## December 14 Last Day For Winter Wheat Diversion Program Signup

December 14 is the last day for signing up under the 1963 wheat stabilization program for farms in the winter wheat area, Edgar L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

"This means that less than a month remains in which growers may file applications to take part in the 1963 winter

wheat stabilization program," the Chairman said.

"Farmers who participate in the 1963 program will be eligible to receive special payments for voluntarily diverting a part of their allotment or base acreage from the production of wheat and devoting that acreage to a conservation use, and they will also qualify for extra price support payments and for the regular price support loan or purchase agreements."

Under this voluntary wheat reduction program, farmers may divert from 20 to 50 per cent of their wheat allotment or base acreage, with special diversion provisions for small farms. The diverted acreage must be devoted to an approved conservation use.

Growers are cautioned, however, to sign up for only the amount of acreage they intend to divert from 1963 production. Failure to divert the full amount of acreage signed up would result in loss of diversion and price support payments, as well as loss of eligibility for the regular wheat price support loan or purchase agreement.

The Mullin Bulldogs beat the Abbott Panthers 34 to 12 for the Regional 6-man football crown last Saturday night before a record crowd in Comanche.

Reeves and Bessent were the star players for the Bulldogs as they tromped over the smaller, but game, Panther team.

Mullin scored first with five minutes left in the first quarter when Bessent went for five yards. The try for extra point was no good.

Mullin tacked on another tally before the quarter ended as Reeves went 40 yards for a Mullin TD after taking a pitch-out from Jimmy Green. With ten seconds remaining in the period Reeves then kicked the extra point and at the end of the first quarter it was 14-0 with Mullin leading.

Early in the second quarter

the Panthers made a touchdown but failed on their extra point try.

Mullin came back with another

touchdown when Bessent raced 60 yards. Try for extra point was good and Mullin led 20-6 with three minutes to go before the half.

In the third quarter the Bulldogs on a pass play from Green to Reeves covered 41 yards for another touchdown and the try for extra point was good. This made it 28-6.

Abbott came back with a score in the same period when they scored from the 40 yard line. The try for extra point was no good and the score stood at 28-12.

The Bulldogs made their final tally in the fourth quarter as Reeves raced 50 yards through the Panthers with two minutes left in the game. This time the try for extra point failed and the score stood at 34-12.

Mullin had 10 first downs and Abbott five.

## GHS Athletic Fund Gets Big Boost When Supporters Pledge \$1,894.00

The Goldthwaite High School athletic fund got a big boost last week when a group of supporters had a get-together and rallied to the cause.

In fact, a big boost, is putting it mildly, when you consider what the group came up with.

The group met at McLean's Coffee Shop for a steak dinner last Monday night and after dinner got things done for the athletic department financially. Attending the dinner were members of the Eagle football squad, coaches, school officials, members of the Quarterback Club and other interested parties.

Those present pledged a total of \$1,894 towards the GHS athletic program with \$1,430 paid in in cash as of to date, according to announcement by LeRoy Beard, superintendent. Beard announced further

that of this amount \$1,225 has been spent for new equipment that has been ordered for next season.

Equipment ordered includes the following: one set of pants, two sets of game jerseys, one set of hip pads and 15 head gear.

Mr. Beard stated that this is just about the nicest thing that could possibly happen to the finance plagued athletic department of the school. It will provide funds for badly needed new equipment and will relieve gate receipts for other necessary expenses.

All funds pledged by this special effort are specified to be used for new equipment only.

Practically all small school athletic departments are in the red most of the time, regardless of gate receipts. Goldthwaite is no exception, and the GHS athletic fund has a deficit at this time.

With this financial help to provide the needed new equipment school officials will be in position to concentrate on retiring the fund deficit and taking care of other expenses out of the gate receipts.

## Type II Oral Polio Vaccine Will Be Given Again Friday

Type II oral Sabin Polio Vaccine will be given again this Friday at Childrens Clinic Hospital. It has been announced by hospital officials.

Children who failed to come in and get the vaccine when it was available at the clinic in the past are urged to come by this Friday between 2:00 and 5:00 p. m. They have taken the Type II vaccine compared to 1,448 Type I when it was given several weeks ago. This vaccine is relatively safe, if not completely, and it is advisable to take it.

This is a preventive health service that the hospital is providing to the public with no intention of making any profit

out of this service. Since it is the only hospital in Mills County, hospital officials have taken it upon themselves to offer the same protection that various organizations of larger counties are providing for their communities.

