## City Council Sets Date For Open House For Water System

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night set Sunday, November 22, as the date for open house for the new water system for Goldthwaite and Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1. Open house for the newly completed water facility will be observed from 2 to 5 p. m. City officials and personnel and their wives will be on hand for the occasion. There will be conducted tours of the filter plant and the off-channel storage reservoirs for the public to inspect the new water system. More details of the open house will be announced.

Finishing touches on the installation are now being made and the plant is being placed into operation on full schedule. W. N. "Doc" Rimsburg and Bob King, representing Joe J. Rady & Associates, engineers for the project, met with the council Monday night. Mr. Rimsburg explained details about operating the filter plant to the council. He will be here this week to work with Jimmy Huffman, water superintendent, in operating the plant.

**OPERATING REPORTS**  
Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments were presented to the council by W. C. Barnett, city manager.

**SWIMMING POOL**  
Report of operation for the 1964 summer season for Mills County Swimming Pool was also presented. The report shows that the pool had a better season this year than last year when it showed a small loss. This year the swimming pool operated in the black with a profit of approximately \$300. The council approved a percentage charge to be made to the Water District for assessing and collecting taxes and take care of other items of expense. This proposal is to be presented to the Water District Board of Directors for approval.

**SEWER EXTENSION**  
City manager was instructed to go ahead with sewer extension in the Cline and Brim Streets area which has been requested by residents there. The project will be done when it can be worked into the city schedule of work. It will be installed on a cost share basis with property owners.

### REQUEST FOR WATER

The council heard request for water from some residents outside the city limits and water district on highway 84 East of the city. This matter will come under the same provisions approved by the council at their last meeting. A prospective customer must be in the water district and provide own line to the city limits and water mains and pay the regular meter installation and connection charge and water rates paid by residents of the city.

### PAVING

Barnett reported on paving project now underway on Fairman Street and adjoining area. Purchase of a track type loader with back-hoe was discussed and the matter was deferred until the next meeting.

## 27.82 Inches Rainfall Here In Ten Months

Goldthwaite received 27.82 inches of rainfall in the 10 months period, January through October, according to official record kept by Harry Allen. Of this amount 2.04 inches was recorded during the month of October. October was quite dry until the last week of the month when general rains covered the county.

### NOVEMBER OFF TO GOOD START

November is off to a good start with more moisture to add to the September and October rainfall. Official record shows 1.13 inches recorded here Tuesday afternoon and night.

## Mills County Voters Give Johnson-Humphrey Big Lead

Mills County voters went to the polls Tuesday and joined the rest of the nation in giving the Democratic presidential ticket of Lyndon B. Johnson-Hubert H. Humphrey a big margin for their nationwide landslide win over the Republican ticket of Barry Goldwater-William E. Miller team.

Johnson-Humphrey polled 1,228 Mills County votes against 495 for Goldwater-Miller.

In the U. S. Senate race county voters gave Democrat Ralph W. Yarborough 1,069 votes against 643 for his Republican opponent George Bush.

Governor John Connally was favored with 1,383 votes over his Republican opponent who received 336.

On the Constitutional Amendments county voters favored all three proposals.

A total of 1,811 votes were cast in the election with a number of ballots not being counted because of improper marking. This was due to split ticket voting on the large ballot. Rainfall late Tuesday didn't seem to effect voting although it was some lighter than the last general election.

