## Little Politics Talked In County With 1962 Election Coming Early

There is little talk to date of politics in Mills County in spite of the fact that the 1962 primary elections will again be held more than two months earlier.

The State Legislature changed the primary election dates two years ago from July and August to May and June. The first primary election will be held on the first Saturday in May instead of the last Saturday in July. The run-off elec-

tion will be held in June instead of August, which was customary for Texans many years.

Along with the primary election being moved up two months the filing deadline also is moved up from May to February. Until two years ago it was customary for candidates to make their announcements in the paper starting January 1. This will have to be moved up also if the candidates are to have their normal amount of time for campaigning.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

UNIONVILLE, MO., REPUBLICAN: "Can you imagine the Russian workers at the testing or launching site of guided missiles going on a strike for any reason? This difference in attitude between the enslaved laborers of Russia and our own free laborers could be the difference in whether we survived or not."

ORLAND PARK, ILL., HERALD: "If Abraham Lincoln was alive these days . . . (he) would have government protection under the minimum wage law and social security."

"If the wages he was offered were not satisfactory, he would receive a subsidy for rail splitting, another for raising some crop he was going to raise anyway, and still another subsidy for not raising a crop he had no intention of raising."

JOHNS, ARIZ., INDEPENDENT-NEWS: "One of the most interesting angles of the effort of Arizona Public Service to save taxpayers money by using existing facilities to transport power generated at Glen Canyon Dam is the advertising program of the REA companies who oppose Arizona Public Service's offer . . . The angle comes from wondering if the REA people can charge the advertising they are doing, and have done, to expense. You'll remember that the U. S. Internal Revenue Service has ruled that free enterprise companies CANNOT charge advertising, defending their business integrity or field of operation, to expense."

FREDERICK, S. D., NEWS: ". . . political merchants of the impossible know they will be applauded for promising to do what cannot be done. They know that the lack of delivery of results is not going to matter much in the long run, for they trust the people to forget their promises . . . For awhile it may be fun to be fooled. But the fun is short-lived — and when the fun is over, there remains the onerous task of paying for it."

"It is time the American people gave a flat turnaround to the blandishments of the promisers of the impossible."

PETALUMA, CALIF., ARGUS-COURIER: "Any time a bunch of the boys from the New Frontier gather for an ideological session, you can bet that at least one of them will be attacking private utilities. And such language! But come tax assessment time and the boys look the other way. Out here in California, for instance, 159 utilities have just been told that their properties are valued at more than \$4 billion, for tax purposes, an increase of 7.4 per cent over last year. From these properties will come some \$300 million in local property taxes this year to support counties, cities, school districts and other local government. In the momentary silence did we hear a small voice ask: 'How much tax will the Bureau of Reclamation and the municipal utility districts pay?' It's a good question, but sort of a mean one to put to a bunch who are living it up so happily."

DILLON, MONT., EXAMINER: "A recent suggestion . . . urging tax subsidies for newly-weds marks another crackpot attempt to demote Americans into a class of think-not, know-not, do-not clods, stripped of the last vestiges of self-respect, ambition and pride of accomplishment."

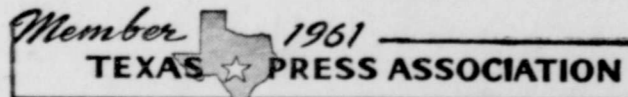

AUSTIN, TEXAS — City officials in Texas got a warning from Chief Engineer John Vandertulp of the State Board of Engineers.

He said Texas had better get moving on its water projects. Vandertulp's staff has just completed a water study outlining ways in which Texas cities and industries could meet their water needs for 1980. Half of the 14 reservoirs now under construction in Texas will be too small to supply their service areas by then.

It is going to take \$1,000,000-000 to build the reservoirs, treatment plants and distribution systems to provide water the Texas of 1980 will need. It will also take planning and working — starting now — to get the 45 new reservoirs proposed by the Board of Water Engineers' plan built and full of water by or before 1980.

Plan is endorsed in most details by the U. S. Study Commission.

