Candidates For School Trustees Announced By County Judge Egger

The old building served the congregation since 1908 when the church was organized with very few members. The building was dedicated by the late Bishop Lynch of Dallas. It has been redecorated and repaired on more than one occasion during the years with the last major project of new siding being installed in the 1950's, according to Mrs. W. P. Woody, who now owns the building.

In clearing the way for the new building this old building was moved last September to the W. P. Woody property about one-half mile south of Goldthwaite, on Highway 183, where Mass was conducted until the last Sunday in February. On Sunday, March 5, Mass was held in the new building. — (Wicker Studio Photo)

Voters in the four Mills County School Districts, Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy and Star, will go to the polls on Saturday, April 1, to elect school trustees for a three year term.

County Judge Cecil Egger has announced the official list of candidates for the places to be filled. Wednesday, March 1, was the deadline for filing to have names printed on the official ballots.

There will be no contest in the Goldthwaite district where only two names appear on the official ballot to fill the two vacancies.

This year is the first time in a number of years that there has been a contest for a place on the county board. Two candidates are on the ballot for county-at-large trustee while there is no contest for county board trustee from precinct three where only one candidate filed.

In Mullin, Star and Priddy there are from three to five candidates for the two places, according to official report from the County Judge.

GOLDTHWAITE

In the Goldthwaite district Charles Wilbur Hill and Elmo Watson are the candidates. Watson is the incumbent seeking another term. Retiring member of the board is J. D. Harper.

MULLIN

Mullin candidates are: G. I. Alldredge, H. L. Pyburn, Jr., F. L. Singleton, J. R. Smith and Glendon D. Hodges. Alldredge and Smith are incumbent members seeking another term.

STAR

Candidates in the Star School district are: Billy Bradford, David Beard and W. V. Horton, Jr. Beard and Horton are incumbent members seeking re-election for another term.

PRIDDY

In the Priddy Common School District the four candidates are: Raymond Tiemann, Victor Limmer, Alton Dreuckhammer and J. C. Tiemann. Retiring members of the board are Carl Jeske, Jr., and Oscar Spinn.

COUNTY BOARD

Trustees on the County School Board serve a two year term. J. H. (Hobert) Priddy has filed for re-election in precinct 3, Allen W. Hardgrave and W. H. Wasserman are on the official ballot for county trustee-at-large. Wasserman is the incumbent seeking re-election.

Hard Freeze Hits Wednesday

A hard freeze hit Goldthwaite and the Mills County area Tuesday night and Wednesday morning with the official thermometer recording a 20 degree reading, Harry Allen, weatherman reported Wednesday morning.

Rainfall recorded here during the past week measured .09 inch.

Heavy Damage From Grass Fire Last Wednesday

A grass fire did heavy damage to range land when over 400 acres were blackened last Wednesday afternoon South of Goldthwaite.

The fire which started along the Santa Fe Railroad right-of-way swept across approximately 400 acres of the Rahl & Woody pasture and touched also on acreage belonging to P. L. Hancock and Carlos Patterson.

One pasture of 188 acres was cleaned of all grass and wood from trees and brush that had been bulldozed, according to W. P. Woody, who stated it "Created quite a fire."

A considerable amount of fence, corals and gates were also destroyed.

Several other smaller fires were reported along the railroad right-of-way between Mullin and Goldthwaite during the same afternoon.

Council Sets Summer Water Rates, Okays Sewer Survey, Gas Ordinance

The City Council meeting in regular session in the City Hall Monday night approved reduced water rates for the summer months, ordered a new and complete preliminary survey of the city sewer system and adopted an ordinance providing for slight changes in billing and rates for Lone Star Gas Company.

Summer rates for the city's water users will be the same as in the past two years. Reduced rates will be effective with April 20 consumption and will apply on the May 20 meter reading and June 1, billing.

The Council ordered a complete engineering survey of the city sewer system. This action was taken after City Manager W. C. Barnett reported the need for such a survey.

It was pointed out that the electric system and water department have received most consideration and are both operating in fine shape while the sewer department has received little special attention during the past few years.

Frady & Associates, Engineers of Fort Worth, are to be contacted to do this preliminary survey. This firm made a small scale sewer survey for one section of the city some time ago which will be incorporated in the new report.

