11 More Boosters Are Needed To Reach Park Maintenance Fund Goal

Another 11 boosters for Mills County Park Maintenance Fund honor roll are needed to reach the goal of 100 for 1969, it was announced Tuesday by W. P. Duren, chairman of the Park Committee.

The committee last week issued what was hoped to be their last call for financial support for this year, but the response has fallen a little short.

There are some who have been boosters of the fund in the past that have overlooked getting their checks in so far this year. Duren stated in commenting on the need for a few additional contributions.

The goal of 100 boosters can be reached with a few more donations, it was pointed out this week, and the drive can be completed.

A minimum goal of \$1,200.00 is needed to insure a park caretaker for the year.

Bank Deposits Up Nearly 2 \$Million Over Past Year

Deposits in Mills County State Bank went up nearly two \$million during the past year according to condensed statement of condition appearing in this issue of the paper.

The statement, as of June 30, reflects the best growth year for the bank in history, W. P. Duren, president, stated as he pointed out that the total resources of the bank went up over a \$million in the past six months.

On December 31, 1968 the bank's resources were \$10,633,411.31 and on June 30, 1969 total resources were \$11,843,947.03.

While deposits gained nearly two \$million during the past year, just shy of one \$million gain was recorded in the past six months.

Deposits on June 29, 1968 were \$9,090,457.18 and on June 30, 1969 they were \$10,702,149.46.

Loans went up from \$4,669,527.91 on June 29, 1968 to \$5,108,815.27 on June 30, 1969.

WCID Directors Vote To Guarantee Easements For Bennett Creek Project

Officers and directors of the Mills County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, have gone on record to guarantee the remaining easements required to see the Bennett Creek project through and get on the construction schedule for 1970.

The directors took this action at a special meeting last week Tuesday night when they reviewed the public support from property owners in the Bennett Creek Watershed.

Before the Tuesday night meeting the board members held a public meeting on Monday night attended by many property owners from the watershed and also a number of those from the down stream flood area.

Purpose of this meeting was to get together and discuss the easements needed and see how much support there was to move the project ahead. Everyone present was given an opportunity to express himself regarding the subject.

The board of directors felt that there was sufficient encouragement from the majority of property owners to go ahead and guarantee the remaining easements.

Of the 34 easements involved for the four dam sites only four remain to be signed by property owners.

One of the four sites has been cleared, two sites lack one easement and one site lacks two easements.

Plans call for four dams on the project at this time. This may be amended at a later date and the work plan may be revised to include more. A number of projects on the Colorado River watershed have been amended to add more structures, according to Doug Sellars, district conservationist of the Goldthwaite SCS work unit.

The four dams planned will hold 800 acre feet of water in Mills County, officials point out.

The board felt since the project has been in process of planning, etc., for about 13 years, that now is the time to follow through and see that it is placed on the construction schedule.

In order to do this the district officials had to guarantee acquisition of the remaining easements so that the Soil Conservation Service can go ahead with the project.

Members of the board are hopeful that the four remaining easements will be signed on a voluntary basis to go along with the other 30 who have already signed theirs. Five of the 30 have signed their easements since June 6. Remaining easements can be taken care of through condemnation proceedings due to the encouragement and support from the majority of landowners involved. District officials however look on this means as a last resort and would prefer having the four grant their easements to make it unanimous.

Officers and directors of the district are: Jim Soules, president; J. Sherwood Owens, secretary-treasurer; Homer McCasland, Arnold Head and Walter Tubbs.

Council Hears Annual Reports At Regular Meeting Monday Night

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall heard annual reports from City Manager W. C. Barnett and talked about the city business for the new year.

Reports of operation were presented for the fiscal year ending June 30, by the manager. Operating reports for the past year included the electric, water, sewer and garbage, swimming pool, library, and cemetery association.

In addition to these proprietary functions of the city the council also heard report on the operation of the governmental functions of the City of Goldthwaite.

The annual budget for the new year is expected to be presented to the council at their next meeting.

Operating reports for the past month for the various departments and the quarterly treasurer's report were also presented to the council.

Manager Barnett reported on the work schedule for city crews for the summer months and projects that are underway. One of these is the street preparation around the low rent housing units for paving these streets.

Garbage collection charges came in for another round of discussion and from all indications the council will formulate some definite policy with rate adjustments to help the city meet the actual cost of providing this service to customers.

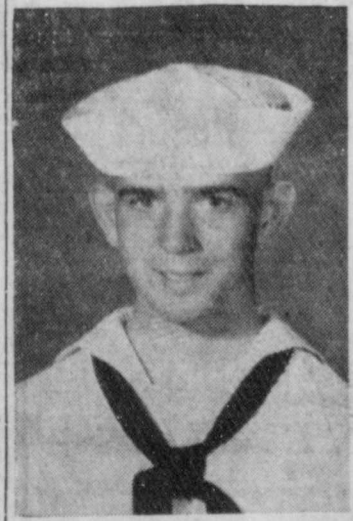
Local Scouts Attend Camp Billy Gibbons

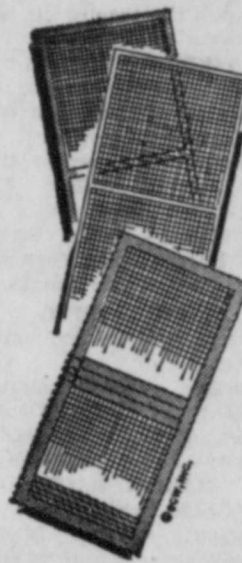

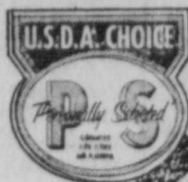