**SALES TAX MODIFICATION**

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert thinks it's time to change the oil tax plan just adopted by the Legislature.

Constitution allocates the new sales tax on motor oil to the State Highway fund for road building. Consequently the corner service station man must keep books on this tax separately from sales taxes he collects for the State's general fund.

Calvert plans to suggest to the Legislature that this oil tax be levied at the jobber level, same as gasoline sales taxes. This will simplify bookkeeping and collecting.

Speaker James A. Turman agreed that there are inequities in the new sales tax which the Legislature should correct.

First to talk openly about paying the tax under protest were the vending machine people. They can't collect sales tax on items selling for less than 25 cents, but they must pay sales tax on their gross sales.

Texas Merchandise Vending Association plans to ask for a court ruling.

**LAST GO-ROUND**

Sale of \$25,000,000 in bonds for the Veterans Land Board completes the borrowing by the State government for that program. Voters authorized \$200,000,000 to finance purchases of farms and ranches for veterans.

In the last year, about \$37,500,000 has been invested in land since the program was revived after an increase in the authorized interest rate.

L. H. Page of Carthage, member of the Veterans Land Board, estimated that veterans will pay enough extra interest that the state will have made \$100,000,000 profit on this program by 2005. That is when the last loan is supposed to be paid off.

**MORE STUDY**

Governor Price Daniel asked the Legislative Council to bring its 1958 study on loans and interest rates up to date.

Governor Daniel now seems likely to call the Legislature back into session in January. He wants up-to-date facts on the subject of regulation of interest rates and lenders. Regular session just could not reach agreement.

He will ask also for passage

of a bill extending the new escheat enforcement procedures to unclaimed bank accounts in banks and savings institutions. Speakers James A. Turman appointed a special House committee to make a follow-up study of escheat laws. Reps. Franklin Spears, San Antonio; Ted Springer, Amarillo; Richard C. Slack, Pecos; Paul Harding, Goliad; and Reed Quilliam, Lubbock, are its members.

**CANDIDACY ANNOUNCED**

Texas got the first announced candidate for the Democratic primary next May 5. He is a young West Texan who has set out to be a giant-killer.

Keith Wheatley, 28, of Stamford, announced as a candidate against Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey for the remaining two years of the late Commissioner Olin Culberson's term.

Wheatley, an independent oil operator and son of State Rep. J. C. Wheatley of Haskell, said the little men in the Texas oil business are being starved out by the Railroad Commission's proration policies.

**FIRST RUNNER**

Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock became the first candidate for lieutenant governor in the Democratic primary next May 5.

Smith, who served three terms in the House of Representatives and five years in the Senate, ran third in the 1950 lieutenant governor's race. That was the year Ben Ramsey won the run-off and started the first of his six terms in the office.

Senator Smith, 49, is a theater operator.

**HIGHWAY SPEEDUP**

Faster feeding of federal-aid money into highway construction is reflected by the State Highway Department's monthly report.

As a recession-trimmer, U. S. cash was sent out faster than had been scheduled. On October 1, there were \$325,858,057 worth of highway construction contracts outstanding in Texas, averaging at just about 50 per cent completion.

During last month, highway contractors completed \$18,684,270 worth of new construction. Figure doesn't include the

If you're hunting in a climate where there is a lot of salt in the atmosphere, wipe all metal parts with a silicone dressing. It will protect the finish and ward off rust.

With proper care, a gun purchased today can still have that "like new" look many years from now.

Remember the first gun you owned? You tendered it loving hands and cleaned thoroughly after every hunt session on the gun range. As time passed, you spent less time cleaning the gun. Then, lo and behold, one day you took it down from the rack and discovered rust. This sort of thing usually happens the week before hunting season, and then you have to foot around and get the gun in condition for hunting. There are two ways to clean the gun—the right way and the wrong way. So let's look at the right way.

First, get a good nitro powder solvent, a can of gun oil, patches and a rifle rod of proper size and length. Then disassemble the gun. Use screwdrivers of the proper size so as not to damage the parts of screws.

