At the sale on Monday of this week a total of 1,500 head passed through the auction ring. The following next week there will be one sale day a week for sheep and goats both selling on Friday.

## Mills County Road 574 Contract Let

Contract for 9.1 miles of road on Farm Road 574 in Mills County has been awarded to the San Antonio firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

B. Zachry submitted the bid of \$198,313 on the proposed construction of grading and drainage structures, from Farm Road 574 north of Colorado River to Ridge is expected to require 175 working days, according to Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Austin.

M. Arthur, Resident Engineer at Goldthwaite will be in charge of the project which is under construction.

## City Employs Financial Advisor

The city council meeting in special called session last week employed a fiscal agent, or financial advisor, to work with the city and engineering firm as plans move forward on the preliminary water survey that is underway.

First Of Texas Corporation, Fort Worth, was retained for the job when the city council entered into agreement with Henry Keller, vice-president of the company.

The fiscal agent will start work immediately on preparing a rate analysis of city water and sewer system rate structure and will work with the city and engineers with details regarding financing should the city undertake an improvement program after the engineering survey is completed.

Bob King, representing Joe J. Rady & Company, Engineers, reported to the council on work that has been done during the past month on the preliminary water survey. He pointed out the possibility and advisability of creating a water district whereby the city and a water district would work

hand in hand with any proposed water improvement program. The council discussed the matter of forming or creating a water district and deferred action until the matter could receive further study.

## Committees And Polling Places Announced For Cotton Referendum

Committees of farmers who will be responsible for conducting the cotton marketing quota referendum throughout the county on Dec. 15 were announced today by the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All committee members are farmers eligible to vote in the referendum.

Arrangements have also been completed for establishing polling places in all of Mills County's cotton and peanut growing communities. Notices showing the date of the referendum, the rules governing eligibility to vote, and the location of polling places have been posted in con-

siderable places in the county. E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Mills County ASC Committee, points out that "eligible" voters in the Dec. 15 referendum are all persons who, as landlords, tenants, or sharecroppers, engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1959. Any questions about eligibility should be checked in advance with the County Office.

## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS



It is said that the difference between an expert fisherman and an also-ran lies in one's ability to "read" a river, stream or lake.

Because there definitely are certain choice spots—and he finds them lands the lunkers where the fish lie.

In many instances, by using the glasses you actually spot the fish, and locate the beds and drop-off areas where the fish gather.

There are two other "hand-thermometers" and a wape. A thermometer helps in spring holes. The water-tube with glass in one end is used to determine bed areas and drop-offs. Turn to the wise . . . time

taken in chartering the favorite stream or river really pays off in better fishing later on.

"It is said that he who fishes 'upstream' catches more and larger fish.

By 'upstream,' we mean 'across and up.'

Dry fly fishermen use this method successfully. Why wouldn't it work with other fishermen? Some say it does. They suggest a high rod and a constant retrieve in order to maintain a tight line. Also they point out that spinners, wobblers, small plugs and nymphs pay off in larger fish than do floating lures.

Learn your water and fish upstream for more and bigger fish, they re-emphasize.

No matter how shallow the water, there is ample concealment in weed beds or lily pads, says one tipster. He adds: Often fish lurk quite far back and do not see lures cast at the edge of weed beds or pads. In such instances a silent cast is not effective. Don't be afraid to let your lure drop with a loud splash.

There always is danger of a hang-up. That's when a heavier leader line comes in handy. There is no reason for not attaching a leader to a spinning line—just so long as it is short enough not to enter the spool. It sure does add a safety factor . . . and makes it a little easier to change lures.

It's well to know the depth of the water in which you are fishing. Next time you fish in deep water let your lure down alongside the boat and count slowly until it reaches the bottom. Then when you cast out, start your count when the lure hits the water. Allow the lure to sink freely. But start your retrieve with a short, hard, hook-setting motion the moment your count indicates bottom depth. Many time the lure is picked up by curious fish on its downward float—and he may still have it in his mouth.