"We will keep on doing this service every time we feel there is a need for such measures," officials stated.

In addition to supplying this firm, Circle X is also shipping 60,000 pounds of bulk mistletoe. Total purchases will run to about 140,000 pounds. Shipments leave by truck daily for Dallas, where they are placed on air freight.

**White Bass Expansion**

Perhaps the most spectacular development has been the spread of white bass in Texas lakes. They were in Caddo lake, as were the crappie, having reached the lake from the Mississippi drainage system via the Red River.

In 1928, fisheries introduced 28 white bass from Caddo Lake into Lake Dallas. They multiplied fast. From Dallas, they were introduced into other lakes, with the same result.

Except for Texoma, all of the white bass in Texas lakes originated with those original 28 in Lake Dallas. And there were plenty left over to give to our friends in Arizona and California for their stocking purposes.

Texoma's white bass reached there the same way they entered Caddo . . . from the Mississippi via the Red River.

White crappie are decreasing in number, while the black crappie are increasing. That's due to the change in water caused by drainage differences after the construction of Texoma. The water is less alkaline now and more acid. White crappie like alkaline water. Black crappie thrive in acid water.

While we're on the subject of introducing exotic fish into Texas waters, we'd better mention the carp, although some people would rather not.

An Asiatic minnow, the carp was imported to this country in the 1870's and spread all over the nation.

It is now an important commercial fish, condemned by some anglers and blessed by others. It depends on the point of view.

Anyhow, the carp, which propagates fantastically, can get out of hand numerically. It thereby endangers the existence of other fish by consuming so much of the food.

Texas Game and Fish Commission scientists came up with an answer to that problem in rotenone.

They worked out a system of poisoning with a rotenone solution that will kill carp and other rough fish—such as shad and buffalo—without destroying the game fish. This process has been followed on several lakes with excellent results.

Killing the shad is a fine idea as far as sports fishermen are concerned. Shad are fine food

for bass, which often gorge themselves on these bait fish. Then the bass won't respond to the angler's lure.

Remove the shad and the bass have to search for something else to eat. Then they find the angler's lure.

Another fish that has moved around some is the Rio Grande perch.

This is a fish that likes warm water. He can live in your lake or pond, unless it gets too cold. Then he gives up the ghost.

He can live perennially in places where there are springs that give the water a more or less constant temperature.

The Rio Grande perch is another fish about which there is some controversy as to whether he is desirable or not. Personally, I like him. He grows to a decent pan size. He is eminently edible. He will readily grab a worm, when he is of such a mind. And he is as full of fight as a bluegill.

Whether we like it or not, he is here to stay—having found his way from the Rio Grande into more northern waters.

Other importations to Texas have found conditions here not much to their liking.

There are a few trout that thrive in the Guadalupe Mountain streams. Smallmouth bass simply won't do in Texas waters. Northern rock bass have been tried and now live happily in one or two isolated places. Walleyes are not for us.

Everything considered, though, we are in pretty good shape as far as our fishing busi-

ness is concerned.

In addition to the species mentioned above, Texas has the gallant largemouth bass, the tasty and often hefty catfish, the hard-fighting, delectable bream and the rugged, sizeable freshwater drum.

It ought to be enough to make a fisherman happy, just to contemplate his prospects.

But to add to his contemplation, he can think about going to the Gulf Coast, where there are more than 200 kinds of fish. These include the speckled trout, the redfish, the pompano, the drum, the ling, and the mackerel.

Also there are tarpon, sails, and others . . . for the sportsman who wants something really big.

Actually — there are about 450 species of fish in Texas waters, both fresh and salt water. Two hundred or more of these are in the fresh water.

For example, there are 30 species of the sunfish, which include the basses, the crappies, and the bream. There are about eleven different kinds of catfish, including the spoonbill, or

paddlefish, which is not properly a catfish at all.

The spoonbill is a relic of prehistoric ages, found in the lowlands of East Texas. It's valued for its roe, which goes into making caviar.

Also in East Texas is the little pickerel, only representative of the pike family in this state.

We haven't mentioned gars, which some fishermen pursue for sport; and we haven't said anything about the minnows, which are part of the picture, and indispensable as bait.

Yep, we're in a good shape for fishing in Texas and — as we said — it's getting better all the time.
