## 1450 Poll Tax Receipts Issued

Records of the tax assessor and collector show that 1450 Poll tax receipts for 1963 were issued to Mills County residents.

The office experienced heavy traffic of citizens coming in to pay their poll tax during the last few days before the deadline on January 31.

This year's poll tax payments show a nice increase over last year when 1,041 were issued for 1962. Two years ago 1,174 were issued while four years ago 1,566 were issued.

## City Council Orders Election To Be Held On Tuesday, April 7

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night ordered the regular city election to be held on Tuesday, April 7, 1964.

Purpose of the election is to elect a mayor and three aldermen for a regular term of two years.

Officials whose terms expire this year are Mayor Howard B. Campbell and aldermen Ray Duren, Lewis T. Hudson and V. A. Hudson.

Holdover members of the council are R. L. Steen and J. C. Wesson.

Candidates will have until March 7, to file and have their names placed on the official ballot for the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April.

### OTHER BUSINESS

Reports of departmental receipts and disbursements for the month of January were presented to the council by city manager Barnett who also reported on tax collections for the year.

Cable - Vision representatives appeared before the council requesting a renewal of their franchise. No action was taken as the matter was tabled for further consideration until the next meeting.

The council appointed L. B. Burnham, C. L. (Solly) Featherston and Jesse Moreland to

serve as equalization board for tax roll of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1.

Progress report on construction work on the water project was made to the council.

Work on the off-channel storage and the water treatment plant got underway last week. It has been slowed down some due to the rain. Contractor for the pipe line has moved equipment and material on the job and is ready to start work as soon as weather permits.

## Crop Soaking Rains Cover Mills County

What many termed as "crop soaking" rains covered the entire Mills County area during the past week providing much needed moisture to insure a good growing season to start off for spring.

Goldthwaite received an official 2.13 inches of rain last Wednesday and Thursday. This brought the total for the month of January to 3.01 inches.

This week weatherman Harry Allen's gauge measured .96 inch for the first four days of February.

Mills County State Bank will be closed next Wednesday, February 12, in observance of Lincoln's Birthday. This is one of the regular bank holidays of the year.

## Jack McKenzie Announces For Commissioner

H. J. (Jack) McKenzie this week authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for commissioner of Mills County Precinct No. 1, subject to action of the Democratic Primary Election on May 2.

Mr. McKenzie is a native of Mills County and has resided in precinct one all his life. He is married and they have one son, Robert, who is a student at Baylor University.

He has been actively engaged in ranching and for the past 20 years has been doing heavy construction work. He served two terms as a member of the board of education of Goldthwaite Independent School District, four years as president of the board. He also served two years as member of the school tax equalization board.

In making his announcement Mr. McKenzie made the following statement:

"This is my first time to seek a county or precinct office. I have lived here all my life and feel that with my experience in construction work and serving the public in other capacities that I am qualified to serve as commissioner.

"I am familiar with conditions and problems of the precinct and county and believe I can take care of the duties of the office in a satisfactory manner if elected. I will appreciate the votes and support of every one in the primary election."

Jernigan will sign with the Texas Tech Red Raiders in Lubbock and Auldrige will sign with the Rice University Owls in Houston.

The four year football scholarships will provide room and board, tuition, books, fees and \$10.00 per month spending money.

Both Auldrige and Jernigan have chalked up fine record of honors during their high school football careers under Coach Jackie Williams.

Jernigan stands six feet two inches and weighs 185 pounds. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hawley Jernigan.

He lettered his freshman year. Received honorable mention for all-district fullback his sophomore year and was named all-district fullback his junior year. His senior year he was named all-district fullback, member of the super all-central

Texas team, all-West Texas and honorable mention all-state in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram selection. He served as tri-captain during his senior year and set a new record for Goldthwaite High School for yards rushing in a season with 1,040 yards.

Auldrige stands six feet and five inches and weighs 200 pounds. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Truett Auldrige.

He lettered in his sophomore year and received honorable mention for all-district tackle. His junior year he lettered and was named all-district tackle. During his senior year he was named tri-captain, lettered, named all-district tackle, member of super all-Central Texas team, all-West Texas team, honorable mention for all-state in Fort Worth Star-Telegram selection and second team all-state by Associated Press poll.

## Mills County School Children Get Checkup During Mental Health Week

Mills County students from Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy and Star, Schools will get their dental check-up during the month of February in observance of Children's National Dental Health program.

