A discussion of methods to attain these goals through local community action and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was led by R. W. Hardy of Abilene, Vice-President of the organization.

Kenneth Ridgeway Serving Aboard USS Ticonderoga

USS Ticonderoga (CVA-14) — (FHTNC) — Machinist's Mate Third Class Kenneth W. Ridgeway, USN, son of Mrs. Martha Embrey of Route 3, Goldthwaite has returned from Vietnam waters to San Diego, Calif., aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ticonderoga, ending seven months of combat operations as a unit of the Seventh Fleet in the South China Sea.

While on station off the coast of Vietnam, attack aircraft from his ship flew over 10,000 combat missions in 115 days.

The 22-year-old 42,000-ton carrier emerged from yard overhaul in San Francisco prior to deploying to the Western Pacific to support American and South Vietnamese ground forces, and launch strike sorties against selected targets in North Vietnam.

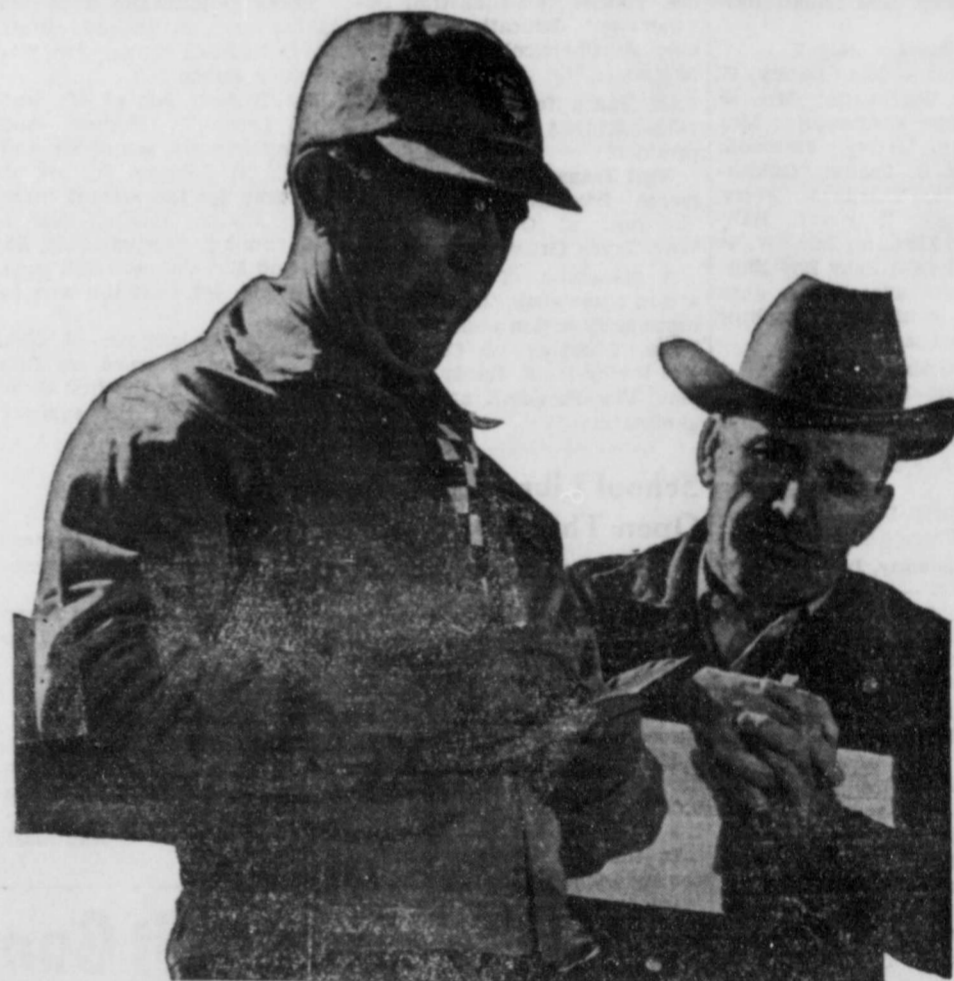

Giving Money Away:
A lot of taxpayers have a very serious question — "Can I give money away?" "How much can I give away without filing a federal gift tax return?"

