Kerby also showed the reserve champion billy while Cornelius also had the reserve champion doe.

The grand champion buck sold to Arthur Davis, Sabinal, and Mrs. Vera Burrows, Barksdale, for \$750. Mrs. Burrows also purchased the grand champion doe for \$235.

Reserve champion buck brought \$460 from M. R. Waters, Jr., while the third place buck sold to A. B. Wilkerson for \$660 and fourth place winner brought \$550, from Brooks Sweeten.

Total receipts from the sale were \$17,800 for the 158 head sold. One hundred twenty-eight bucks brought \$15,135.00 for an average of \$118.24. Thirty does brought \$2,665.00, average of \$88.83.

Association officials said that this was the best sale to date and indications are that next year will be even better. Buyers were plentiful and the quality of Angoras was extra good.

Second place doe was sold to Dan Parrisher for \$125. M. F. Deens and Son bought third place doe for \$140 while fourth place doe sold to Brooks Sweeten for \$130.

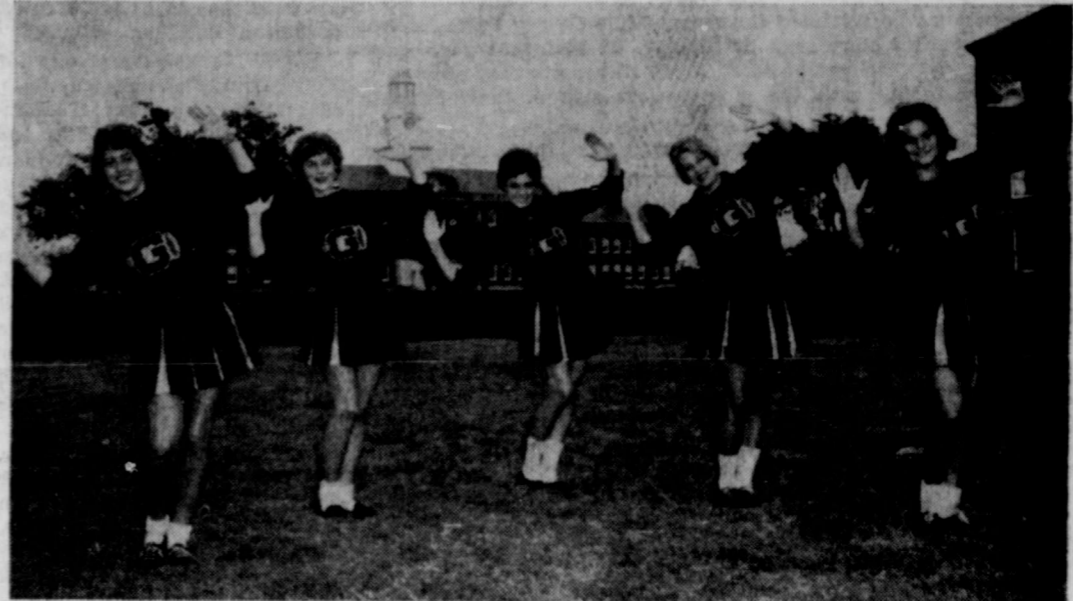

Southwestern Comanche County Quarantined As Anthrax Area

Anthrax, a highly contagious and dreaded disease of livestock, is prevalent in the southwestern part of Comanche County, according to announcement by Dr. Seymour J. Smith, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, Texas. The disease, which resulted in the loss of about 100 head of livestock to date, first broke out in the Petite community of Comanche County during the last week of July. Attempts to quarantine infected and adjacent premises have failed, and on August 19, James M. Collier, Supervising Livestock Inspector representing the Texas Animal Health Commission, issued a blanket quarantine covering that portion of Comanche County from the City of Comanche, east of FM Road to Zephyr, extending to the Brown County line, and west of Highway 36 to Hamilton, to the

Outbreak Appears Under Control

The anthrax outbreak in southwestern Comanche County appears to be coming under control, according to Dr. Ben B. Norman, representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission. No new infected premises have been reported in several days. All recent reported death losses of livestock have been in known infected areas. The disease is apparently confined in the limits of the anthrax quarantine zone.

