Three Dead After One Car Crash Here Monday Afternoon

Three people are dead and the fourth is injured and hospitalized here after a one car crash just south of the Goldthwaite city limits Monday at 5:30 p. m.

Dead are Mrs. Vivian Irene (Dee) Greathouse, 47, Hamby Cleo Perry, 73, father of Mrs. Greathouse, both of Goldthwaite, and Avery Franks, 69, of Lometa.

Injured and still hospitalized in Childress Clinic & Hospital is Louis Eldred Perry, 49, of Goldthwaite, son of the elder Perry. He was the driver of the 1966 car the four were in, officers reported.

The crash took place at the South Y when the car left the highway and smashed through signs and a mesquite tree and landed in a water pond located between highways 183 and 16, according to Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks and Dwan Cohn, highway patrolman, who investigated.

The four were traveling towards Goldthwaite and as they approached the city limits at a slight curve the car apparently failed to follow the curve and started off on the right shoulder. It knocked down four curve reflector signs and a highway marker. After cutting down the highway marker the car skidded left across the highway through the tree and landed in the pond, at Mill Pond Park.

Officers reported that the car skidded 425 feet after hitting the highway marker before it came to a stop. When officers arrived at the scene all occupants were in the car which was tilted on its side in the water and mud.

All were taken to Childress Clinic and Hospital by Roy Wilkins Ambulance service.

Mr. Franks and Mrs. Greathouse were pronounced dead shortly after arriving at the hospital. Hamby Perry, in critical condition, was transferred Monday night to Medical Arts Hospital in Brownwood where he died early Wednesday morning.

Louis Perry is still hospitalized here and his condition Wednesday morning was reported as fair.

Funeral services for Mrs. Greathouse were scheduled for Wednesday morning, June 4, at 11:00 a. m. at the First Baptist

Church in Goldthwaite under the direction of Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.

The Franks funeral services were scheduled for 5:00 p. m. Wednesday afternoon at the New Baden Baptist Church in Robertson County, with Roy Wilkins Funeral Home in charge.

Services for Hamby Perry were pending Wednesday morning and were to be announced by Wilkins.

Bennett Creek Project Boosters To Meet Friday

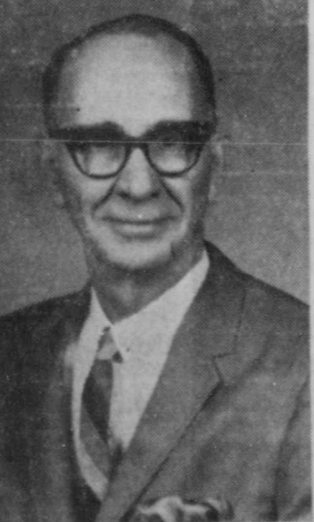

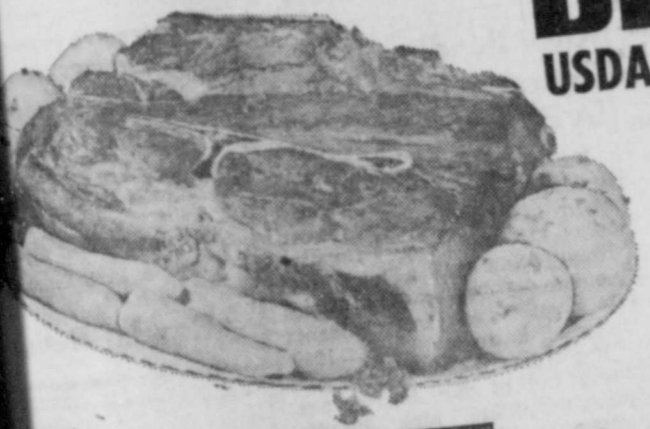

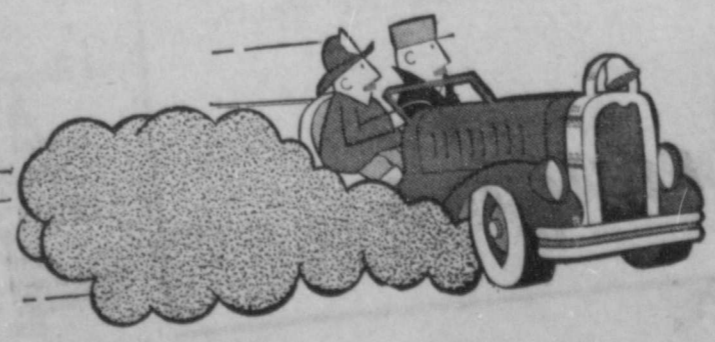

Farmers And Ranchers Are Invited To FB Policy Meeting In Brownwood

Two issues of vital importance to farmers and ranchers will be discussed at a District 7 meeting June 9 in Brownwood, according to B. J. TFB President Sidney Dean urges all county presidents and policy development and policy execution committee members to attend and participate in their respective district meetings. He asked them to be prepared to "discuss these important issues with your county Farm Bureau members."

Two Are Charged In County Court After Sniping Incidents Thursday

Two men from New Mexico were charged in Judge Cecil Egger's Court here after sniping incidents on highway 84 in northern Mills County last Thursday afternoon, according to Sheriff H. G. Brooks.

Morris Crow, 36, of Albuquerque, N. M., was charged with DWI and aggravated assault and remains in Mills County jail with bond set at \$2,000.00. He is also being held on a federal warrant.

Richard Taylor, 20, alias D. A. Caldwell, also of Albuquerque, was charged with aggravated assault and pleaded guilty and was fined \$150.00 plus costs and given a 30 day jail sentence.

Sheriff Brooks stated Tuesday that he believed the two would be released to federal authorities since they are reportedly parole violators.

Brooks was assisted in the investigation by highway patrolman Dwain Cohn, of Goldthwaite, and about 40 outside officers from Brown and Comanche counties before the second man was arrested Thursday night.
