Bulk Feed Station Installed By Blackwell Feed Company

Blackwell Feed Company is in the process of installing a bulk feed station. The installation is located just north of the feed store by the Santa Fe tracks at Third Street.

Installation of the station got underway about six weeks ago and it is expected to be completed in the next week, according to Al T. Langford, operator of the firm.

Langford stated the station will have 120 ton capacity. There are four 30 ton tanks which tower to a 57 foot height, with five ton hopper scales just below the tanks. The elevator leg of the installation is 87½ feet high.

Feed will be shipped from the company by rail in hopper cars which will be elevated and unloaded into the tanks.

Bulk feed delivery will start with a seven ton bulk feed truck as soon as the installation job is completed.

Goldthwaite will have a new bank building.

A new home is being planned for Mills County State Bank.

The bank's board of directors voted at their last meeting to proceed with plans for the new bank building, according to announcement by Warren P. Duren, president.

Preliminary plans had been submitted by the Architect to the board for study.

Planning a new home for the bank which has served Mills County for over 65 years calls for moving the establishment from the corner of Fisher and Fourth Streets to a new location.

The new bank building will be located on the west side of the courthouse square.

It will be constructed on a lot with 80 foot front just south of Duren Grocery and the Masonic Hall. Three old buildings that have been vacant for some time will be torn down to make way for the modern new structure. Two of the buildings are the former Gartman buildings which have been used for storage purposes. The third and smaller building was last occupied by Bryan Electric Shop.

Tentative plans for the new bank home call for a new and modern structure with the finest banking facilities including drive-in window service.

There will be a 20 foot driveway on the north, between Duren Grocery and the banking house where customers will be served from the drive-in window.

In the building proper there will be a large lobby, private offices for executive officers, space for loan officers, two vaults, board of directors room, facilities for four tellers, book-keeping department, file and storage rooms, equipment and kitchen.

Special added feature will be a community meeting room with seating capacity for 70 persons.

The building proper will be 10 feet back from the front property line providing for planters across the front. There will be employee parking at the back of the building.

Saylor Chevrolet Company is installing air conditioning for the show rooms, offices and parts department, according to announcement by W. G. Saylor.

Work on installing the unit started Tuesday morning and was expected to be completed in two to three days.

Gladiola's Baking Recipe of the Month

MRS. HAVEL'S GERMAN SLICE GARLIC BREAD

1/2 cup lukewarm water	1 tablespoon salt	8 cups (about) sifted GLADIOLA Special Hard Wheat Flour
1 cake compressed yeast	1 tablespoon shortening	1/4 cup melted shortening, Garlic salt
2 tablespoons sugar	2 cups boiling water	

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water. Measure sugar, salt, and shortening into mixing bowl; add boiling water, stir and let cool to lukewarm. Add yeast to cooled mixture. Add about 4 cups of the flour; beat until smooth, then gradually add remaining flour to make a stiff dough. Work dough until smooth; place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and let rise again until double. Divide dough into 3 portions. Roll each about 1/4 inch thick; cut with a 3-inch biscuit cutter of glass. Brush rounds with melted shortening and sprinkle with garlic salt. Stack rounds and place on edge in well-greased 9 x 5 x 4-inch loaf pans (or place on edge, alternating slices so they overlap in center). Cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) about 35 minutes until golden brown. Brush tops with melted butter; remove from pans. Serve hot or cold; may be reheated if desired.

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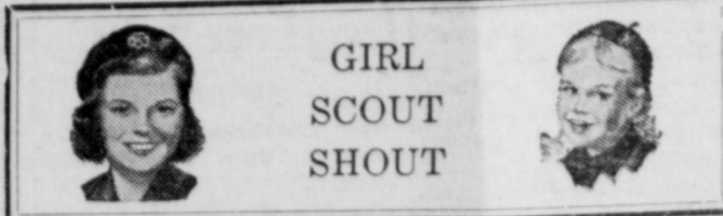

Question: My husband died in March of this year. We had been living separately for several years, but we were not divorced. Can I receive benefits from his social security account?

Answer: Since you are his legal widow, you can receive monthly benefits; but because of your separation, you cannot receive the lump-sum death payment unless you paid his burial expenses.

Question: I am a nurse earning a salary of \$300 a month. I will be age 65 in July and after July, will be working only part-time. How much can I earn after July and still draw my social security?

Answer: You must limit your salary to \$100 per month for the remainder of the year.

Question: I have been receiving social security benefits for several years until 1959 when I stopped my checks while self-employed as a real estate operator because I expected to have earnings in excess of \$1200. My actual net for 1959 was \$1252.