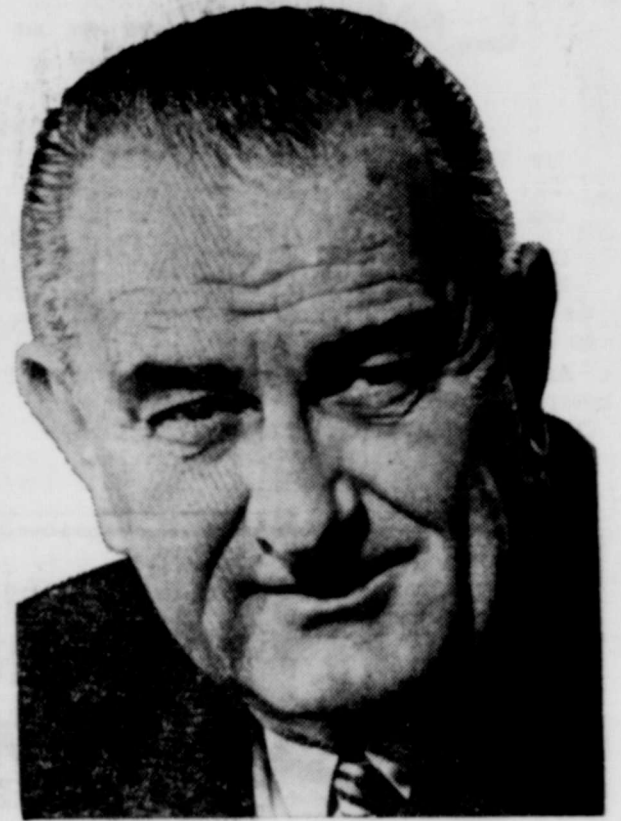

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## Committee Issues Second Appeal For Stock Show Prize Money

The finance committee for Mills County Stock Show issued a second appeal this week for contributions to provide prizes for the annual show scheduled here January 8 and 9, Chairman V. Z. Cornelius, announced Tuesday.

Approximately 500 letters were mailed out two weeks ago to the interested farmers, ranchers and business firms asking for their annual contribution.

Approximately \$1,000.00 will be needed to provide prize money for the 150 boys and girls who spend many hours during the year with their projects for the annual show.

Response to the letter has not been as good as expected and the committee is hopeful that this second appeal that personal solicitation will not be necessary. As of Tuesday, Glynn Collier stated that the committee had received only \$226.00 of the approximately \$1,000.00 needed for the prize money.

The 1965 show catalog is now in the process of being printed and all contributors are asked to turn in their money now in order to be listed in the new book. Plans call for the catalog to be ready for distribution by the first week in December.

All those who received the letter with self addressed envelope are urged to mail their contribution now. Anyone who did not get a letter and would like to support the show is also invited to make a contribution.

Checks should be made out to Mills County 4-H and FFA and mailed to Glynn Collier or checks may be given to any member of the finance committee, Cornelius stated.

A meeting for the recertification of Brucellosis will be held at the Courthouse in Goldthwaite at 7:30 p. m., next Thursday, November 12th, it was announced this week by County Agent George Reese.

Dr. James B. Henderson, Area Supervisor, from Coleman will discuss the three year recertification plans for Mills County.

The County is due for recertification by January 15, 1965.

In order for Mills County to qualify as a modified Certified Brucellosis free area this testing must be completed on 40 reactor herds and 159 negative herds of 20% of the negative herds of the county.

All cattle producers of Mills County are invited to attend this meeting and plans will be formulated to complete this vital program, Reese stated.

## GHS Eagles Bomb Santa Anna 44-0; Play Crucial Game At Burnet Friday

The Goldthwaite fighting Eagles didn't let the large homecoming crowd down here Friday night as they went on to win their second district game of the season by smothering the Santa Anna Mountaineers 44-0.

The Eagles came up with three touchdowns in the first quarter, two in the second, and wrapped it up with one more in the third quarter.

In the first few minutes of the game Jimmy Ball sprinted 54 yards for the Eagles' first touchdown. The extra points were racked up on a pass from Hammond to Ball making the score 8-0 with 9:52 remaining in the first quarter.

On their second touchdown the Eagles started their drive by picking up a Santa Anna fumble on the Mountaineers' 21 yard line. Then with the terrific running power of Blackburn and Ball they carried the ball to the one yard line with Johnny Hammond pushing over for the TD. The Eagles were penalized 10 yards on Blackburn's run for the extra points, but that didn't seem to matter as they completed a pass from Hammond to Ball to get the two points anyway.

