Billy B. Hale Succeeds Kerby On Mills County FHA Committee

Appointment of Billy B. Hale as a member of the Farmers Home Administration county committee was announced this week by Marlin C. Barker, the agency's county supervisor serving Brown and Mills Counties.

Mr. Hale owns and operates a livestock farm in the Mullin community, and was selected because of his experience, knowledge and interest in agriculture, particularly as it pertains to the family-size operation.

Two other members make up the 3-member committee which works with the county supervisor to see that the best possible use is made of the agency's farm credit service program consistent with local farmers' needs.

The other two members are Howard B. Campbell of Goldthwaite, and Willie W. Marwitz, Priddy. Mr. Campbell will serve as committee chairman during the next or 1961, fiscal year.

Each member is appointed for a 3-year term. Mr. Hale succeeds Mr. Frank Kerby, Route 3, Goldthwaite, whose 3-year term expired this year.

The committee determines the eligibility of individual applicants for all types of loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress and aids the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in this area. Members are selected and appointed so that, so far as possible, different areas or neighborhoods are represented.

The Farmers Home Administration makes annual or intermediate term loans to farmers who need adequate funds to buy equipment and livestock, and longer term loans to build or repair houses and other essential farm buildings, and to purchase or improve land suitable for family-type farm operations.

It also advances credit to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices, and to install and improve irrigation and farmstead water facilities.

Hospital Wing Construction Is On Schedule

Construction of the new wing for Childress Clinic and Hospital is moving ahead on schedule, according to announcement by Dr. M. A. Childress and Truett Auldridge, general contractor for the job.

Foundation and framework went up in record time and the roof of the structure is being completed this week.

Inside walls have been placed and crews are now busy installing sheetrock, insulation and electric wiring.

Auldridge said this week that the job should be completed by about October 1.

Dr. Childress stated that he is well pleased with the progress being made on construction of the new wing, and said plans for financing are moving toward completion also.

Those who have indicated their interest to invest in the hospital financing project and have not paid may do so now.

Approximately \$5,000 is still available to interested citizens of Mills County who care to invest in the program at 6 per cent interest, Dr. Childress stated.

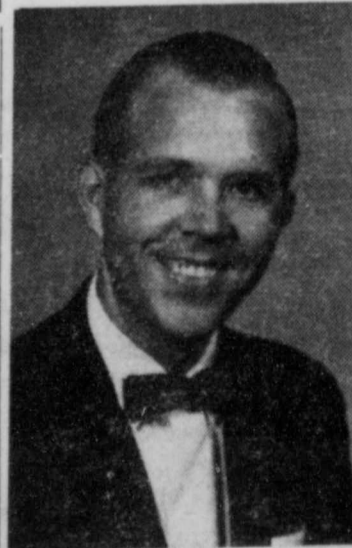

WHAT ABOUT AN AIRPORT?—Sounds like big business when the subject of airport, or landing strip, is being discussed in a small city like Goldthwaite, but it is being discussed just the same.

The Editor has been approached several times recently with the subject of a landing strip for Goldthwaite and Mills County.

A lot of cities and counties throughout the state do have an airport. Many who are not financially able to have or maintain an airport do have and maintain a landing strip.

There wouldn't be too many people in Goldthwaite and Mills County who would own and maintain a plane, but there would be some, if facilities were here.

Then there would also be some use made by those from other places who have their private planes and do much of their business by air travel.

It's something to think about.

WHO ARE YOU WORKING FOR?—Suppose you earn \$4,500 a year, and put in a 40-hour week.

If that's your situation, said the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, you work all day Monday and until 1:45 p. m. Tuesday without making any money for yourself. The money you earn in that time all goes to the government in taxes.

If you earn more than \$4,500 a year the amount of your time given to the tax collector rapidly and progressively increases. And if you get into the really big income brackets, very little of your working time results in take-home pay for you.

It's commonly said and believed that defense costs are almost solely responsible for the present burden of taxation and the size of the federal budgets. But the fact remains that, in the 1955-61 period, defense costs rose only 12 per cent, while non-defense items rose 43 per cent.

