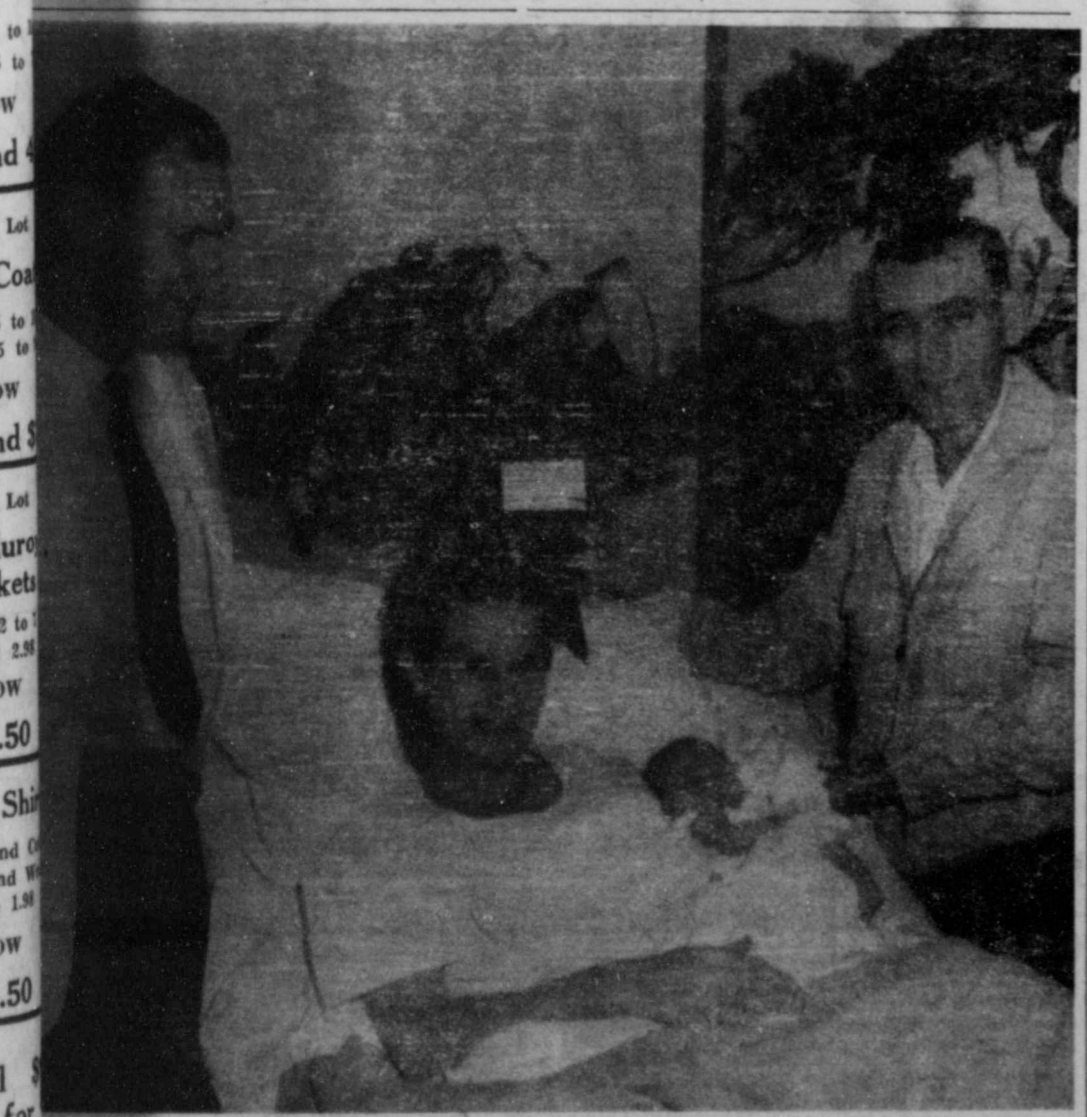
**BENEFIT GAMES**

**ABOUT CITY WATER**—A lot has been said and a lot has been written about the matter of our city water supply, the shortage every summer for the past 10 years and the possibility of providing a permanent and adequate supply for the city for present and future needs.