The gas ordinance adopted by the council provides some adjustments in rates and billing procedure for Lone Star Gas Company.

The ordinance was presented and explained to the council by L. J. Ward, local manager of the gas company.

Primary changes will be an increase of a few cents for gas users in certain brackets and on the other hand it will effect a saving to a number of customers through a new policy in the summer disconnect and fall re-connect charges. Full text of the ordinance appears on another page of this paper.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council heard from City Manager W. C. Barnett monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for February.

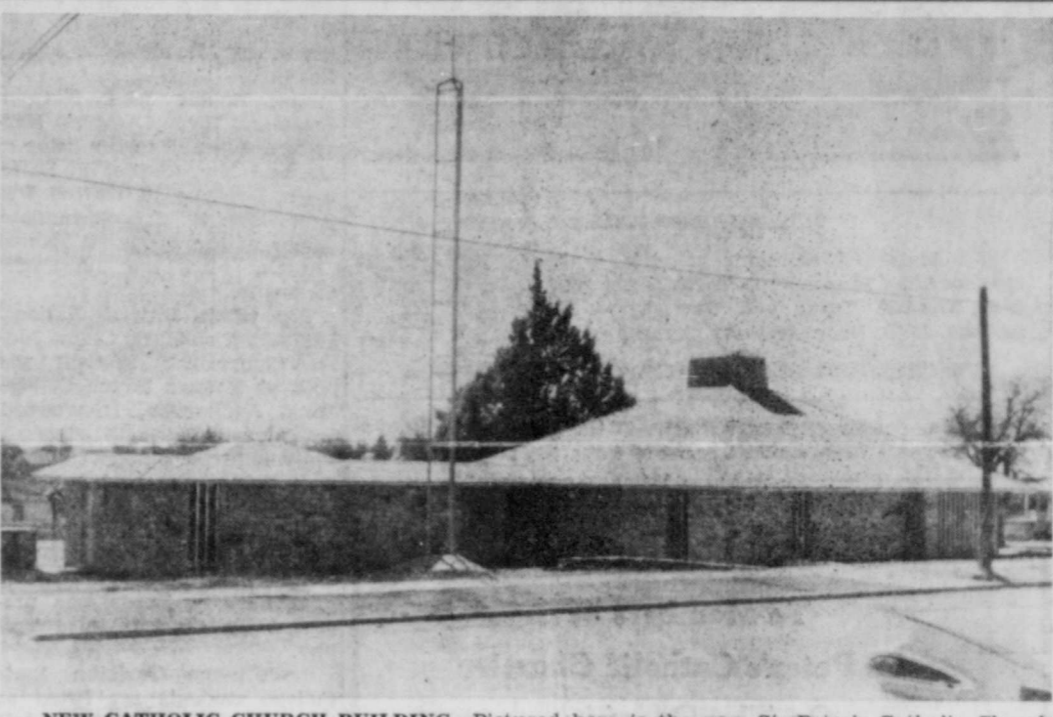
Carload of Tractors on 40th Anniversary

Five candidates will appear on the official ballot for the Mullin city election on Tuesday, April 4, when a mayor and two councilmen will be elected for a two year term.

W. T. (Son) Lee and Autrey Keating are the candidates for the office of mayor.

Candidates for the two council seats to be filled are: D. A. Morgan, H. B. Collins and Jerry Locke.

Locke has been serving out an un-expired term of J. E. Phillips who resigned and Argie Whisenhunt, whose term on the council expires this year, did not file for re-election.

Blessing Of New Building And Open House Scheduled For Sunday

Official opening with Blessing and Dedication services of the new St. Peter the Apostle Catholic Church and classroom building in Goldthwaite will take place this coming Sunday, March 12.

Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese for the Mills County area, Louis Relcher of Austin, Texas, will preside at the ceremony of Blessing.

The Blessing Ceremony is scheduled to begin at 3 p. m. and it will be followed by an open house until 5 p. m.

Father Frank Briganti, of Hamilton, is pastor of St. Peter's Church. In commenting on their Dedication Service with Open House he said: "Certainly, we would like very much and very cordially invite all the residents of Goldthwaite to stop in and see our new quarters. It would be a delight to have them at our open house."

