San Saba's strong line and fine passing ability on the part of QB Phil Letbetter put the squeeze on Goldthwaite, with a touchdown in each of the first three quarters. Letbetter's passes of 27 and 30 yards connected with Dick Little and Bill Watkins for the first two tallies. The passing artist then intercepted on the Eagle 20-yard line and crossed over for the final TD.

Little kicked one extra point, Frankie Miller ran over for a two-point conversion after a faked kick, and Letbetter passed to Little for the last two extra points.

Seniors And Parents Are Reminded Of College Entrance Requirements

As colleges and universities in the state of Texas become more crowded, entrance requirements are becoming harder to meet. Students in the four Mills County Public Schools have been given materials and explanation of entrance recommendations by county counselor, O'Donnell Newton.

With few exceptions, colleges and universities in the state and United States use either the ACT or SAT college entrance examination. Students have received the registration materials and have been urged to take one or both of the tests as soon as possible. Most colleges have deadlines for completion of the tests and submitting an application for admission. An early testing date will help

the students interested in scholarships and loans. To qualify for most scholarships, a student needs an overall academic average of at least a high B and in the upper quarter of his class. Also, it is important that he, or she, decide on a possible major before applying for a scholarship. These applications must be in as early as possible or at least by March 15, in most cases.

Priority is usually given to early loan applicants. Again, if the student completes his, or her, entrance requirements early, the chances of obtaining a loan are increased.

Newton is available at each county school one day a week and encourages all students and parents with questions to call or come by for a conference.

AUSTIN, Tex.—A new Texas land war is raging.

Land developers and Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler are in disagreement over the recently-revived \$400 million state Veterans Land Program.

Mindful of the VLP scandals of the mid '50's, Sadler is adopting cautious, conservative policies to guide future state policies. Program permits qualified veterans to buy land on the low interest, long-term-pay plan.

Developers claim Sadler is tight-fisted and is jeopardizing the program by low-ceiling land value appraisals and limiting sales to 10 per cent of large sub-divisions.

Under Sadler's limits, developers with tracts of 1,000 acres can sell only 100 acres through the state bond-financed program. The Commissioner argues that the state should not spend all its constitutionally-authorized bond funds in a few areas.

Central Texas developers counter that land values already are soaring and that veterans held out of the market now eventually will pay higher rates.

Sadler says land already is selling at prices beyond reason in Travis, Kerr, Bastrop and Hidalgo Counties. Realtors say

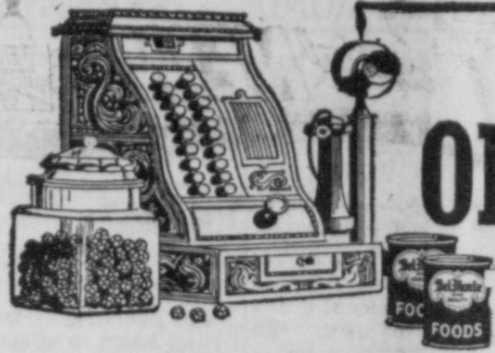

September is always a problem month for mothers with children in school. Once again they must fight the breakfast battle, the getting up and getting dressed in time to catch the bus battle, and at night the TV versus homework battle. After the adjustment period of September, some of these battles have been won (or lost), but at least they're accepted in one way or the other.

When my children were at home my biggest battle was with my daughter, and the problem was that she didn't want to eat breakfast. I had always been taught to eat breakfast as I grew up, and then in school was deeply impressed by the scientific findings on what breakfast does for us. Do you know that a child or person of any age is supposed to be able to learn more and retain it longer if he eats an adequate and balanced breakfast? This may not work for all of us, but research has proved

it to be so on the average child. It has been studied for many generations, and the results are always the same.

My daughter's main complaint was that she didn't like eggs or cereal. One day I read this article about this very problem that stated if your child didn't like the standard breakfast foods you should give him anything he would eat rather than send him to school with an empty stomach. This was where the tide turned with our non-breakfast eater. I told her she could have anything she wanted, but that she must eat something. You won't believe the things I fixed for her—chili dogs, tuna fish sandwiches, chocolate cake, ice cream sundaes, etc.

Possibly you are saying to yourself by now, that Peggy Edwards is crazy. For awhile I thought so myself, but all this wild food really paid off. After a week or two she got used to eating the normal breakfast foods with the rest of us. (I had no problem with my son and husband). She has been eating

like a human being ever since, and that makes mother feel very good. If you have a similar problem try this — It might work for you.

COUNTY WOMEN ATTEND GOVERNOR'S WORKSHOP

The Governor's Committee on Aging, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, held a workshop in Brownwood September 10-11. Those who attended from Mills County were Mrs. J. M. Wrinkle, Jr., and Mrs. Joe Anderson, local Community Action workers, and Mrs. Peggy Edwards, Mills County Home Demonstration Agent.

Much practical and useful information was derived from attending this workshop. The objective of the meeting was to help interested people to understand the problems our elderly face, and what we can do to help solve these problems. Sessions were held covering the areas of: Nutrition, Housing and Furnishings, Consumer Protection, The Use of Leisure Time, and Special Projects for the Elderly.

Mrs. J. M. Wrinkle, Jr., is presently engaged in making a survey of persons aged 60 or over in Mills County. This is a government survey called Project FIND, and it is designed to find the needs of our elderly. Mrs. Wrinkle was so enthused by all she learned at this workshop that she wrote this about her session on Use of Leisure Time:

"I have spent a wonderful day being briefed on the subject of Senior Citizens. After listening to the many ways to help our senior citizens lead useful and productive lives; I for one began to realize what we have been missing in letting them believe their usefulness is over. From the knowledge they have acquired in life they can surely help our generation and those yet to come.

"For instance, the art of tating, knitting and crocheting is almost lost. We must not let this happen. Those who sew can give scraps and many beautiful and interesting household helpers can be made by the hands of our elderly who still want to help someone else. You and your time are needed if you will volunteer your help.

"For the men there is always scraps of wood that can be made into useful attractive toys for children. Many of these toys are actually educational, and are made special for children with problems of coordination, etc.

"Those of us who attended this workshop came home very excited and full of hope for youngsters and senior citizens alike. Each of us like to feel that we are able to accomplish some small task to help others. There is no greater pleasure in life than knowing you have helped some one to have a brighter day."

A young couple just getting started were unable to borrow enough money from private credit to build or buy a badly needed home. Farmers Home Administration loaned them the money they needed and gave them terms long enough to keep the payments within their paying ability.

An elderly couple needed a new roof on their home but were unable to obtain the money from private credit sources due to age, security, and paying ability. Farmers Home Administration loaned them enough to put a new roof on their home and provided them with terms within their paying ability.

Farmers Home Administration housing loans are made from private sources at reasonable rates and terms and tailored to individual needs. They can be made in the countryside or in towns up to 5,500 population.
