Results Reported Here Deer Hunters

Probably good luck has been reported by local deer hunters who headed for the hills Saturday morning. The deer season got underway according to reports from the Eagle office.

Deer hunters got their bucks over the hills despite the extremely heavy fog early Saturday morning which caused the hunters to get off to a bit slow start.

Deer hunting has been reported in the western part of Mills County. Mrs. Glenn Nicolson reported that eight bucks were killed the first two days on the hunt. She and her husband, Lillian Landon, and her son, R. Ashton and Hern Harshbarger, eleven miles west of Goldthwaite.

As many early morning hunters as have been reported for the first day were reported for this year as have been reported in some other areas.

October 31: One buck checked in at County Locker Saturday morning by James Knight. The buck was checked in at 9 a. m. Before Saturday morning 25 bucks had been checked in, and by Monday afternoon 40 deer, including two bucks, had been checked in at the locker plant.

All reports that have been reported to the Eagle office, a buck killed by Lesley is the largest buck in Mills County this season. The buck, which was killed by Sleepy Hollow in the western part of the county, field dressed 132 pounds.

Heavy Snowfall Covers County

A heavy and unusually wet snowfall covered Mills County last Friday giving farm and ranch lands much needed relief from the extreme dry weather experienced here the past month to six weeks.

Some parts of the county received considerable rain before it turned into snow.

In Goldthwaite it started to rain about 5 a. m. Friday morning and continued until it turned into snow about 9 a. m.

Snowfall soon covered the ground and it continued until late afternoon. Many reported that they have never seen snowflakes that large falling in this area. The ground was warm and most of the snow melted the same day it fell and all of it was gone by Saturday night.

Snowfall was so heavy that some damage was reported to pecan trees as many limbs loaded with pecans broke and some trees split.

Some reports indicate that parts of the county received four to five inches of wet snow.

On-official reports from over the county are .70 to 1.90 inches of precipitation from the snow and rain last Friday and Saturday.

Officially, Weatherman Harry Allen reported 2.50 inches of snow and 1.32 inches of precipitation from the rain and snow. This brings the total for November to 1.64 inches.

The GHS Fighting Eagles will host the Early Longhorns this Friday night in what will decide the District 9-A championship. This will be the Eagles' last home game and will start at 7:30 p. m. By winning, the Eagles will hold a clear title to the crown. However, if Early should win, Goldthwaite will be forced into a co-championship with Bangs. In this case, the Eagles would automatically represent the district in the bi-district play-off, because they beat Bangs earlier in the season.

Early stands 7-2 in season play, while the Eagles hold a 4-5 season record. Early has had several players injured this year, but all of them are well now and will be in full force Friday night, according to Coach Johnson. In speaking of Early he said, "They have a good ball club and have been pointing to this game all year. They will be out to whip us, but we're going to be ready for them."

Dale Dodson, Longhorn tailback, boasts the best scoring record in the area this year with 110 points in nine games. He has also racked up over 1600 yards rushing. Other Early players to look out for will be QB Robert Lee, center Joe Evans, and Joey Grissom, and back David Kemp, according to Johnson. Early has all but two of their players back from last year.

Joe Dan Hardgrave was the leading rusher for the Eagles with 127 yards on 8 carries.

Disposable Sack Refuse Collection Considered Further By City Council

The Goldthwaite City Council is giving further and serious consideration to a new system of using disposable sacks for refuse collection by the city garbage department.

This new method appears the coming thing for cities from the standpoint of health and sanitation and also labor saving for city crews.

Benj. Feld, representing St. Regis Paper Company, appeared before the council Monday night to explain the method and he also displayed some samples of the paper sacks with holder and rack for the sack.

The two ply wet strength paper bags are of the same capacity as 30 gallon garbage cans. Under the new method garbage cans would be eliminated and refuse and garbage would be picked up bag and all each week and new bags would be used for the next week's collection.

After the demonstration Monday night members of the council discussed the cost of the new system along with the fact that the city is faced with revising the present garbage collection charges, both residential and commercial.

Present rates are out of date and cover only about one half or less of the actual cost of providing this service for city residents.

Revising rates has been under study for some time by the council as well as the new refuse bag system which is being installed by other cities, large and small.

Also discussed was the need of making it mandatory for all residences of the city to be on the collection system since the city has to operate the truck over the various routes. At the present time about 100 residences are not using the city's garbage collection system.

The council will give serious study before the next meeting on December 2, with the idea of installing the new system on a trial basis covering a certain number of residences on a selected route of the present garbage collection system.

