New Radio For Sheriff's Office Being Installed

A new radio system for the
Mills County Sheriff's depart-
ment was installed Tuesday
with tower on top of the court-
house.

The new radio system will be
a base station with five mobile
units and will be electrically
powered, according to Sheriff
H. G. Brooks.

Four of these units have been
designated and one is open at
this time. The mobile units will
be used by Sheriff Brooks, his
deputy, Bob Wilcox, resident
game warden B. R. Schriver
and highway patrolman Jack
Straley.

The new system will provide
better communications for Mills
County officers with law en-
forcement officers in the sur-
rounding area. It will have a
range of about 90 miles.

Twenty-four boosters of Mills
County Park have contributed
a total of \$504 during the past
three weeks after announce-
ment was made by the com-
mittee that funds were needed
for park up-keep for this year.

The park committee has pro-
vided funds for caretaker to in-
sure park maintenance for the
past several years through vol-
untary contributions from in-
terested citizens.

Originally the committee
started the drive with the idea
of getting a minimum of 100 in-
terested persons to donate on
the basis of \$1.00 per month, or
\$12 a year, to do the job.

During the past several years
a number of park boosters have
contributed more than the \$12.
This has been a great help and
has made the drive successful
without personal solicitation
campaign.

Last year the committee rais-
ed \$1,429.00. This took care of
the park maintenance for the
season and provided a few ex-
tras.

Three weeks ago the commit-
tee opened the fund drive with
an appeal for "At least 100 per-
sons to contribute a minimum
of \$12 to insure park mainte-
nance for this year."

The response has been grati-
fying, according to park com-
mittee chairman W. P. Duren,
and the committee is hopeful
that the \$1,200.00 will be forth-
coming soon.

With 24 interested parties
giving \$504 the committee feels
that the goal will be reached at
an early date.

the Park Fund, and may be
turned in to any member of the
committee or mailed to Mills
County State Bank.

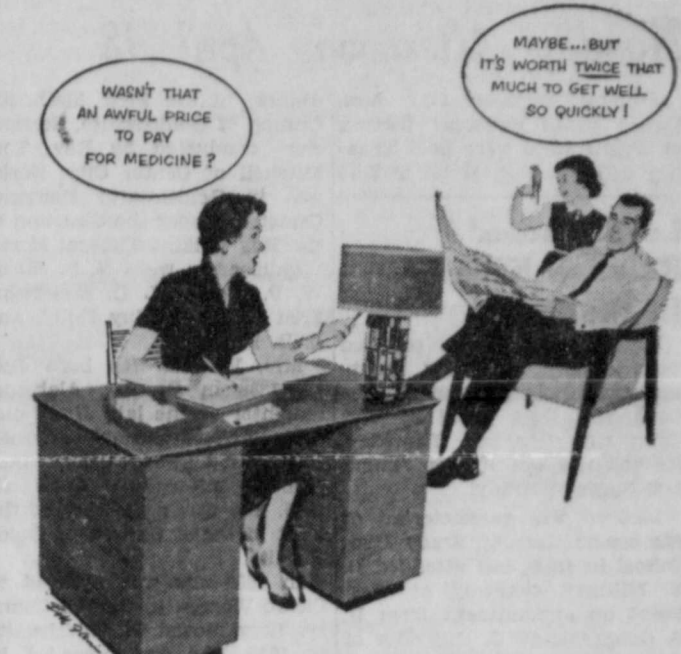

The plans for 150 Post-Conference meetings to discuss local library problems demonstrate the determination of Texans to study and meet the needs of their libraries.

It is hoped that each Texan will visit his library and see for himself the partnership it has with the public—a partnership which provides cultural and economic growth for the community and intellectual and spiritual growth for the individual.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of April 17-23, 1966, as LIBRARY WEEK in Texas, and urge all Texans to become better acquainted with the services and the needs of their libraries.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Road Beauty Bill Hit
Outdoor advertisers, motel owners, tourist attraction operators and salvage dealers at a public hearing here vigorously attacked standards for implementing new federal legislation aimed at beautifying highways by policing billboards and junkyards.

In two days of testimony before Paul E. Warren, U. S. Bureau of Public Roads Examiner,

61 witnesses hammered at the detailed standards, although many said they supported the original intent of the bill.

Most said the regulations proposed by the U. S. Department of Commerce would destroy or seriously damage their businesses.

