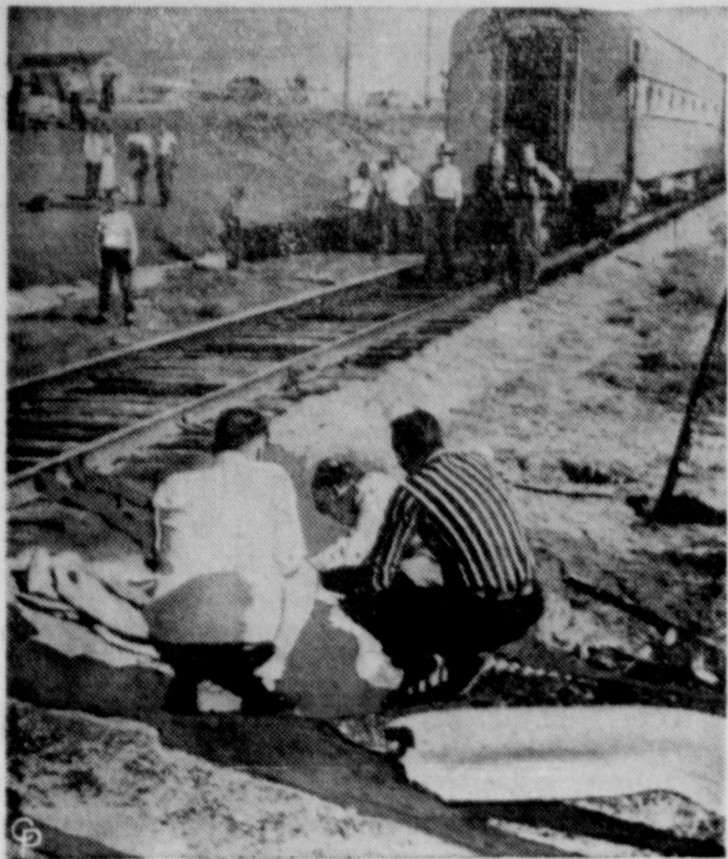

WHAT HOMEMAKERS SHOULD CONSIDER WHEN BUYING TURKEYS

Homemakers and others who buy turkeys through retail stores should consider a number of things before buying. Since the holiday seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas are only a few weeks away, your interest in buying turkeys is probably greater at this time of the year than any other.

How big a turkey should you buy? This will largely depend upon the number you expect to serve and reaction of family members to eating leftovers. You should keep in mind that for each person served you will need about 3/4 pound of oven-ready turkey for a generous allowance.

Now that you have decided upon the size turkey to buy, you should consider the quality you want. Best quality turkeys, which are designated as grade "A", will have an even covering of fat over the entire bird. They will be broad breasted with bulging thighs and large drumsticks. Turkeys with these qualities have a maximum per cent of meat to bone and thus give more edible meat for your dollar spent. In addition to the previously mentioned qualities that determine the grade, you should select a turkey without blemishes, such as torn skin and bruises.

Look for the inspection and grade tag on the turkey you buy.

Turkeys that have been inspected for wholesomeness under USDA supervision will have a tag, either metal or paper, attached to them which states that the turkey has been inspected for wholesomeness and it will have the prefix U. S. on the shield. The tag is usually attached to the wing.

If the turkey has been graded, which indicates quality, under USDA supervision, it will likewise have a tag attached, explains Beanblossom. This quality will be indicated by the letters "A", "B" or "C"; "A" indicating top quality. If the turkey is both graded and inspected under USDA supervision there may be only one tag on the turkey but it will show both the grade and the inspection for wholesomeness. There may be, however, two tags—one indicating wholesomeness and the other grade. You should remember that an inspection tag for wholesomeness does not indicate the grade of turkey you buy.

In addition to suggestions on buying tips, here is a helpful suggestion on cooking. I suggest that you allow 15-20 minutes per pound of oven-ready turkey weight. I also recommend an oven temperature of about 325 degrees F. The larger the turkey—less time per pound