The mayor and city council are to be commended for what they have done about the problem.

Citizens have been complaining to city officials, — hundreds of complaints every year, — to see what can be done about getting plenty of water for the city.

City officials undertook the problem and went after the answer by employing an engineering firm to make a thorough survey and study of the problem and report to the council.

The engineers made a study of present facilities, all possible sources for adequate supply, estimated cost to develop these sources and reported their findings along with recommendations to the council.

The report shows that present water supply is getting shorter since water level in our wells is dropping every year. And it may play out.

The report also shows that citizens of Goldthwaite can get an adequate water supply for present and future needs if they are willing to pay for it.

Every citizen of Goldthwaite should become acquainted with the facts and study the matter. A number of copies of the engineers' report are available at the city hall. Everyone is invited to get a copy and read it to get the full and true picture of the water study and the engineer's recommendations.

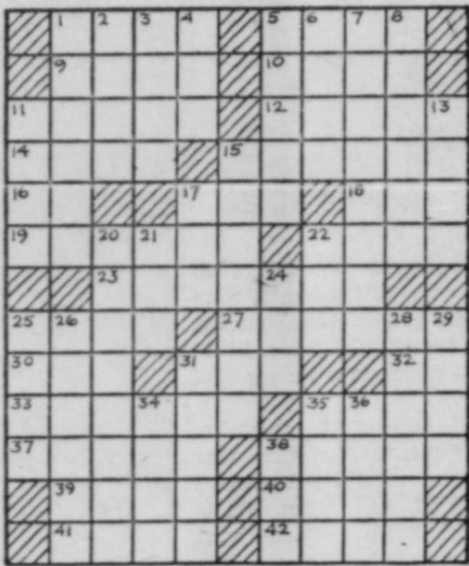

NEW ANTARCTICA TREATY MAKES DIPLOMATS CHEER

RUSSIA FINALLY AGREE TO INSPECTION SYSTEM

WASHINGTON—Western nation diplomats in Washington believe the signing of the international treaty for demilitarization of Antarctica to be the brightest ray in current West negotiations.

It is also the official view of the United States. President Eisenhower, for example, commented, "The Antarctic treaty guarantees it embodies constitute a significant advance toward the goal of a peaceful world."

The treaty provides for long-term peace uses of Antarctica, a continent as big as North America and Europe combined, unlimited inspection by any signatory nation of another's ships, bases and installations.

This is the first time that Russia agreed to an inspection system anywhere in the world. Western diplomats believe it to be the opening wedge to acceptance of inspection systems elsewhere as the Antarctic pact proves its practicability.

Yet, there are signs that the treaty will not face easy ratification when it comes up for the necessary ratification in the Senate.

Some students of political developments surrounding the treaty believe the United States gave away too much in achieving its program for demilitarization with inspection.

Both congressmen and senators are included in a group which holds that this country has perfectly valid claims on most of the continent which would be upheld in any international court.

McElroy also contend that Russia was so agreeable because she had no such valid claim, and agreed to an inspection system in an area where she could not legally have set up military or missile bases anyway.

NEIL McElROY—The departure of Neil McElroy as secretary of Defense after some 26 months on the job came quite suddenly and with an amazing lack of the usual run of comments about the government losing a dedicated and able public servant.

McElroy's resignation had been anticipated for months. In fact, he had been all set to depart earlier in the year but was persuaded to continue in his post during several crises that vague and faded.

The sorry fact is that McElroy was miscast in his role as top man in the U. S. defense effort. He was more a sales man than an administrator. And, prior to his arrival on the Pentagon scene, his knowledge of national defense needs was unimpressive.

