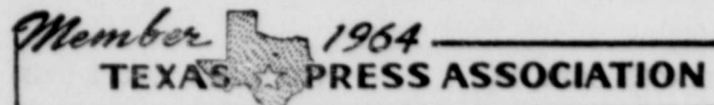

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VA Makes Plans For Re-Opening National Service Life Insurance

The Veterans Administration is preparing to handle next May's flood of applications for the re-opening of National Service Life Insurance, Glyndon Hague, manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said today.

More than three million veterans with service-connected disabilities may do this under terms of the law signed October 13 by President Johnson, the VA manager said.

Opening date on which VA will accept applications is May 1, 1965. They must be in on or before May 3, 1966, he pointed out.

Hague said an unknown number of veterans who up to now have not applied for service-connected but can do so in order to obtain insurance, may also now be eligible to buy up to \$10,000 in permanent GI insurance.

The VA is planning before May 1, 1965 to mail full details and application forms to all veterans receiving monthly compensation payments.

Those veterans whose disabilities are service-connected but who are not drawing compensation will not be included in this mailing. For these, and for other veterans who believe they may be eligible, full explanatory material and explanation forms will be on hand at all VA regional offices by April 1, 1965.

No applications can be accepted before May 1, 1965, Hague said. Because of this, VA requests that veterans do not write, phone or call for applications until after April 1, 1965.

Persons now on active duty with the Armed Forces and certain Philippine veterans are not eligible to take part in the insurance re-opening. Expenses of all medical examinations must be borne by the applicant, the VA manager said.

To buy this insurance, the veteran must:

- a. Have been originally eligible for National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) between October 8, 1940 and January 1, 1957.
- b. Have now either no GI insurance or less than the \$10,000 in authorized coverage.
- c. Be in one of the following three groups—
 - (1) Veterans with service-connected disabilities who meet standards of good health.
 - (2) Veterans whose service-

YOUTH LEADS THE WAY
Cotton is No. 1 on the teenagers' hit parade of fibers, a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture survey shows. Right behind in the No. 2 spot is wool, especially for winterwear.

The preference, of course, varies with the item, and only selected items were included in the survey. But when the ratings of 3,200 boys and girls were counted, cotton or wool came out on top almost every time.

Most of the girls said they preferred cotton for summer skirts, blouses and everyday dresses. The boys liked cotton for their summer sport shirts, sport coats and slacks.

The reasons for this preference? Cotton is cool and airy. It's easy to wash and iron. And the boys liked the fact that cotton didn't irritate or cling in hot sticky weather.

Wool, however, got the top vote for girls' skirts and boys' sport coats and in both girls' and boys' outer jackets and short coats. It was a toss-up between wool and cotton for winter dress slacks for boys. And wool was second only to cotton in girls' everyday dresses for winter.

Why wool in winter? It's warm. The teen-agers also pointed out that wool doesn't wrinkle, and it holds its shape and its press.

Telephone Company To Introduce New Number System Here In 1965

The most modern system of telephone numbers in use today will be introduced in Goldthwaite when new telephone directories are delivered in July.

Known as All Number Calling (ANC)—the system substitutes numerals for the two letters being used, making a seven numeral rather than two letters and five numerals.

J. Lacy, division manager of Southwestern States Telephone, explained that although other advantages have been realized from the use of the system was developed as a result of a need for providing more workable telephone numbers.

As all previous steps in telephone numbering plan have been taken as the result of our latest step is made to insure the availability of a supply of numbers to meet the growth and demand for telephone numbers," Lacy said.

Changing to ANC will result in an actual change in the dialing of Goldthwaite telephone numbers, Lacy pointed out. For example, the number Mission 65 or MI-8-2225 would be changed to 648-2225. An examination of the telephone dial reveals that the "6" corresponds with the "M" on the dial, the "4" corresponds with the "8" and remains unchanged.

The telephone directories to be delivered in July, 1965, will list all Goldthwaite telephone numbers under the new ANC system, appearing as the following example cited: 648-2225. Through the actual use of telephone companies have offered other advantages. ANC eliminates the confusion between the figure zero and the letter "O"; between the figure and the letter "L." ANC eliminates wrong numbers caused by misspelling central office names, such as HY for HYacinth. ANC eliminates dialing errors caused by sound-alike central office names, such as Mitchell and Mutual. ANC promotes improved legibility on dials, as it will permit elimination of letters entirely from telephone dials, making numbers larger. ANC will facilitate miniaturization of the telephone instrument, which the public prefers. ANC is the forerunner of 24-hour dialing. 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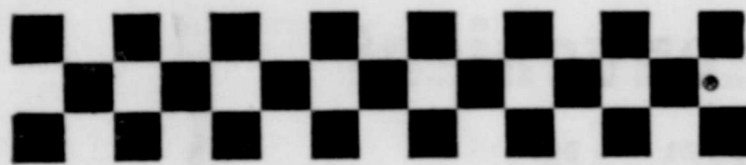

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Term Of Office And Electing ASC Committees To Change In January

After January 1, 1965, the method of electing county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committees and length of term in office will be changed.

Under new legislation, three major changes have been authorized:

1. A 3-year staggered term of office for county committees instead of the existing 1-year term.

2. A county committeeman to serve no more than three consecutive terms. Previously there was no limit.

3. County committeemen to be elected by all community committeemen at the county convention rather than by the chairman of each community committee in the county.

To establish the staggered-term system for the county committees, one member will be elected for a 1-year term, one for 2 years, and the third for 3 years at the first county convention in 1965. Thereafter, each member of a county committee will be elected for a term of 3 years.

Both county and community ASC committees are made up of farmers who are taking part or eligible to take part in one or

more of the farm programs which the committees administer. Among them are the Agricultural Conservation Program, acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, feed and grain program, voluntary wheat program, Sugar Act program, National Wool Program, farm storage loans, and other such programs. Other duties are assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture as the need arises.

Community committees are made up of three farmer-members elected by other eligible farmers in each community. These committeemen will in turn elect the three farmer members to serve on the ASC county committee. The county Agricultural Extension agent serves as an ex-officio member of the county committee.

There are 3,065 ASC county committees in the U. S. and 26,682 community committees.

Wool Growers Are Reminded Of Final Date For 1964 Marketing

Growers were reminded today to complete all details of marketing wool and lambs not later than December 31, 1964, in order to receive payments for the current marketing year.

E. L. Burkett, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, points out that marketings completed after that date will be eligible for payments for the 1965 marketing year. Since the wool marketing year now is on a calendar-year basis, the sale will not be considered as taking place in the 1964 marketing year if any part of a sale of lambs or wool is not completed by De-

ember 31.

This means that all the information needed to complete the sales documents and show the net sales proceeds for wool has to be determined and available by December 31 in order to be eligible for wool program payments for the 1964 marketing year.

Under program regulations, wool is not marketed until title has passed to the buyer either physically or through documents which transfer control to the buyer, and all the information—such as price per pound, weight, yield, etc.—needed to determine the buyer's total purchase price is available.

Payments for the 1964 marketing year will begin about April of next year, after the program payment rates are determined, based on the average prices received by producers for shorn wool sold in 1964.

Payments for the 1965 marketing year on marketing taking place or completed after December 31, 1964, will be made in the spring of 1966.

Wool producers may file applications for the payment for the 1964 marketing year with

Agriculture Census To Bring Statistics Of County Up To Date

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Mills County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 767 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 893 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 555.3 acres in 1959, compared with 475.3 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$4,699,459.00. The value of all crops sold was \$460,465.00. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$4,238,994.00.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th series which began in 1909 because of the rapid changes in American agriculture which are undergoing in recent years.
