Product Development Reports Heard At Annual Meet Of Mohair Council

Merchandising finished mohair products, new product development, proposed mohair grade standards and technical information on flammability tests highlighted the annual membership meeting of the Mohair Council of America, in San Angelo January 30.

More than 150 persons attended the session, including most of the council's directors from 21 districts.

Those attending the meeting from Goldthwaite were V. Z. Cornelius and David Watters.

Delph Briscoe, Jr. of Uvalde, who has headed the council since it was created three years ago, was re-elected president. Gail Dudley of Comanche was re-elected vice president and Walter Pfleger of San Angelo was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The council's directors approved a budget of \$395,000 for the fiscal year 1969-70, and producers gave their unanimous approval to continue the 1½¢

per pound deduction on mohair marketed during the 1968 calendar year.

Eleanor Kairalla, who supervises publicity and promotion activities for the council in New York, and Lee Clark, the council's market development director, issued encouraging reports on interest being shown in new fabrics and yarn development, but both women warned producers and directors that a mohair labeling program would have to be undertaken if past efforts in promotion continues to be effective.

"We can create all the consumer interest in the world for mohair, but we can't capitalize on it effectively without proper labeling of our products," Mrs. Clark declared. Mrs. Clark called the labeling situation a "broken link" in the chain of progress, since current labeling methods are detrimental to creating market stability that mohair vitally needs.

Mr. McAndrews, whose firm has completed limited tests for the council said, "The tests have proved that mohair is one of the most resistant fibers to fire and further tests could boost the fiber to new uses because of its safety features."

Elroy Pohle, with the USDA's fiber testing laboratory in Denver, said work is continuing on establishing mohair standards, and he is being given full support of the Mohair Council in setting up these standards.

In other action the council membership approved two by-law changes which call for an additional meeting of the board in August and approval of the board to have authority to fix compensation and travel allowances of all council directors and members.

Briscoe called the meeting one of the most informative general sessions ever held by the council.

Directors named from the immediate area include Col. V. Z. Cornelius and David Watters of Goldthwaite, and Troy Duncan of Lometa.

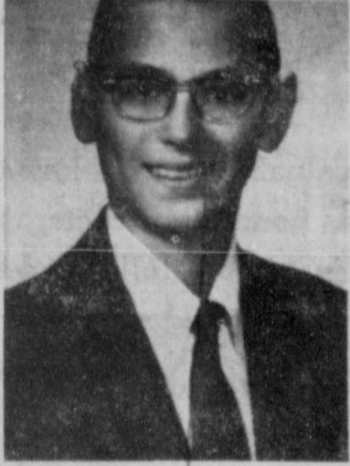

Community News From Mullin

Rabbit hunting is almost a lost sport in Texas.

I mean honest-to-goodness rabbit hunting.

Sure, some hunter will go out after doves or quail and will plunk an occasional bunny. But how many Isaac Walton Leaguers do you know who go hunting strictly for rabbits? Very few, I betcha.

Why this is true, I don't know. Rabbit hunting offers some of the finest sport to be had in the great outdoors.

Perhaps it is because the bunny isn't protected by game seasons in Texas. You can hunt cottontails and jackrabbits anytime. Somehow, by throwing the sport open to anyone, any time, it sort of takes something out of the pleasure.

But it shouldn't. Rabbit hunting actually is a bonus hunt. When other hunting seasons are closed and the hunter is home twiddling his thumbs, wondering what in blazes he can do, there is great sport to be had in scouting the woods for rabbits.

Believe it or not, rabbit hunting can be as simple or as complicated as you want it to be. This is one of the real appealing aspects of the sport. There are deluxe rabbit hunts and plain vanilla rabbit hunts, and just about everything in between, depending on your pleasure.

One of the most enjoyable means of seeking Mr. Rabbit is with a dog or dogs. Any canine that will chase rabbits can be used in the sport. But when you talk about rabbit hunting, you sort of think about Bassets and Beagles. These are the rabbit-hunting hounds.

Basically, both accomplish the same purpose. Idea behind rabbit hunting with dogs is to flush the bunny into the open where the hunter can get his sights on it. But dogs are not alike in their hunting methods. Beagles pursue rabbits mostly by sight; Bassets by scent.

When a Beagle spooks a rabbit into the open, the dog takes out right on the heels of the bunny, its legs a blur of motion. Since the Beagle has short legs it can't stay up with a rabbit in a foot race. However, this really is an advantage rather

than a disadvantage. If the dog makes the rabbit run too fast, it will take off instantly and soon be out of gun range.

Experienced hunters know that a rabbit often will circle and come back to the spot where it started. Thus the hunter stands still and waits, listening to the high chop-chop bark of the pursuing Beagle. Chances are the bunny will soon come hippity-hopping back in view again.

A Basset hound moves along with its nose almost dragging the ground. Seldom does it look up to see where it is going. When a rabbit is spooked by a Basset, the bunny sort of hops off leisurely in front of the dog, always keeping well out in front, but not hurrying. The hunter tagging along usually can get some fine shooting opportunities.

But dogs are not absolutely necessary to make a rabbit shoot a memorable event. If you don't believe this just take out your trusty shotgun or 22 rifle and walk through any wooded area known to be inhabited by rabbits. Keep your eyes alert. Be on the lookout for one to jump suddenly into view . . . often from almost under your feet.