There have been no reported cases of human infection in this outbreak.

The anthrax quarantine zone is bounded by Farm Road 590 from the City of Comanche to the Brown County line on the West, then by the Brown, Mills, and Hamilton county lines on the South, then by State High-

"May I hope to see you there.

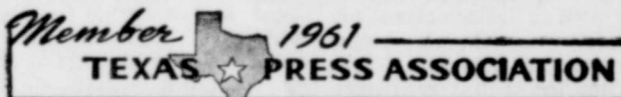

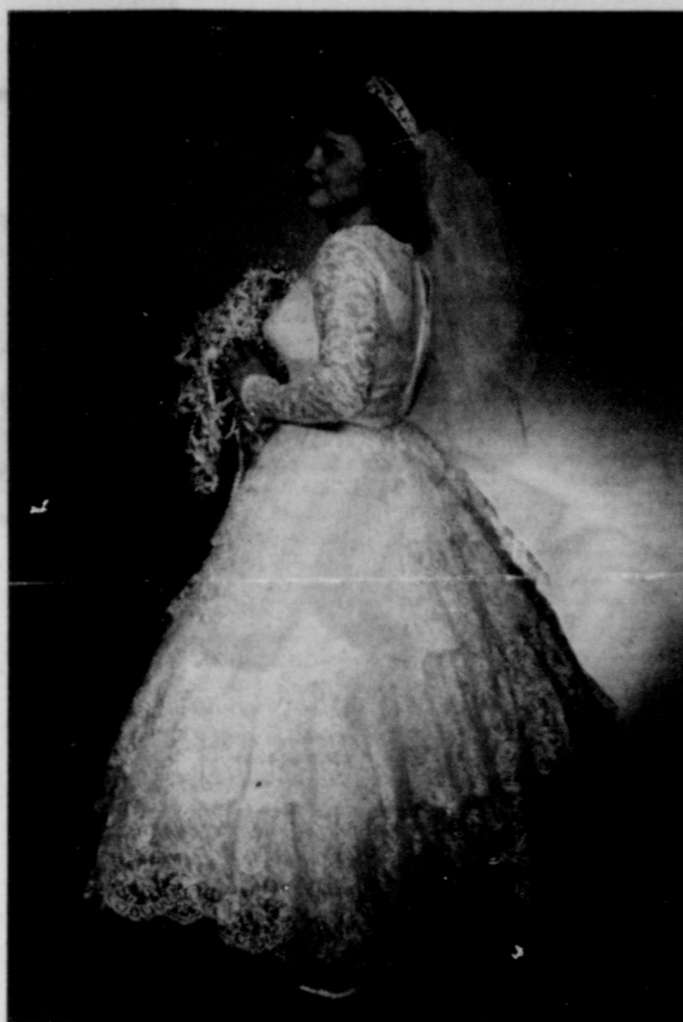
Arlen Graff of Hondo served as best man. Groomsmen were William Grell and Wilbur