As the survey sees the situation, "If we Americans spent more time trying to get our tax money spent wisely, we'd have enough money left to make us happy—and not the raft of worries caused by the lack of it."

WHAT ABOUT TAXI SERVICE?—Yes, what about taxi service in Goldthwaite?

That subject has come up a number of times for discussion. Some feel that there would be little or no need for taxi service in a small town. Others feel there is a definite need for it.

Those who feel there is little need say most everyone has a car and no one would use a taxi even if it was available.

The ones who feel there is a need for taxi service say that it would be used, especially by a number of our Senior Citizens. Something else to think about.

A LOOK BACK—We pride ourselves on being a forward looking people. We foresee a time in which life will be happier, healthier, richer, and more productive. We all hope that the world in which our children will live out their lives will be a better one than ours.

At the same time, it is the part of wisdom to look back—if only to recall some of the words that were said long ago by men who helped make this nation. For instance, there is this: "I place economy among the first and most important virtues, and the public debt as the greatest of dangers to be feared. To preserve our independence, we must not let our rulers load us with perpetual debt."

"We must make our choice between economy and liberty, or profusion and servitude. If we run into such debts, we must be taxed in our meat and drink, in our necessities and in our comforts, in our labors and in our amusements. If we can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people under the pretense of caring for them, they will be happy."

That was said by Thomas Jefferson, whose contribution to the American system of government was, perhaps, greater than that of any other single man. The language is archaic, but the principle is crystal clear. We have gone a grimly long distance in violating his doctrine. The question is whether we shall have the resolution, the strength, and the wisdom, to change our national way before it is too late.

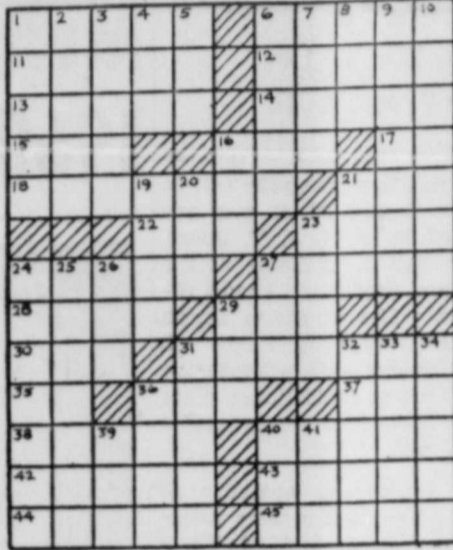

CENSUS WILL CAUSE POLITICAL HEADACHES

SOME CAPITOL HINGE ON REAPPORTIONMENT

WASHINGTON—To professional politicians at the state level there is an added and important element in this year's national elections.

Political leaders traditionally have thought in terms of winning or retaining control in their cities, counties or states, as the case may be. They want to have a winner in the White House, too, for this brings added benefits in the way of patronage, contract jobs, etc.

However, 1960 is a census year, and that means that population shifts will result in additions and subtractions for many states. The number of congressmen they will have representing them in Washington.

The actual reapportionment is made by the state legislature after the state's total number of congressmen becomes known. The reapportionment must be accomplished by the time Congress convenes for its 1963 session. This is the added element of importance politicians which is not normally present in an election year.

More than ever before, state political leaders are looking at the presidential candidates with an eye to how much they can help or hinder the election of candidates to the state legislatures. For a majority in the legislature assures the kind of reapportionment that will tend to perpetuate the faction in political power.

Election district boundaries can be changed to help a party's future candidates by splitting the pockets of opposition strength and diluting them with areas of known majorities favoring incumbents. This is called "gerrymandering," a time-honored practice by both parties, and an effective one.

● ET TU, BRUTE—This might seem strange to the man on the street but some congressmen take their responsibilities so seriously that they set about training their successors—looking forward the day when age or ill health will force their retirement. It's not altruistic, however, as this is one method of retaining an element of political control after retirement from the public arena.