Yet, during his initial period as head man at the Pentagon, his stock soared. He was mentioned frequently as a vice presidential, and even a presidential possibility. In truth, no man in the Defense post could have made it a springboard for high political office.

McElroy's term in office opened with the sensational announcement of Russia's first successful sputnik, and the equally sensational failures of the American vanguard satellite program.

In his two years in office, the Russians have widened their satellite and space exploration by three to five years.

The former soap company head was also cast in the unflattering role of having to hold down defense budgets in tough, and down seasons with the service chiefs and the Democratic controlled Congress.

All-in-all, it was an unhappy time for the Defense department and for whomever had the misfortune to head it at the time.

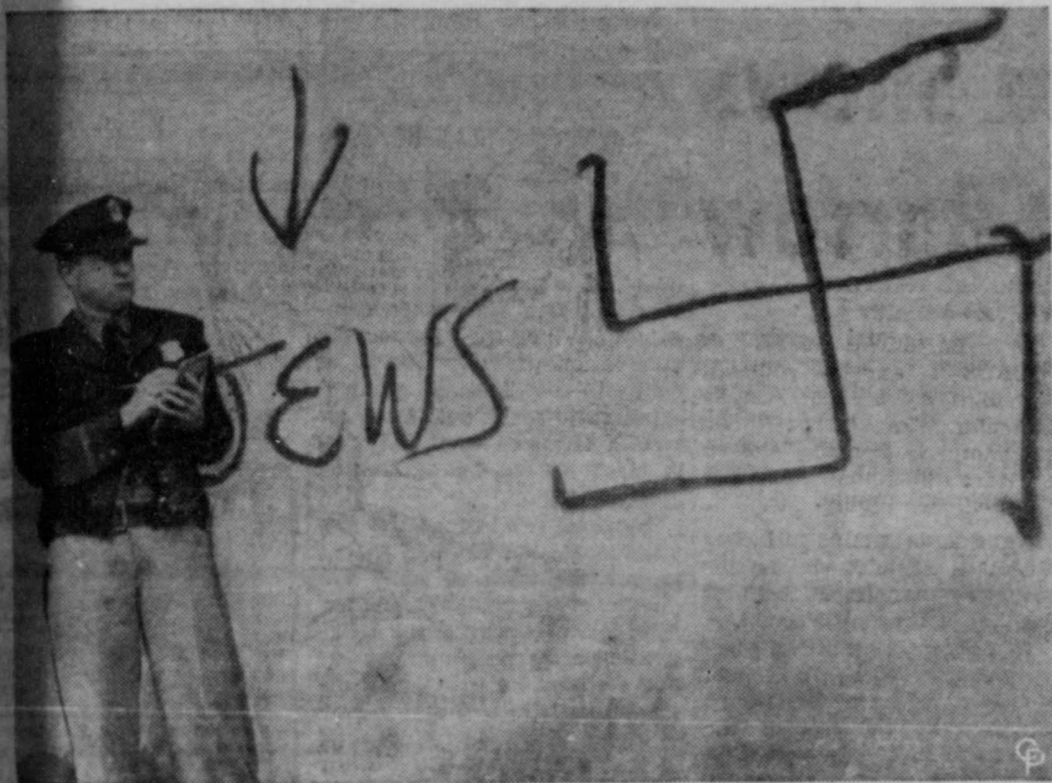

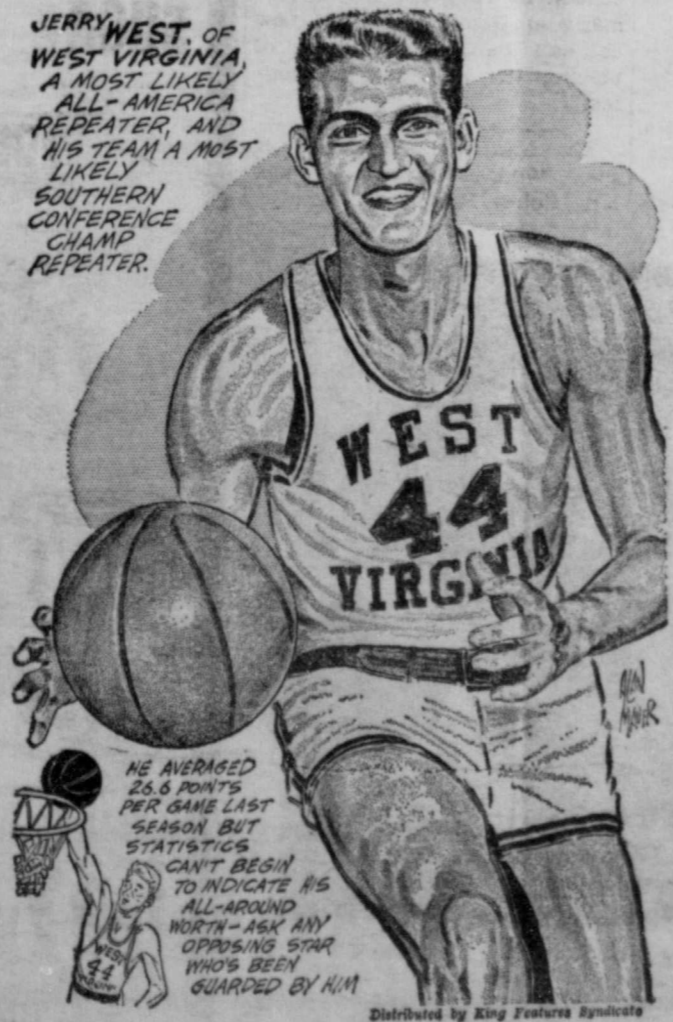

Read the first Psalm.

**REGIONAL MEETING FOR TEXAS**

The 1960 annual meeting of the 14-state Southern Commissioners of Agriculture will be held June 17-20 in San Antonio, and the Texas Department of Agriculture will be hosts for this important session.

The San Antonio gathering will mark the first time the Southern commissioners ever have met in Texas as a group.

The 1960 meeting of the commissioners will be especially significant because it will be held just in advance of the Democratic national convention and will, in effect, amount to a Democratic Party agricultural caucus. A list of nationally prominent speakers is slated to address the meeting, probably including a number of active or hopeful candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Agricultural Commissioner S. E. (Si) Corley of Mississippi is president of the Southern commissioners, and the Texas Agriculture Commissioner is vice president. Membership of the Southern Commissioner of Agriculture includes the state of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

Coming as it does in the

midst of a presidential election year and at a time when campaigning for the Democratic nomination probably will be at its peak, the Southern group is expected to speak out in no uncertain terms on what they feel is most needed by agriculture in their region.

Decisions reached at the San Antonio session may, in effect, become the basis of what will emerge as the planks in the agricultural platform of the Democratic party nationally for the 1960 election. Each of the commissioners is regarded as a party leader in his own state, and their influence working with the collective voting strength of their 14 states cannot but make itself felt in the attitude of the Democratic party nationally toward the urgent problems which now beset U. S. agriculture.

PARENT PROBLEMS

White House Gathering To Discuss Delinquency

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

PREVENTION and Treatment of Juvenile Delinquency tops a list of 40 major "areas of concern" reported by 45 states with committees preparing for the White House Conference to be held March 27 to April 20, in Washington. More than 2,000,000 persons are involved in preparatory work for this conference.

**First Concern**

Of the 45 states reporting, 39 named juvenile delinquency as of first concern. Nearing it were 32 states naming emotionally disturbed children, 29 naming retarded children, 25 naming religious and spiritual life of children, and 24 naming establishing ideals and values in children. Only 10 states named the effect of television on children.