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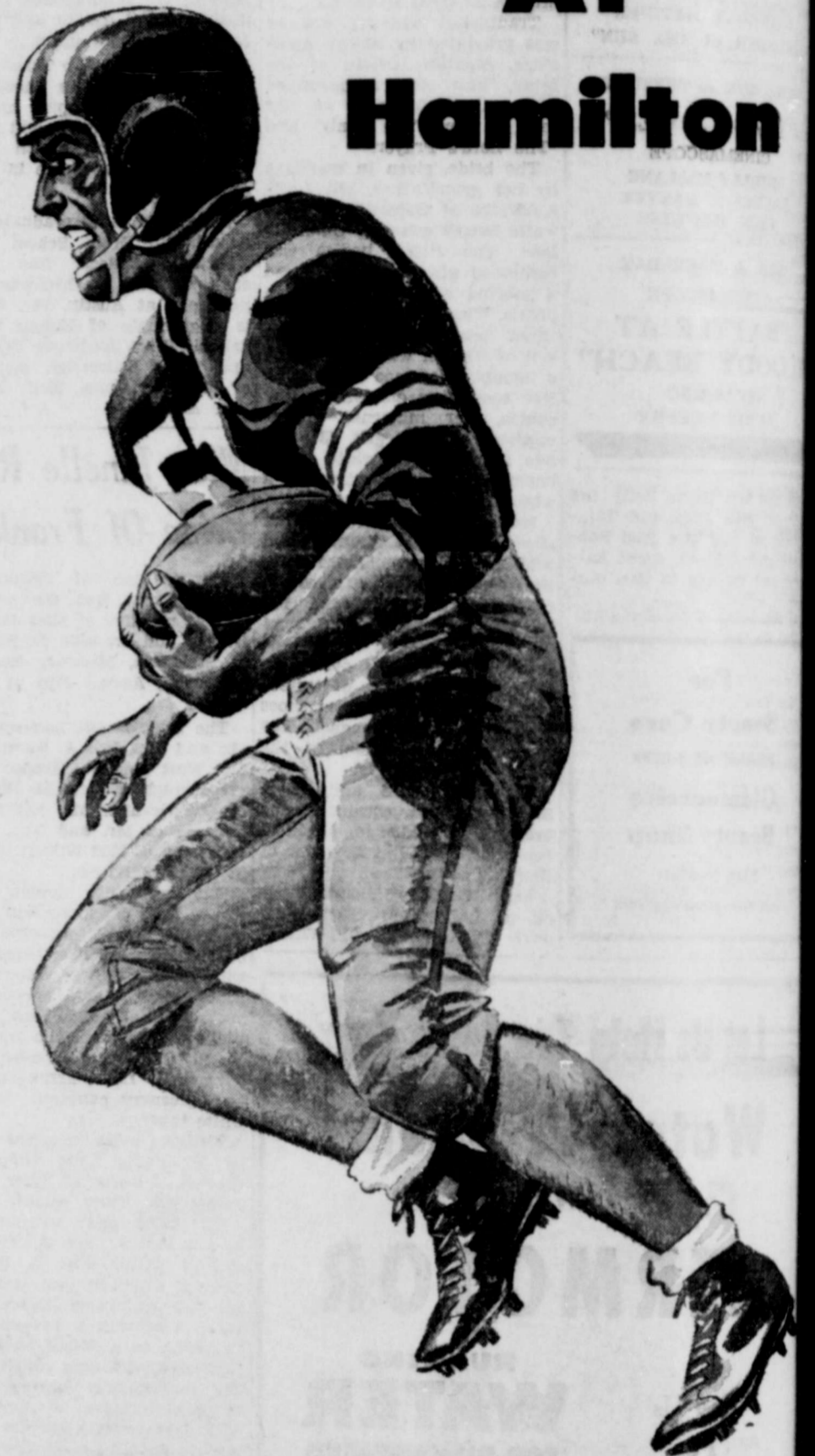

