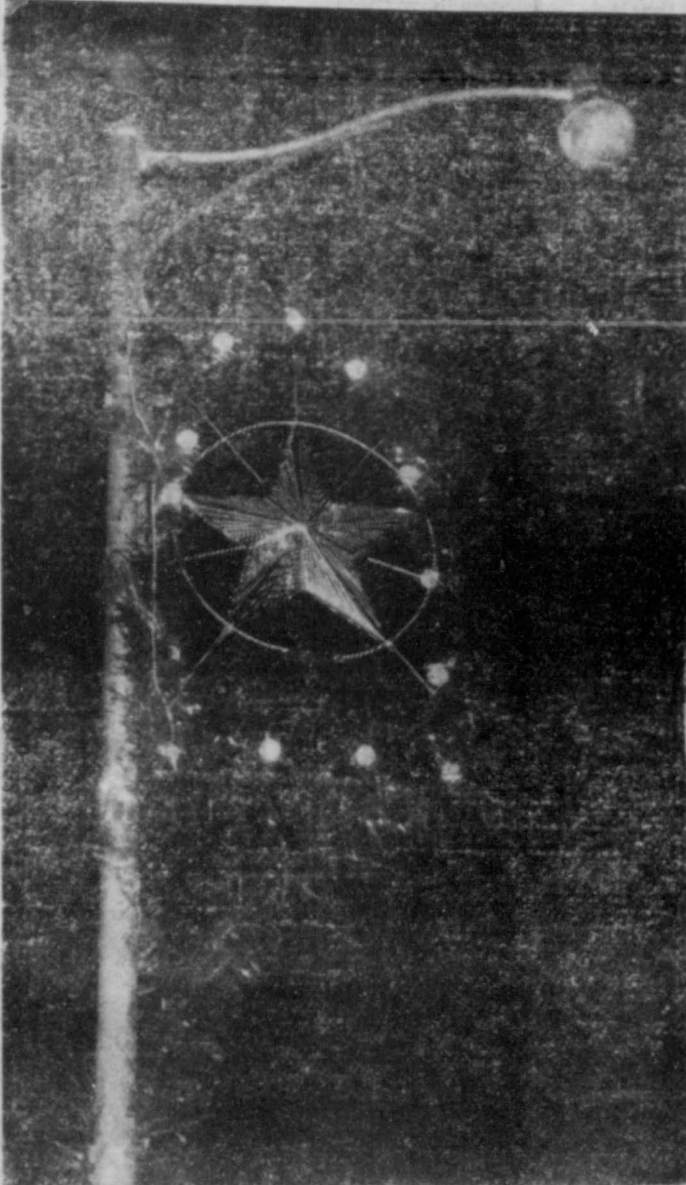


Mike Conradt Bags Fine Buck

Pictured here is one of 42 electric Christmas lighting decorations that are mounted on special steel and utility poles along streets and at a number of intersections.

The 42 decoration pieces are about one half of the total planned in a decoration program that was approved and undertaken two years ago when

the first phase got underway. At that time, without soliciting funds from merchants, \$800 was raised to purchase eight of the fixtures. These were paid for by the Lions Club Christmas Lighting Fund, Mills County State Bank, City Utilities and the Commissioners' Court.

Last year the city council voted to purchase an additional 34 of the same type decorations which brought the total to 42. This brought the total to a little over the one-half way mark of the entire program which calls for 75 electric decorations to be purchased over a period of time.

Sen. Chet Brooks Heads Committee For Second Term

State Senator Chet Brooks, of Harris County, son of Mrs. Julia Biddle of Goldthwaite, has been appointed to a second term as chairman of the Senate Committee on Vocational-Technical Education.

The committee, which Sen. Brooks has headed since its inception in 1967, was instrumental in the drafting and passage of the Texas Technical Vocational Education Act of 1969. The new law set up the State Advisory Council on Technical-Vocational Education, created the position of Associate Commissioner for Technical Education within the Texas Education Agency, and placed much greater emphasis on occupational training in the state.

Information On "Cycling Safely" Released By City Health Officer

Dr. M. A. Childress, city health officer, has released some information regarding "Cycling Safely," which should be of interest to parents as well as the bicycle riders of the community.