Rep. Alvin O'Konski, Wisconsin Republican, has held his seat in a normally Democratic district since 1942. He has been assiduously training an assistant, Robert Shafer, to succeed him when the inevitable day of retirement comes.

Shafer, however, has gotten impatient. He's gone out and captured the nomination for O'Konski's seat, of the Democratic party. This autumn it'll be O'Konski against Shafer in the congressional election.

This situation hasn't upset either man, however. Shafer still working for O'Konski in his Washington office, and will so until campaign time rolls around.

● NEW FACES—Regardless of the outcome of the election there will be at least 44 new faces in the Senate and House next year. Two senators have died and four others have announced their retirement.

In the House, 10 have died, 25 have announced retirement, two have been defeated in the primaries, and one has resigned.

The oldest retiree is Senator Theodore Francis Green (D), Rhode Island, who holds the all-time record as the oldest member ever to sit in the Senate. The powerful is Rep. Leo Allen (R), Illinois, who is the ranking member of the House rules committee and served as chairman that all-powerful group when the Republicans controlled House.

News Of The Ebony Community

This is Thursday, August 11. It has rained in Beaumont every day this week, yet we have been able every day to get the clothes dry between showers. Last night it rained so hard and so long and there was such loud thunder I thought it must be a flood, but this morning the radio did not even mention it. The evening paper said it rained two inches at the Airport.

The time is drawing near for us to be going home. Marilyn and her family are coming tomorrow night. Monday we want to get an early start toward

home. Haven't heard yet whether it has rained at home. I read in yesterday's paper that the range over Texas was the best in 37 years. Hope Ebony is included.

We have stayed so much longer than we intended that I have had to write Mrs. Effie Egger to read our light meter and send our bills.

Her letter came today and I was greatly shocked and grieved to hear of the passing of Miss Cora Posey of Indian Creek. She died of a heart attack about 4:30 Sunday morning, August 7.

The Poseys were having a reunion at the river at Miss Cora's place. Miss Cora visited with them and had supper with them Friday evening. Saturday evening her niece, Mabel Posey (Mrs. Harvery Byrd of Waco) and Ina May Posey (Mrs. Grover Pierce of Arlington), visited with her. Later in the evening Miss Cora entertained the small children. Read poems to them. She told Mabel and Ina May that she felt better than she had in a long time. But in the early morning hours the heart attack struck. Mrs. Connley (not sure of the spelling), her friend and nurse, who was staying with her, took her to Brownwood to the hospital. She lived only about 30 minutes after they got there. Funeral services were Tuesday afternoon. Burial was in Indian Creek Cemetery. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Will Grady of Brownwood, and a large number of nephews and nieces.

Miss Cora was a most outstanding person. She was outstanding in the gracious hospitality of the South. She liked to cook and entertain friends. I remember well a weekend house party she gave for the teachers when I was teaching at Indian Creek. It was a gala occasion. Just last year she invited us to her house for our Auld Lang Syne Party for this June. It was a wonderful occasion, and I'm so happy that we have that to remember. I'm glad of those few days we had with Miss Cora. She seemed so heartbroken when we left her that I sang her a little love song: "Goodnight, Sweetheart, One more perfect day is thro', Goodnight, Sweetheart, One more perfect dream come true. We've reached the hour of parting. Oh kiss me tenderly. Goodnight, Sweetheart, Close your eyes and dream of me." I kissed her and that was the last time I saw her.

Miss Cora was outstanding in her community. She was deeply religious and was very active in church work. In her early young womanhood a man noticing how she taught her Sunday School class, asked her to teach school for them. She complied with the requirements and opened up school that fall. Someone named her school Rosebud College. I think that was a pretty name. She taught eight years at Indian Creek. She quit teaching because her mother wanted her to. But she served her community all her life. Later she was able to help a number of worthy boys and girls get a college education.