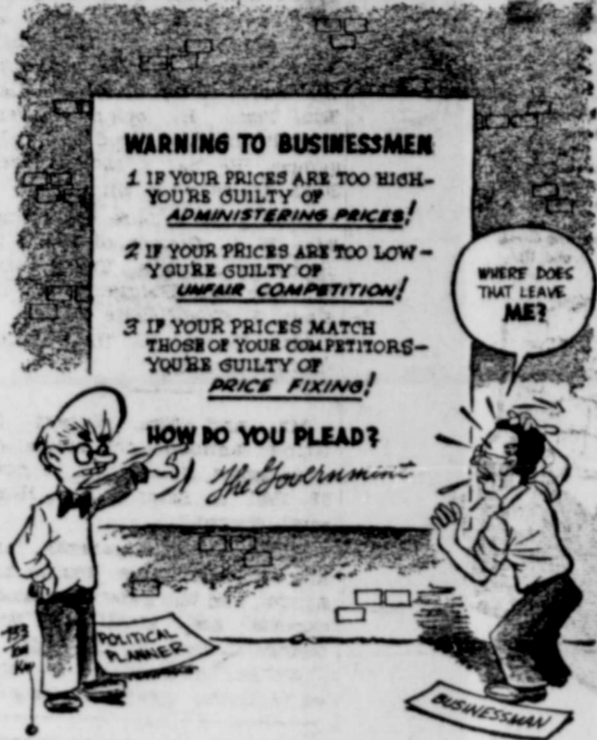

Open Seasons 1961

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—10, Possession limit—not to exceed 10.
WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10, Possession limit—10.
NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—20, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.

TEXAS Game and Fish Commission Austin, Texas

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary," and the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County.

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 8, 9 and 10 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

HOME ECONOMICS BRIEFS

A healthy skin requires a healthy diet. Teenagers with weight or complexion problems should take special note of the foods required for healthy bodies, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A&M College of Texas. This applies for adults, too.

If you have weight or skin problems, why not check your diet? "Food For Fitness," a colorful leaflet available from your county home demonstration agent's office, gives an easy-to-follow plan for balancing your daily food needs.

COTTON ROOT ROT KILLS SHADE TREES, SHRUBS AND FLOWERS

Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas. Except for the Panhandle and High Plains, the disease generally is found throughout the state. It is very common in heavy, alkaline soils. The disease first occurs in south Texas during late May, and is observed in north Texas during June and July. About 80 per cent of the wild and cultivated plants are susceptible in varying degrees. The fungus may live on some native trees and shrubs without killing them.

Small flowers, shrubs and trees die suddenly after the first wilting symptoms occur. Large shrubs and trees may die more slowly. The bark of affected roots is decayed and brownish. Woolly, buff or brownish, fungal strands are present on the surface of the damaged

roots. To check for the strands, place parts of suspected roots in water for a few minutes. Then carefully remove any remaining soil with running water. Allow the specimen to dry for several minutes before making a microscopic examination.

The whole root system decays. Bark is rotted off the harder wood of the root, and roots slip out of the soil with comparatively little pulling effort.

Under moist conditions, with or without affected plants spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surface. These mats are 2 to 12 inches in diameter, at first snow-white and cot-

tony; later they appear tan and powdery.

The disease fungus generally invades new areas by continued slow growth or through the soil from plant to plant. It may live in the soil for many years. The disease is often found as deep in the soil as roots penetrate.

The disease is controlled by the growing of resistant or immune trees and shrubs. Certain cultural practices may help prevent the disease from occurring more often.

For additional information, ask your county extension agent for a copy of L-390, "Cotton Root Rot."

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

... Texas—Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner—after a decade in this name has been synonymous with the Lieutenant Governorship—carries with it major political implications.

... it's a pretty safe bet that the quiet-spoken East Texan will not be in the field of candidates for the Governor's office. Pre-campaign speculation had Ramsey in practice every gubernatorial race in the past years.

... It leaves the 1962 election wide open. At least a few likely prospects all have been mentioned.

... and it puts Sen. Bruce Reardon in charge of the Lieutenant Governor's duties. He was elected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate shortly before Gov. Daniel's announcement of his appointment.

... There could be several "Lieutenant Governors" before the end of this year. This depends on how many legislative sessions there are between now and the next election.

... At the close of the called special session which voted a teachers' pay raise averaging \$810 per year, Governor Daniel announced he will call another session sometime before the end of the year, to act on several matters.