In the meantime a sample of the disposable sack, with holder and stand will be on display at the front of the city hall where it may be inspected by anyone interested.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, said that this will give the citizens of Goldthwaite an opportunity to see it and ask any questions that they may have regarding this new system. City employees will be happy to answer questions and explain the plan.

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Bennet Creek Watershed Work Plan At Critical Stage Pending Approval

Progress toward construction readiness for the Bennet Creek Watershed hinges on easements from local landowners, according to directors of the WCID.

The Watershed Work Plan is now in Washington in category "Operations Approval Pending," according to Doug Sellars, Work Unit Conservationist, and will be ready for operations when finally approved and all remaining easements are obtained.

Bennet Creek is one of eleven Texas watersheds now in Washington for final approval and, therefore, must have all easements for construction before operations can begin according to Sellars.

Those watersheds that do not have all the land rights cleared, when Congress is ready to give final approval and financing, will be dropped and put on the inactive list. No further action will be taken on inactive watershed projects until the local people secure all remaining land rights and request re-activation of their watershed application.

Re-activated applications will then have to compete for priority at state and Washington levels, Sellars points out. With the apparent shortage of construction funds and the tremendous competition for Federal assistance to watershed projects, it is quite likely that de-activated watershed applications will be lost in the shuffle.

To point out the competition at the state level, says Sellars, Texas alone has received 232 watershed applications and more are anticipated. The 240 applications now in Washington awaiting various levels of approval for planning or operations are evidence of tough competition for small watersheds.

The Bennet Creek watershed project would provide benefits in the form of reduced annual flood damages for the Goldthwaite trade area. It would mean an estimated \$33,962 annual benefits in flood damage reduction and improved land treatment measures. It will also result in permanent storage of about 800 acre feet of water covering 125 surface acres for the enhancement of wildlife and natural beauty.

There would also be improved grazing along the approximate 7.6 miles of shoreline of the four structures on 885 acres of land that will receive temporary flood water. Permanent water and temporary floodwater storage behind the flood prevention dams would also cause Bennet Creek to flow for a longer period of time.

With increased water storage and improved vegetative cover in the upper part of the watershed, Bennet Creek can even be made more nearly a continuous running stream.

Local interest in the Bennet Creek Watershed must now be evidenced by action, if progress continues toward an installed program. Those interested in seeing the flood control program become a reality might well lend encouragement where needed by contacting the directors of the WCID for information on how they may help with the program.

Through the years I have learned many things about people. Sometimes I even learn something about myself. All in all I have come to one conclusion, and that is that nobody is perfect—especially me. So many of you were kind enough to let me know you read my column.

You will never know how good it makes me feel to know of your interest in the words I write. Many of you were smart enough to realize that an Apricot Nectar Cake should have some apricot nectar in it. One reader said, "how do you get the apricot nectar in the cake? Do you pour it over it after it's done or what?" By now you are realizing that I'm telling you that I goofed last week on the Apricot Nectar cake recipe. Please note that this is a correction and if you cut that column out for your recipe file, take a black pencil and X out that recipe. Here is the corrected recipe.

APRICOT NECTAR CAKE

- (It's Still My Favorite)
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1 pkg. lemon jello
3/4 cup liquid shortening
3/4 cup apricot nectar
4 eggs
2 tablespoons vanilla flavoring
2 tablespoons lemon extract
Directions: Put cake mix and jello into large mixing bowl. Add shortening and apricot nectar — beat 1 minute. Add eggs one at a time and beat after each. Add flavoring last and beat well.

Pour into greased and flour-ed tube pan. Bake for 55 minutes at 325 degrees.

Correction No. 2

On the easy cake mix variations where it says use chocolate pudding with chocolate cake mix, this is wrong. With chocolate instant pudding you use yellow cake mix and with vanilla instant pudding, use chocolate cake mix.

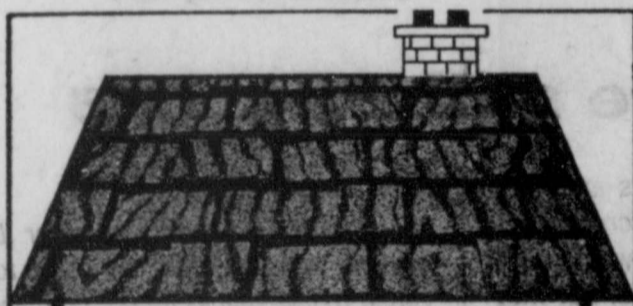
Garden Clubbers Hold Flower Show Workshop, Nov. 6

Dear Editor:

I have lived in Goldthwaite my life and have rarely been ashamed of that fact. That is, until I came home from college to teach here in the public school.