She was not only outstanding in her home and her community, but she was also outstanding in the state. She held the highest offices in the Eastern Star. While holding one of these offices, she traveled from Coast to Coast and moved in the highest circles of the state. For a long time she was State Secretary with residence at Arlington. When I was at her home last June, I saw a newspaper clipping with her picture on it. It said, "Miss Cora Posey, Sweetheart to thousands." As this we shall remember her.

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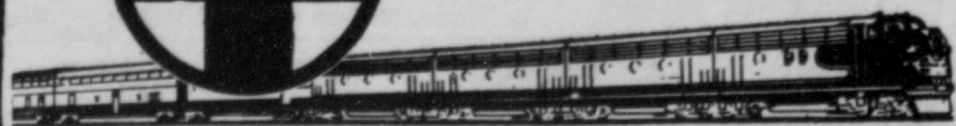

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OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

is a fairly common trout in Texas. But even in Texas, it's the most fit word to describe Devil's in West Texas.

is a most unusual river, the very moment it embarks as a fast-running stream in Verde County, until it reaches the crystal-clear water in Devil's River Lake some thirty miles away.

is a genuine thrill to follow swift-moving waters as they wind through the mountainous country, at the rate of some feet per mile.

is first thought is—"This is West Texas. It's like Colorado or Montana."

True, there are no mountain trout in Devil's River. But there are plenty of catfish, perch galore, and a bountiful supply of four-pound-plus bass.

Most Texans aren't used to fishing waters of this type. In fact, they will find it difficult at first. But when they catch on—watch out.

Fly fishermen will have a run for their money, as the perch scramble for their hackles and hooks. Spin fishermen also find the perch eager for their small diving lures, Abu spinners and midget spoons.

Catfish are reputed to be abundant in these waters, but our angling endeavors attracted none except in the lakes below the river.

But—the big bass—they are the tricky ones. These lunkers stay in well-protected holes, between or close by rocks and underwater ledges.

Biggest problem for the fisherman is that the rippleness of the water is so clear that the fish can see the angler readily—and from great distances. When they spot you they scatter quickly.

Actually, you have to stalk your game here, more like a hunter than a fisherman. You'll do a lot of wading, too. You won't necessarily need waders, as you won't be wading in very deep water, and you'll have plenty of trudging around to do. But you will need rubber-soled shoes that will give you a

good footing on the smooth rocks and in the swift current.

We found our inexpensive Dura-Hyde, low-cut shoes ideal for the occasion. They are made of a synthetic material, instead of leather, and have heavily-ribbed rubber soles. They took the rocks without scuffing or bruising the feet and held a firm grip wherever the foot was planted. Frankly, we were surprised to discover that they were not harmed one bit by the continuous soaking.

Pardon the digression, but shoes in a place like this are mighty important.

Now, let's get back to those bass.

Because of the clear water the fisherman can spot the deep holes in the water quite readily, as he walks along the bank. But, by the time you find the deep holes where the fish abound, you've spooked the fish. So, of necessity, you must know the river.

Actually, one should survey the river for a few hours before fishing, to locate the lunker holes. Then, do your fishing by means of long-distance casting.

That's where the heavy lure comes in handy. You need a heavy lure that can give you the long cast.

Devil's River bass seem to prefer top-water lures above all else. Also, they have their preferences as to the kind of top-

water attraction.

Our host for the trip, Stanton Bundy, publisher of the Devil's River News at Sonora, uses one top-water lure and only one. It has proved to be the most successful lure in this water, year in and year out, for Stanton and his fishing buddies.

Its name? Oh, yes, it's the Bass-Oreno. South Bend makes it. The color of the lure didn't seem to make much difference. However, the green and black, frog-colored lure, seemed to have a slight edge over all others. Second choice was the red and white.

As he uses only one lure, Stanton doesn't take along any tackle box.

To me, this was unique in itself, for seldom have I seen anglers so sold on one lure that they will use it and no other kind or brand. As one who likes to experiment, I couldn't conform to this practice. But I'll admit it catches the big ones for them.