Best time to hunt is real early in the morning or late in the afternoon. During these periods the rabbits are up and about, feeding. Then they are more susceptible to a stalk. In midday they bed down in clumps of brush and you almost have to step on one to make it show itself.

Whether you prefer a shotgun or a 22 rifle is simply a matter of personal preference. A shotgun loaded with No. 6 shotshells is more deadly at short range and on running shots, but the 22 rifle is more sporting. Get your 22 out often during the year, for a little rabbit shooting, and you won't have any trouble connecting with a deer when the big-game season rolls around.

Another facet of rabbit hunting, usually ignored, is that cottontails are very good to eat. A young, tender cottontail is especially delectable.

Skin one by making a cut cross-ways right on the backbone, insert your fingers under its skin on each side of the opening, and spread your arms apart. Half of the skin will peel down over the hindquarters, the other half over the head.

Cut the meat into chunks and fry it just as you would Southern fried chicken, in a deep skillet brimming with lard and laced with some bacon drippings. Or if you prefer, boil and later add dumplings.

One session at the dinner table when cottontail rabbit is the specialty of the house and you'll be a rabbit-hunting convert for life.

Anyway, rabbit hunting itself is just plain fun.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas Legislators now are busy with committee hearings on dozens of bills the 181 members would like to turn into laws.

Even though Gov. Preston Smith may not have his budget and tax message ready this week there is plenty of business before the legislative committees to keep them occupied.

Perhaps the most talked-about legislation is that dealing with the public school reorganization plan recommended by Gov. John Connally's Committee on Public School Education.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes joined Governor Smith in doubting that the forced consolidation of school districts would pass. And mail the legislators are getting from parents and administrators in the smaller districts leads others to agree that the proposal will have to be modified.

Smith is urging reform of the basis on which state aid is given to local school districts.

PSE Committee's study revealed that a great many school districts are getting bonanzas from the state by failing to properly tax their own property. It seems that the less they collect locally, the more they get from the state.

Sen. A. M. Aiken Jr. of Paris and Rep. George Hinson of Mineola have signatures of more than half of the members of each house on the Texas State Teachers Association pay raise bill for school teachers. This package of changes will cost the state's taxpayers some \$206 million a year, plus \$20 million increased state funds for school operation, maintenance and transportation.

Smith said that he will recommend new taxes to finance projects he will recommend in his spending program. But he is not yet ready to say what sort of tax he will suggest.

WETS ACT FAST
Liquor by the drink legisla-

tion received instant action in the Senate.

Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso introduced a proposed constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to legalize mixed drink sales on a local option basis, then minutes later, his own senate constitutional amendments committee set it for hearing Wednesday, (February 12).

A similar amendment was introduced in the House at the same time by Rep. Cletus Davis of Houston.

Both Lieutenant Governor Barnes and Governor Smith gave the amendment a cautious approving nudge.

Barnes said he viewed prospects for approval of liquor-by-the-drink as improving and added he feels "people ought to have an opportunity to decide the issue" by popular vote.

Smith made an almost identical observation and noted the proposal advanced by Christie and Davis gives voters "several checks" through local option elections.

Constitutional amendments must receive a two-thirds vote of both houses of the Legislature before they can be submitted for approval or rejection of a majority of qualified voters.

The Christit-Davis proposition would delete the old constitutional ban on "open saloons." It would empower the Legislature to "regulate the manufacture, sale, possession

and transportation of catering liquors, including power to establish a state monopoly on sale of distillate liquors."

A separate bill sponsored by the recommended amendments to take effect on passage of constitutional amendments be introduced later. It would be introduced later. It would be introduced later. It would be introduced later. It would be introduced later.

Barnes predicted some opponents who oppose liquor-by-the-drink will go along with admitting the issue to a vote of these, Sen. Oscar Mann of Dallas, is a co-author of proposed amendment.

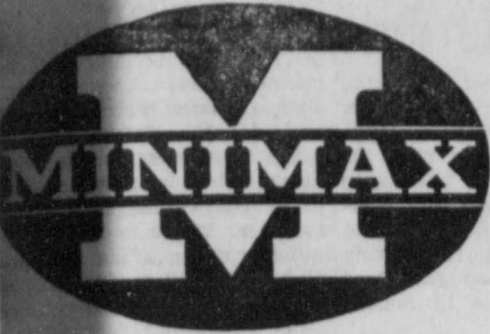

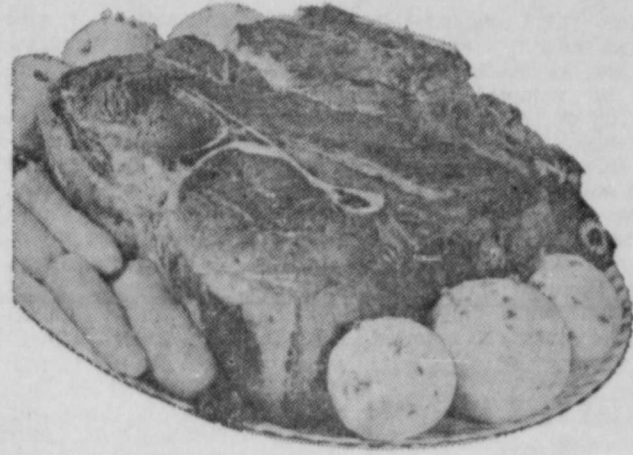
