This includes boys and girls who are 5 or 6 years of age and who have not gone to school.

## Priddy Bank Burglary Suspects Held At Marshall


Sheriff H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff, has announced that four persons charged with burglary of the Farmers and Merchants Bank at Priddy, on August 31, are being held in jail at Marshall, Texas, in lieu of bond. They have been charged in Justice Of The Peace E. H. Thorne's court in Goldthwaite and detainer warrants have been forwarded to the Harrison County Sheriff at Marshall, according to Sheriff Brooks. Their case will go before the Grand Jury in the November term of court.

The burglary at Priddy netted the suspects less than \$10.00 in cash although they did considerable damage to the vault while being unable to gain entry to the safe.

Sheriff Brooks said that officers at Marshall identified the men as Billy Joe Suel, 25, and brothers Jerry Grammer, 24, Larry Grammer, 19, and Charles Grammer, 22.

The men are also charged with bank burglaries at other places.

The Eagles returned to Goldthwaite Friday night with a 26-8 victory over the Mason Cowpunchers. The win over the District 8-AA member put the Eagles at 1-2 for the season in non-district play.

Gary Warlick opened the scoring for the Eagles in the second quarter with a 37-yard sprint to the goal for six points.

Ted Roberts came back with his first score on a five-yard run in the third quarter, making the score 13-0 after Danny Spradley kicked an extra point.

Mason got its lone touchdown in the first part of the fourth quarter when Larry Donop ran over from one yard out. Wayne Lehmborg passed to Louis Durst for two extra points, and the scoreboard read 13-6.

Mike Wright added another tally for the Eagles when he intercepted a Mason pass and returned it 70 yards for a TD. The final Eagle touchdown was a one-yard plunge by Ted Roberts. Gary Warlick kicked the extra point, ending the game at 26-8.

Eagle coach, Les Johnson, made the following comments about the game, "We're proud of our boys, as they showed a lot of improvement. They played much better as a whole team, and there was no outstanding individual. Our defense was very aggressive with lots of pursuit and gang tackling. The offense showed up much better, and we came out with only one fumble."

A tract of land with 31.86 acres was annexed to the city of Goldthwaite by action of the city council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall.

A petition calling for the annexation of the land belonging to Ray and Margaret Duren was presented to the council and was accepted.

The Council then passed an ordinance annexing the tract to the city and enlarging the city limits area by 31.86 acres.

The tract of land is situated at the north edge of the city, bounded on the South by highway 84, on the West of the old Brownwood highway and on the East by the Railroad.

Operating reports of receipts and disbursements, for the month of September for the various departments, were presented to the council by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

Quarterly treasurer's report was also presented and approved, along with operating report for the swimming pool for the past season.

It was reported that the Library fund was out of money and the council voted to transfer \$500.00 from the general fund to the Library fund.







AUSTIN, Tex.—Although the primaries are not until next May, Texas politicians, here and there, already are beginning to get in and out of statewide races.

Big question still is whether Gov. John Connally will run for an unprecedented fourth term. He says he hasn't made up his mind.

If he doesn't run, it now appears that it will be at least a three-way race in the Democratic primary—between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, who already has announced, Speaker Ben Barnes and former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

If Connally does run, Barnes and Carr probably will vie for lieutenant governor, though neither has as yet announced a definite decision.

In the state Supreme Court, both Associate Justice James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffith say that they will not seek reelection in 1968. Woodrow Bean of El Paso and former state Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio are being mentioned as possible candidates for those two posts.

### Highway Officials Promoted

On January first B. L. DeBerry, Dallas district highway engineer, will replace Assistant State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall. Dingwall will replace State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer, who is retiring.

There will be four other administrative changes in the Highway Department:

Archie J. Sherrod, now district engineer in Odessa, will be promoted to chief engineer of maintenance operations.

John G. Keller, Beaumont district engineer, will succeed DeBerry.

Franklin Carter Young, district administrative engineer in San Antonio, will take over Keller's job.

Paul H. Coleman, assistant district engineer at Odessa, will replace Sherrod.

### Research Award To Texas

Texas Research League was presented the top research award of the Governmental Research Association for its report, "Metropolitan Texas: A Workable Approach to Its Problems."

Award was made in Boston. Accepting were Alvin A. Burger, executive director of the League, and James W. McGrew, research director and head of the project.

League's report was made after an 18-month study requested by Governor Connally. It contained seven legislative recommendations, but only one of them passed the Legislature. That one provided \$250,000 of state money for regional planning.

### Texas Tourism Pushed

Texas' official travel exhibit—pushing the state as a vacation land with a "World of Difference"—was seen by approximately 450,000 persons at the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto. So says Walt Warner, director of programs for the Texas Tourist Development Agency, which sponsors the exhibit.

Warner regards Canada as an important but unexplored market for the Texas travel industry. "Many (Canadians) were unaware that Texas lay just 1,200 miles from Toronto's border," he said. "They seemed surprised to find a state so near that offered a warm, tropical climate during the winter months."