**Tips On Monofilament Line**

As spin-fishing grows increasingly popular the use of monofilament line becomes more general. It is true that monofilament offers many advantages. But there are disadvantages too. Perhaps we should say "handicaps."

A knot points up its biggest weakness. In fact if you want to break monofilament line at a specific place, just tie a knot

there and jerk. The line will break at that exact spot.

This brings up these two facts:

1. When you find a knot in your monofilament line, either untie it (which is almost impossible) or break the line, then and there. Otherwise some lunker will do the job for you . . . and you will lose a nice catch.
2. When you tie monofilament to a swivel (or direct to a lure) follow this tie-down tip and you will avoid use of a line-breaking knot.

First, run the end of the line through the eye of the swivel. Next, pull through about eight inches of line. Then, instead of tying a knot as you would with braided line, wrap the short length of line around the line proper—seven or eight times. Now comes the important part—run the end of the line through the loop that formed immediately above the eye of the swivel. All that's left to do is to pull slowly but firmly on the line itself and the wrapped-around portion will slide down the line to the swivel to form a vise-like grip.

Just be sure you pull the line tight and hard, and check to see that the swivel is firmly attached. If you have not pulled hard, then the end of the line may slip back through the loop. In that event you will have to repeat the entire operation. Until you learn the trick you may have to hold the tag end of the line to keep it from slipping through. However, after a few trials you'll find this tying is the safest and surest way to tie on a swivel or lure. Actually it's known as the clincher knot.

Finally, if you want to be doubly sure that the end of the line doesn't slip through—just strike a match and burn the tip of the line lightly. The monofilament will burn until a small but hard ball forms. This ball, on the end of the line, will keep the end from slipping through the loop. So, by burning the excess line you not only make a neater job, but a stronger one too.

A word of warning. Don't let any of the burning monofilament drip on your hands or clothes. It's hot as a poker!

Miss Margaret Reese, a student at NTSC, Denton, spent the holidays here with her parents. Mr. and Mrs. George Reese.

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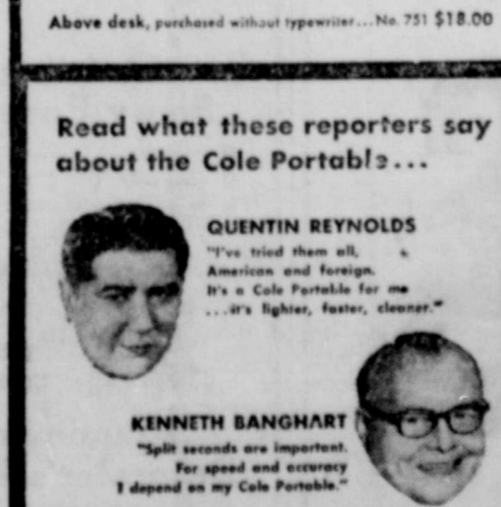

## Postmaster Announces Campaign On "Mail Early For Christmas"

Postmaster Lucile Fairman this week announced her annual "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, and outlined plans for insuring delivery of all Christmas gifts and cards by Christmas Eve.

"Public cooperation," she said, "has been a key factor in moving Christmas mail on time in recent years, and I am hopeful that it will be even better this year."

The Postmaster urged patrons of the Goldthwaite Post Office to start mailing Christmas packages now. Packages to distant places especially should be mailed as early as possible.

"This is also the week to prepare and mail your out-of-town Christmas cards," she said.

Mrs. Fairman gave these pointers on the proper mailing

of packages. "Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with a strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

"If your article is of unusual size or bulk, check with the post office because there are restrictions on size and weight.

"It is also important to make sure that your package bears the correct mailing address and your return address. If you are sending your package to a large city be sure to include the addressee's zone number. Including the zone number in the address always will facilitate delivery in large cities. Zone numbers also should be used on Christmas cards and other mail

to cities with postal zones.

"The address should be on the top of the package, and it should be carefully written or lettered. A piece of transparent cellophane tape placed over the address will usually prevent defacing in transit." "It is also a good idea," Mrs. Fairman said, "to include the address inside the package in case the outside address should become defaced.