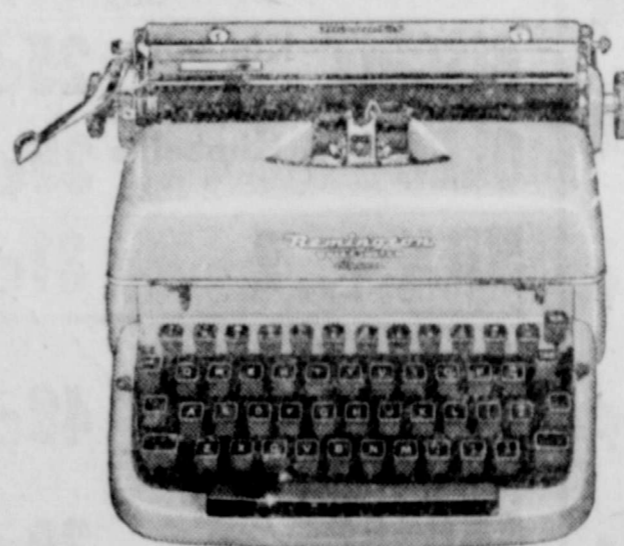

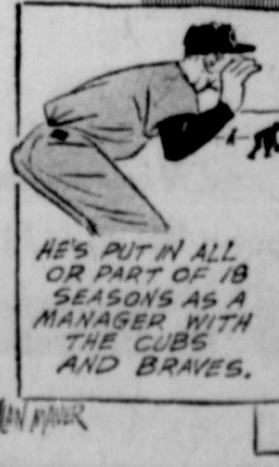

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: The Clerk of the court in which I was born tells me that my birth was not recorded. I will be age 62 next year and expect to file an application for benefits on my husband's social security account. My birth is not on record. Should I do to prove my age when I file my application?

Answer: Although a birth record is the best to prove your age, other records may be used. An insurance policy issued a number of years ago may show your age or date of birth. A family Bible in which your birth is recorded may be used to establish your age. I suggest you ask your social security office to examine any records you may have showing your age or date of birth, as you may have sufficient records. If not, they will advise you of the records that can be used and how you may obtain them; for example, they will assist you in obtaining a birth record. By doing this you may save a delay in getting your first check.

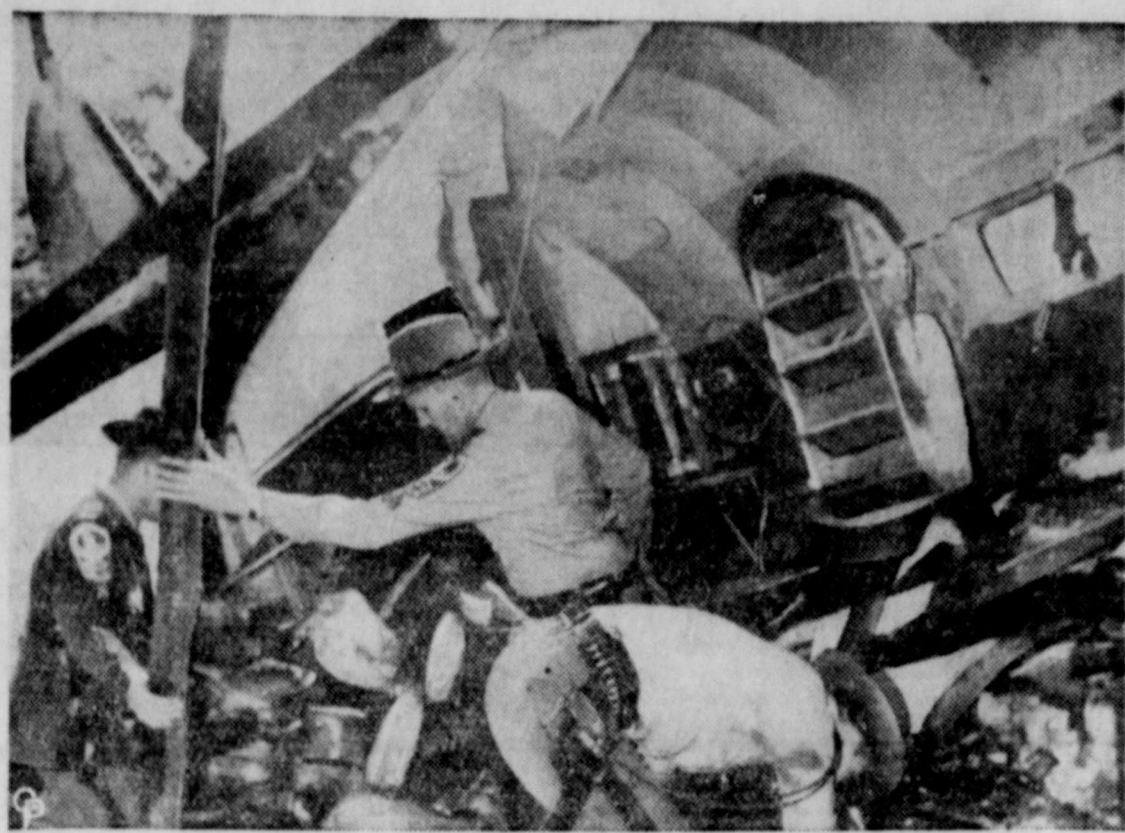

I have spoken of Cousin Jennie several times in this column. She was my mother's cousin. She was 98 Oct. 23. Her father, John William Stansfield, was my maternal grandmother's brother. He was born in Leeds, England, as was my grand-

When John and I visited her last summer a year ago, she seemed very happy there.

Johnny got a sand pile this week and I got a lot of sand to mix with this adobe soil in my flower beds, so we are both elated.