The free dental check-up is being provided by Dr. T. C. Graves, Goldthwaite dentist, with the assistance of his staff members and the cooperation of Mrs. M. Y. Stokes, county school nurse.

The program started this week Wednesday afternoon at the Goldthwaite school and will be conducted at Star, Priddy and Mullin the next three Wednesday afternoons.

National Children's Dental Health Week is being observed during the week of February 2 through 8. In connection with the observance and participation on the local level the following information is presented.

Earl and regular dental care is a standard recommendation of the dental profession. But how soon is "early" and how often is "regular"?

In a national survey, the American Dental Association found that dental patients under four years of age had an average of three teeth needing fillings. The highest incidence of decay occurred among those aged 15 to 19, who had an average of five teeth needing fillings. And this is not counting those who seldom, if ever, see a dentist.

It was also revealed that 80 per cent of the dental patients under the age of 15 who were surveyed needed fillings, while about 64 per cent of those over 15 needed fillings.

Children are highly susceptible to dental decay, as this and other surveys have shown. This is due to a variety of reasons: Snacks between meals, excessive amount of sweets, improper and infrequent toothbrushing and lack of regular professional care.

Home care is quite simple. The teeth of those who eat sweet snacks frequently during the day are subjected to almost continuous acid attacks. Therefore sweets should be kept to a minimum. Brushing immediately after eating will help to remove the sugar before it is converted to acid. When brushing is not possible, the mouth should at least be rinsed with clear water.

As for professional care, a child should make his first visit to the dentist when he has all 20 of his first teeth, normally between two and three years of age. During that visit, he may need no more than a thorough examination, including x-rays, and cleaning. However, some pre-school children have cavities that require treatment.

The child should visit the dentist as often as the dentist recommends, to see that the teeth are growing properly. Contrary to common belief, the first teeth are very important, for they set the growth pattern for the permanent teeth to follow.

Thus by starting early, when a child is two or two and one-half, by continuing regular care, and by making use of such preventive measures as fluoridation, you can ensure a bright future for your child's dental health.

## Barnett Attends Short Course At College Station

W. C. Barnett, City Manager, attended a three day Electric Short Course held at A&M College, College Station, last week. He was accompanied by Mrs. Barnett.

The three day school, ninth of an annual series, was held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. It is sponsored by the Texas A&M University Electrical Engineering Department for managing personnel of electrical systems and power plant superintendents, operating superintendents and other municipal employees.

Program instructors included engineering professors of the University, officials from General Electric, Westinghouse, and managers of municipal electric systems in Texas.

Barnett, president of the Municipal Utilities Section of the Texas League of Municipalities, was program chairman for the school.

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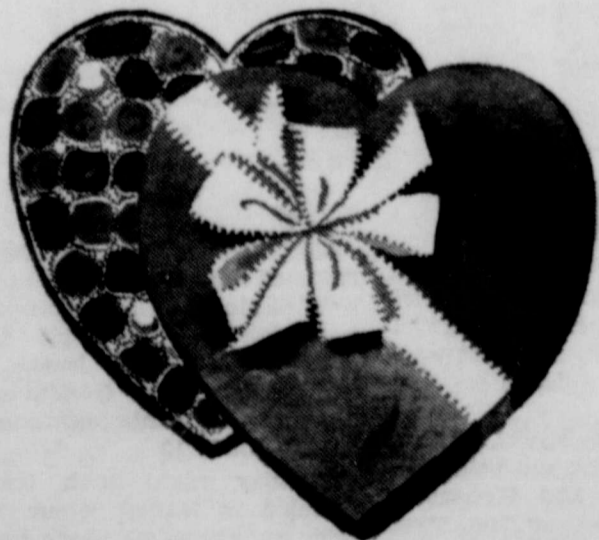

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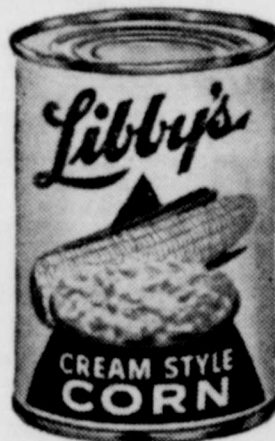

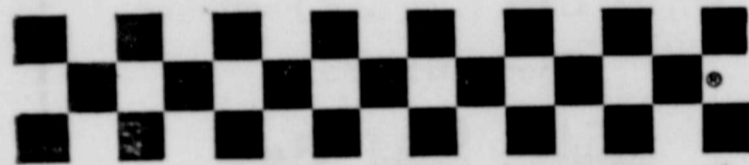