"If you use Christmas stickers or seals, place them where they will not conflict with the address. Then, before you drop the package in the mail, be sure you have firmly affixed the proper postage."

The Postmaster reminded that the entire Christmas mailing period is primarily a battle against time. A delay now will contribute to a serious pile-up, particularly in the larger post offices, as the holiday approaches.

All packages going directly to distant cities should be in the post office by December 10. Other mail should be sent on its

way as soon as possible, a local mail should be in the office no more than a week or ten days later. This kind of operation would mean the Christmas mail would be ordered before Christmas Eve. Postmaster explained.

**BRUCELLOSIS**

An all-out effort for the eradication of brucellosis is now underway throughout the United States. Twenty-one states and more than one-half the nation's counties are now modified certified free. Of the 254 counties in Texas, only three—Jeff Davis, Brewster and Presidio—are modified certified areas, according to Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

Cattle infected with brucellosis often suffer a 20 per cent reduction in milk production. They calve on the average every one and one-half years rather than yearly. In addition, the resulting abortions, sterility and difficult breeders increase replacement needs by 30 per cent. A beef cow that loses 20 per cent of her milk production will wean a calf 10 per cent lighter than normal, a substantial loss in these days of high beef prices.

The Mills County Livestock Raisers Association is circulating petitions in the county for the Type II control plan. These petitions need to be signed by 75 per cent of the cattle owners, who own at least 51 per cent of the cattle as shown by the tax rolls.

One of the causes of chronic bloat in cattle is believed to have been found by researchers at Oregon State College, reports Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian. According to their research, he adds, bloat runs in the family.

The researchers kept records on 250 beef calves in the course of the study. Chronic bloat showed up in 7 out of 13 offspring of "bloater" bulls mated to "bloater" cows or to cows closely related to the bulls. Of the regular breeding herd, less than four per cent bloated occasionally.

Bloat is caused by a buildup

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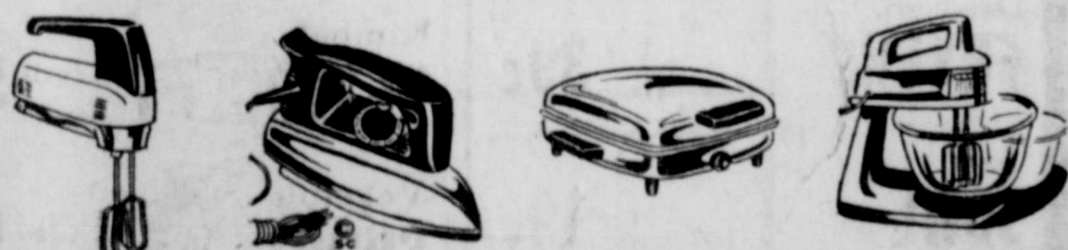

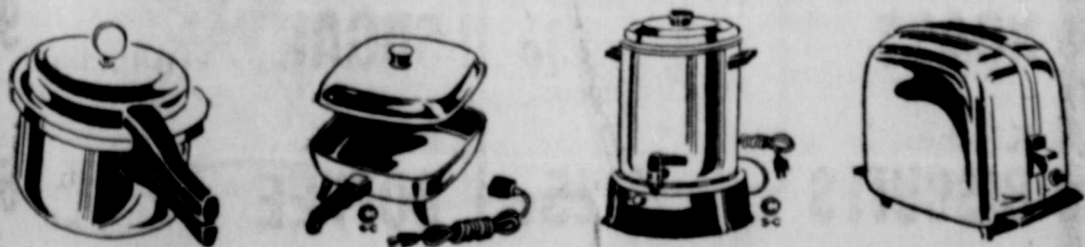

**SCREWORM DECISION**

Despite an outstanding job in eradicating screwworm infestation in Southeastern states — Florida, Georgia, Alabama and part of South Carolina — the U. S. Department of Agriculture has decided against the same type of all-out campaign in the Southwest and adjacent Mexico at this time.

