Star Takes District Title; Meets Mozelle For Bi-District Playoff

Star Tigers overpowered last Thursday night by a TD of 50-8 to wind up their football season for 1970 also to take the District Championship.

Mozelle's only loss came on their second game of the season when they lost to Star 28-22. "Mozelle probably has the fastest 6-man team in the state and they are capable of playing real hard football," Coach Tidwell stated Monday morning.

With only 2:19 left in the first quarter Bronco Eddie Sutton scored from the one-yard line. Mike Taylor kicked the PAT.

As the clock showed only 3:13 before the half, the Broncos kicked a 27-yard field goal which left the Eagles trailing 10-0.

When the Eagles had to give up the ball on the Bronco 16-yard line, Milton Noel breezed down the field for Sonora's second TD of the night. The PAT was good. Noel again took the ball 87 yards for another TD for Sonora. Taylor kicked the PAT.

In the final two minutes of play Goldthwaite erased the 23-0 score when fullback Sam Watson scored from the four after Kennon McLean intercepted a Sonora pass. However the run

for 2 extra points failed. Those expecting a Sonora runaway Friday night were greatly surprised by the first half. In fact, according to all statistics, the score should have been closer.

The Golden Eagles finished their 1970 football season as the District 10-A Champions with only one loss during the regular football season. This loss was to San Saba by a score of 7-0.

The Eagles played very outstanding football this season and against some very tough teams.

City crews started Monday morning on the job of installing the Christmas Lights throughout the city's business district.

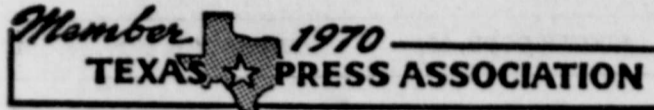
The holiday decoration program with electric fixtures was expanded this year to include a wider area with lights being installed in more than 30 new locations.

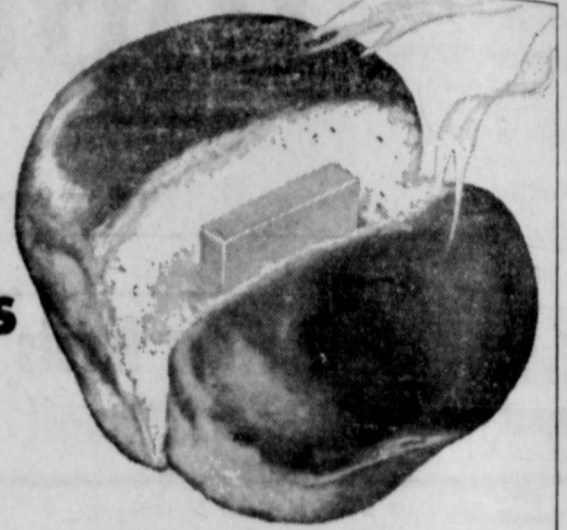

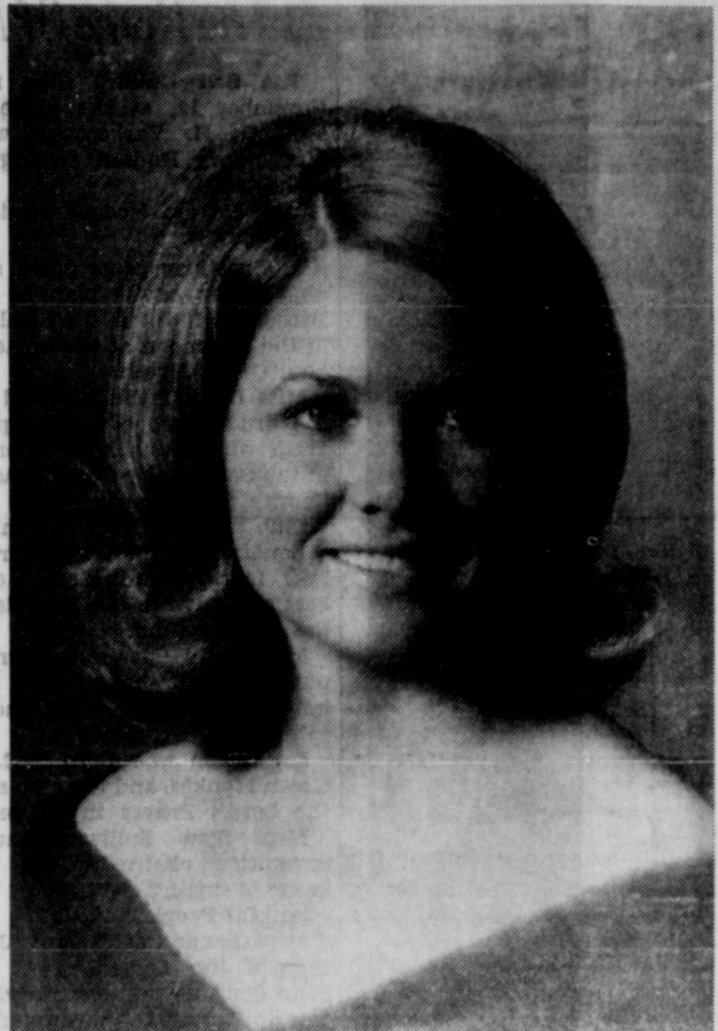

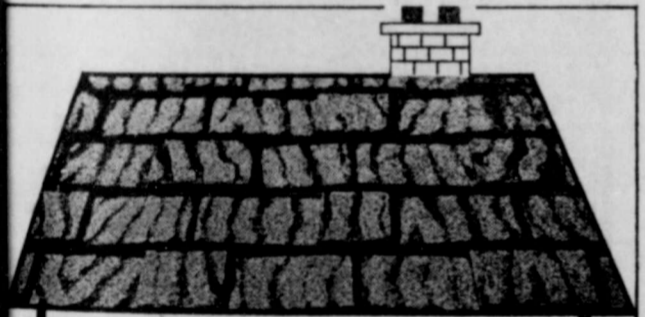

"The Missing Day" was told by Mrs. C. A. Keeler. It concerned a missing day in time discovered and related by Harold Hill, president of the Curtis Engine Company in Baltimore, Maryland, and a consultant in the space program. Mr. Hill stated that he thought one of the most amazing things that God has for us today happened to our astronauts and space scientists at Green Belt, Maryland. They were trying to determine the position of the sun, moon and planets 100 years and 1,000 years from now. In order to do this they had to plot the orbits through past centuries.

