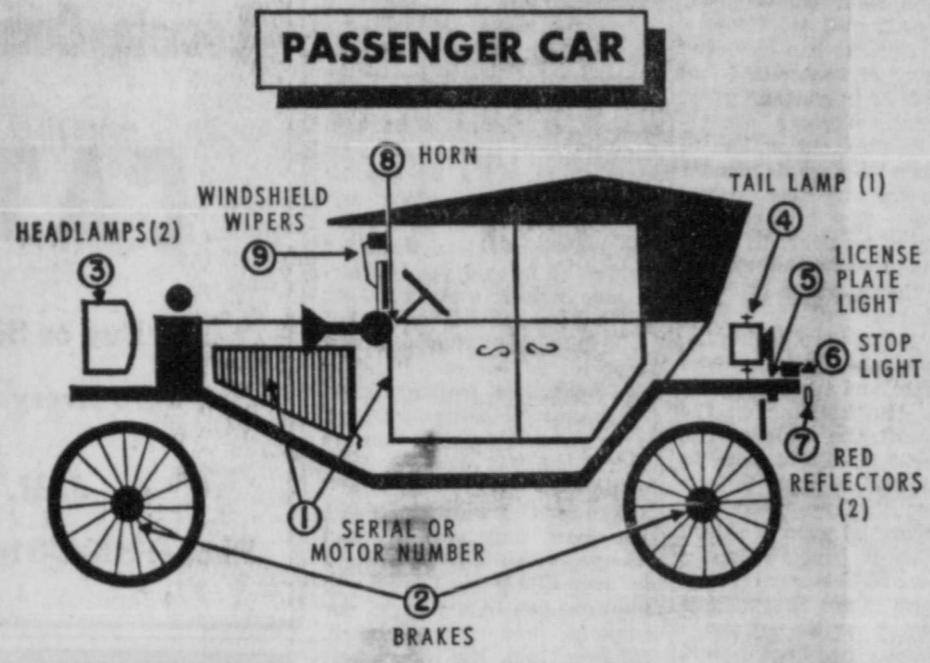

## 98 Registered Under New Law By Tuesday Noon

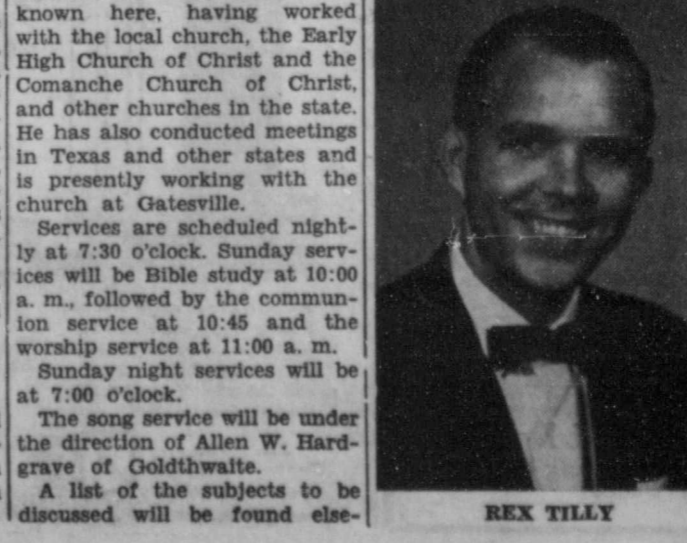
Ninety-eight persons registered in Mills County by Tuesday noon under the new Texas Voter Registration Law, according to H. G. Brooks, tax assessor-collector.

It was a photo-finish that won the Eagles the mile relay and the Brady Relay championship last Saturday.

The score was 103 to 104½ with Brady leading as the final event, the mile relay, came up. If the Eagles could come in in front of Brady, the relays would be theirs.

From the blocks, a commanding lead was taken by Ronnie Hill to give his teammates an excellent chance for the relay. James Cook came down the back - stretch second behind Early trailing only a few yards. Owen Yarborough, deciding that the Eagles needed first again, came from behind and stretched the Eagles' position to a first place, ten yards in front of the pack.

Anchorman Jerry Rountree, running easily a good 15 yards in front of the pack, looked as if the relay would belong to Goldthwaite. On the last corner Brady's Bob Wade caught Rountree and it was neck and neck to the wire, with Jerry finishing by five-tenths of a second in front of Brady. Their time of 3:28.6 set a new record in the mile relay for Brady.