Now, I do have something to be ashamed of and I do have a complaint. I'm concerned about what I see in the stands at a football game.

A teacher tries to instill in his students some pride of country. But it's hard to do so when, during the National Anthem, some people talk and NO ONE sings.

Pride in our school is hard to teach if disparaging remarks are made about that school. And how often I've heard snide remarks about coaches, the football boys, the band. If the band does not perform letter perfect, there is always some Goldthwaite rooster who will say "they're no good, and say it loud enough for all to hear. After all, how perfect were you at marching, staying in step, playing beautifully when you were twelve or thirteen? Or didn't you know that about half of the band members were twelve

and thirteen? And what about sportsmanship? I heard a man from Goldthwaite, when an opposing member was injured on the field, yell "Get that boy off of there. We came to play football." I wonder what he would say if HIS son were hurt on the field. The same thing? I doubt it!

How can a teacher ever hope to help students be tolerant of other races when a Negro from an opposing team is abused profanely by a small segment of Goldthwaite people? How can the boys on our team gain confidence in themselves as people, when every move they make is subject to the scorn of a loud-mouth in the stands? How can coaches do their best job when it seems that everyone in the stands knows better how to coach than the coach?

I'm not foolish enough to think that every fan from Goldthwaite shows poor conduct at the games. I AM foolish enough to think that every fan should be proud of his school — win or lose, and foolish enough to hope that the loud-mouths who criticize might be shouted down with support from concerned fans who are proud of good sportsmanship.

I love the students at this school. If I didn't, I wouldn't be so concerned.


But these kids work too hard at being good participants and good people to be subjected to the profanity and abuse sometimes handed out by some adults. Think about it.

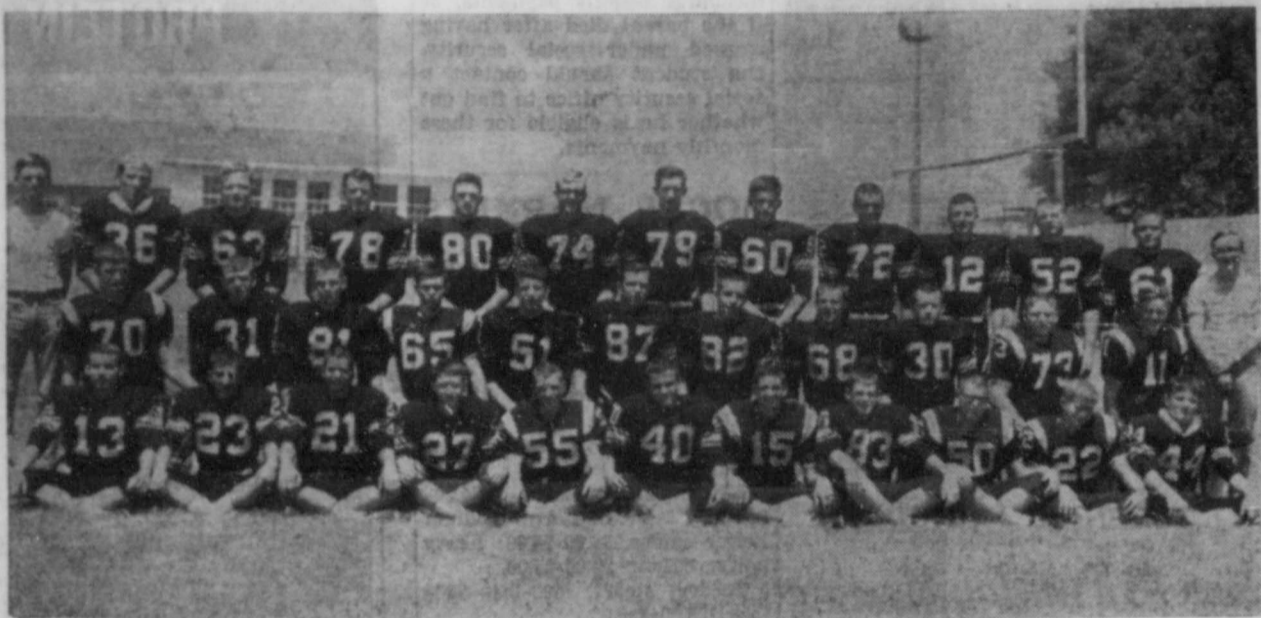

Social Security Pay To Students Reported By SSA

In the 1968-69 school year, social security will pay about \$479,000,000 to about 466,000 students between 18 and 22 years old, averaging more than \$1,000 to each eligible student.

