Deer Permits Will Be Issued Nov. 2

Game Parks and Wildlife Commission announced that deer permits will be issued in Mills County next Monday, November 2, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. in Goldthwaite at the county courthouse, under the supervision of game warden stationed

at the county courthouse. Hunters or their agents are to be present to obtain permits during the period for permit issuance. A fee of \$1.00 for the county showing and rate of issuance will be posted in the county courthouse.

Permits will be issued to landowners, or his agent in person, or by letter to such land, with letter from the landowner to the game warden stationed at the county courthouse.

It is also announced that hunters wishing to lease land for hunting rights may pick up their preserve licenses and permits at the same time.

Mrs. Robertson reported Tuesday morning that the Hereford has another set of twin calves. This is the second set of twins in addition to one set of triplets and three singles.

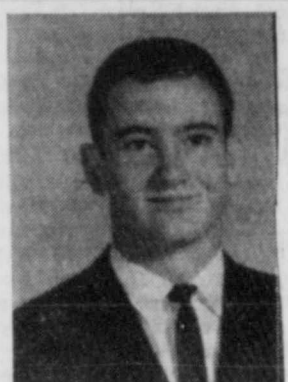
The triplets and twins have been spaced out with a single calf birth between.

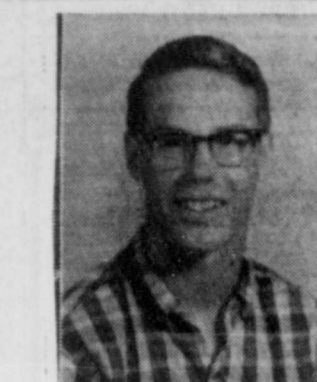
Members of the American Legion Post will have their regular meeting tonight in the American Legion Hall at Goldthwaite, according to announcement by Lee Roy Stacy.

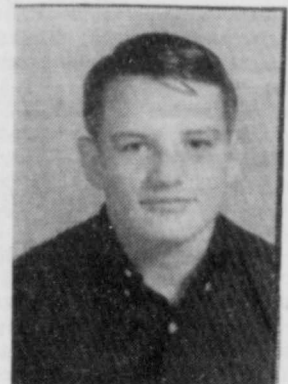

Mills County is in a joint Community Action program with San Saba, Mason and Llano Counties.

From the results of this survey, it has been decided by the Planning Committee that the foremost need for women is a class for typing and bookkeeping. They have made application to begin these classes and it has been approved. The funds have not been approved through Congress of this date.

The survey has not been completed and will have missed some who may be interested in taking these courses. Those who are interested, should call or come by the Community Action office on the first floor of the Courthouse. They will be night classes, two nights a week, and baby-sitting will be provided. These courses will also include any men who would like to participate.

Retired Missionary To China To Preach At Baptist Revival

Retired Missionary To China, Dr. C. L. Culpepper, will be the evangelist for the Fall Revival scheduled to start at the First Baptist Church in Goldthwaite this Sunday, it was announced this week by Rev. Tommy Jones, pastor of the church.

The revival services will start Sunday morning, October 30 and continue through the following Sunday, November 6.

There will be two morning services Monday through Friday, at 7 and 10 a. m. The seven o'clock morning service will be a special men's meeting with coffee and donuts being served.

Evening services will be at 7:30 p. m. each night except Friday when the time will be moved up to 6:30.

Lucian Stohler, music and youth director of the church, will be the song leader for the revival.

Dr. Culpepper will be accompanied to Goldthwaite by Mrs. Culpepper. They are making their home in San Antonio.

The Culpeppers went to China in 1923 where he did field evangelism work for four years. Then he went into the Seminary. He taught four days a week and then would go with students and faculty into churches and mission points and preach on the weekend. He was president of three Seminaries. First in North China. After the war they could not go back there so he helped to build an All China Seminary at Shanghai where he remained four years.

The communists took Shanghai in 1949 and Dr. Culpepper took over the Mission Office in Hong Kong where he was two years. Then he was moved to Taiwan and began a Seminary there where he remained 13 years until his retirement last year.

