## U. S. Senatorial Election To Be Held Tuesday

Mills County voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, April 4, to cast their votes in the special United States Senatorial election.

The special election is being held to name a U. S. Senator to fill the un-expired term of Gordon B. Johnson who resigned after being elected Vice-president.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m. There are 70 candidates on the official Mills County ballot. Names are on the ballot in the order they were drawn for the election.

## Proposed Bill Would Help Small Watershed Planning

Small watershed flood prevention work is receiving the attention of the Texas Legislature through House Bill 780 sponsored by representative Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches, Ben Barnes of De Leon and Sam Parsons of Henderson and the companion Senate Bill 393 sponsored by Senator Crawford Martin of Hillsboro.

The bill would appropriate to the Texas State Soil Conservation Board \$75,000 for each of the next two years to be used in paying the cost of developing detailed flood prevention plans on watersheds of 250,000 acres or less.

The State Soil Conservation Board, Temple, Texas which receives all applications for these projects states, "At present we have on file 56 applications from Soil Conservation Districts, Counties, Cities and Water Control and Improvement Districts

one from the county-at-large. County board members are to be elected for a two year term.

Voting at Star, Priddy and Mullin will be at the schoolhouse in each of the respective districts.

In Goldthwaite the election will be held in the Commissioners' Courtroom in Mills County Courthouse.

**WHAT MAKES MAIN STREET GO?**—This week throughout the 50 states some 11,000 editors of smaller daily, weekly and semi-weekly newspapers will lock up their forms and "go to press." Their papers will carry the only broadly circulated written record of the people and events, the problems and opinions that shape our lives in the community, the state and the nation. Their editorial pages provide the greatest forum of independent free expression in the world. The value of this in a country where majority opinion will decide public policies with which we all must live cannot be overestimated.

On the pages of these thousands of papers will run the advertising that gives the spark to the engine of private enterprise. Our tremendous transportation and retailing systems, capable of moving and displaying all the nation's wares, would be of little use unless people knew what products were available, at what cost, where they could be purchased, and in addition, were inspired with the desire to buy.

Advertising makes Main Street go in every city, town and village throughout the 50 states. The head of every family knows that the only way to find the right price for the quality merchandise desired is to compare the advertisements, whether the problem is making out the week's grocery list, buying a new house or trading in the old car.

Advertising supports the radio and television programs, the magazines and periodicals which provide information, news and entertainment and it makes independent newspapers possible. There would be no free press were it not for advertising by the local merchants and industries who support the press but do not control it. Whether you are selling, buying or merely interested in remaining a free informed citizen of the United States, advertising performs a three-sided and indispensable service.

A report of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States indicates that the American people have hardly been niggardly in supporting the schools. We are spending three times more money on public elementary and secondary schools than we spent 10 years ago, and eight times more than 30 years ago. Expenditures will top \$16 billion, for a new record, by the end of the current school year. Putting it another way, we are spending an average of about \$390 per pupil, which is 52 per cent more than the 1950-51 figure.

According to an article in Coronet, this country has the youngest average marrying age in the Western world. In a late year, for instance, 40 per cent of all brides were teenagers. A result: couples where bride and groom are under 20 at the time of marriage have a 20 per cent divorce rate, highest for any age group.

**SHOE ON THE OTHER FOOT**—It is no secret that private automobiles and trucks have been the major cause of lost freight and passenger revenue by the railroads.

It therefore seems ill advised for the powerful Teamsters Union to seek public support for curbs on rail rate cuts and penalties on trucks using piggyback on the grounds that transporting truck trailers on rail cars is costing drivers jobs.

That plea won't get much sympathy from some 450,000 rail workers who have lost their jobs largely due to truck competition or to tens of thousands of investors in railroads who have spent billions of dollars to meet truck inroads.

Piggybacking is a logical evolution in transportation which the Teamsters Union cannot block any more than the railroads could prevent the use of trucks.

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### Questions And Answers About Social Security

**Question:** I will be age 65 in July of this year and would like to retire on my birthday, but since I am earning a better salary this year, would my benefit be greater if I waited until January 1, 1962, to retire? How many years and which years of earnings will my benefit be based on? I have heard that the most recent years are used.

**Answer:** Yes, if you waited to file, your benefits would be greater because we figure your average monthly wage to determine your benefits and your average would, of course, be higher if you worked until January 1, 1962, at a better salary than you had made in the past. In figuring your benefits, we drop out the lowest 5 years and use the others. In your case, the years 1951 through 1960 must be considered, and 1961 would be considered if it would help you. We would in your case use the 5 best years and drop out the 5 lowest years.