That's the way it went the rest of the night with the Eagles out doing the Mountaineers in every play.

Bobby Rountree picked off a Santa Anna pass and went 12 yards to score before the teams changed ends of the field.

In the second quarter Jim Childress picked off another Santa Anna aerial attempt and returned it 50 yards to open the second period's scoring. The Eagle's extra point try was penalized but Ball got the two extra points on a 17 yard pass from Hammond. Childress was out of the action most of the game with a previous injury to his shoulder, resting up for this week's game with Burnet.

Jerry Rountree got the final Eagle tally before halftime intermission when he went six yards to paydirt. Bobby Rountree racked up the extra points on a pass from Hudson, making the score 38-0.

During the fine colorful homecoming halftime ceremonies, Miss Anita Rhoades was crowned the 1964 football sweetheart of Goldthwaite High School by her escort, Jimmy Ball. Other nominees were Miss Helen Head, escorted by Johnny Hammond, and Miss Beverly Rhoades, escorted by Phil Duren. Bob Frazier was presented as the Pep Squad Beau of 1964 by Miss Jeannie Stewart, pep squad president. Also receiving honors were Band sweetheart, Linda Jones, and Band beau,

Phil Nickols. Other entertainment was provided by the twirlers and drum majorette as they twirled fire batons to the fine playing of the Goldthwaite band.

After intermission a pass play from Tommy Hudson to Jerry Rountree gave the Eagles their last TD. The play covered 26 yards.

While the Eagles were blasting the Mountaineers 44-0, the Burnet Bulldogs were fighting for life over at Marble Falls. The score remained 0-0 until the final period when Calvin Keel made the extra point kick that really counted for the Bulldogs as they won their third straight district win with a 7-6 victory over Marble Falls.

The Bulldogs now hold top place with Goldthwaite holding second. The Eagles will challenge the Bulldogs this Friday night in a crucial, 9-A decisive football game at Burnet. Everyone is urged to come as the Eagles try for district championship.

**SOIL CONSERVATION  
DISTRICT NEWS**

Construction is scheduled to begin on Blanket Creek Watershed with the award of the first contract to build three floodwater retarding structures, according to Scott Lanford, Chairman of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District board. Sites 1, 3, and 4 are being advertised for construction bids and will be opened at 2:00 p. m. on November 19, in the SCS Office at Temple.

Principal bid items in the three floodwater retarding structures include approximately 250,000 cubic yards of compacted earth fill material in the three dams, 4,675 pounds of steel bar reinforcement in 102 cubic yards of concrete and 500 linear feet of spun concrete pipe for the principal spillway installations, salvaging and placing about 31,900 square yards of top soil on embankments and emergency spillways for establishment of grass that will assure minimum maintenance needs by local interests to be provided by the Brown County Commissioners Court, and about 14,700 linear feet of new fencing around dams and emergency spillways for management grazing use on established grass.

All structural costs are provided by the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture with operation of the works of improvement being performed by the Soil Conservation District and maintenance by the counties.

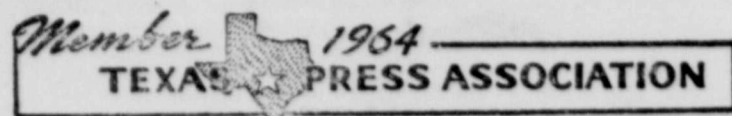

**SOIL CONSERVATION  
DISTRICT NEWS**



By ELGIN SMITH

Construction is scheduled to begin on Blanket Creek Watershed with the award of the first contract to build three floodwater retarding structures, according to Scott Lanford, Chairman of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District board. Sites 1, 3, and 4 are being advertised for construction bids and will be opened at 2:00 p. m. on November 19, in the SCS Office at Temple.

Principal bid items in the three floodwater retarding structures include approximately 250,000 cubic yards of compacted earth fill material in the three dams, 4,675 pounds of steel bar reinforcement in 102 cubic yards of concrete and 590 linear feet of span concrete pipe for the principal spillway installations, salvaging and placing about 31,900 square yards of top soil on embankments and emergency spillways for establishment of grass that will assure minimum maintenance needs by local interests to be provided by the Brown County Commissioners Court, and about 14,700 linear feet of new fencing around dams and emergency spillways for management grazing use on established grass.