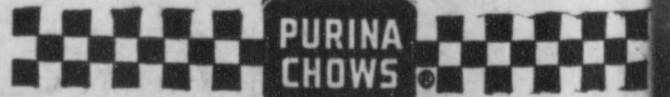

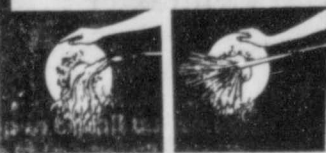
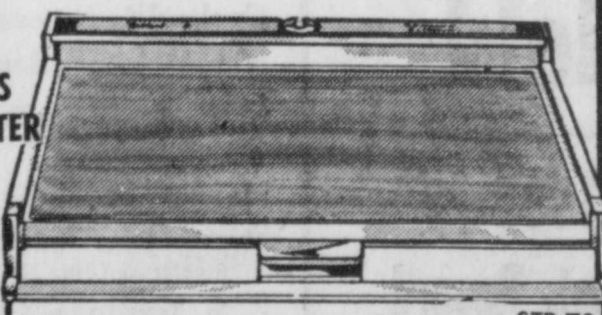

Area Quail Hunting Prospects Point Toward Record Harvest

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is urging landowners and hunters to join forces this year for what could be a record quail harvest.

"The conditions are right. High quail populations have been reported in most areas of the State and each county has a season ranging from 20 days to three months," says Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the Department.

The Possum Kingdom regulatory authority area, which includes Mills County, has a quail season in effect from November 9 through January 31. Bag limit is 12 per day, with a 36 possession limit, according to Game Management officer, Benny Schriver.

Statewide, the quail population is a little below that of 1966 which is considered a record year. However, Department biologists say several areas of the State actually have a higher population this year than they did two years ago.

Quail is the one wildlife species that dramatically points out that wildlife cannot be stockpiled or "saved" from one season to the next. Game managers of Texas have been saying this since the first research on quail began in the late 1930's.

Research over the years has always pointed to "hunt 'em when you have 'em."

Attempts at stockpiling or increasing quail populations by restocking, killing predators or closing seasons have all failed. Game biologists stress that a quail population is determined

by habitat — food, water and cover.

A landowner who wants to hunt should not be concerned about over harvest of his quail. There are thousands of acres of good quail country in the State that never have a shell fired on them. If a quail population is heavily harvested on one farm or ranch then quail will move in from adjacent areas if the habitat is adequate. This intermingling of hunted and non-hunted areas leaves brood stock in practically every area of the State," says Horace Gore, wildlife supervisor in Waco.

"You can't find an example where last year's hunting has hurt this year's quail crop," long-time Biologist Dan Lay of Nacogdoches says.

Statistics gathered over years of research show only 20 out of every 100 birds at the beginning of the hunting season will survive until the spring mating season. The other 80 birds die from lack of food, freezing weather, and other natural causes. The hunter's gun — either hunting or locked in a gun cabinet — has little influence on the carryover quail population.

"We've found that the same number of birds survive through the winter whether they are hunted or not. All the hunter does is harvest what would have been lost anyway," says E. A. Walker, director of wildlife services.

"Birds trapped on unhunted areas show the same ratios of young to old as those from hunted areas, indicating that the process of reproduction moves along in normal channels regardless of hunting," Biologist Lay wrote 15 years ago.

Some game managers say that half of the quail population can be harvested safely without any danger to the breeding stock.

AUSTIN, Tex.—General election day was a rosy one for statewide Democratic contenders.

Not only did Texas endorse liberal presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey, but also all statewide-Democratic standard bearers. No incumbent congressmen lost their jobs and the partisan lineup in the state legislature remained just the way it is.

Preston Smith of Lubbock won the gubernatorial race with about 57 per cent of the votes over his opponent and first-time candidate GOPer Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls. Ben Barnes, 30, of De Leon will become the youngest lieutenant governor in history by virtue of his overwhelming triumph over Republican Doug DeCluit of Waco. Barnes was the top statewide vote-getter on the ballot.

All incumbent statewide officials seeking re-election won handsily.

In congressional races, three Republicans seeking new terms had no great trouble, but none of their colleagues seeking to unseat incumbent Democrats was successful. Congressional lineup remains 20 Democrats to three Republicans.