Another first came with Kenneth Hollingshead with a jump of 6'2" in the high jump. This also was a meet record, bettering the last Finals.

In the 120 yd. high hurdles Jim Childress ranked first with a 15.7. Kenneth Hollingshead managed to claim third in the heat.

The 440 yard relay (G. Warlick, H. Moore, C. Blackburn, J. Rountree), took third with a 43.9, setting a new Goldthwaite High record.

180 yd. low hurdles was next on the agenda; Jim Childress finishing second and Bobby Rountree fourth.

The 220 yd. dash claimed fourth in the person of Jerry Rountree.

Goldthwaite's team in the 880 yd. relay finished third.

The shuttle hurdle (S. Campbell, Kenneth Hollingshead, B. Rountree, J. Childress), composed a second for the Eagles.

Gary Holcomb finished 9th in the 880 yd. run.

A speedy 10.1 finished first in the 100 yd. dash and won a trophy for the Eagles' Charles Blackburn.

The Eagles finished with 123 team points to Brady's 120½ and Fredericksburg's 76.

Prizes in the contest are representative of the good-time spectrum available to all Texans. Winner will have his choice of a weekend for himself, his immediate family, and his best friend at any of three top-flight tourist attractions in Texas. The spectrum:

Six Flags Over Texas, the Jolly Dallas-Fort Worth theme park that drew more than 1.7 million visitors last year; the amazing Aquarena at San Marcos boasting, among a host of charms, the world's only submarine-type theater; and the city of San Antonio, the historic place J. Frank Doble once described as "every Texan's second home."

Second and third-place essayists and their families will be entertained on an all-expense basis by the two attractions remaining after the winner's choice is made. Auto travel expense of winners will be paid by the hosting attractions. In each case one "best friend" will be hosted, too.

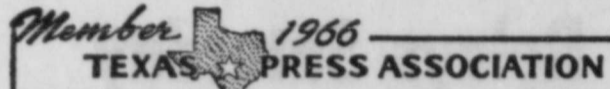

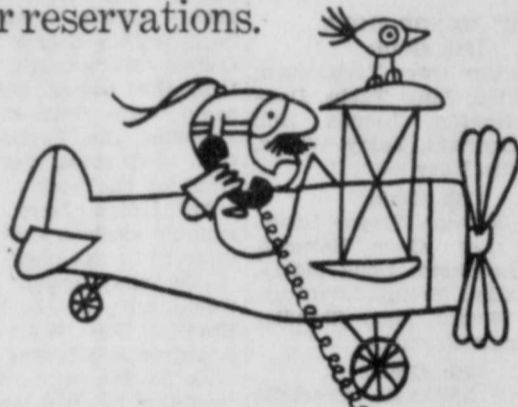

25 YEARS AGO

The March 18th call for men for military service by the selective service board of Goldthwaite was for three Mills County men. Those complying with the call and leaving for the induction camp were:

Forest Lewis Straley, Jack Locklear and Elton Allen Jarrett. The latter volunteered for service before being called.

Four hundred sixty-five 50 pound mattresses have been processed in Mills County Cotton Centers since the beginning of the 1941 cotton program in early February. These centers: Live Oak, Mt. Olive, Ratler, Ridge, Prairie, and Nabors Creek, have completed the processing of the 1941 mattresses. The above named centers have operated rapidly and with a minimum of friction.

Other Cotton Centers to be commended for the quality of work and good management of operating are: Star, Lake Merritt, Midway, and Big Valley.

In a communication to Earl Summy, county clerk of Mills County from the State of California, the requirement of that state to secure a birth certificate, when none was filed at birth was furnished, it is necessary to employ an attorney, and proceed through civil courts. As a result the total cost is \$25.00

plus attorney fee, and citation by publication costs which equal the first cost, totaling at least \$50.00. While in Texas a birth certificate costs anywhere from \$3.00 to not exceed \$7.50.

Death took another one of Mills County's native sons, who had gone out into the world and achieved success, When Dr. Walter Herndon Nelson died last Friday in the San Juan Hospital at Silverton, Colorado, which he was operating.