With the stock and bolt removed, examine the bore. Is it clean? Does it appear to be free of filth? Is it rusty? If it appears too dark, some scrubbing with the powder solvent is in order. Insert a patch on the head of the rifle and soak it with solvent and let it from the breech end of the gun.

It can be avoided, never clean a gun from the muzzle. Last few inches of a gun's barrel are the determinate factor of accuracy. Any damage would ruin the performance of the gun.

After scrubbing the bore, run a patch down the barrel and let both the patch and the barrel. If the barrel is bright shining and the patch not dirty, then all that is needed is several more dry patches covered by one soaked with oil. But if the barrel is still dirty, repeat scrubbing with solvent.

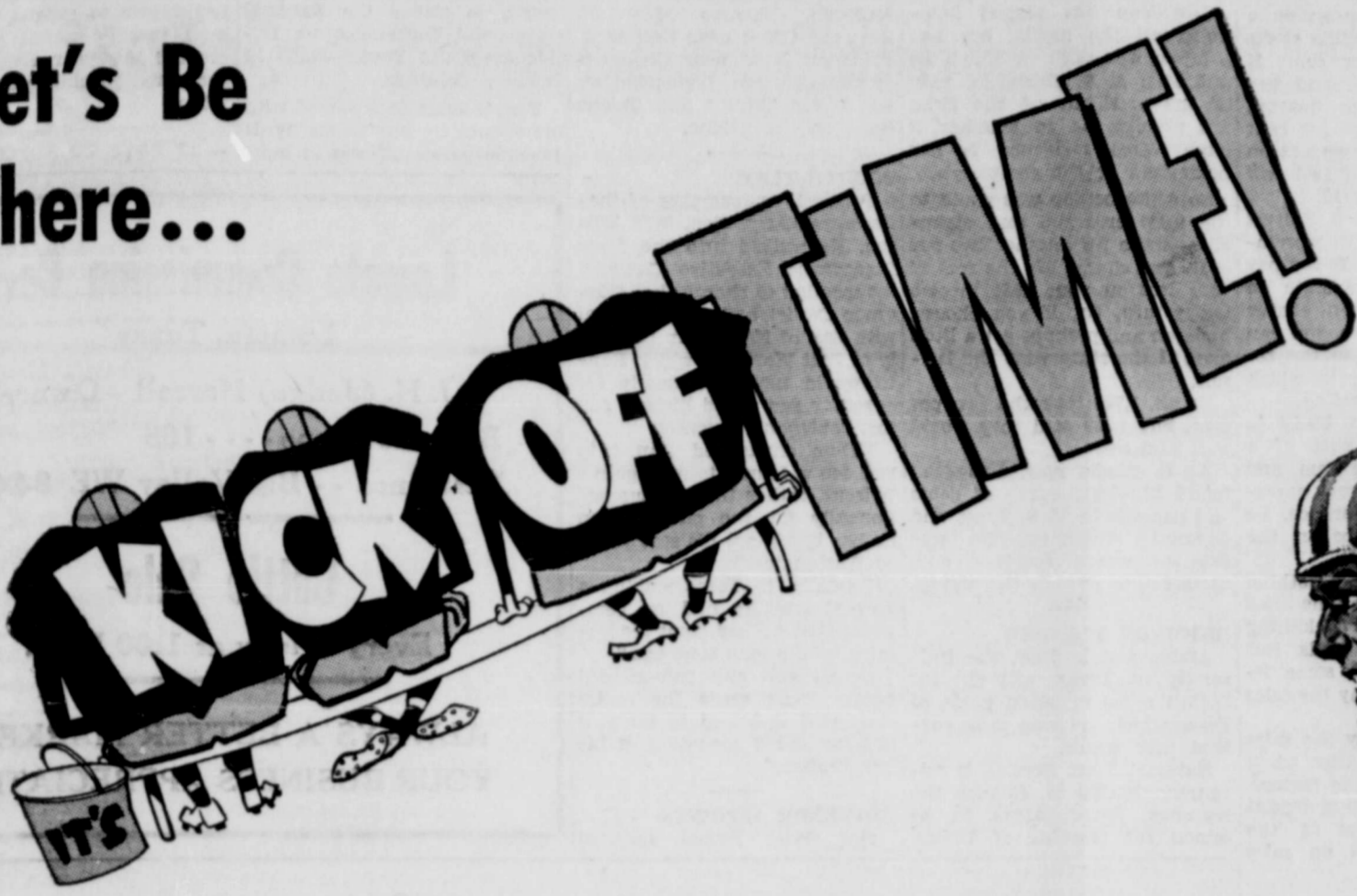

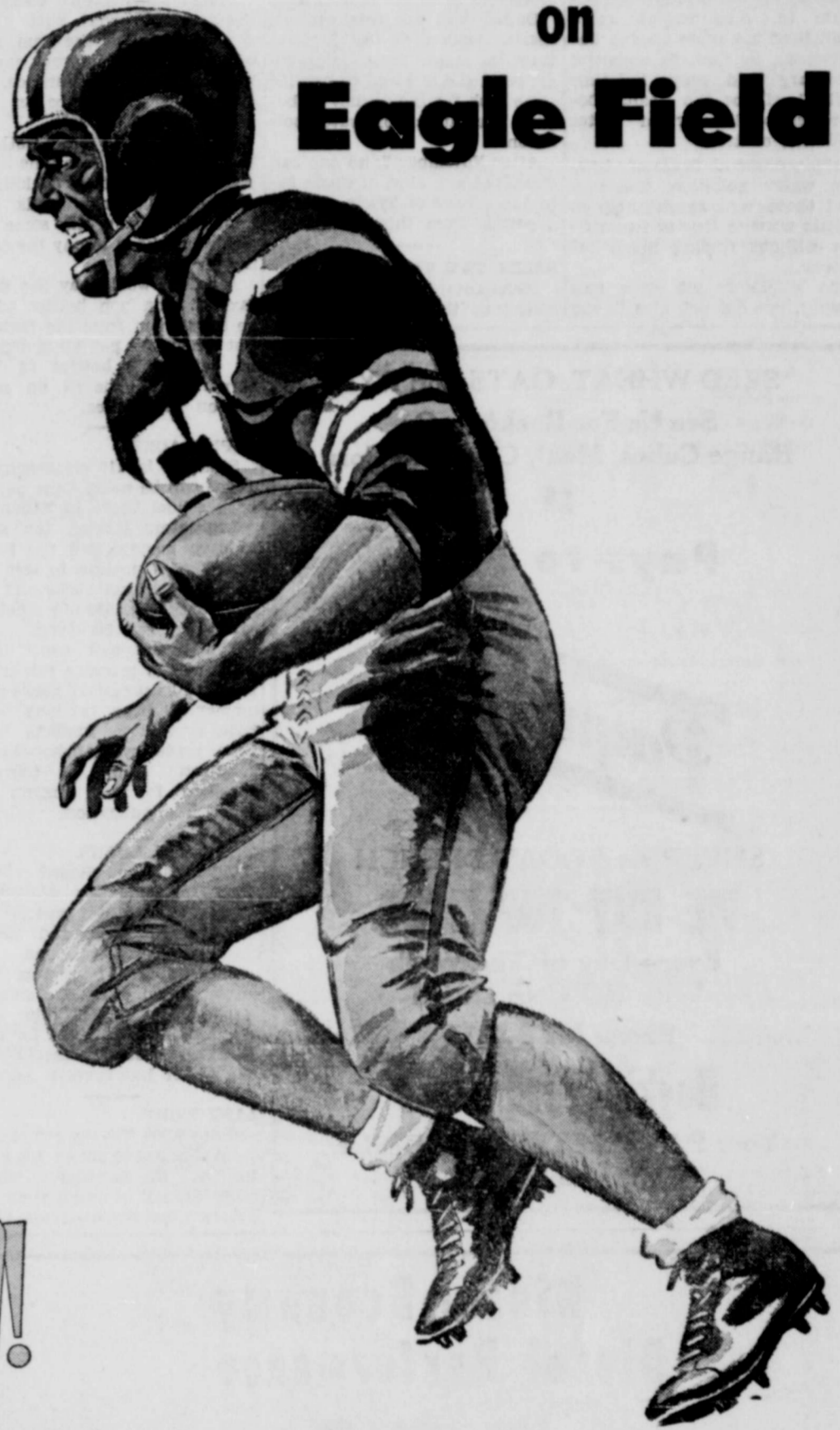

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

### WATER POLLUTION

Governor Daniel will soon name the members of the new State Water Pollution Control Board. This new agency will operate to some extent as a branch of the State Health Department, in that its executive secretary and only full-time official will be the Health Department's director of water pollution control.

Many areas of Texas are having water pollution problems, and those who sought help in Austin went to four or five offices without finding much response.

So legislators set up a new agency, but did not give it any

operation money. It authorized Governor Daniel and the Health Department to allocate part of their appropriations, if they can spare it, to the new agency.

Daniel will ask this winter's special session of the Legislature to make some improvements in the law and to provide some cash for the agency to begin a real attack on water pollution.