Eight Republican state House members were elected — four incumbents, four newcomers. Three incumbent GOPers were defeated. Two GOP state senators were re-elected. Lineup remains 142 Democrats to eight Republicans in the House, 29 Democrats to two GOPs in the Senate.

Boasting that no other state can compare with Texas "regarding its support of, loyalty to or victory for the Democratic party," former State Democratic Committee Chairman Will D. Davis observed:

• Texas is the most populous state to have a Democratic governor and only one of 10 largest to have solid statewide Democratic administration.

• Texas was the only one in the southern and southwestern regions to give Humphrey plurality; and only Texas, Washington and Hawaii west of the Mississippi voted for the Democratic presidential nominee.

Most Amendments Defeated
Voters showed they are in an economy frame of mind in their decisions on 14 proposed state constitutional amendments.

They voted November 5 to cut out the state property tax, but they refused to go along with raising the state's public welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million a year or to increase legislators' salaries from \$4,800 to \$8,400 annually.

Approved were changes in state employees' pension system, university fund investment liberalization, removal of the \$504 a year ceiling on contributions to teacher pensions, wiping out the property tax and clarification of a legislator's eligibility to run for other office by virtue of the termination date of his elective term.

Texasans turned thumbs down on tax exemptions for warehouse-stored property, El Paso local governmental consolidations, Dallas road bonds, tax aid for Texarkana tobacco merchants, state contract changes, tax benefits for anti-pollution equipment purchasers and industrial bond issues.

New Jobs Announced
Gov.-elect Preston Smith announced as his first staff selection James P. Oliver, formerly of Caldwell, to serve as execu-

tive budget director after the new administration takes over in January. Oliver currently serves as assistant director of the Legislative Budget Board.

Walter N. Corrigan of San Antonio is new chairman of Texas Research League. C. I. Wall of Amarillo is vice-chairman, and Grogan Lord of Georgetown was renamed secretary-treasurer.

C. C. Miller of Dallas is chairman of University Interscholastic League Legislative Council and B. E. McCollum of Port Neches is vice-chairman.

Glenn Biggs, formerly of Abilene and one-time executive assistant to House Speaker Barnes, has been appointed president of National Western Life Insurance Company.

Hill-Burton Fund Approved
Forty-two applicants received allocations of \$15,198,504 in federal Hill - Burton hospital construction - modernization funds through State Board of Health.

Biggest allocation of \$1 million each went to hospitals in Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, Bonham, Irving and Fort Worth. Memorial Hospital of Uvalde received two grants totalling \$865,000. Atlanta City Hospital received \$900,000; Brownfield's Terry Hospital District \$650,000; Hotel Dieu at El Paso \$885,500; Johnson City Hospital \$390,000; Community Hospital of Brazosport in Freeport \$242,690; Ballinger Memorial Hospital \$300,000; Highland General of Pampa \$321,119; St. Joseph's of El Paso \$594,313; Seton of Austin \$375,000; Denison Memorial \$210,000; Newton County Memorial \$320,350; and Mornside Manor (home for aged), San Antonio \$700,000.

Smaller amounts went to facilities in Waco, Lone Star, Jacksonville, Floresville, Hempstead, El Paso, Robert Lee, Coleman, Sterling City, Midland, Greenville, Corpus Christi, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth.

Hill-Burton funds pay up to half of the cost of construction-modernization work.

Attack Redirected

Texas Animal Health Commission has changed its attack on hog cholera in Texas by de-emphasizing the cure which has turned out to be a cause of the disease.

Commission has been depending on the modified live-virus vaccine to combat the disease. But statistics show that, in 1967, 31 per cent of the hog cholera cases were traced back to the use of the MLV.

In 60 per cent of those cases, the vaccine was improperly used. But in the other 40 per cent, it was not. Texas statistics showed that 33 per cent of the cases were caused by use of the MLV.

So, the Commission approved a new requirement that all hogs leaving a market for destinations other than slaughter be inoculated with inactive serum. Then, if the owner wants to use the live virus, he may.

Secondly, the Commission amended its regulation that all hogs entering the state must have been treated with the modified live-virus vaccine. New requirement will be the use of the inactive serum alone.

Employment was benefited by the creation of 5,700 new jobs. Facilities were created for 1.2 million annual visitor-days of recreation.

Eleven of these reservoirs were constructed through cooperative cost sharing efforts with communities so as to provide municipal water supplies.