They ran the computer measurement back and forth over the centuries and suddenly it came to a halt. The computer signaled that there was something wrong either with the information fed into it or with the results compared to the standards. They called in the service department to check it out and found nothing technically

wrong. The computer still came up with the same discrepancy — a day was missing in space in elapsed time. The scientists were dumbfounded. There was no answer.

One of the team remembered a reference to the sun standing still in the Bible. Upon checking, they found in the Book of Joshua a pretty "ridiculous" statement for anybody who has "common sense." According to the Scripture, Joshua was concerned because he was surrounded by the enemy and if darkness fell they would overpower him, so Joshua asked the Lord to make the sun stand still. "So the sun stood still in the midst of heaven, and hasted not to go down about a whole day." (Joshua 10:13). There was the missing day!

They checked the computers going back to the time it was written and found it was close but not close enough. The elapsed time that was missing back in Joshua's day was 23 hours and 20 minutes — not a whole day. They again read the passage and there it said, "about (approximately) a whole day." This still did not account for the other missing 40 minutes. The 40 minutes had to be found because in projecting special orbits it would be multiplied many times over.

Again the man remembered somewhere in the Bible that it said the sun went backwards. In 2nd Kings, Chapter 20, Hezekiah, on his deathbed, was visited by the prophet Isaiah who told him that he was not going

to die. Hezekiah did not believe him and asked for a sign. The shadow go forward ten degrees, or go back ten degrees (2nd Kings: 20:9-10). The shadow is exactly 40 minutes. Twenty - three hours, twenty minutes in Joshua's day make the missing twenty hours the space travelers had log in the logbook as being missing day in the universe. 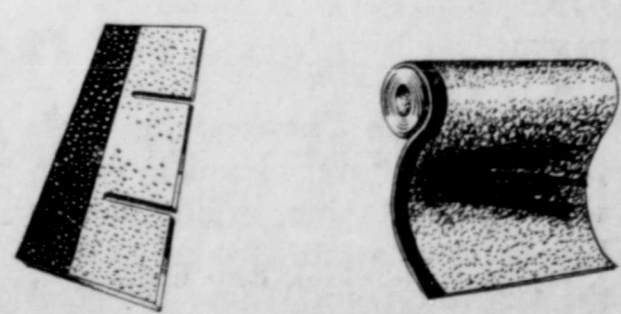

Traditional Thanksgiving feasts provide the occasion for family reunions and other festive gatherings. Tradition calls for native fruits and vegetables, such as sweetpotatoes and pumpkins, to be served with that popular native American bird — the turkey.

Even if your family gathering is rather small, you still may want to select a large turkey to roast and serve for Thanksgiving dinner. Then you can cut the leftover turkey from the bone as soon as possible, slice the meat and portion into packets suitable for other meals.

Wrap the turkey slices in freezer paper or foil, label and freeze immediately. Follow the same procedure with diced cooked turkey that you plan to use in turkey salad and soups.

TURKEY RICE SOUP is a tasty way to use left-over turkey.

- 4 cups turkey stock
 - 1/4 cup finely diced onion
 - 1/2 cup diced celery
 - 1/2 cup diced carrots
 - 1/4 cup rice
 - 3 tablespoons fat
 - 3 tablespoons flour
 - 1 cup diced cooked turkey
 - 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- Heat stock to boiling. Add vegetables and rice to stock and cook slowly. Melt fat, blend in flour. Add a little hot stock to flour mixture and blend until smooth, then stir into soup. Add

turkey. Cook, stirring constantly, for 10 minutes longer. Remove from heat and add chopped parsley before serving. Serves five.

TURKEY GUMBO

- 2 small onions, diced
 - 2 tablespoons fat
 - 4 cups turkey broth
 - 2 cups canned tomatoes
 - 2 cups bits of cooked turkey
 - 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 - 2 cups cooked rice
 - 4 cups cooked okra
- Cook onion in fat until tender but not brown. Add broth, tomatoes, okra, turkey, parsley and paprika. Heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Taste for seasoning. Add cooked rice. Heat and serve. Makes four to six servings.

Steamed Cranberry Pudding is an old fashioned favorite.

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 2 tablespoons melted shortening
 - 1 1/4 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/3 cup warm water
 - 2 teaspoons soda
- Have ready for SAUCE:
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup cream
1/2 cup butter, melted
1 teaspoon vanilla
- Combine flour, baking powder, and salt. Sift together. Add cranberries. Mix molasses, water, shortening, and soda, and add to cranberry mixture. Spoon into well greased one-quart mold or cylindrical can. Cover mold with parchment paper, aluminum foil or several layers of heavy waxed paper, and tie loosely in place. Place in steamer, or on top of a trivet or wire rack in a large covered kettle or roasting pan. Add water to just below top of rack. Cover pan, remove mold from pan and let stand a few minutes or set in cold water a few seconds before unmolding.
- To prepare the sauce, blend sugar and cream. Heat, but do not boil. When ready to serve, beat in butter with rotary beater. Add vanilla. Serve pudding hot with hot sauce drizzled over the top. Makes eight servings.