Judging from what the committees have been saying and writing, emotional disturbance will have first place among the alleged causes of juvenile delinquency, while self-control and effective parental control begun in the pre-school years will take last place. Nor will there be, if I guess correctly, much if any emphasis on giving teachers more authority to control children in the classroom.

**Set Some Limits**

Parents of children eight to 15 will probably be urged to establish some limits for these children and to stiffen up home control. Then thousands of such parents will be frustrated, wondering how they are going to carry out this advice, because so many of these children are beyond the bounds of parental control.

What will happen if the conference discusses parents' responsibility for the anti-social behavior of their children, such as vandalism?

My guess is there will be a regiment of experts and leaders

of PTA and other child welfare groups who will strongly object. They will declare that, if parents were fined or punished in other ways for vandalism by their children, desirable parent-child relations would be impaired.

**Excessive Permissiveness**

Because many of the speakers and advisors at the White House Conference have been committed for years to the theory and practice of excessive permissiveness, and have led in spreading this theory and practice, we can hardly expect that they will emphasize early restraint of the tot as a means of preventing juvenile delinquency.

At the conferences that I attended, I heard not a word of this sort nor did I see a word about it in the published reports.

**Home Control**

In recent years, what have you read or heard at your local PTA or other community meetings about establishing home control of teen-agers by beginning effective control of them in childhood?

In the acres of print on prevention of juvenile delinquency, not an area the size of a little garden plot has considered effectively teaching the tot the meaning of NO. Millions of dollars to study juvenile delinquency—hardly a cent to study its earliest apparent source!

**Answering Parents' Questions**

Q. Should a child be forced to play a musical instrument for company?

A. No. But if the company is composed of appreciative listeners, the child might want to play briefly. Thus he will be encouraged to practice his music.

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

**Question:** Why were social  
security taxes increased effec-  
tive January 1, 1960?

**Answer:** Benefits are much  
higher now than in years past.  
For example, in 1949, the high-  
est monthly benefit that could  
be paid to a retired worker  
without dependents was \$45.60  
— compared to as much as \$119  
in 1960. In 1949 the highest  
family benefit was \$85. Now it  
is \$254. A gradually increasing  
schedule of taxes was written  
into the law from the begin-  
ning. Congress has increased  
this tax schedule from time to

time in order to finance the  
increased benefits and the ex-  
panded protection the social  
security program did not in-  
clude at the beginning — such  
as survivor benefits if the wage  
earner dies, cash benefits for  
disabled workers age 50 to 65.  
In raising benefits or adding  
protection features, Congress  
has set the tax rates at the  
level that would assure that  
any benefits due you are cer-  
tain to be paid—both now and  
in the future.

**Question:** My wages are about  
\$5,000 a year. How much will be  
taken out for social security?

**Answer:** On the first \$4,800  
you earn in 1960, your employer  
will deduct 3% or \$3 from every  
\$100 you make. This is 50¢ more  
per hundred dollars of earnings  
than you paid last year. Your  
total social security tax in 1960  
(3% of \$4,800) will be \$144 in-

stead of the \$120 you paid in  
1959. Your employer matches  
this amount from his own  
funds.

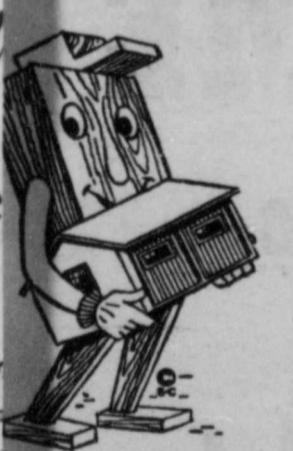

By the terms of a new law, trailers over 4000 pounds will have to have certificates of title for the first time. Titles can be obtained now while there is still time to meet certain requirements regarding proof of ownership and serial numbers. February and March will be a very poor time for handling this new requirement, according to Stubblefield.

New 1960 license tags for cars, trucks and trailers go on sale February 1.