Final regulations will not be adopted until hearings have been concluded in all 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Brucellosis
Texas Animal Health Commission reports 11 more counties are testing for initial certification as control counties in the drive to eradicate brucellosis among Texas cattle.

Atascosa, Brooks, Coryell, Falls, Hamilton, Hood, Jack, Limestone, McLennan, Milam and Roberts Counties are the latest to test. No counties qualified in February, but four — Comanche, Moore, Sherman and Deaf Smith — did qualify for recertification.

U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Commission list 55,876 cattle backtagged in markets during the month. There were 12,997 tagged cattle originating in Texas at slaughter and 16,328 cattle tested at markets for return to county with 258 brucellosis reactors discovered.

Short Snorts
Parks and Wildlife Commission in an unpublished meeting added nearly 400 acres to 245 previously designated as Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near famed LBJ Ranch.

State Securities Commissioner William M. King has taken action to prohibit the sale of securities issued by Atlas-American Oil Corporation, Dallas.

Texas Department of Public Safety is now tied in with a multi-state high speed police teletype network to carry information on crime and traffic.

W. Astor Kirk of Austin and Cristobal P. Aldrete of Del Rio were named deputy director and manager of community action programs, respectively, for the southwest regional headquarters of Office of Economic Opportunity.

Texas Education Agency ac-

creditation team probably will re-visit the troubled Eagle Pass school system in April. School was warned its accreditation will be discontinued in July unless "substantial progress" is made.

Pioneer amphitheater complex in Palo Duro Canyon State Park will be expanded, according to Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will Odom.

Securities Commissioner William M. King, in issuing an order prohibiting sale of \$2,500,000 in securities of Golden Circle Gospel Foundation Inc., Austin, said proceeds would have gone not to religious purposes but to oil speculation.

Courts Speak
State Supreme Court will review on May 4 a suit to force reapportionment of Midland County commissioner's precincts to require substantially equal population in each. A district court ordered the reapportionment, but El Paso Court of Civil Appeals reversed the decision.

Supreme Court refused for second time to hear an appeal from a judgment against the S. W. Richardson estate for failure to pay state, county and school property taxes on 32,750-acre St. Joseph Island in 1960 and 1961.

Austin District Court temporarily enjoined operations of Marketmakers Inc. of Beverly Hills, Calif., three Texas-organized corporations and eight individuals. Attorney General Carr has described the operations as a "pyramid club scheme" (similar to old chain-letter clubs) which has defrauded hundreds.

Business Activity Up
Texas business activity index resumed an upward trend in February after three months of "approximate stability," UT's Bureau of Business Research reports.

Hand-in-hand with business gains, non-farm employment soared to new heights with South and West Texas out in front. Overall, the state showed the smallest jobless percentage for February in 14 years—3.6 per cent.

Construction industry scored a big 16 per cent increase in February over January. Total construction for the first two months of 1966 was 24 per cent above the same period in 1965, a record year.

Major cities showing sharpest growth rates were Dallas, Beaumont, San Angelo and Amarillo.