The main reason for the decision is the lack of natural barriers against the screwworm fly in the vast infested areas of Southwestern states and their Mexican neighbors just across the Rio Grande and the international boundary. The decision was confirmed in a survey recently completed by USDA personnel working in cooperation with the Republic of Mexico.

The eradication method used successfully in the Southeast was based on the release of vast numbers of sexually sterile screwworm flies to mate with native females of the species to produce eggs which do not hatch. The flies were reared in a laboratory and sterilized by exposure to radioactive cobalt.

The survey established that screwworms were able to live through the winter in about 70,000 square miles of Texas, 40,000 square miles in California, 34,000 square miles in Arizona, and 1,000 square miles in New Mexico, in addition to several hundred thousand square miles in adjacent Mexico. By contrast, the average overwintering area in the southeastern United States is less than 50,000 square miles.

Efforts to protect the United States and adjacent areas of Mexico from infestation from father south would necessitate establishing some type of permanent buffer zone. On the basis of present knowledge, it was indicated that sterile flies would

have to be continually reared and released in this zone along with constant inspections and control of livestock movements.

The screwworm fly, a little larger than the house fly, attacks only the flesh of living, warm-blooded animals. The fly lays eggs in masses around the edges of wounds. The maggots or screwworms, hatching from the eggs, bury themselves head-first in the wound, gouging out pockets by their feeding. An untreated wound may kill an animal in 10 days.





## Meeting Called For Monday Night To Organize Mills Cancer Unit

Plans to organize a Mills County Unit of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society were announced this week by Dr. M. A. Childress. The first organizational meet-

ing will be held Monday, December 7 in McLean Cafe, Goldthwaite, at 7:00 p. m. All citizens of Mills County, who are interested in learning how they may join the fight

against cancer in their own community are cordially invited to attend.

"Since knowledge is the key to cancer control," Dr. Childress pointed out, "twice as many cures could be effected with our present knowledge, if patients were treated promptly. However, the lack of prompt treatment is due to the lack of knowledge of cancer's danger signals or the fear of cancer itself. Last year, 75,000 lives were lost to cancer unnecessarily."

"In order to protect Mills County citizens from the dangers of cancer, we need our citizens to take an active interest in the program of the American Cancer Society to save lives from this vicious and silent killer disease.

"Our Mills County citizens have a right to know how to protect their lives. It is the responsibility of our community to develop a year-round educational and service program by organizing the Mills County Unit of ACS.

"Through education we can save many lives today and for the future, and through service to the cancer patient we can aid in alleviating the suffering of those who learned the facts about cancer too late," Dr. Childress concluded.

## Cotton Allotment Notices Are Mailed To Mills County Growers

Official notices of 1959 cotton farm allotments are now being mailed to Mills County growers, according to E. L. Burkett, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. The notices should reach all operators of "old" cotton farms within the next few days.

As in 1958, two allotments for 1960-crop upland cotton will be established for each farm, and if marketing quotas are in effect for the crop, each farm operator will have an opportunity to choose the one he wants to comply with. If he elects and complies with the "regular" — Choice (A)—allotment, he will be eligible for price support at not less than 75 per cent of parity; if he elects and complies with the Choice (B) allotment (which is 40 per cent larger than the "A" allotment), his crop will be eligible for price support at not less than 60 per cent of parity.

If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1960 crop of upland cotton, only the "regular" allotments will be available and price support to cooperators will be available at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Mr. Burkett explained that farm operators who elect the Choice (B) cotton allotment must register their choice at the

County ASC office. If the referendum on December 15 approves marketing quotas for the 1960 upland cotton crop, farm operators will then be notified of the deadline for filing such (B) choices.

If the operator intends to grow his cotton under the (A) choice, no action need be taken. Failure to elect Choice (B) will automatically make Choice (A) effective on the farm for 1960.

Allotments are established for all farms on which cotton was planted or regarded as planted in any one of the past 3 years. The minimum farm allotment is the smaller of the farm's 1958 allotment or 10 acres.