All structural costs are provided by the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture with operation of the works of improvement being performed by the Soil Conservation District and maintenance by the counties.

Farmers and ranchers in the watershed also have a vital part in the program by applying needed conservation land treatment on the 125,440 acre watershed.

Construction is due to begin within 20 days and is scheduled for completion within 230 calendar days following award of the construction contract, according to Don Larner, Work Unit Conservationist. The first construction on the three structure contract involving sites 1, 3, and 4 will be at the choice of the contractor. These flood prevention structures being located on construction easements granted by Ben Smith, the Blackman Estate, and T. D.

Levisay farms respectively. Showing of sites to prospective bidders and supervision construction will be under direction of Weber McShane Project Construction Engineer at Brownwood, according to Area Conservationist, E. J. Ghes. Four additional structures are scheduled to be awarded two contracts by late November Hughes states.

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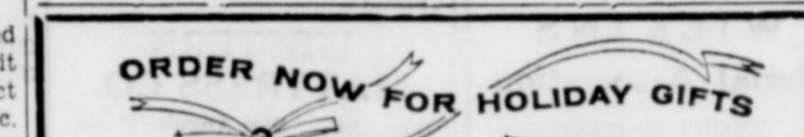
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## Last Rites For J. C. Blackwell Conducted Tuesday Afternoon

## Water Commission Initiates Central Texas Ground-Water Study

Judge Cecil Egger has determined that the Texas Commission recently conducted a regional study of the water resources in Central Texas, including Mills County. The study will be conducted from a field office established in Waco. The study is designed to determine the quantity and quality of underground water available in the region with initial emphasis on the prolific Lower Cretaceous Trinity Sands.

Personnel of the Commission's Ground-Water Division will conduct intensive field investigations of the area including the collection of information on municipal, industrial, and selected domestic wells.

A major goal of the study will be the construction of a model of the aquifer system from the data collected in the field. The model will enable estimates to be made of the potential amounts of ground water available to communities and cities in the study area.

This detailed study will require at least three years of field investigation for completion. It will provide valuable information to all cities, industries, and other water users in this important area. Shortly after the study is completed, the Commission will publish a report of the findings which will be available to the general public.

## Antlerless Deer Permits For Mills County To Be Issued Here Friday

Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless doe deer hunting permits for Mills County this Friday at the County Courthouse. Permits will be issued for the county's designated areas of the county to bona fide landowners or their agents only after their agents have applied

in writing for the exact number of permits to be used. Said owners or agents shall then issue permits to individual hunters before the hunter begins his hunt.

It shall be unlawful for any person to possess an antlerless deer unless such person shall have in his possession an antlerless and/or doe deer hunting permit on which appear the date of kill, the hunter's name, and the signature of the owner or agent on whose tract the deer was killed.

Owners or agents receiving antlerless and/or doe deer hunting permits shall return the fully completed stubs from used permits and all unused permits and stubs to the issuing officer not later than January of the year following date of issuance.

It continued: "The Texas Highway Department was privileged to cooperate and work with the Ford Times in developing said recreational map and special edition."

The resolution expressed the appreciation of the governor and the highway commission to "C. H. Dykeman and his staff and to the host of Texas Ford dealers whose support and enthusiasm for the special Ford Times Texas edition contributed so much to its production."