King Member Of 4684th Base Group In Greenland

Gary King, 22-year-old son of Mrs. W. H. Dodson of New Mexico, and grandson of Mrs. Bertha Weathers of Goldthwaite, is at his home on the 4684th Air Group stationed at Sondrestrom Air Base, Greenland, where he has served since February of this year. He will complete his tour of duty in the Air Group in February next year.

small town, and about three hours by boat from the nearest fishing camp inhabited by the native Greenlanders.

There is plenty of recreational facilities on the base, including a movie house.

Airmen live in concrete barracks with central heating in order to protect them from the temperatures which sometimes dive to 50 degrees below zero and never rise beyond 50 or 60 degrees for a short period in mid-summer. King also said that pipes three feet in diameter are crisscrossed under the buildings to keep them on an even keel when the surface on which they are built shifts because of the changes in temperature.

A bus makes the rounds of the base facilities every 12 minutes when temperatures are dangerously low, so that no man is required to face the elements for longer than about five minutes at a time.

A Scandinavian Air Lines hotel is situated across the air strip from the base where King is stationed, but airmen have no contact with the tourists who stop there.

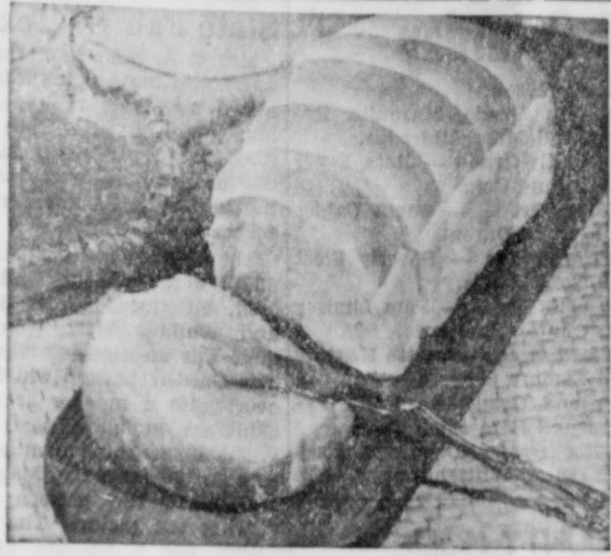
In the deepest winter, there is practically no activity at the base, and the men find time tedious because they cannot receive mail regularly. They have no complaint about the food because of "the good Danish cooks," who prepare their food, according to King.

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Grass And Forage Field Day Held At Ross Ranch Thursday

The Grass and Forage Field Day at the R. H. Ross Clearing Ranch last Thursday was attended.

The field day was a first year event on the Renner Pasture and was managed and sponsored by the Brown-Mills and Water Conservation and Agriculture Committee of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce and Bob

Head, ag teacher, and FFA members Wayne House, Tommy Watson, and Doug Doggett.

At the field day, Renner Research Foundation technicians explained the cultural and management practices used in root-plowing 200 acres of land overseeded with a mixture of De Soto grass sidecoats grama, and K. R. Bluestem. De Soto grass is a perennial grazing sorghum developed at Texas Research Foundation. The demonstration also includes Ermelo Lovegrass in future systems.

This demonstration is scheduled for six years and is one of 21 such pasture and range projects in the Renner Foundation's 25-county farm demonstration program.

"Tightland soils on the Ross Ranch are typical of thousands of acres of range in the North Central Prairie we have locally west of the Pecan Bayou," said Elgin Smith, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service in Goldthwaite. Smith described the soil on the ranch as deep clays and fine sandy loams over heavy tight sub-soils of clay.

"The proper seed-bed and management techniques used in the demonstration offer another alternative to reach the potential for forage and livestock production using a combination of native and introduced grasses," Smith said.

Pallbearers were James Schumann, Elroy Wahl, Charles Schumann, Milton Schwab, Gary Schwartz and Charles Schumann.