He pointed out that there have been several accidents in the past year in Goldthwaite in which bicycle riders were involved.

The following article, "Cycling Safely," is taken from a State Health Journal and presents many worthwhile tips on the subject.

"Although summer is about over—as far as carefree young bicycle riders are concerned—bicycle safety is still a must for our Texas streets and highways. And with school time approaching, many students will be pedaling their way to classes (and in many cases, in all kinds of weather.)

The State Health Department suggests you remember that there are rules and regulations for bicyclists. These are important for both bicycle riders and motorists to know.

It's important too, that parents instruct their children in the "right" method of bicycling. Somewhere in the neighborhood of 600 bicycle riders annually lose their lives when in collision with motor vehicles. There are more bikes out now than ever before. Children learn to ride at an earlier age, and more adults and elderly persons are out riding for exercise and recreation.

According to information on hand at the State Health Department, collisions between motor vehicles and bicycles occurs about as follows:

- Well over half at intersections.
- Seven out of ten during daylight hours.

• Four-fifths of the bicycle riders killed or injured in traffic accidents, were violating a traffic law at the time of the incident.

• Half of the motor vehicle-bicycle accidents, involved a violation on the part of the motor vehicle operator.

• One out of five bicycles involved in accidents had some mechanical defect.

• Some of the most common traffic violations of cyclists are: (not in order of frequency):

- Failure to yield right-of-way. (In most cases, the cyclists did not "see" the car; in some cases he intentionally infringed on the motorist's right-of-way.)
- Riding in the center of the street.
- Speed too fast for conditions of traffic and road surface.
- Disregard of traffic control devices — signal lights and stop signs.
- Improper turning.

To avoid such situations as just described, here are some safety rules for bicyclists:

- A skillful bicycle rider always has his bike under control. He never drives too fast and he never rides too far. He always has both hands free to steer.
- The cyclist must develop skill in balancing and pedaling, to avoid swerving into traffic, hitting a fixed object, running off the sidewalk or highway. Parents have the responsibility to be certain their child has the skill to cope with traffic before permitting him to drive on the street.
- Every bicycle rider should be familiar with the laws governing bicycling in his community, or the one in which he is riding. These rules are usually available through the school or local police.
- Cyclists must ride on the right side of the street with the flow of traffic; not on the left, facing traffic.
- Hand signals should be used by the cyclists, and are now commonly accepted as a safe riding practice.
- Cyclists should avoid crowding between cars at stop signs, or between an automobile and the curb.
- Carrying more passengers than a bicycle is designed and equipped for is dangerous and illegal. Two on a bike also increases stopping distances. The polo or "banana" seat, standard equipment on the hi-rise bike, appears designed to carry two. Such is not the case!
- Never hold onto a moving vehicle nor in any way attach the bike to the vehicle.
- Always ride single file.
- Trick riding or strutting is always dangerous. Drivers of hi-riders are especially cautioned against making the bike rear up and riding on back wheels only, or jumping the bike over obstacles.

All the projects were under the direction and supervision of Mrs. Patti Johnson, homemaking teacher at GHS.