A birthday card of pansies and a letter came early this week from my sister, Mrs. Edna Dwyer. She and the Cawyers spent Sunday, Nov. 1, at Port Lavaca with my grandchildren, Marilyn and Tommy Sheffield and their daughters, Brenda and Becky. They had attended church and had a good dinner and she was still happy over the visit.

Today the postman came to my door and delivered me a package from Merced, California. It was addressed to Ebony, Brown County, but it reached me all right today. It is a birth-

day present. Tomorrow, Nov. 7, is my birthday. It is a box of homemade candy-covered walnut meats, and they are delicious. And since tomorrow is my 79th birthday, would it be all right to quote the note that came with it: Dear Mrs. Briley: This letter will come as a surprise to you because you do not know either of us, however, by reading your weekly column in the Brownwood Banner not too long ago, we feel that we know you. The friendly and charming way in which you wrote of your friends and neighbors gave us many delightful moments of reading, and to show our appreciation we are sending this little birthday gift. Hunters Asked To Save Hides For Hospitals

AUSTIN, (Spec.) — Operation "deer hide" will be in effect again this year, it has been announced by the director of information of the Game and Fish Commission.

Hunters are asked to save their deer hides for use of hospital patients. Formerly they were sent only to tubercular hospitals, but this year they will be made available for patients in mental hospitals and special schools.

Wherever possible the hides should be sent to L. M. Rathbone, Austin taxidermist, who will handle them out to the tanneries. Hunters should rub salt on the green hides before sending them in. If the hides cannot be delivered direct to the taxidermist they should be left with the nearest frozen food locker plant. These locker plants then will route them to Austin over motor freight lines which have agreed to handle them when they are marked "charity."

On hides west of the Pecos, they should be routed to the Russell Williams Frozen Food locker on N. Grand Street, Odessa. From there they will be picked up by Omar Drilling of San Angelo and routed into Austin.

From Austin they will go to the tanneries, and then be sent to the hospitals for use of patients in handcrafting.

The entire operation is on a cost-free basis, under direction of the Board of Hospitals and Special Schools.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am a wage earner and I expect to retire in January and apply for my social security benefits. In addition to proof of my age and my social security number, what other records should I take with me when I apply?

Answer: You should take the names and addresses of all your employers during the past 12 months. Also, be sure to take with you your withholding tax statements, Forms W-2, for 1959. You will receive your first benefit check sooner if you have necessary proofs readily available.

Question: I am a self-employed worker, and I plan to retire in March, 1960. When should I go to the social security office and what should I take with me?

Answer: You should visit your social security office in January or February and you should have information on your 1959 earnings. Have your Federal Income Tax Form 1040, along with an extra copy of your Schedule "C" and the receipt or cancelled check showing payment of the social security tax. Take some proof of your age with you—your birth or baptismal certificate is best, but an old insurance policy, family Bible and other old documents may be used.

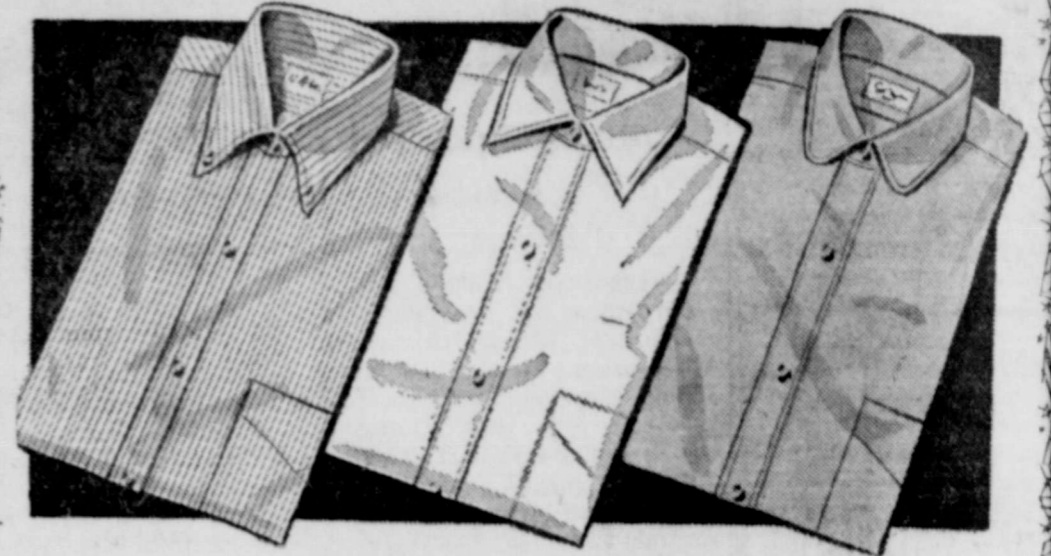