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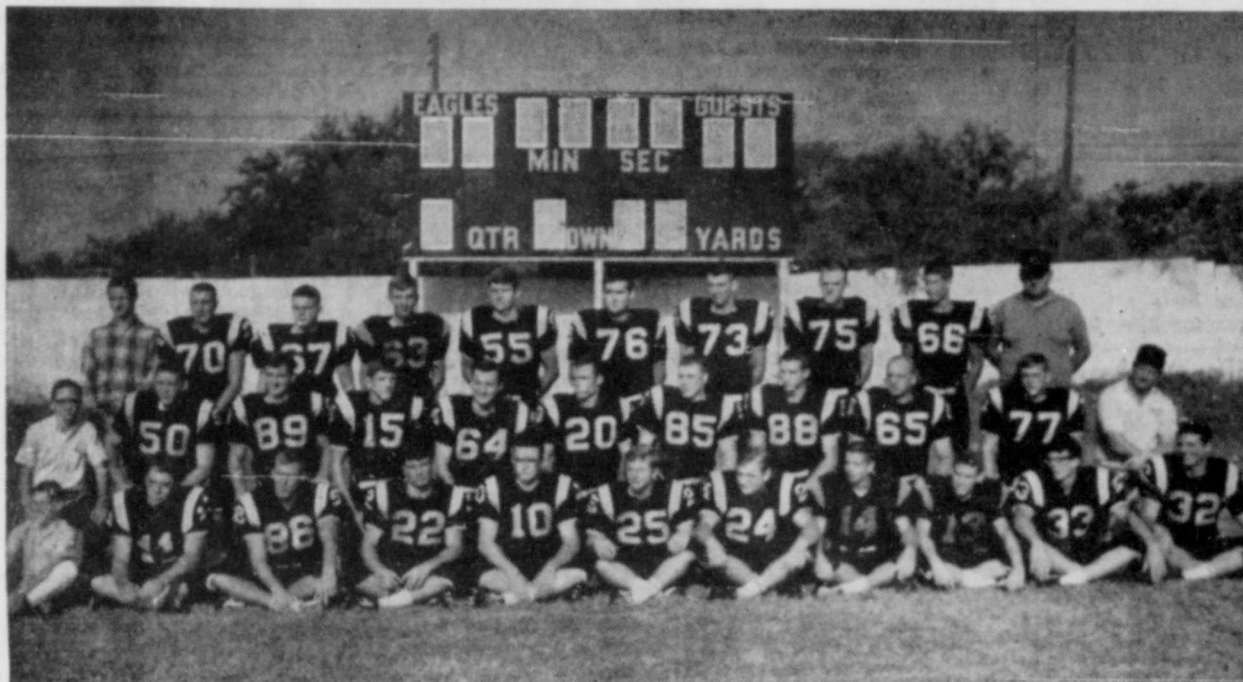

Taxes Paid By Railroads In Mills County

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies in Mills County totaled \$11,252, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' nearly 35,000 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Mills County, own their own homes.

"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am delighted that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."

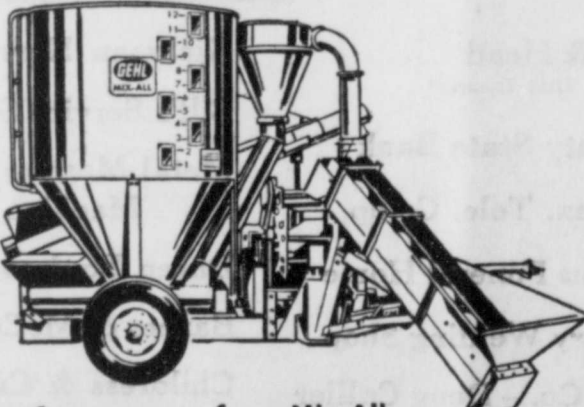

The three counties have agreed to share expenses of such an office, it was announced by County Judge Cecil Egger Tuesday.

The District Courts to be served in the three counties are the 27th District Court in Mills

County, the 35th District Court in Brown County, and the 35th and 119th District Courts in Coleman County.

The starting salary for the Probation Officer of the three counties cooperating in the formation of the multi county office is \$5,400.00, plus \$800.00 travel and automobile allowance, and \$400.00 office expense per year.

Duren, chairman of the Park Board; Elgin Smith, past president of the Jaycees; W. C. Barnett, City Manager; Paul Henderson, engineer for the Texas Highway Department and Mrs. T. C.