Texas' exhibit is being displayed in travel shows all over North America.

### Oil Production Down

Texas oil production was reduced by 109,071 barrels for October. Texas Railroad Commission cut out the allowable after finding demand lower as the Middle East crisis eases off.

Commission was to have announced its decision immediately at its regular statewide production hearing, but delayed it four days to see what effect Hurricane Beulah would have on production and refining.

After studying that situation, it was decided that no major damage had been incurred, though there were temporary disruptions.

### Camino Del Norte Proposed

A group of Midland citizens appeared before the Texas Highway Commission to request a study on the feasibility of an interstate highway stretching from the Big Bend Country to Denver.

Dubbed "Camino Del Norte" by the applicants, the highway would begin at U. S. 90 near the Mexican border and would run through Midland, Lubbock, Amarillo and on to Denver.

Delegation presented the Commission with copies of a brochure outlining the proposed highway—examining the population, education, cultural, recreational, historic and national security aspects of the prospect.

Commission took the request under advisement.

### City Sales Tax Favored

Saturday midnight was an important hour in Austin, in so far as many Texas municipalities were concerned. That was the deadline date for reporting city sales tax election results to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. . . if the tax is to go into effect January 1. Otherwise the cities would not go under the tax until April 1, 1968.

As of this writing, 12 of the 13 municipalities that have voted on whether or not to adopt a 1% city sales tax, along the lines of the state's 2% sales tax, have favored the proposal.

Voters in Electra, near Wichita Falls, turned it down.

Voters in the following cities adopted the new-to-Texas taxing device: Aransas Pass, Austin, Elgin, Orange Grove, Herietta, Ingleside, Nacogdoches, El Paso, Port Aransas, Taylor, Texarkana and Wichita Falls.

### Short Snorts

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has ruled that the State Textbook Committee is covered by the 1967 Open Meeting Bill, which requires that all meetings of most state and local agencies be open to the public.

State Republican Headquarters announce that Jay Anderson of East Bernard has been appointed deputy state Republican chairman for Region III, and Jim Griffith of San Marcos has been named Republican district committeeman for the 14th Senatorial District.

Texas Highway Commission celebrated its 50th birthday in Austin last week with former officials joining current ones and leading elected officials in festivities.

Austin, Texas — One day after receiving a 40-year service award from the Texas Highway Commission, State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer announced his retirement.

Greer reached the mandatory retirement age of 65 on July 27; but he agreed, at the behest of the Commission, to stay in the job until the end of the year.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, acting as governor while Connally hunts in Africa, called on Greer at his office to present him with a framed copy of a proclamation making August 4 "DeWitt C. Greer Day" in Texas.

A celebration commemorating the Highway Department's 50 years is slated for September 26. A highlight of the celebration

will be presentation to Greer of funds donated to endow in his honor a lectureship at the Texas A&M Civil Engineering Department.

Greer, a graduate of A&M, went to work for the Highway Department in 1927 and became its top administrator in 1940. During his tenure as chief engineer, Greer has supervised the investment of more than \$4,000,000,000 in a highway system that's grown from 20,359 miles to more than 68,000 during the past 27 years.

A former president of the American Association of State Highway Officials, Greer now serves on the organization's executive and legislative committees and has received its two highest honors for contributions to highway progress. In 1965, Texas Christian University made him an honorary Doctor of Laws. Texas A&M gave him its Distinguished Alumni Award in 1966.

### SUCCESSOR NAMED

Succeeding Greer on January 1 will be Asst. State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall who has been with the Department since 1928 except for the World War II years when he served in the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and four years he spent as Engineer-Manager of the Texas Turnpike Authority, supervising the financing, design and construction of the \$58,000,000 Dallas-Port Worth Turnpike.

Dingwall served as the Department's supervising urban engineer in Houston, overseeing construction of the Gulf Freeway — the first major freeway built in Texas. He has been assistant state highway engineer since 1958.

In other Highway Department activity, Hay Woodward of Coleman was sworn in as chairman of the Highway Commission, and Herbert C. Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs took the oath to begin an unprecedented third six-year term on the Commission.

Woodward, who succeeds Petry as chairman, was first named to the Commission in 1955.

## Questions And Answers Asked At Draft Boards

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—Can military men serve on draft boards?

A—No. Not even a member of the military Reserves.

Q—Last year I attended college part time, but will attend full time, beginning in September. Will I qualify for student deferment?

A—Ordinarily, a student who attended part time last year would not qualify for Class II-S this year because he was not then full time. Your board's consideration of circumstances might, however, result in deferment in II-S.

Q—My sick friend won't be able to complete high school until he is nearly 20. Will he be drafted before he gets out?

A—A young man who is a high school student and satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course shall be deferred in Class I-S for high school study until (1) he is graduated, (2) reaches age 20, or (3) drops out of school, whichever is first.

Q—I was 24 years old in July. If I become an undergraduate student this fall, will I qualify for the II-S student deferment?