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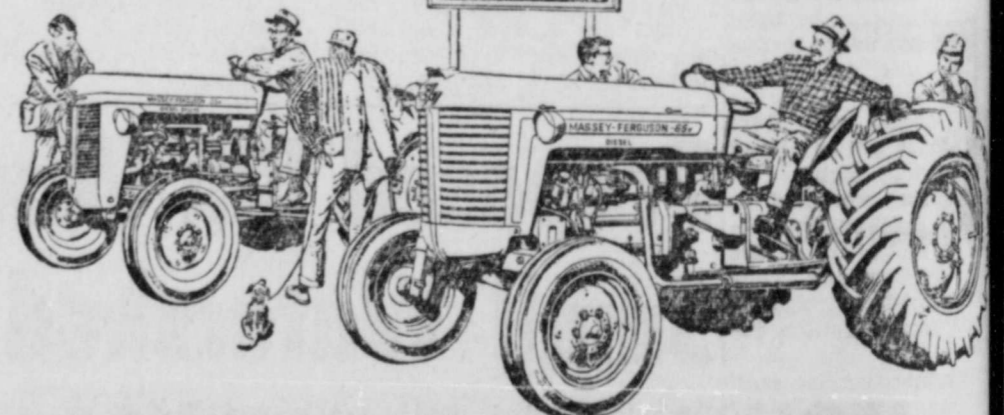

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Texas Senate demonstrated its faith in the future by passing an appropriation bill without having the money to meet the obligation.

It calls for spending \$2,496,685 during the next two years. It does not include teacher pay raises or medical care for the aged. Senators agreed that they needed to know how much new money could be raised before making decisions on these.

The measure calls for spending \$376,000,000 from the already-overdrawn general revenue fund. That's \$103,000,000 more than the comptroller's estimate of general fund revenue for the next two years. This \$103,000,000, plus a deficit that is expected to be about \$63,000,000 at the end of this biennium, adds up to \$166,000,000 in new revenue that would be needed to put the Senate appropriation bill into effect, as it is now.

Panel Okays Teacher Raise—Senate Education Committee approved the Hale-Aiken school improvement program which includes an across-the-board \$800 a year raise for public school teachers.

Sen. A. M. Aiken Jr. of Paris, sponsor, said he would not ask for floor passage of the school measure until the general appropriations bill has been passed as well as a tax bill that would provide money for it.

Hale-Aiken program would cost the state about \$72,000,000 a year and local districts about \$18,000,000 a year. It would set the minimum salary for beginning teachers at \$4,014 a year.

Battle is not over since the differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill will have to be worked out.

Taxes Debated—House Revenue and Taxation Committee is exploring the possibility of raising money through a corporate income tax.

Testimony was heard on two bills. One by Rep. Tony Korioloth of Sherman would repeal the present corporate franchise tax (for a loss of \$48,000,000 a year) and substitute a three per cent corporate income tax (for a gain of approximately \$96,000,000 a year).

Also heard was a bill by Rep. Maco Stewart of Galveston which would levy a 10 per cent corporate income tax, repeal the oil well servicing tax and reduce the sulphur tax.

A bill to provide for a \$1 charge for taking a state driver's license examination was passed by committee and sent to the House. It would raise an estimated \$1,250,000 a year.

Meanwhile, Speaker James Turman, addressing a teachers' group, said he felt Texas was close to resorting to the "last resort"—sales or income taxes.

Campaign Limit Passed—Senate passed 26-to-4 a bill that would limit to \$25,000 the spending of any one candidate in a race for the U. S. Senate.

Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin is sponsor of the bill. Limit would apply to money spent for newspaper, radio or television advertising with the candidate's knowledge. All other means of advertising would be exempted.

Attorney general would be responsible for enforcement.

If the bill should be finally passed and take effect before the present special senatorial race is over, it could put a lid on spending of candidates in the run-off campaign next month.

Firemen's Bill Killed — House killed by a 73-to-66 vote a bill that would have set up a procedure for arbitration of wage-and-hour disputes between firemen and city governments.

Passage was urged by firemen but opposed by city officials. Bill would have provided for

ning teachers with bachelor's degrees at \$4,014 a year.

Horses Lose Race—Before a gallery packed with church people, Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry gave up the fight for a proposed constitutional amendment to legalize horse racing.

House vote against the measure was 143-to-5. Berry, seeing he did not have enough votes for passage, signaled his supporters to vote against it. This, he said, would avoid "putting them on the spot" for a lost cause.

Berry still hopes to get a referendum on the 1962 general election ballot to indicate public opinion on racing and parimutuel betting.

Milk Bill "Skimmed"—One of the most controversial bills of the session, the milk importation measure, was passed by the House by voice vote.

But before passage, opponents' amendments had skimmed off the cream of the bill the dairymen wanted.

As passed by the Senate, the bill would bar out-of-state milk from Texas unless a Texas inspector certified he had personal knowledge the milk was produced under standards as high as those required in Texas.

Amendments took out the "personal knowledge" phrase and provided the milk could be imported on the certification of out-of-state health authorities after a Texas authority had found the out-of-state producer to be meeting acceptable standards.

Battle is not over since the differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill will have to be worked out.

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Passage was urged by firemen but opposed by city officials. Bill would have provided for

an arbitration board and if necessary an election once a year to consider firemen's requests. Supporters contended it would have enabled firemen and city officials to settle their problems on the local level instead of battling before the Legislature, as in years past.

Opponents objected to the possibility of frequent, costly elections and argued that it would give firemen a privilege not enjoyed by other city employees.