... He said he will submit such subjects as loan shark control legislation, a law to include abandoned property act, juvenile delinquency legislation, and controls over municipal annexation.

... Governor Daniel has announced that he will call another special session before the end of the year. So it will be up to the Senate to elect a man who will assume the duties of Lieutenant Governor for that session. Then another will be chosen for the interim between its windup and the beginning of the next one. An! so on!

... Meanwhile, Reagan is first in line of succession to the Governor's office.

... Ramsey's appointment to the \$17,500 a year Railroad Commission post came as no surprise in political circles.

... Appointment is for the unexpired term of the late Olin Culberson, which runs until January 1, 1963. Then, if Ramsey desires a full six-year term, he will have to stand for election.

... Ramsey joins Ernest O. Thompson and William J. Murray, the present chairman, on one of the most important agencies in the state government. The Railroad Commission not only regulates all Texas oil and gas production, but all highway and railroad freight and passenger rates in the state.

... ANOTHER SPECIAL SESSION ASSURED

... At the close of the called special session which voted a teachers' pay raise averaging \$810 per year, Governor Daniel announced he will call another session sometime before the end of the year, to act on several matters.

... He said he will submit such subjects as loan shark control legislation, a law to include abandoned property act, juvenile delinquency legislation, and controls over municipal annexation.

... The short session, in addition to the teachers' pay raise, also provided additional money for the operation and maintenance of school buses and for administration.

... A law requiring runoffs in congressional elections when one candidate doesn't receive a majority was passed in the dying moments of the session.

... Although the major objectives of the Texas State Teachers Association have been reached, there are more to come.

... These include a sick leave plan for teachers; provision for assistant superintendent units for larger school systems; using average daily attendance, instead of scholastic census, as the factor for determining distribution of the State's available school funds to local districts; more driver education teachers; compulsory attendance for all children, six through 16, for the whole school year; and creation of regional film libraries.

... Incidentally, the \$810 teacher pay raise doesn't necessarily mean every teacher in the state will get such a raise. Some districts already are paying their teachers more than the state minimum. In such cases it's up to the districts to decide whether a raise is in order.

... DANIEL ACCEDES TO SALES TAX

... Governor Daniel filed the sales tax bill with the Secretary of State, unsigned. This permitted it to become law without his signature.

... He said to veto it at this time, when appropriations must be met September 1, "would be disastrous to the State of Texas, its school children, state institutions, old age pensioners, and other programs which are dependent upon adequate revenue and appropriations."

... "It is with considerable regret," he said, "that I feel compelled to permit this type of bill to become law. Among other inequities it contains a limited type of general sales tax which I have opposed for 22 years."

... There is no time to "re-fight" the tax battle, he added.

... SCHOOL BUS PRICES FIXED?

... An anti-trust suit has been filed by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson against 16 persons and firms. Suit alleges that bids on school buses sold to the state have been rigged.

... Wilson said something like 5,500 buses costing \$23,000,000 are involved. Allegation is that those named agreed to "fix, maintain and increase the price at which school buses are sold in the State of Texas."

... Suit asks penalties up to \$3,600,000 for price-fixing acts covering a period from January 1, 1955 to August 16, 1961.

... DO'S AND DON'TS WITH STATE MONEY

... The Legislature says it's all right for the Governor to transfer funds from other appropriations into the Civil Defense and Disaster Relief appropriation if the President proclaims the national safety is in danger.

... It also says he can purchase a \$10,000 limousine for official use — but Governor Daniel quickly announced he would not do so "as long as the state deficit continues."

... Legislature says it's NOT all right for state money to be spent on embossed or engraved printing or stationery, except for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, members of the Legislature, and for degrees and diplomas from state institutions of higher learning.

... SHORT SNORTS

... There will be no more game wardens in Texas after September 1. Thereafter they will be called "conservation officers."

... "Actually," says Howard Dodgen, secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, "they spend more time on prevention of violations than in actually making arrests."