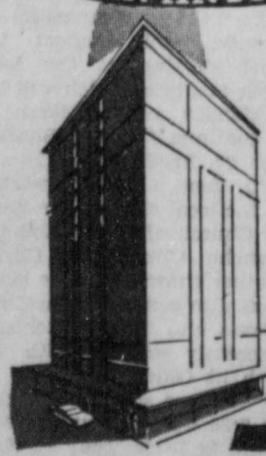

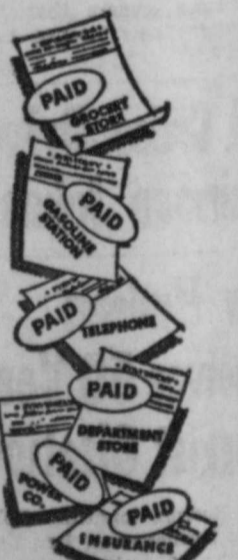

## Application Blanks For Medicare Benefits Available At Post Office

Acting Postmaster Ray Duren of Goldthwaite announced today that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the Goldthwaite Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailing and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

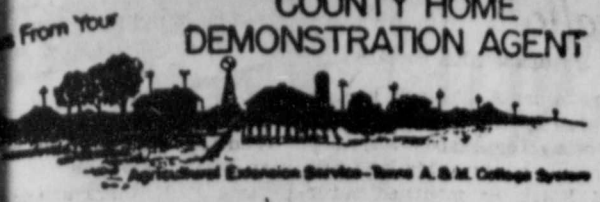

Save your government as well as yourself valuable time and money by carefully checking your 1965 tax return before you mail it.

### Many Vets In 17th District Are Eligible For New GI Bill Benefits

Approximately 6,000 veterans in Texas' 17th Congressional District are potentially eligible for benefits and services under the new GI Bill just signed by President Johnson, Congressman Omar Burleson said today.

The new GI Bill provides education and training programs generally patterned after the highly successful GI Bills of World War II and the Korean Conflict. Rep. Burleson was a strong supporter of the bill.

The Congressman pointed out that in the first year alone, over 700 veterans are expected to take advantage of the educational benefits, according to statistics from the Veterans Administration. This educational provision is expected to provide the veterans in the district almost \$491,000 in direct benefits in that first fiscal year, according to Congressman Burleson.

He said the educational provisions of the new bill go into effect June 1, 1966, giving the veteran ample time to plan his schooling program.

The veterans covered under this bill are also eligible for hospital benefits and 1,000 patient days at a cost of \$26,000 are expected to be made available to applying veterans in the first fiscal year.

All veterans are eligible for educational and guaranteed home loan benefits who were on active duty more than 180 days after January 31, 1955, and honorably discharged, or who were discharged with less

than 180 days service because of a service-incurred disability. Under the education and training sections, monthly payments for full time training are:

\$100 for veterans without dependents.

\$125 for veterans with one dependent.

\$150 for veterans with more than one dependent.

Veterans eligible can receive up to 36 months of schooling or training on the basis of one month for each month spent in uniform.

The veteran must complete his program of education within eight years after discharge. The Congressman hailed the President's action and praised the meritorious way Congress acted in this urgent matter.

He noted the GI home loan provisions of the bill would increase real estate activity throughout the country.

The formula for eligibility of the veteran to participate in the GI home loan program is the same as that already in existence; that is, 10 years from the date of discharge, plus one year for each for each three months served. Entitlement shall not continue beyond 20 years, nor shall it expire before 10 years.

Guaranteed or insured loan ceilings remain at \$7,500 while the top for direct loans, made where no private financing is readily available, has been increased from \$15,000 to \$17,500. Medical and hospital care is available on the same basis as for wartime veterans. Other benefits include burial benefits, employment assistance, and veterans' preference in Federal employment.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas' first big free voter sign-up is under way.

But top state officials still are "fighting mad" because F. B. I. agents were assigned to keep and eye on registration procedures in selected counties.

"It's an insult to every public official and every citizen of Texas," wrote Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr in a letter to U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach about the F. B. I. check.

Gov. John Connally agreed and further charged the U. S. Department of Justice with intentionally "instigating trouble" among stormy political factions.

A three-judge federal court granted Carr's request for a 30-day stay of its order abolishing the poll tax as a voting requirement. Stay was granted in order to allow time to put the new registration law into effect. Therefore, the old poll tax requirement will apply through most local elections this month.

All indications are the initial 15-day free registration (March 3-17) is going smoothly. Interest varies from county to county. Intensive registration drives are under way in the major counties, with all factions trying to sign up more voters who reflect their own views.

Connally and Carr have called on local tax assessor-collectors, who are voting registrars, to provide as many sub-stations and deputies as necessary and to authorize all the overtime needed to assure the widest possible opportunities for voter qualifications.