Construction of the new building began last September. William J. Schudder of Austin, was the Architect and Truett Aldridge, Goldthwaite, was the general contractor.

Construction cost ran approximately \$28,000.00. The first \$10,000.00 was a grant from the Catholic Extension Society of Chicago.

Seating capacity for services is 140. The new building, which is air-conditioned, also provides much needed space that the church has been wanting for some time. The overall floor space also provides for an office and a religious instruction classroom which the old church building did not have.

Plans to construct a new church building were started some two and one-half years ago when a building committee was formed for that purpose. Those serving on the building committee included: Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa, chairman; LeRoy Vernet, secretary, and Cruz Corona, treasurer.

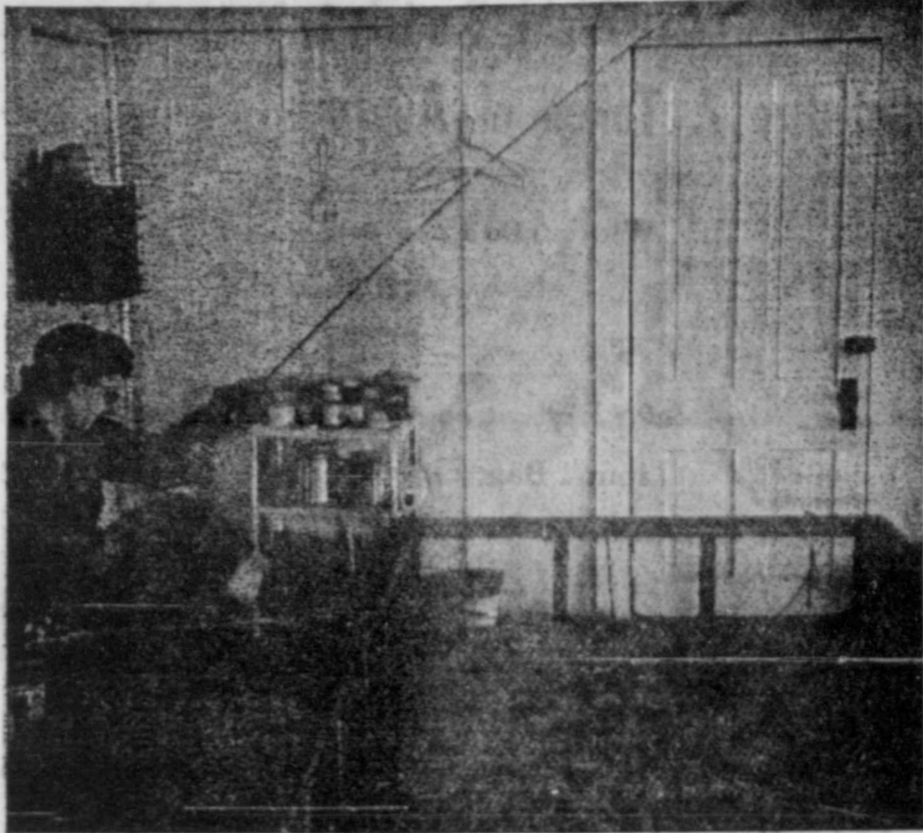

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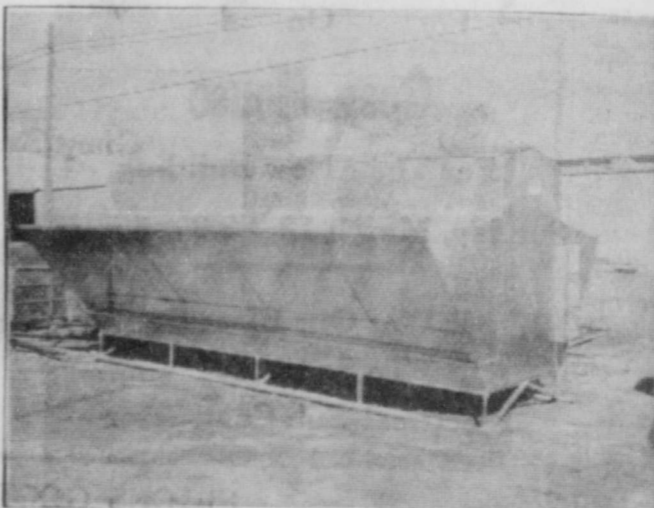
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Woody Egger Tells Of Experiences As New Zealand Exchange Student