After November 7, no one can discharge any kind of waste into the waters of Texas without a permit from this board.

### SALES TAX TIME

Merchants who have been collecting the new state sales

tax will make their first payments to the state October 31, covering collections for September.

Payments will then go on a quarterly basis. Collecting stores get to keep one per cent. If they make estimates and pay in advance for each quarter, they can take a three per cent discount. Advance payments on the fourth quarter of 1961 will be due by November 15.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert issued some more interpretations of the new law. If you pay the sales tax to the state on credit sales, and then charge them off as bad debts, you can deduct the tax on the tax return for the quarter in which you gave up on collecting.

Unless seller keeps books to show clearly what part of a credit sale is for the item, and what part is for interest, carrying charges and insurance, he must collect the tax on the whole price of the sale.

Shirt boards and clothing bags are exempt from the sales tax when bought by a clothing store or selling new goods. But laundries buying the same items would have to pay the sales tax on them.

A bottler would pay the sales tax on soda pop bottles when he buys them from the factory. But when you put up a deposit on returnable bottles at the corner store, there's no sales tax on the bottles.

### PAPERBACKS—

Students in 110 classrooms in Texas will be using some paperback school books in January.

Legislators looking for ways to save money, told the State Board of Education to test out paperback school books and report back by 1963 on whether tax money can be saved.

The board will adopt new books at its meeting November 13. It will vote on 27 books recommended by a teachers textbook committee. Protests have been made by Rancher-Writer J. Evetts Haley of Canyon, speaking for the Texans for America organization.

### MORE G. I. LOANS

Veterans Land Board advertised for bids for \$25,000,000 in State bonds to expand the program of farm and ranch loans to Texas veterans.

Step up in the program was announced by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who said tracts to be subdivided for sale to GI's will be appraised before the owner has surveys made.

### LAST WORD

Some 7,700 Texans got checks from State Insurance Liquidator C. H. Langdeau which brought to 39 per cent their recovery from the bankrupt U. S.

Trust and Guaranty Company. This was the big insurance, investment and automobile sales firm which collapsed in 1955.

Langdeau has almost liquidated all the assets, but has pending a lawsuit in which he and Mrs. A. B. Shoemaker, wife of the president of the firm, are arguing as to whether a large Waco residence is her homestead or the company's.

So a proposition was made to the 9,000 creditors and claimants—settle for another two per cent, and charge off the rest of your loss on your 1961 income tax return. Or, if you choose, hang on and perhaps get a little more if the state wins the lawsuit.

In all, 7,700 took the two per cent, but 1,300 said they would wait and see.

As it stands now, Langdeau found \$7,100,000 worth of debts and deposits in U. S. Trust and Guaranty Company. He was able to scrape together only \$2,800,000 to pay on the claims.