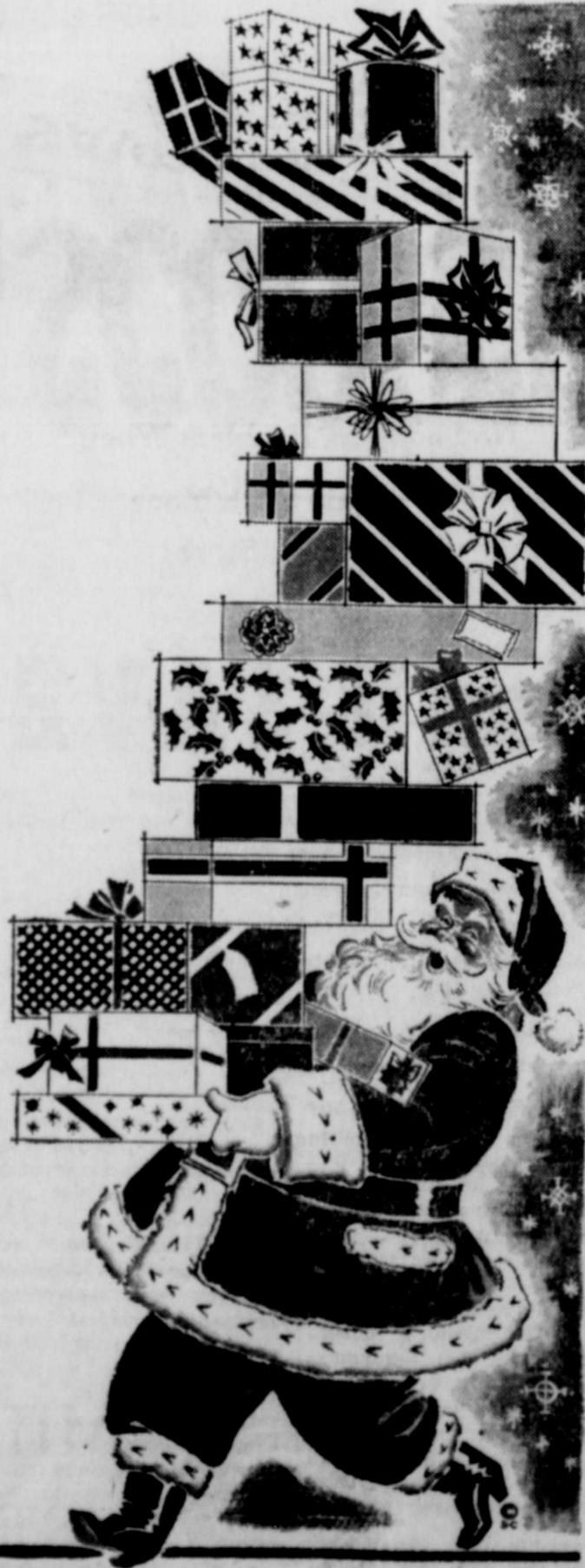

## Peanut Referendum To Be December 15

A national marketing quota referendum of peanut growers—the first in three years—will be held December 15. The balloting will determine whether or not marketing quotas will be in effect for the next three crops of peanuts.

If at least two-thirds of the votes are favorable, quotas will be in effect for the 1960, 1961, and 1962 crops of peanuts, penalties will apply to "excess" peanuts, and price supports will be available to growers who comply with their acreage allotments at the full level of support announced.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose, quotas and pen-

alties will not be in effect for the 1960 peanut crop, level of price support for the growers will drop to 60 per cent of parity. In such another referendum was held in 1960 for the first three crops.

A grower will be eligible to vote in the Dec. 15 referendum, Mr. Tabor said, if he is to share in the 1959-crop peanuts planted for harvest on a farm having more than one acre of peanuts planted.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect since 1949. In the last referendum, quotas for 1958, and 1959 crops were set by 93.5 per cent of the voters.