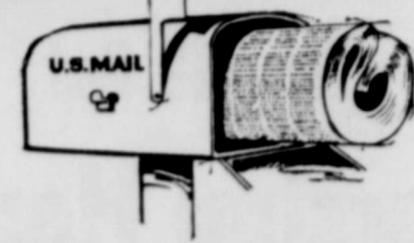

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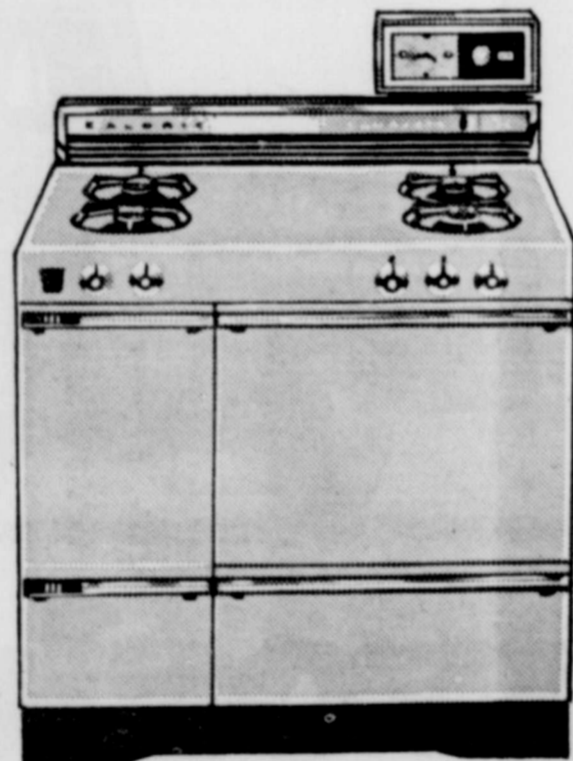

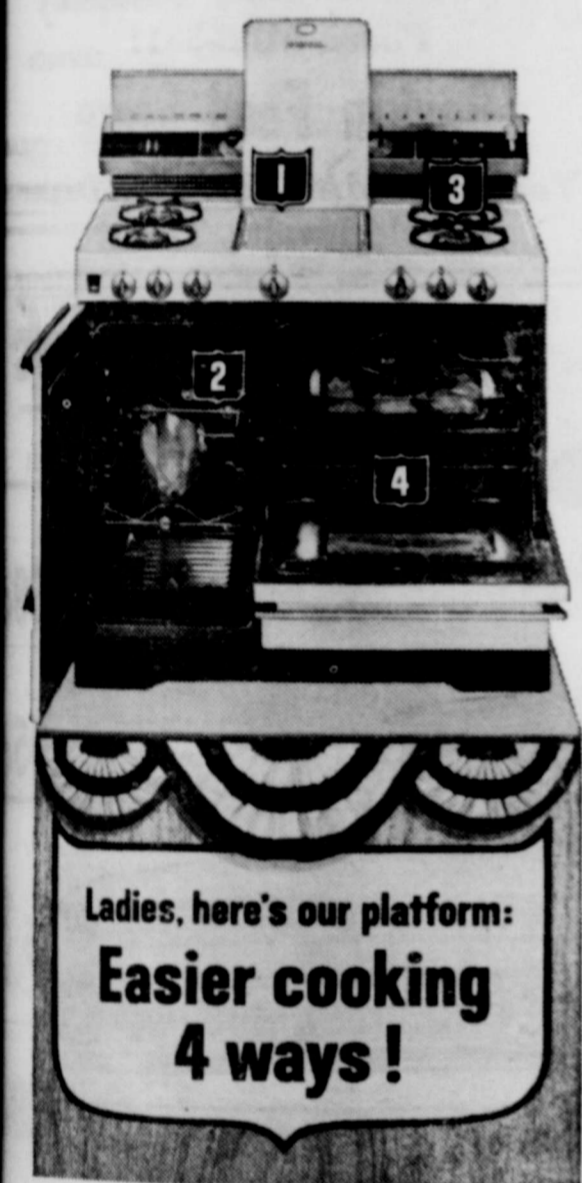

## Records Of Civil War Veterans Needed By Historical Committee

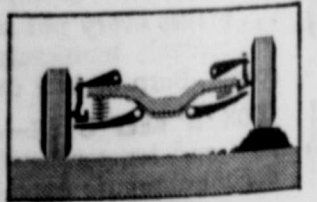