A—No, because you're 24. You will qualify for classification in Class I-S for an academic year if you're ordered for induction while you're a full-time, satisfactory student.

Q—We have only one son. We've heard if a family has only one son he won't be drafted, but he'll be put in Class IV-A. Is that right?

A—That depends. The provides that he must be sole surviving son of a father of which the father or more sons or daughters killed in action or died in of duty while serving in Armed Forces of the U. S. subsequently died as a result of injuries received or disease occurred during this service.

Q—Must a man return to own local draft board for Armed Forces physical examination, or for his induction?

A—No. He may transfer either physical examination or induction by requesting this at the draft board nearest him.

Q—Recently my wife and I were divorced. She has custody of our two children and them with her. Can I still be in Class III-A deferment?

A—Not as a father. To qualify for III-A, you must maintain bona fide family relationship with the children in your home. It may be possible for you to be deferred in III-A because of extreme hardship to these dependents, but you will have to prove hardship to your board's satisfaction.

Q—How long did Congress tend the draft law?

A—Until July 1, 1971.



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## Social Security Disability Pay In Mills County \$40,000 Annually

August 1967 marked the tenth anniversary of the first disability benefit payments under social security. In the 10 years 1957 to 1967, the number of people in the nation receiving these payments has risen from 149,850 to over 2 million, including wives and children who receive payments also as dependents. In Mills County, almost \$40,000 is paid yearly to these people.

abled. The average monthly amount paid a disabled worker is \$98, and the average family amount is \$215 where there are a wife and one or more children.

Glen McNatt, in charge of the Brownwood Social Security Office, says if someone under age 65 worked under social security but cannot work now due to disability can get more information at the office and can apply for payments if he wishes.

Disability payments can be made to a disabled worker at any age under 65 if he or she worked long enough under social security to be "insured," meaning 5 years of work in the 10 years before becoming disabled. At present, 56 million workers and their wives and children, or about 87% of the nation's population under 65, are protected against loss of income if the worker becomes disabled.



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



## 1968 Feed Grain Situation To Be Discussed At Meetings This Week

Open meetings to discuss the feed grain situation and program alternatives for the 1968 Feed Grain Program were announced today by Mr. Ralph T. Price, Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee. The meetings starting at 10:00 a. m. will be held in Vernon, Texas on October 5, 1967 at the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium and in San Antonio, Texas on October 6, 1967, at the Sheraton Motor Inn, 1400 Austin Highway.

Leaders and representatives of farm organizations, commodity producer groups, and trade groups interested in feed grain are being invited to come and present their views. Anyone who is interested in the feed grain outlook and program is welcome to attend.

The Chairman explained that the meetings are two of a series being held in major feed grain states to provide farmers and other interested people an opportunity to express their views and recommendations on the feed grain program for the 1968 crop year.

Representatives of the Secretary of Agriculture will attend each meeting to discuss the feed grain situation, review the various provisions of the feed grain legislation, and outline program alternatives for the 1968 crop.

Matters to be discussed at the meetings will include the feed grain supply-demand situation; the size of the 1968 production needed and the acreage to be diverted to conserving use in order to achieve that desired level of production under average weather condition; the various levels at which the diversion percentage, diversion payment rate, the price support payment rate, and the loan rate might be established for 1968; whether soybeans might again be substituted for feed grains; and other miscellaneous problems and decisions of importance.

Anyone who is not able to attend the meetings in person but who wishes to make a recommendation may submit his ideas in writing to the Secretary of Agriculture as soon as possible but not later than October 10. All recommendations will be given careful study by the Department. Various phases of the 1968 Feed Grain Program will be announced soon, possibly in late October.

## New Procedure Is Announced For Antlerless Deer Permits

Landowners who plan to permit hunting of antlerless deer in regulatory responsibility counties during the 1967 regular hunting season must draw their permits at the time and place publicized in local news media or not hunt antlerless deer this year, according to a statement issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

This new ruling conforms to Senate Bill 295, passed by the last legislature. The intent of the act, as written in Section 15, is "to produce a greater degree of uniformity."

Section 6 of the same act prohibits the Department from issuing permits later than 10 days prior to the opening of the regular season.

Department authorities said the permits would be issued to landowners sometime during the latter part of October after deer census counts have been completed. The actual date of issuance in counties concerned will be announced later.

Department records for 1966 show that more than 49 per cent of landowners, in certain counties, did not draw their permits at the scheduled time and place as announced in local news media.

Since more than 10,000 landowners in regulatory counties drew permits on a state-wide basis in 1966, field personnel of the Department were required to interrupt law enforcement

and data gathering activities during the open deer season in order to issue permits to landowners or their agents who had not drawn permits on the dates selected.

"In many cases, requests by landowners for permits after the deadline were difficult to honor as field personnel were away from headquarters and in the field much of the time during this peak period of activity," Department sources said.

The commission suggested absentee landowners designate a person in the locality to act as agent and draw the permits allocated to properties concerned.