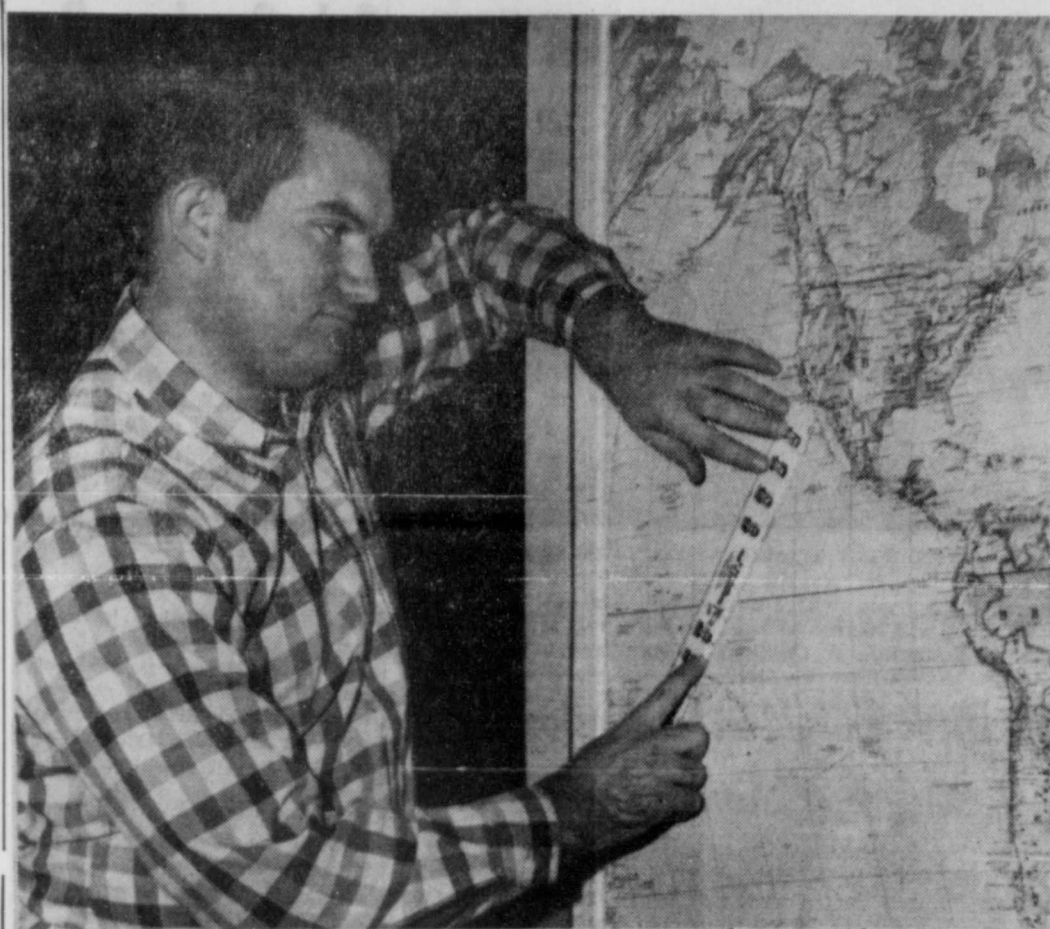

Following are excerpts from Woody's letters that he sent home after attending school a little over a week.

"Now I have fifteen minutes to get dressed in my school uniform. I suppose you wonder about my uniform. Well, here goes from bottom up. It consists of grey socks and black shoes and trousers that are either black or grey. Also included is a white shirt and a gold and grey striped tie. Next comes a grey sweater with gold trimmed neck. Eventually I will have a grey school blazer that is trimmed in gold, but I had to order this as they don't usually make them in size 'Texas.' Also, when cold weather comes, I will wear a gold and grey scarf."

"I have fifteen minutes to eat breakfast before jumping on my bicycle to go catch the

bus. I have to go about a mile and a half to catch the bus. The school bus is a chartered one from some company like Greyhound, and it picks up kids for four different schools."