"Kid" Drivers Target—House Highways Committee is considering a bill that would take 14-year-olds off the road—as drivers of cars or motor scooters.

Rep. Maco Stewart, sponsor, urged the measure to "take the cars out of junior high school and get the students' minds on their books." His measure would raise the minimum age at which a driver's license may be issued from 14 to 15 years and would set up the same licensing requirements for motor

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

**Question:** My husband and I were married in December, 1959. He has been receiving social security benefits for several years. He reported our marriage to the social security office, he advised that even though retirement age, our marriage must be in effect three months before I could receive his benefits. Has this rule changed?

**Answer:** Yes, the amendment to the Social Security law in September, 1960, reduced

the marriage requirement to one year. You and your husband should contact your social security office, and you should present proof of your age and your marriage.

**Question:** I receive \$116 monthly and my wife receives \$58 on my social security record. She plans to work in 1961 and expects to make about \$1,300. Will anything be withheld from my benefits?

**Answer:** No, but your wife will have \$50 of her benefits for 1961 withheld (\$1 for every \$2 of earnings between \$1,200 and \$1,500).

**Question:** Suppose my wife and I together receive \$110 monthly in benefits on my social security record, and I earn \$200 a month in each month of 1961, \$2400 in the year. What

## TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

### Play It Safe

Never go out in a boat without a lifebelt or at least a life-saving cushion handy.

This applies especially to canoes because of their easy-to-tip-over habit. And in canoeing, always wear the lifebelt.

No matter how well you can swim, wet clothes and wet shoes can pull you under should your craft capsizes.

### Check Trotlines Often

When running trotlines at night be sure to check them at least every three hours.

Rough fish take a good toll of trotline bait—and empty hooks catch no fish. Keep those hooks baited by frequent checking.

### Warning Bells

A turkey bell rigged on the shore line, dangling from your trotline, will save many trips running hooks. The bell will ring when your bait is tampered with. No ring, no rebaiting.

### Retrieve in Spurts

Your retrieve should be more or less erratic when spinning for bass.

This is especially true when

social security benefits will we receive?

**Answer:** You will receive \$270 in social security benefits for the year. It is figured this way. For the first \$1200 in earnings, no benefits are withheld; for the next \$300 in earnings, \$150 in benefits is withheld; for the next \$900 in earnings, \$900 in benefits is withheld. Since you and your wife are entitled to \$1320 in benefits, and \$1050 is withheld because of your \$2400 earnings, you would receive \$270 in benefits.

using a spoon, as the steady twinkle of a spoon looks most unlife-like when viewed by a fish.

Let the spoon dip and rise, slow down and speed up, for life-like action.

### Color and Deep Fishing

The deeper you fish the less important color becomes.

Colors on your lures tend to lose individually the deeper they sink. Red is the first to lose distinction.

So concentrate on plug action in deep water, and never mind the color of your bait.

On the surface, however, color does count, with red and white the most popular. Contrast of the two colors seems to please (or displease) bass especially.

### Try Backcasting

Backcasting is important, especially in bait-casting.

Forward motion is increased by a snappy backcast. Backcasts not only get distance, but also save making bird's nests.

Learn to flick your wrist in a snappy cast to the rear, and then slash quickly forward.

### Improving Cheap Flyrods

Avoid buying cheap flyrods. Among obvious drawbacks is the fact that they do not have enough guides to control the line properly.

But if you already have such a rod, it can be improved by re-spacing its guides and adding a few of your own. These can be bought at any sporting goods store for about the cost of a cigarette each.

### Clear Water Fishing

Clear water is hard to fish. Even old pros have trouble with it.

You can help matters a lot by using patience.

Cast out your plug. The fish will scatter. Let the plug sink to the bottom. Leave it there — three-four-five-six minutes — then start your retrieve.

By that time the fish will have forgotten the original splash of your plug and may go for it.

### Change Dry Flies Often

Wet flies and dry flies are dif-

ferent in many ways.

One important point to remember is that the dry fly loses its efficiency once it gets water-logged. Conversely the wet fly increases its allure the more beat-up it gets.

So change dry flies often and let the wet flies stay on your line.

### Add Glue To Blood Bait

Blood bait is great for trotlines and throwlines. But it does not stay on the hook well.

To make bait that has good sticking properties, take a pint of warm blood (chicken, beef, etc.) and pour in a jar. Mix in 3 tablespoons of casten glue.

When glue dissolves in blood, pour mixture in a shallow bowl or pan and let cool until thick. Cut into short, bait-sized blocks or strips and then go bait your lines.

### Make A Hit With Misses

When a bass strikes and misses, wait a spell before casting out over that spot again.

This is especially true of bait-casting. But even fly fishermen can profit by this advice.

### Summer Fly Fishing

Small wet flies usually are thought of as early spring bait. But it is surprising how often they work in dead summer when the water is sluggish and clear.

Fish 'em deep and slowly in the pools.

### Stretch Trotline Tight

How you stretch the main line of your trotline is very important. Market catfishermen know this and their catches are generally big.

Stretch line tight, so that when a fish bites, the hook will set at once.