### DIGGINGS PLANNED

Archaeologists from the University of Texas will dig for Indian relics in seven parts of Texas which are soon to be covered with water.

National Park Service is advancing \$60,000 to finance the searches. Seven areas to be mined for remains of Indian

cultures are those to be covered by Sanford Reservoir on the Canadian, Amistad on the Rio Grande, McGee Bend on the Angelina, Navarro Mills on Richland Creek near Corsicana, Columbus Bend near Columbus on the Colorado, Livingston on the Lower Trinity and Toledo Bend on the Sabine.

### FOURTH TERM

Political newsmaker-of-the-week was Atty. Gen. Will Wilson. He walked into the State Democratic Executive Committee meeting to charge that Governor Daniel had made a deal with Sec. of Navy John Connally for Fort Worth by which Daniel would support Connally for governor and would himself run for lieutenant governor.

Wilson challenged Daniel to run for a fourth term (against Wilson), rather than to support Connally for the place "when he has barely got his seat warm in Washington."

Connally, in Texas making a speech, said he had no comment, that he had "quit reading fairy tales a long time ago."

Daniel said any fair-minded person "who reads the entire statement is bound to know it is false and a concoction of his imagination."

### GOVERNOR APPOINTS

Gov. Price Daniel assigned

Dr. James A. Turman (no kin to Speaker Turman), Texas Youth Council director, and Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth to attend the National Governors' Conference on Delinquency and Youth Crime in Denver, Colorado.

They'll come back armed with arguments on why Texas needs juvenile parole officers in more

than just the five biggest counties. That's extent of present program.

Governor Daniel is asking the Legislature to expand the five-man juvenile parole set-up created this year. Kennard has sponsored juvenile parole legislation.

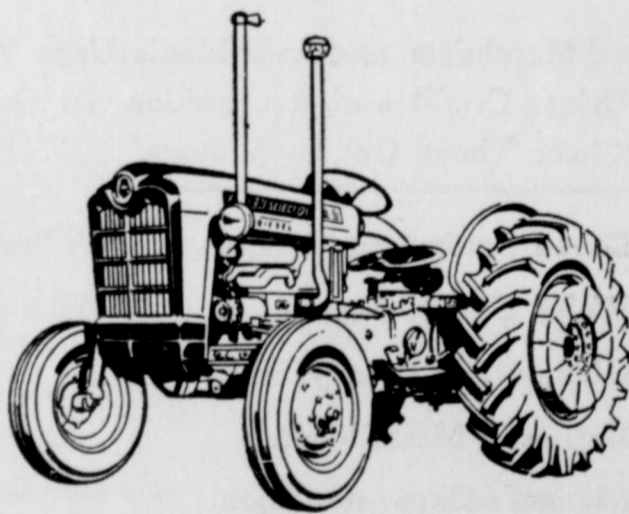

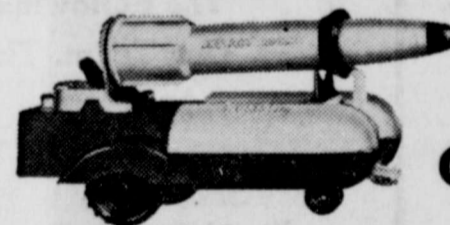

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# Rural Housing Loans Are Expanded

Living in small rural areas and in rural areas, though not engaged in farming, may now be eligible for loans made by the Farmers Home Administration, according to Marlis C. Barker, county supervisor of Mills and Mills counties.

Requirements for rural housing loans. As a result owners of non-farm tracts in rural areas and in small rural communities of not more than 2,500, as well as farmers, may be eligible for this type of credit.

"This program is an important new tool in promoting the development of rural areas," Mr. Barker said. "Rural housing loans will not only help families obtain better homes but will put more carpenters, plumbers, and electricians to work, and will increase the sales in lumber yards and building supply firms."

Housing loans are made for the construction, repair and remodeling of dwellings and essential farm buildings and to provide water for farmstead and household use.