"School begins at 8:45 with an assembly where we all sing a hymn, hear a short lesson from the Bible, say a prayer, and receive any notices for the day. Next, I go to my first two classes. Classes are about forty-five minutes long."

"After the second period, we have a twenty minute break to walk around doing nothing or play a couple of card games or anything else you can find to

do. After this we have roll call in form room (home room), then go to our third and fourth periods. After this everyone has an hour lunch period. There are no school lunches, so everyone has to bring sandwiches, cookies, and so forth. They do have a canteen for ice cream and cold drinks though. Lunch period is also used for going to the Library (only time it's open). After lunch we have our last three periods from 1:15 to 3:30. I catch the bus for home at ten 'till four. I get home about 4:30 and after evening chores and tea, I get a little homework and go to bed."

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Medicare Patients Are Invited To Have Claims Checked By SS Office

Older people in this area who have paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their medicare doctor bill insurance payments are invited to have their claims checked by the Brownwood Social Security Office before mail-

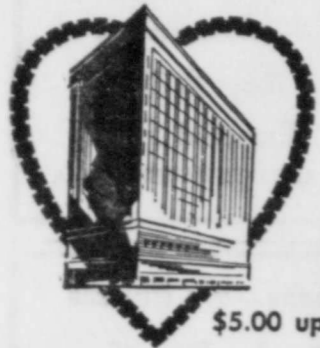
ing them, says Glen McNatt, in charge of the Brownwood office.

"In the first six months of the medicare program, some benefit payments were delayed because the applicants did not include all necessary information with their claims," he said. McNatt believes most people will need this help only the first time they make a medical insurance claim. "The Medicare Handbook, given to all people eligible, explains how to make the claim," he said, "and the form is relatively simple, but most people can use some advice the first time they apply."

McNatt noted that the medicare claim may be made either by the doctor if he accepts assignment of the insurance, or by the patient if the patient first pays the bill. If the patient applies, he sends the completed request-for-payment form together with an itemized receipted bill.

"The Social Security Office does not make the decision or pay the claim," he explained. "The law requires that the payments be handled through the selected medicare carriers. In Texas, this is Medicare (Blue Shield) in Dallas. But we can answer general questions and help people get their applications ready for review by Blue Shield."

In 1884 she moved with her young parents to a log cabin on Browns Creek near what is now known as Bozar Crossing in Mills County. At the age of 17 she became a clerk in her father's General Mercantile store. Through this experience she became familiar with the problems of the farm folks in this section.

In 1901 she entered the senior class in the Sam Houston State Normal Institute, Huntsville, Texas. Upon receiving her diploma she entered the teaching profession and taught in the public schools of Texas for thirty years.

In 1910 she married the Rev. J. S. Bowles, a Methodist minister, who preceded her in death in 1948 in Fort Worth.

In 1922, Mrs. Bowles received a B. A. degree from Texas Woman's College, Fort Worth, and in 1928 a Master's degree from the University of Texas.

Mrs. Bowles' outstanding contributions to the field of his-

tory are two books, "The History of Trinity County" published in 1966 under the auspices of the Groveton Public Schools where Mrs. Bowles taught for a number of years; and "A No Man's Land Becomes A County," history of Mills County, published in 1958.

Mrs. Bowles lived a very active life, working with young people in the public schools and with adult and youth groups as a wife and helpmate of a minister. At the time of her death she was a member of the Goldthwaite Methodist Church, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and was a charter member of the Mills County Histori-

Col. Garrison Reminds Motorists To Get Vehicles Inspected For '67

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance of the garage.

He advised that inspection stations are being urged to re-

quest permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorist as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a 'check-

up' and start the new year right with a safe vehicle."

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GOLDTHWAITE, MILLS COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Goldthwaite:
SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of April, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Goldthwaite by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:
FIRST 800 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.760 gross; \$1.584 net.
NEXT 1,200 cu. ft. @ \$1.482 per MCF gross; \$1.334 per MCF net.
NEXT 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$0.927 per MCF gross; \$0.834 per MCF net.
NEXT 20,000 cu. ft. @ \$0.649 per MCF gross; \$0.584 per MCF net.
OVER 25,000 cu. ft. @ \$0.593 per MCF gross; \$0.534 per MCF net.
No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.
ADJUSTMENT
The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.
Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.
In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.
The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.
SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.
SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.