These boys know their waters, though, and they are dead right about the Bass-Oreno for the big bass, at least for the weekend we were there. Not one single lunker was caught on anything else but a Bass-Oreno during the two days of fishing, although other good lures took more than enough small bass and perch.

This points up the importance of listening to the lure or bait recommendations of the local anglers when you're away from home on a fishing trip. You may be a good fisherman. You may know what to do in your favorite fishing waters. But the same kind of fish don't always react the same in different waters.

Personally I always take along a dozen or so lures—especially

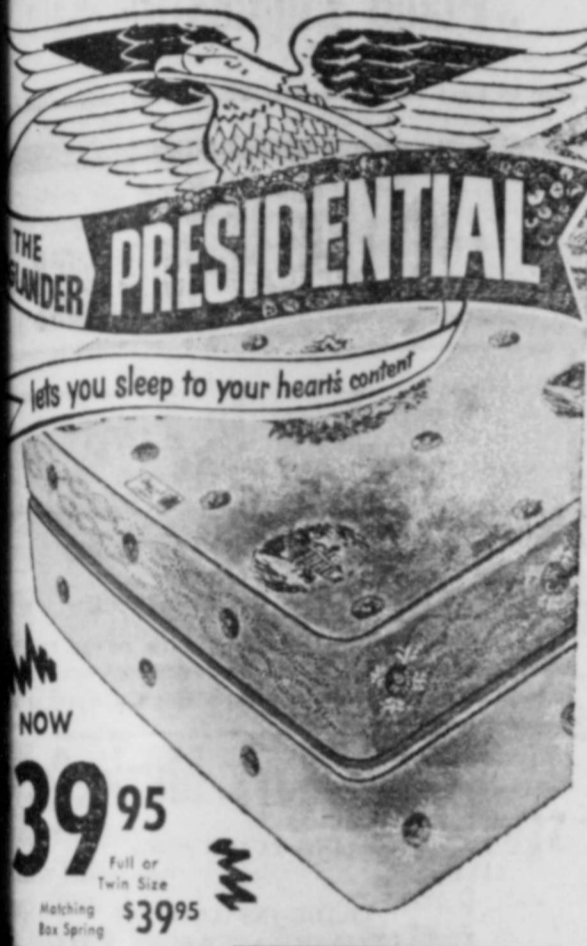

SIX ITEMS ON SEPTEMBER LIST OF PLENTIFUL FOODS

Grocery shoppers will find a lot of broiler-fryers available in Texas food markets this September. They are featured among the six items listed as plentiful for the month.

Turkeys are another poultry plentiful. Lamb, melons, peanut butter and a wide array of late-summer vegetables complete the list.

These foods are selected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for special emphasis in this area because the supply of each is expected to exceed normal demand.

Homemakers can take advantage of the abundance by serving these foods often.

September broiler-fryer marketings are expected to run about 5 per cent more than a year ago. Look for meaty, tender, flavorful young chickens, from 2 to 3½ pounds. The number of turkeys expected to be marketed in September is about the same as a year ago, but total weight may be higher because there will be more of the heavy breeds. Both chicken and turkey provide ideal fall-weather entrees for family fare.

There'll be lots of lamb for National Lamb Week, September 15-20. Slaughter has been averaging about 6 per cent more than a year ago.

Pleasant melons include watermelons, cantaloups, honeydews, Cranshaws and Casabas. The late-summer watermelon crop is expected to be especially huge.

Choice of late-summer vegetables will vary in different localities but good supplies of onions, carrots, squash, cabbage, eggplant, potatoes, sweet corn and many others will be available.

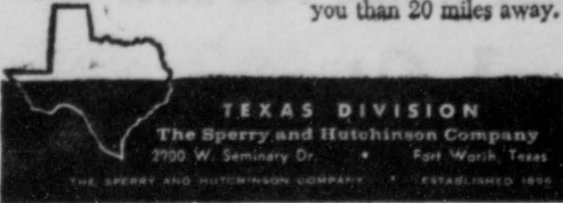