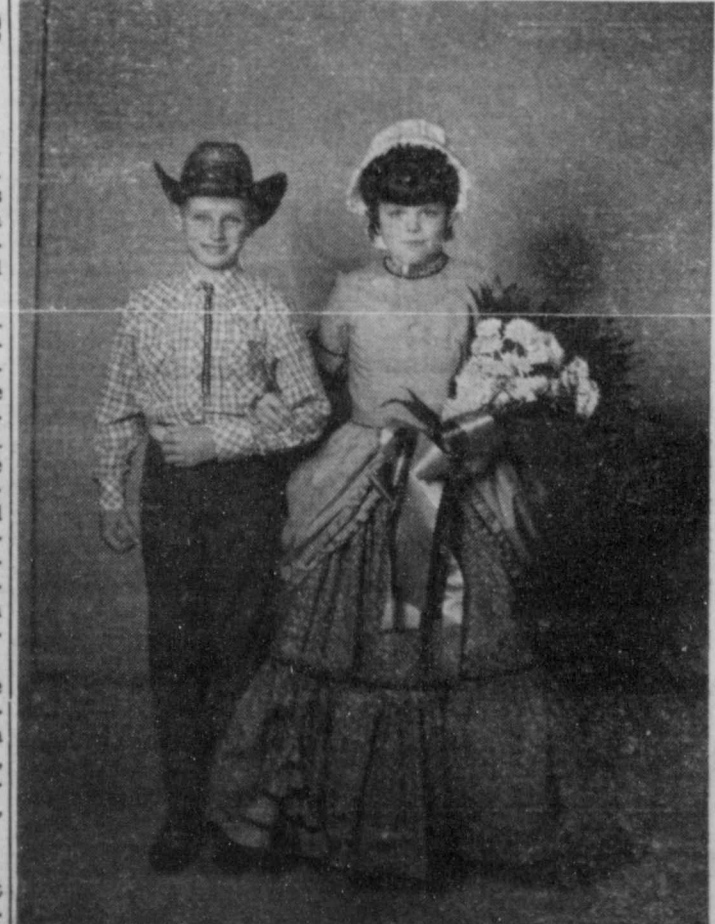
Spradley To Have Anniversary Sale

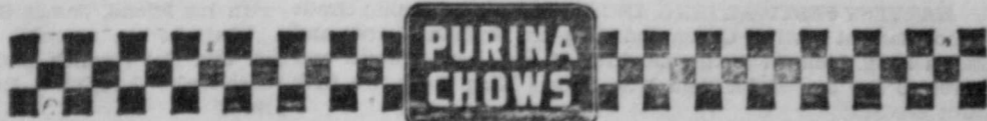

Sales in Texas during October were \$14,409,900 and sales for the 10-month period totaled \$148,528,569 for 87 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$170.1 million.

Over the nation, sales for the month were \$438 million — a 24-year peak for any October and 2 per cent higher than a year ago. The January-October sales totaled \$4,066 million — 83.6 per cent of the national goal of \$4,861 billion.



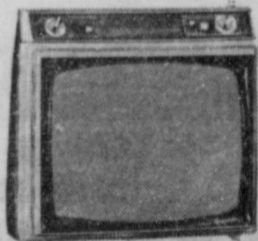

AUSTIN, Tex. — Prospects of whopping new tax bills may face Texans in 1971, 1973 and 1975 and a critical housing shortage within the next decade is likely.

Texas Research League heard the bad news at its 17th annual meeting here.

James W. McGrew, new Executive Director of the League and one of the state's top fiscal authorities, warned of the coming "decade of tax crises" like that of the 1950's.

McGrew sized up the 1971 tax bill as at least \$270 million and maybe as much as \$400 million. Furthermore, he predicted, a bigger one will be in store two years later and one not quite so big in 1975.

Standby sales tax (now a four and a quarter per cent in many areas) may be near its "political limitation." Implication was clear that new tax trails will have to be blazed.

Gov. Preston Smith said half the state's 2,803,000 housing units are "inadequate or sub-standard." He requested the League to study the problem and come up with recommendations as to the state's role in the housing field.

Housing shortage may reach "crisis proportions" in two years, Smith told League members. Needs over the next decade, he forecast, will demand \$1.5 billion worth of construction.

tion a year in Texas. Within the same period, he said, housing will have to be found for 875,000 new Texas families, and slums and overcrowding must be eliminated.

Greatest prospect for solving problems of slums, contended the governor, lies in "effective programs of governments to assist slum residents in becoming home owners." Public housing and rent supplements, he maintained, "tend to isolate, segregate and spotlight the poor, while providing no long-range changes in their situations."

Smith suggested a statewide building code may be needed and State Housing Authority may be helpful to coordinate efforts of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development with local governmental units.

BALLOT SPOTS PICKED

Proposed constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink will be in the second spot on the November 3, 1970, general election ballot.

Here's how drawings for other ballot places by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. came out last week:

No. 1 — Provision for removal, censure or retirement of appellate court judges and justices of the peace by a new Judicial Qualifications Commission.

No. 3 — Uniform method for assessing farm, ranch and forest lands on a capability to produce basis.

No. 4 — Making the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.

No. 5 — Authorizing counties to issue road bonds up to a fourth of assessed valuation on vote of taxpayers.

No. 6 — Increasing value of homesteads exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 — Providing for consolidation of local government functions and inter-agency contracts for performance of governmental services.

COURTS SPEAK