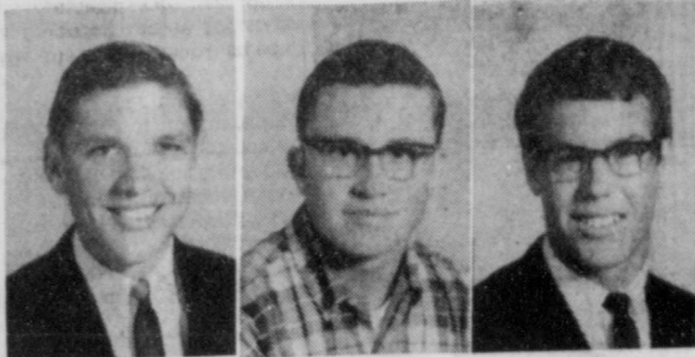

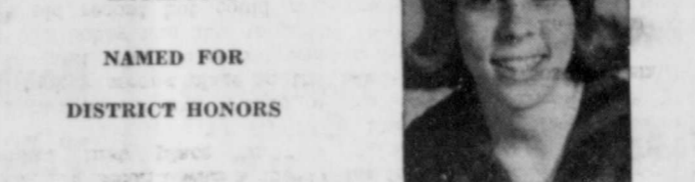

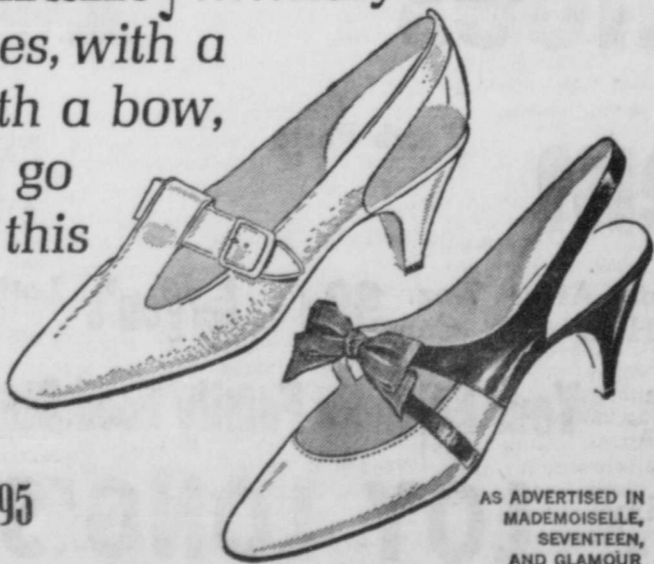
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Liquor By The Drink Legislation Appears Heading For Rough Road

"If the saloon bill is passed and liquor by the drink is allowed by law, more than 600 Texans will die needlessly in automobile accidents the first year," Rev. Tommy Jones, pastor of the First Baptist Church, said today.

Rev. Jones said the 600 figure is based on a 20 per cent increase in fatal automobile accidents that occurred in other states after liquor by the drink was legalized. "Some of our neighbors, friends, children will be the victims of drinking drivers—deaths that are needless," he said.

In addition to the 600 additional deaths in automobile accidents, the number of alcoholics would increase by 50%, according to records of other states with saloon laws. "These are well-documented facts. For every \$1.00 in alcohol taxes Texas collects, it spends \$37.00 in alcohol-caused costs, such as crime, welfare, lost jobs, extra policing, courts, etc., according to the American Business Men's Research Foundation. Liquor by the drink will cause more people to start drinking. It will enable

more minors to drink, increase crime. It will increase the traffic accidents, cause cholera, and poverty. It is a Christian duty to oppose saloon bill," Rev. Jones said.

Open saloons would increase available tax money cause so much alcohol-related costs would rise, according to statistics from Texas Alcoholics Education, Inc., saloons would not cut down amount of drinking, but would increase it.

In "bottle only" states capita consumption of alcohol is slightly under one gallon per person per year. In open states it is nearly two gallons, Rev. Jones said.