The law is very liberal on allowing gifts without tax. You can give \$3000 a year to your son or daughter—or anyone else—without having to file a gift tax return. A husband and wife with community property can give \$6000 each year without filing a gift tax return. The law also allows you a \$30,000 lifetime exemption for gifts before you pay any gift tax. This \$30,000 is in addition to the \$3,000 exemption you have for each year. You can take the \$30,000 exemption at any time but you must file a gift tax return to claim this exemption.

Don't Lose Your Arrows
Arrows frequently are lost from the quiver. To prevent an occurrence of this sort, fit a 2" chunk of styrofoam into the bottom of the quiver. Arrowheads then can be stuck into this pliable material. But, a slight pull will release them.

Loosening Tent Ropes
Loosening tent ropes that have become wet can be a chore. Make such work easier by digging a 6-inch hole on the tent side of each pole. Then as you slide the poles into the holes the ropes become loosened.

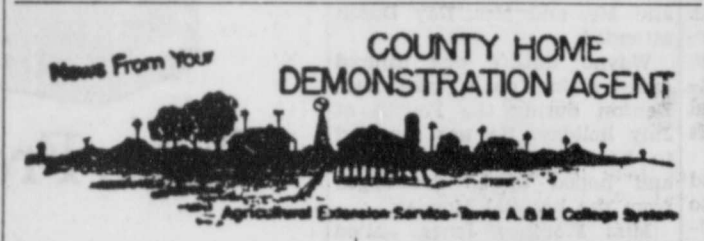

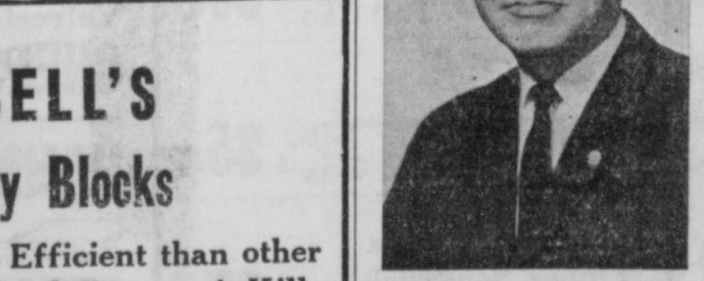

FEED YOUR TREES
Spring is the time to fertilize your trees. If, however, your trees are newly-planted—in the past few years—and you've used plenty of good soil for backfilling, they probably don't need it this year. Wait 'till next. But street trees, planted in the narrow parking between sidewalk and curb, may suffer from mineral depletion. So probably, do some of your yard trees. You can tell if the leaves are paler than normal and the growth slower.

the trunk 3 feet above the ground. Use 2 pounds of 5-10-5 fertilizer for each inch of diameter. (A 1-pound coffee can holds just this amount).

2. Use a soil auger or posthole digger (if you have either) to dig holes around your street trees. A crow bar or broom stick will do for trees in your yard. Make holes 15 to 24 inches deep if you can and about 18 inches apart around the dripline of the trees (the area beneath the ends of the longest branches).

3. Distribute the fertilizer equally among the holes, then fill the holes with good soil. A

mixture of equal parts topsoil, sand, and peat moss is good for this purpose. It provides aeration and water access as well as filling the space.

WATER: An Important Element In Your Diet
Talking about water in relation to nutrition may seem a bit odd—yet water is an extremely important part of the diet. Water aids digestion, acts as a tissue building material, and regulates body temperature.

Many of the chemical reactions between substances of the body cannot take place unless

these substances are in solution. Water helps to keep them in solution. It also stimulates the flow of digestive juices, and, as part of the blood, helps to carry soluble nutrients to the tissues.

Water, as a body regulator, transports heat from one part of the body to another, thus equalizing temperature. The body rids itself of excess heat as water is evaporated from the lungs and skin.

repair of tissue, water is an essential part of every body tissue, even hard tissue such as bone.

There's a continuous loss of water from the body which amounts to about 2 to 2½ quarts daily. This amount needs to be replaced if normal water balance is to be maintained.