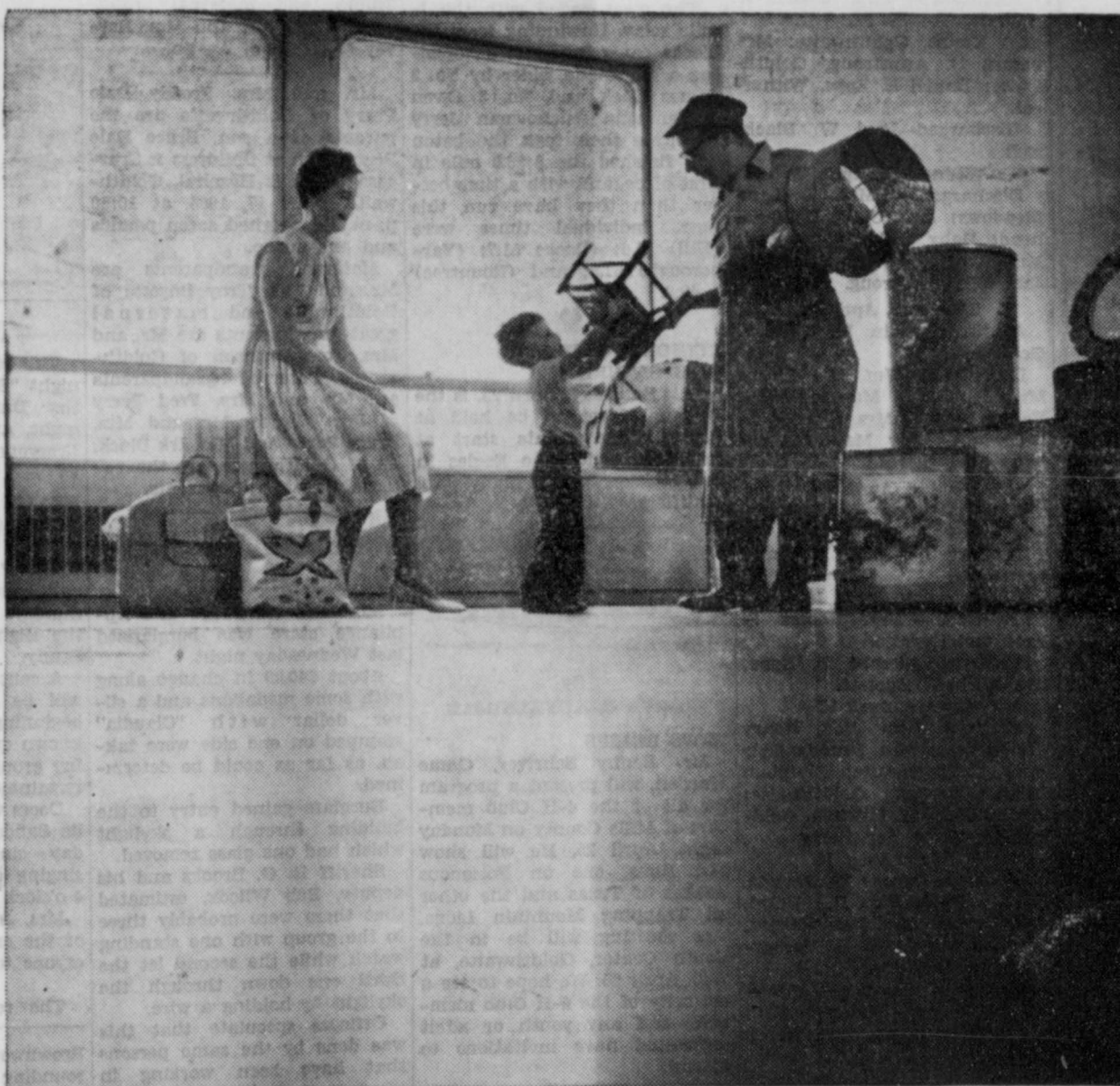

EAGLES CAPTURE BANGS RELAYS

Last Friday, breezing by all other contestants, Goldthwaite captured first place in the annual Bangs Relays. Things got off to a booming start as the sprint relay clocked a speedy 43.5. J. Cook, H. Moore, J. Rountree, and C. Blackburn have an excellent chance of turning in a first place time at Regional this Saturday.

A 2 mile relay composed of four men, each running an 880, was devised to add length to the meet's races. J. Berry, S. Hudson, B. Harper, and G. Holcomb clocked a 9.03 in the re-

lay, taking a close 4th place.

In an 8 man 1-mile relay a third was taken. Composed of T. Roberts, Ray Hill, L. Wernette, R. Holland, D. Sears, T. Hudson, J. Ledbetter, and B. Rountree, the relay helped push up the point status of the Eagles.

The distance medley laid claim to a second place running. 1 — 440 yd. dash, 1 — 220, 1 — 330 and an 880. O. Yarborough, G. Warlick, C. Blackburn, and E. Miller were enlisted.

Individual events consisted of hurdlers J. Childress and K. Hollingshead hurdling to a second and 4th and J. Rountree a second in the 100 yd. dash. The controversy over the winner of the century ended when both Rountree and Bo Strickland received a 10.2 timing with Strickland receiving 1st. Childress clocked a 15.4 in the hurdles. Charles Blackburn, timing 23.1, took second place in the 220 yd. dash.

The meet ended with the 1-mile relay. Unwinding from the blocks came Ronnie Hill, opening a gap made wider by No. 2 James Cook and No. 3 Owen Yarborough. Anchorman Jerry Rountree then took the baton and finished the 3:26.0 mile in first place, and with a time better than they have run this year. Individual times were (Hill) 15.6; (Cook) 51.7; (Yarborough) 51.8; and (Rountree) a 49.8.