In addition to major construction, funds are available to modernize homes — add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens, and other home improvements, as well as to enlarge and remodel farm service buildings and put in related facilities such as paved feedlots, yard fences, and driveways.

Rural housing loans may also be used for the construction of fall-out and storm shelters.

The interest rate is 4 per cent per year on the unpaid balance of the loan. Loans may be scheduled for repayment over periods up to 33 years.

The proposed housing must be adequate to meet the family's needs yet modest in size and design.

To be eligible an applicant must own a farm or a housing site in a rural area; be without decent, safe and sanitary housing; be unable to obtain the needed credit from other sources; and be without sufficient resources to provide the necessary housing on his own account. He must also have or be able to provide sufficient income to meet payments on existing debts, take care of his other expenses, and make the payments on the proposed loan.

The local county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration will review building plans and inspect the housing construction as it progresses in order to make certain that the borrower obtains sound and acceptable construction.

The local county or area committee of the Farmers Home Administration determines the eligibility of applicants.

Farmers who need to enlarge or develop their farming operations in order to obtain enough income to pay for housing loans may obtain farm enlargement and development loans and farm management help from the Farmers Home Administration.

Rural families who need emergency housing repairs and do not have the ability to repay a loan may be able to obtain small grants for such purposes as repairing a roof, screening windows, and providing a sanitary supply of water.

All loans are secured to the extent necessary to protect the Government's interest. Small improvement loans made in amounts of less than \$1,500 with repayments scheduled over period up to 10 years may be

secured by a promissory note. Other loans are secured by mortgages.

Under certain circumstances building loans may be made to lessees of farms.

More than \$400 million has been authorized for rural housing loans over the next four years.

The Housing Act of 1961 also authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to insure loans for housing and related facilities for domestic farm labor. These loans may be made to farm owners, associations or farmers, state and local government units and non-profit associations.

Funds for these insured loans are provided by private investors. The Farmers Home Administration will make and service the loans, and insure their repayment. The total volume of insured loans may not exceed \$25 million in any one year.

Further information on rural housing loans may be obtained at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration, located on the Second Floor of the Chamber of Commerce Building, Brownwood, Texas.

Isaak Reed, pioneer Baptist Minister, organized the church. Reverend Reed came to Texas in 1834 from Tennessee. He held the first Baptist prayer meeting in 1835 under a tree near the present site of the old North Church. Under that tree there is now a monument with the unique remembrance that "God alone can make a tree."

Reverend Reed was killed by Indians in 1848.

## Advance Pay For Diverting Wheat Acreage

Wheat farmers who divert acreage from production of wheat under the 1962 wheat stabilization program may earn payments by putting that land into approved conservation uses. And the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office now has authority and will be prepared to make partial payment at the time of sign-up, according to E. L. Burkett, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The Agricultural Act of 1961 provides that up to not more than 50 per cent of the payment to producers may be made in advance of determination of performance. This provision is designed to provide income to farmers ahead of harvesttime.

The advance payment that can be made at the time of sign-up is computed by multiplying the number of acres to be diverted by the farm payment rate that is based on 45 per cent of the normal yield, and taking half of that amount. The farmer may receive this advance payment in cash or in wheat.

When a farmer signs up to participate in the 1962 wheat program, he must indicate the acreage he intends to divert to a conservation use if he desires payment. The law requires him to divert a minimum of 10 per cent of what his wheat allotment would have been without new program or 10 per cent of his highest acreage if such acreage has not exceeded 15 acres in the past 3 years. This minimum diversion is reflected in the 1962 farm wheat allotment sent to farmers before the referendum.

The ASCS office will issue the producer a sight draft. If he wants cash, he merely endorses the draft and cashes it at his local bank, or the sight draft may be used to purchase wheat at the market price determined by the Commodity Credit Corporation. Only the original payee may use the sight draft to buy wheat. Subsequent payees may endorse the draft for cash only.

Other details of the program, including the producer's high and low option on diversion and a complete list of approved conservation uses are available at the ASCS County office, Chairman Burkett said.