The body needs about 5 or 6 glasses of fluids each day. These may be taken in the form of water, soup, or other beverages.

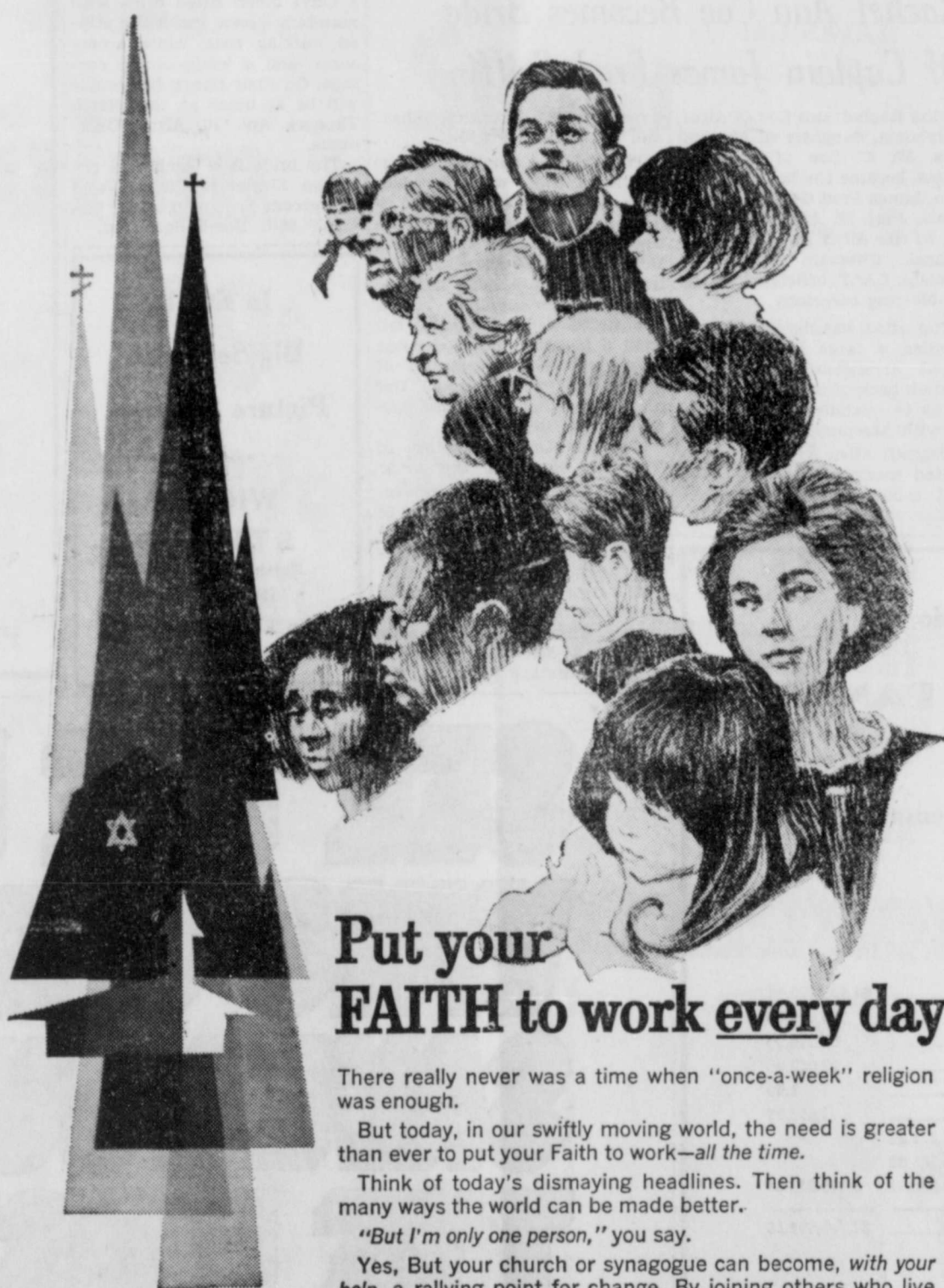