This is in keeping with instructions of the federal court which conceivably could lengthen the 15-day period if it feels all voters who wanted to register were not given sufficient opportunity.

Carr, meanwhile, has appealed the poll tax invalidation order to the U. S. Supreme Court. However, few feel it will be reversed.

Reversing earlier instructions, the attorney general said Texans over 60 years of age in cities of 10,000 or more who failed to get exemption certificates before January 31 still can sign up free.

Reliable estimates of the number of new voters who will qualify by March 17 have been raised to around 500,000.

### Cigarette Imports Tightened

State and federal inspectors are clamping down on imported sales that resulted when the state per-pack tax jumped to 11 cents.

Travelers are being warned that they can bring back no more than two packs of untaxed cigarettes from across the border.

State comptroller's agents, liquor control board inspectors and customs officers are making close checks in an effort to enforce the limit.

Comptroller's figures show the total cigarette tax collected for February as \$8,500,000. This is nearly a \$2,000,000 increase from February, 1965. Actually, however, last month's stamp sales meant 77,778,963 packages of smokes were purchased. This compares with 83,431,387 at the old rate in February, 1965.

Before the last three-cent-a-pack increase, sales sometimes went to more than 100,000,000 a month.

"We're looking at every avenue we can to protect the revenue of the state," commented Albert Brown, head of the excise and store tax division of the comptroller's office.

### Texas Joins Compact

Texas will be one of the first states to participate in the Interstate Compact for Education, Governor Connally has announced.

Compact aims to strengthen the voice of states in formulation of alternative nationwide educational policies.

Connally has indicated he is making a bid for location of the compact's central office in Texas.

An interstate commission composed of seven representatives from each member state will develop alternatives in ed-

ucational policies, gather data on enrollments, conduct research, exchange information with other groups and recommend proposals for financing education.

Two Selected  
Amarillo and Beaumont were selected as the sites for two \$450,000 pilot Mental Retardation centers sought by 20 Texas communities.

State Board for Mental Health and Mental Retardation said the cost will be shared by state and federal appropriations.

Other cities considered for the centers were Abilene, Austin, Brownwood, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Edinburg, Longview, Midland, Odessa, San Antonio, San Angelo, Tyler, Texarkana, Temple, Victoria, Wichita Falls, and Waco.

### Attorney General Speaks

A Childress County constable who accepted a \$1-a-day job as a deputy tax assessor-collector for a single day during the poll tax drive put on by the Junior Chamber of Commerce did not vacate his office, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held in an official opinion.

In other opinions Carr concluded:

• A driver's license is automatically lost on felony conviction for driving while intoxicated, but is not so forfeited when a person is convicted of misdemeanor DWI and placed on probation (unless probation is revoked).

• Driver of a pickup, panel truck, carry-all or station wagon of 2,000 pounds or less capacity does not have to have a commercial operator's license even if vehicle is operated in combination with one or more trailers.

• Texas Water Rights Commission is governed by article setting \$1,500 maximum for water use permits (and \$200 top for additional use under same permit). Request originated with Sulphur River Municipal Water District and City of Irving applications to take water from Cooper Reservoir.

• Workmen's Compensation law does not have permissive application to county-line independent school district (Goose Creek Consolidated ISD) under jurisdiction of a county having population of 1,200,000 or more unless it is wholly located or situated in the county.

• A warrant on Texas Water Rights Commission's appropriation to pay for paper used in printing special engineering reports to state water plan is a legal expenditure.

### Highway Improvement Planned

State Highway Commission initiated plans to make U. S. Highway 271 a multi-lane facility from Paris northward to the Red River and the Oklahoma border.

Facility will connect with a multi-lane highway planned by the State of Oklahoma to extend southward from McAlester to the river.

Among other projects ordered by the commission was completion of a highway loop around the city of Lufkin.

Devil's River Bridge on U. S. Highway 90 west of Del Rio received the American Institute of Steel Construction "Oscar" at a commission meeting here as best of its class constructed in 1964.

### Courts Decide

State Supreme Court held for the typographical union in action requiring the Houston Chronicle and Houston Post to reset in their composing rooms advertisements placed by a local firm through a local advertising agency. Arbitration board held that "national" advertising does not have to be reproduced by the newspapers, but "local" advertising does.

Supreme Court turned down the appeal of Mayor Morris L. Newnam of Ranger to be included on the Democratic primary ballot as a candidate for state representative in the 63rd District (Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Callahan and Shack-
